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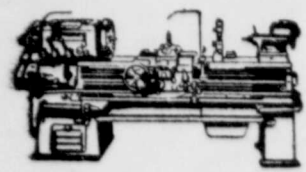

**Antelope "B" Team
Outplays Lockney
"B" Team Here, 16-6**

Abernathy's Antelope "B" team football boys were fired up last Thursday evening when they entertained the Lockney "B" team here. The local lads racked up 16 points and held the visitors to a lone touchdown, that coming in the final quarter.

Quarterback Bobby Pettit opened the scoring for Abernathy as he raced 25 yards for the six-pointer in the first quarter. Fullback Larry Boyce plunged over for the two-point conversion to put the Antelope "B" team ahead 8-0.

Stalwart fullback Boyce was responsible for Abernathy's next eight points as he galloped 35 yards for the touchdown in the second quarter, then added the extra points.

Moseley, Lockney's fullback, scored in the final quarter, going about 30 yards for the TD. Abernathy's defense held on the conversion try, thus the scoring was ended with Abernathy out front, 16-6.

Defense Stands Out
Except for the play on which Lockney scored, the local "B" team's defense was very good, being led by George Reagan, Kay Don Habbinga, Ray Ingram, Billy Barrick and Richard Saari. Offensively, the team also looked good as the linemen were hitting hard with their blocking, and the backs turned in some fine running.

School Bus Law

The following is paragraph (a) of Section 104 of the School Bus Law, regarding Overtaking and Passing a School Bus:

The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving

or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children.

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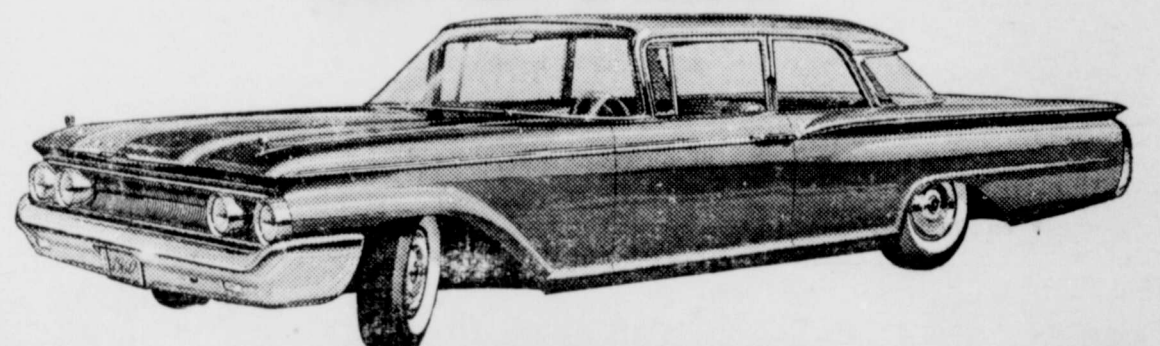
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"GUIDES IN RELIGION"

Reading Time: 4 Minutes

"O Lord, I know that the way of man is not in himself; it is not in man that walketh to direct his steps." (Jer. 10:23.) The Israelites had tried to direct their own steps, and they had departed from the Lord instead of walking with Him. This is only one of the many instances in the Bible where men went astray when they relied upon their own ways instead of the Lord's way. Every person has some one, it might be himself or others, something, or the Lord as his ideal or guide. Every person has some philosophy of life or accepts some type of leadership all through life. Right or wrong man adopts something for leadership. Some of the persons and things are:

- 1. PARENTS** — The majority of men are what they are because their parents taught them or because of their affection for their parents. The Bible teaches, "Cursed be he that setteth light by his father or his mother." Deut. 27:16. "He that loveth father or mother more than me is not worthy of me; and he that loveth son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me." (Matt. 10:37.)
- 2. CONSCIENCE** — One of the most fallible things in the world is the conscience. Saul of Tarsus persecuted the church with a clear conscience. "As for Saul, he made havoc of the church, entering into every house, and haling men and women committed them to prison." (Acts 8:3.) According to his own words before his conversion he was, "A blasphemer, and a persecutor, and injurious; but I obtained mercy, because I did it ignorantly in unbelief." (1 Tim. 1:13). Later he said, "I have lived in all good conscience before God until this day." (Acts 23:1.) If conscience is an infallible guide why does it direct men in opposite directions? Why does it not direct all men to do the same? If one can follow his conscience when it opposes the Bible what is the Book worth?
- 3. PREACHER** — Many are

following uninspired preachers without ever investigating to see where and how they are being led. A preacher may teach, strengthen, encourage and help bear your burdens, but he is just a man, and has no authority of his own. He is just as subject to error as any other person. He is in grave error when he takes the Scriptures into his own hands, perverts them, and makes them teach something the Lord never intended for them to teach. Do not be afraid to question your preacher, and demand a "Thus saith the Lord" for all that he teaches. Following preachers will not bring salvation to the lost, it creates and sustains denominations. If all men would quit following preachers today there would be no denominations; all would be just Christians and members of the Lord's Body.

