### Cotton Growers Vote Dec. 13



With no change in the basic character of the Thunderbird, the 1961 models shown above introduce all-new styling, improved performance, and new standards of comfort and convenience. ### Information On Child Labor Law And School Attendance

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following information was furnished by Abernathy Public Schools Superintendent, Noel Johnson.)

School patrons are reminded of the Federal Law as applies to child laborers. Basically, the law prohibits persons under 16 years of age to be engaged in work during school hours on days that school is in session in the school district in which they reside.

The Federal Law makes the employer liable and responsible and there are no exceptions or exemptions. School officials have no authority, under any circumstances, to grant a permit of any kind to enable employers to be relieved of this liability. This article is being printed in Spanish also so that Spanish-speaking persons may understand that it is useless to make applications to any school authority for exceptions to this law.

### Is Vegetable Growing A Gamble?

College Station — When the statement "Growing Vegetables is a gamble," is made, it is the case of the culprit, blaming the victim? Clyde Singletary, extension horticulturist, says that the only way to learn the answers to these questions is to take a close look at the vegetable business.

With few exceptions, most vegetables are staple food items of most American families. Per capita consumption of most vegetables is increasing each year along with rapid growth in our population. Vegetable surpluses are temporary — in many cases lasting only a few days or weeks. These surplus problems can, however, be damaging to growers.

The vegetable industry, particularly as it relates to consumption, appears quite stable, continues Singletary. Week-to-week price fluctuations occur, but averages over a period of years are fairly stable.

If consumption is always positive, why should there be this attitude that growing vegetables is such a gamble. Could it be that some farmers are blaming the industry when they should be blaming faulty production practices? Singletary says that yield per acre, quality yield, speculative growing, concern for product after harvesting and knowledge of competition are the main factors in

determining profit and loss. Careful analysis of the vegetable situation in Texas reveals that low yields per acre is the most important factor affecting income of growers. Consumers are quality conscious, thus quality is one of the most important tools of bargaining.

Speculative growing is another income reducer. Planting without planning can lead to disaster. Another common fault of some vegetable producers is the apparent desire to drop all responsibility for their products as soon as they leave the field. Growers need to be as concerned about the product from the field to the consumer as from seed to harvest, says the specialist.

Singletary concludes by saying that producers need to know their markets. That is, they must know how much of what will be needed at a certain place at a certain time.

Cotton growers will vote December 13 in their annual referendum to determine whether to use a system of marketing quotas for the upcoming crop of upland cotton, Chairman E. J. Pope, Jr., of the Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee announced October 12. If approved in the referendum, the system of quotas would apply to the 1961 cotton crop. This would be the eighth successive year in which quotas have been in effect for upland cotton.

Upland cotton quotas have been proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture on the basis of an official determination that the estimated total supply of cotton for 1960-61 will amount to approximately 21.7 million running bales, or about 3 million bales above normal. The law requires the proclamation of quotas by October 15 in any year when the total supply exceeds normal. Quotas do not take effect, however, unless approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum.

In announcing the upland cotton program for 1961, Chairman Pope pointed out that only one allotment-price support program will be available to growers for their 1961 cotton crop. Legislation provided the so-called Choice (A) and (B) programs only for 1959 and

1960. The national cotton allotment for 1961, he said, has been determined at 18,398,424 acres, compared with 16 million acres in 1960. This 1961 national allotment, plus a national reserve of 60,000 acres, will be broken down to States and counties, and individual farm allotments will be made available to producers before the referendum. The 1961 farm allotments as compared to 1960 may vary considerably in the extent to which they reflect the national increase, Mr. Pope said.

If marketing quotas are approved in the December 13 referendum price support will be available to growers who comply with their farm allotments at a level within the range of 70 to 90 percent of parity. As in other years, the exact level of price support will be determined later. Growers who exceed their farm acreage allotments will be subject to penalties of 50 per cent of the June 15, 1961 parity price on the farm's excess production of the crop. In addition none of the upland cotton produced on the farm will be eligible for price support.

If marketing quotas are disapproved for 1961, acreage allotments will remain in effect and price support will be available to cooperators at 50 per cent of parity, as provided by law.

City Policeman Dan Blanchard requested the following warning to motorists be published in The Review.



### Governor Gives Vote Information

AUSTIN, Texas — Voting in the Democratic Primary does not obligate anyone "legally or morally" to vote for the Democratic presidential nominee in the general election, Governor Price Daniel said today.

The pledge on the primary ballot applies only to nominees selected in that primary for state, district, and local offices, Daniels stated in an interview with a Dallas Morning News correspondent.

Daniel was asked for his views on the matter after a statement quoting him was issued by the State Democratic Executive Committee as follows: "More than 1,500,000 Texans affiliated themselves with the Democratic Party this poll tax year, under provisions of state law. It is the responsibility of all affiliated Democrats to carry their great strength into the general election in support of the party nominees."

Daniel told the News he did not mean to imply that participation in the Democratic Primary obligated a voter to vote for that party's presidential and vice presidential nominees in the general election.

