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

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

**Cotton Grower Directors  
Vote To Continue Program**

Directors of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. in session at Lubbock voted in favor of continuing the two choice cotton program in 1961 and approved a budget of \$185,000 for the next fiscal year.

The 1960 cotton program provides farmers operating under the "A" plan with their "regular" farm acreage allotment and price supports of not less than 75 per cent of parity.

It enables growers who selected the "B" program to expand their acreage by about 40 per cent in exchange for lower price supports of not less than 60 per cent of parity.

There still was a considerable speculation about whether or not new cotton legislation could be enacted in time to affect the 1961 crop.

But one farmer apparently sounded the sentiments of a large portion of the group when he said that "we'd better be ready to suggest something when Congress convenes in August, or we might get something rammed down our throats that we wouldn't like."

Opposition also was voiced to reports that an effort may be made in the future to put production controls on a poundage or bushelage basis.

In essence, the vote to continue the 1960 program into next year apparently was aimed at voicing dissatisfaction with the lower acreage allotments and a cut in price supports that are looming for 1961.

At the same time, however, it seemed likely that the big cotton organization would oppose any efforts to raise price supports to unrealistic levels at the expense of greatly curtailed acreage allotments.

"It's my guess that any sizable increase in price supports would be accompanied by the most stringent production controls we've ever had," one leading cotton observer at the session said.

The directors unanimously approved the budget after it was presented by M. A. (Rip) Elms, Littlefield, chairman of the PCG's finance committee.

Elms said the budget for 1960-61 is essentially the same as for the past fiscal year except that it provides for an increase of \$10,000 for promotion and advertising expenditures on High Plains cotton.

The advertising and promotional budget for 1960-61 totals \$20,000. Directors also approved plans to cooperate with the U. S. Department of Agriculture on a strip-per-harvesting research study, for which the USDA has provided a grant-in-aid of \$40,000.

A total of \$35,000 of the PCG's budget will go for cotton research.

The price outlook for hogs during the next few months is considerably brighter, says John G. McHaney, extension economist. The smaller pig crop last spring and the expected smaller 1960 fall crop are primary factors in the better price outlook.

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## "FALSE CONFIDENCE"

"And he spake this parable unto certain which trusted in themselves that they were righteous, and despised others: Two men went up into the temple to pray; the one a Pharisee and the other a publican. The Pharisee stood and prayed thus with himself, God, I thank thee, that I am not as other men are, extortioners, unjust, adulterers, or even as this publican. I fast twice in the week, I give tithes of all that I possess. And the publican, standing afar off, would not lift up so much as his eyes unto heaven, but smote upon his breast, saying, God be merciful to me a sinner." (Luke 18:9-14).

The world is filled with people who are fully confident that they are faithfully serving Jehovah. They will tell you that they know the Lord is pleased with their life. They, as did this Pharisee, will list the things that they are doing, and have done, that the Lord wants them to do. This Pharisee was a man who was very religious. He gave a tenth of his earnings, he fasted twice per week, and was not guilty of any sin such as adultery or extortion. Despite this background of good things this man did not receive the approval of God. The reason for this disapproval was that the Pharisee was full of "false confidence." He JUST KNEW that he was much BETTER than the publican who (only) acknowledged

his shortcomings and asked for God's mercy.

It is possible for one to believe that he is a Christian when in reality he is not. People think they can become a Christian without being baptized when the Bible teaches differently. Jesus said, "He that believeth and is BAPTIZED shall be saved." (Mark 16:16). This false confidence will be the damnation of thousands. Others will have the false confidence that observance of the Lord's Supper is not necessary every first day of the week. An examination of the New Testament and church history will reveal that this too is false confidence. Another is mechanical instruments of music in worship. People say, I see nothing wrong with such a practice. Yet the New Testament is as silent as a tomb on the authorization to use such in worship to God. The only music to be used is singing, and Eph. 5:19, and Col. 3:16 authorize this explicitly. Again, the New Testament and church history supports this conclusion. Those who practice such are guilty of "false confidence" in trying to serve God.

Don't be guilty of this tragic mistake. Always consult God's Word before drawing a conclusion concerning your obedience to God. Paul said, "Be not wise in your own conceits." (Rom. 12:16).



seemed to be a lack of ability to use all of the time available so he strived for an instrument rating which he gained in July 1956. Now he was equipped to do anything that presented itself in the way of flying. He has done crop spraying, charter flying, and instructing for James Miller at Plainview, having begun there May 1, 1955.

May 1, 1959 he went to San Marcus as a civilian instructor in the Army and did crop spraying on his off days as well as charter flying. He was transferred to College Station on August 1, 1959, and still with the Army as a civil-

ian. This unit was transferred to Alabama in November 1959 and he served as instructor at Ft. Rucker and another Army center.

Finishing up with the Army he went to North Dakota and Montana and continued to do crop spraying, mostly wheat. One day a man called him to come and spray 250 acres of Canary Seed. He thought this was really for the birds, but he went over and found that it was really for the birds. There was the 250 acres of Canary seed growing and in need of spraying. Well, for the birds he sprayed this crop, at the same time learning that bird seed was really a commercial crop. Now he says he will spray anything and think nothing of it. Around Lon-

poc, California he sprayed flowers. Gene has approximately 6,500 hours of flying time in his log book, 2,200 of which has been instruction with 1,900 hours of instruction being for the Army as a civilian instructor and the balance as instructor in private flying schools. He has 2,500 hours of crop spraying logged. He has flown nearly every kind and size of plane and has done a little helicopter flying also.

The average spraying speed is 90 miles per hour and the average acreage per hour is 150. However, on a large field in open country he can spray as much as 300 acres in one hour.

Crop spraying being a very seasonal occupation, sprayers usually engage in other types of flying in the off-season, such as charter flying, instructing, or perhaps con-

ducting flying clubs or even air line piloting. The spraying season usually runs from May 15 to Nov. 1st. It begins in the southern areas and progresses north. There is lots of competition and sprayers have to work at the job to get business just as in most other businesses. The glamour of flying soon fades when spraying, as it is just plain work and a job to be done.



**GIN YARD GROUPING OF COTTON ADVISED**

The practice of ginning cotton in the order of arrival at the gin needs revision. The reason, says E. G. Reeves, extension cotton ginning and mechanization specialist, is the ever-increasing number of machines used to harvest the fleecy staple.

Machine harvested cotton, he says, usually has a higher moisture and trash content than hand-

picked cotton and different settings of gin machinery and drying equipment are required for each type. A modern gin can turn out a bale of cotton every 6 to 10 minutes and there isn't time to make the needed adjustments on an individual bale basis. The result, points out Reeves, somebody loses and it usually both the grower and ginner.

The answer to the problem is the grouping of seed cotton on the gin yard according to the method of harvesting or moisture content. Reeves says that a number of gins in Texas have been using this plan and both the ginner and grower have profited. The grower has received a better selling price for his cotton and the ginner has been able to do a better ginning job.

Reeves suggests that farmers and gingers get together and agree

on a procedure for solving the problem locally. In some instances, hand-picked cotton has been ginned during the day and machine harvested cotton during the night. If machine harvested bales are in the majority, then ginning hours can be adjusted to take care of the local situation.

Experience has shown, says the specialist, that trucks and trailers are usually back in the field, under the grouping plan, as soon as they were under the old system of ginning on a first come basis. The best ginning job is done when the lint moisture is 5 to 7 percent. Drying to this level says Reeves, gives a smooth sample and allows proper cleaning. He advises farmers and gingers to get together on the problem before the heavy harvesting season begins.