4. CHRIST — All men should follow Christ the Savior of the world. Peter said Christ had the words of eternal life. (John 6:68.) God is speaking to us through Christ, His Son now. (Heb. 1:1-2.) A voice from heaven said in Matt. 17:5, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; hear ye Him." Christ has all authority (Matt. 28:18). He is man's only Savior (Matt. 1:21), and His word is our only infallible guide (II Tim. 3:16, 17). Whom do you trust for salvation? To whom do you listen? Parents? Conscience? Preacher? Christ? Jesus said, "He that believeth and is baptised shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." (Mark 16:16). Have you done this or have you allowed parents, conscience, or preachers to explain it away?

At the Judgment we will be judged by the words Christ has spoken (John 12:48), and not by what others have said. We plead with you to investigate the Words of Christ and follow Him. Do not go to the judgment without Christ as your guide.

incomplete and Abernathy led 12-6. Hale Center came back strong after the kickoff and did not give up the ball until they scored, driving 69 yards to tie the ball game. A penalty against Abernathy for roughing the kicker gave the Owls not only 15 yards but repossession of the ball, after the

Antelopes had held them on downs on the Owls' 34.

Adams' Leg Twisted

The Owls had the ball on their own 49 after the above mentioned penalty, but two plays later received a 15-yard clipping penalty after gaining five yards. Donnie Adams was clipped and it twisted his right leg, the same one that got broken last year in the game against Morton. (Coach Davenport stated Monday that Donnie may possibly be able to see limited action in Friday night's game).

Hale Center was moved back to their 41. A long pass to Klatt was almost broken up by M. Ritchey, and Joy came over to make the tackle. Another long pass to half-back Gerald Grange was also almost broken up, but he juggled the ball, caught it and carried it to Abernathy's 7 yard line. Ritchey made it to the one on two plays, then Florence stopped him for a two foot gain on third down. Dollar went the final foot against stout resistance over the middle of the line for the touch-down, knotting the score 12-12.

There was no more scoring in the game but Abernathy worked the ball down to Hale Center's 24

Then Leo Kiker threaded his way 16 yards around right end to the 43 with less than half a minute in the game. The game ended with the Antelopes still on the 43 as they were stopped for a no-gain, then two passes fell incomplete.

a potentially large export market for U. S. grain sorghum.

Members of the team are: Zenichiro Yasuda, Minister of Agriculture, Livestock Bureau, Tokyo, head of the mission; Shiro Kawada, president of the Japanese Feed Manufacturers Association; Hanjuro Kotake of the Feed Department, National Farm Cooperative Association; Morihisa Emori, chairman of the Japanese Cereal Feedstuffs Importer Association; Kohei Yamanouchi, Mill-Feed-By-Products Association and Feed Manufacturers; and Paul Y. Some, secretary of the team, and Assistant Regional General Director of the Wheat Associates, U.S.A., Inc., Tokyo.

"American grain for Japanese feed bins" is the goal of the U. S. Feed Grains Council, sponsor of the tour that will carry the six-member team on a coast to coast educational tour of feed, grain production areas, handling and utilization facilities. Initial "ground work" for the team to make such a tour was started last fall by the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, which has since that time joined forces with other Feed Grains associations to form the Feed Grains Council.

The tour will include a stop at a cage laying plant at Plainview, a beef feed lot operation at Lubbock, and grain sorghum in the field in the Abernathy area. The visiting team will be shown concrete examples of the merits of feed grain in mixed, balanced livestock rations, and the quick extra pounds that can be expected through proper feeding.

A meeting of local grain men and farmers was held last Tuesday in regard to the activities of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, Hart reported.

The main purpose of the meeting was to discuss what the Association has done and is doing, and to discuss plans for the fall membership drive for this area, Harp said.

sorghum this year. The Department of Agriculture had planned to lower the price support 10 cents per hundred pounds, Harp said.

Abernathy farmers are getting roughly \$150,000 more for their grain sorghum this year than they would had it not been for the one conference in Washington, Harp added. The 10 cents increase in price this year is enough to pay the Abernathy farmers' dues for 33 years, Harp stated.