### Local Girl To Attend November G.S. Convention

Two members of Girl Scout Troop 95 have been notified of their selection to attend the National Girl Scout Convention in St. Louis, Mo., November 14-18. Betty Ann Sterrett will be a delegate and Judy Kiker, First Alternate.

Two delegates and two alternates were chosen by the Selection Committee from seven names nominated by the Senior Planning Board at a recent meeting. Cathy Balzer and Sue Carpenter, both of Lubbock, were also selected.

This will be the thirty-fifth convention of the Girl Scout National Council and will be attended by 6,000 official delegates and an additional 4,000 visitors. This triennial convention will mark the official beginning of the Girl Scout "birthday years" celebration.

Senior Girl Scouting will be highlighted at the meeting and a new Senior Girl Scout uniform will be introduced. Theme for the convention will be "Honor the Past—Serve the Future."

STATE LAW

RECOVERY OF CIVIL DAMAGES DUE TO DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY BY MINORS

Section 1. Any property owner, including any municipal corporation, county, school district or other political subdivision of the State of Texas, or any department or agency of the State of Texas, or any person, partnership, corporation or association, or any religious organization whether incorporated or unincorporated, shall be entitled to recover damages in an amount not to exceed Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) from the parents of any minor under the age of eighteen (18) years and over the age of ten (10), who maliciously and willfully damages or destroys property, real, personal or mixed, belonging to such owner. However, this Act shall not apply to parents whose parental custody and control of such child has been removed by court order, decree, or judgment.

Section 2. The suit may be brought in any court of competent jurisdiction, and venue thereof shall be governed by the statutes regulating venue in actions based upon trespass. The recovery shall be limited to the actual damages in an amount not to exceed Three Hundred Dollars (\$300), in addition to taxable court costs.

Section 3. The action authorized in this Act shall be in addition to all other actions which the owner is entitled to maintain and nothing in this Act shall preclude recovery in a greater amount from the minor or from any other person, including the parents, for damages to which such minor or other person would otherwise be liable, it being the purpose of this Act to authorize recovery from parents, and to limit the amount of the recovery, in situations where they would not otherwise be liable.

### WAGE-HOUR OFFICIAL REMINDS FARMERS ABOUT FEDERAL CHILD-LABOR LAW

DALLAS — Farmers who hire workers for harvesting fall crops were reminded today that the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act sets a 16-year age minimum for the employment of children in agriculture during school hours.

The reminder came from Regional Director William J. Rogers of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions here, the agency which administers this law.

"Today and in the foreseeable future, the need for youngsters to meet even higher educational standards is beyond question," he said. "The child's chance for success in later years can depend on whether he enrolls in school this fall."

Mr. Rogers pointed out that children may lawfully work on farms before and after school hours or on weekends, but that their place is in the classroom when school is in session in the school district where the child is currently living.

"The law protects the children of migratory workers as well as

local children," he said. "The only exception to the law is the child working exclusively for his parents or guardian."

An age certificate showing that the youngster is at least 16 is the best protection the farmer can have against inadvertent violation. In Texas, these certificates are available, as a public service, from local Texas Employment Commission offices.

He added that the Federal child-labor law applies to farmers who engage in interstate commerce or ship their products in interstate commerce, either directly or to firms who ship them across State lines in their original form or as an ingredient of another product.

### Information On Student Accident Insurance Plan

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following information was furnished by Noel Johnson, superintendent of the Abernathy Public Schools.)

For several years the Abernathy School District has sponsored a Student Accident Insurance Plan as has many other area schools. This service was initiated originally to help defray medical costs to students participating in athletics but grew into a plan that could be purchased by all students voluntarily.

This year as has been the case for the past two previous years, the School Board selected the insurance carrier that writes over 80% of the Student Insurance in Texas. Like most insurance of this nature the policy is limited. The following excerpts are from a letter that goes out with each claim form:

1. Under no circumstances is a tax supported governmental subdivision, such as a public school, ever legally liable for medical attention to its employees, students, or third parties under the Texas statutes.

2. If the patient has or indicates that he has insurance coverage procured through voluntary student insurance plans or athletic benefit plans, it is still a prime responsibility of the doctor and the parent of the student to make satisfactory arrangements for the payment of the medical bills.

3. The school provides necessary data on company claim forms and responsibility thereafter will rest with the parent and the doctor.

4. Negative X-ray is \$5 maximum. Office calls are limited to \$5 for the first visit and \$3 for all subsequent visits on the current plan.

The School Board and School Officials would like to be relieved of providing a service that often causes misunderstanding such as the Student Accident Insurance Program does and as the benefits become more limited, the premiums become higher, or both, the program will probably be discontinued.

### NOTICE

(Re-printed as a reminder to dog owners. This Ordinance has been in effect for several months.)

ORDINANCE NO. 93 AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE KEEPING OF DOGS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS, AND FIXING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. No dogs shall be permitted to run at large in the City of Abernathy, and it shall be the duty of the registered owner of every dog to keep same within a fenced enclosure or on a leash at all times.

