

Local Negro Charged Negro Woman **Fatally Shot** Here Saturday

A 22-year-old Abernathy Negro, Alvin White, was charged Monday with murder with malice in connection with the gunshot slay-ing in Abernathy Saturday night of a Negro woman, Florida Mae

White remained in Lubbock County jail Monday night in lieu of \$5,000 bond, set by Justice of the Peace F. R. Land.

Sheriff's deputies said the Negro woman, the mother of three children, was shot during a struggle over a gun between the sus-pect and Harvey Lewis, also of Abernathy, at a cafe in the south-west section of Abernathy. Argue Over Money