As a result of the GSPA's work toward foreign markets, exports are expanding. U. S. grain is moving places it had never before reached, Harp stated and more potential foreign markets still lie ahead.

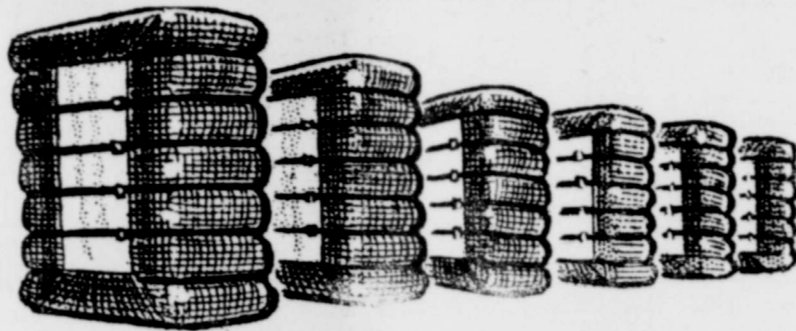

SAME WHEAT PROGRAM CONTINUES FOR 1961

With winter wheat planting getting under way, Chairman E. J. Pope, of the Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee pointed out recently that the wheat program for

1961 will be essentially the same as it has been in recent years. As highlights of the program, Mr. Pope listed the following: 1. **MARKETING QUOTAS**—As a result of an 7.4 affirmative vote of wheat growers who voted in a referendum July 21, marketing quotas will be in effect for the 1961 crop and the marketing of excess wheat will be subject to penalty.

2. **PRICE SUPPORT**—Price support will be available in 1961 crop wheat at a minimum national average rate of \$1.78 per bushel, leaders organization was formed. W. T. McEachern is chairman of the group, other officers are Mrs. W. F. Holloway, vice-chairman, and F. L. Ballard, secretary and reporter. The organization is composed of all 4-H adult leaders in the county. Twenty-two 4-H leaders representing the group attend at Ceta Canyon recently. Workshops were set up for various subject matter fields and for the organizational leaders. "I wish all our county 4-H leaders could have attended the camp" was the popular comment by the leaders. Another often heard remark was "I got a new over-all look at 4-H club work." Leaders who represented Hale County included Fred Blumenstock and Arvie Johnson, from Abernathy.

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2. **PRICE SUPPORT**—Price support will be available in 1961 crop wheat at a minimum national average rate of \$1.78 per bushel,

the same as the rate for the 1960 crop. 3. **ACREAGE ALLOTMENTS**—Each wheat-producing farm has an acreage allotment, representing the farm's share of the national allotment, which again in 1961 stands at 55 million acres, the minimum permitted by law.

Under the marketing quota system, any farmer who keeps within his wheat acreage allotment (or does not exceed 15 acres of wheat) may market his total wheat crop without penalty. Also exempt from penalty is any farmer who obtains approval to participate in the feed wheat program and produces 30 acres or less of wheat for use on his farm.

Other growers who exceed their allotments will generally be subject to a marketing quota penalty on the normal yield of the excess acres. The penalty rate for 1961

will continue at 45 per cent of parity, which for 1960 worked out to a dollar-and-cents penalty rate of \$1.08 per bushel.

The wheat price support program for 1961 will be carried out through loans on farm or warehouse-stored grain and through purchase agreements. Support will be available from harvesttime in the summer of 1961 to the end of January 1962. The tentative support level is a minimum announced in advance of planting, which may be increased on the basis of later information next year but may not be reduced.


The total U. S. wheat supply for the 1960-61 marketing year is now estimated at a new record of 2,682 million bushels, according to the latest U. S. Department of Agricultural report on the wheat situation received at the local ASC office.

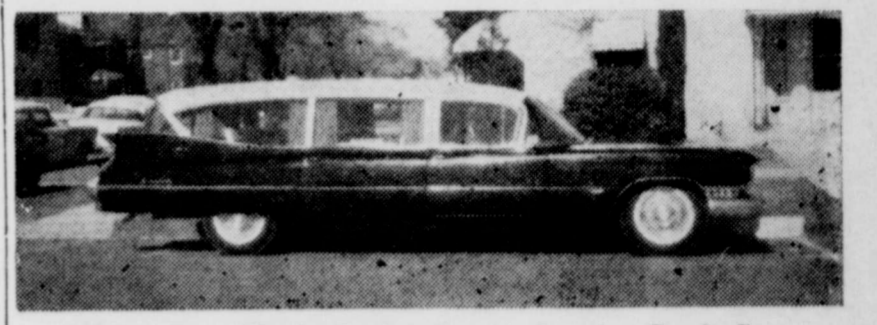