SECTION 2. Any dog found in the City running at large is hereby declared to be a nuisance and shall be impounded as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the animal warden or his authorized agent to capture and impound in a pen, to be provided by the City engineer of said City for that purpose any dog, male or female, found running at large within the City of Abernathy, Texas. If such dog, male or female, is not redeemed and reclaimed and taken from said shelter within the time required under the provision of this ordinance, then the animal warden shall advertise said dog for sale twenty-four hours by posting one notice of said sale at the door of the City Hall, which notice gives the time and place of the sale and shall, if not redeemed, sell said dog, male or female, at public auction and no one shall bid upon the same, the amount of charges due on said dog, the said dog shall be bought by the City at once and killed by the animal warden or his duly authorized agent.

SECTION 4. The owner or keeper of any dog or dogs captured or impounded under the provisions of this ordinance shall be permitted and allowed at any time within forty-eight hours after such dog or dogs shall have been impounded, to redeem, reclaim and again receive possession of said dog or dogs, upon payment to the City Clerk or his duly authorized agent, the sum of \$1.00 per day or fractional part thereof during such time said dog or dogs may have been impounded, said sum to be deposited with the City Treasurer for the use and benefit of the City.

SECTION 5. It is not intended that this ordinance change, amend, effect, or in anywise repeal any other ordinance of this city.

SECTION 6. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$200.00.

SECTION 7. This ordinance shall be enforced from and after its publication and the City Secretary is hereby directed to publish same.

### New Water Rates To Start With November Billings

The new city water rates, passed by the City Council last August, will be placed into effect on the November water bill, City Manager Paul Noland reported Tuesday. "The increase this month should be small," the manager said, "because of the heavy rains and the fact that October is a low usage month."

From a minimum of \$3.00 for 10,000 gallons, the rate will be changed to a minimum of \$3.00 for 3,000 gallons, with staggered, reduced charges thereafter. The new rates still compare favorably with water rates in other West Texas cities, according to the latest figures available. For example, the 1958 rates in other comparable cities were as follows:

From the above figures, it is seen that although 7 of the 10 other cities listed have lower minimums than does Abernathy, only one city charges less for 25,000 gallons of water. Most Abernathians use between 5,000 and 25,000 gallons of water per month.

The new rates, adopted upon the recommendation of Mr. Bob Davis, an expert on municipal financing, should produce additional revenue of approximately \$7,000 per year for the city. The money will be used to help retire increased debt obligations coming due in 1961.


### Ralph Stevenson Attends Conference of HS Principals

Ralph Stevenson, principal of Abernathy High School, attended the conference of the Texas Association of Secondary School Principals in Dallas on October 16, 17, and 18. The conference is an annual affair and was held in the Baker Hotel at Dallas this year.

There were approximately 1,000 principals of high schools and junior high schools from all parts of Texas in attendance at this meeting. The conference was made up of four general sessions, each of which was held in the Baker Ballroom, one sectional meeting, in which the principals were divided according to the size of their respective schools. Lay speakers made interesting, humorous, and inspirational addresses at each of the general sessions. Reports were given to the group from the Texas State Teachers' Association concerning such matters as the new insurance program which has been approved for the members of the profession, legislation of interest to the profession, and proposals for improved preparation of school administration.

In the sectional meetings any item of interest to the group was taken up, with many of the problems which are most common in the various schools being discussed. Mr. Stevenson attended the group meeting for high schools between 200 and 350 in enrollment. Such problems as the activity period, the 20 credit plan for graduation, class trips, amount of time spent for athletics, and many others were discussed and trends were determined. Mr. Stevenson noted that in the group with which he met there were approximately 100 principals representing their schools. In this group approximately two thirds of the principals reported the discontinuance of over-night trips for classes or groups other than those who were representing their schools in some contest or activity in which distance made it necessary to be away over night. Many others indicated that the policy of over-night trips was being discontinued after the present school year.

The final session, held on Tuesday morning, concerned reports of the many committees of the organization, election and installation of officers for the next year, and an invitation for the group to meet in Abilene next fall. Mr. Stevenson reported the trip was very successful and informative and stated that he felt he gained most from the sectional meeting where problems were discussed. He also stated that his attendance at this conference and discussion with other principals from over the State made him even more happy to be connected with such an institution as the Abernathy High School.

Vote early in the day to allow election officials more time for tabulation work and early reporting of results. Polls will be at Abernathy City Hall and at a Lakeview Church for Hale County Voters, and at Joe Thompson Implement Co., in Abernathy and at New Deal for Lubbock County Voters.

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 39)** — Authorizes the Legislature to create hospital districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, and sets forth certain powers, duties and limitations.

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR 6)** — Increases the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board to three and one-half per cent.

**NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 3)** — This bill is what is known as the "Annual Salary Bill" for legislators. It provides for an annual salary of not to exceed \$4,800 for each legislator, and a per diem allowance of not to exceed \$12 a day for the first 120 days of each regular session and for 30 days of each special session as maximum compensation for members of the Legislature. Also it limits the regular session to 140 days.

**NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR 6)** — Authorizes the Legislature to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest, and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per cent per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; provides that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; provides for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event of cancellation of or refusal to grant any permit.

BOOK REVIEW

A review of the book THE PEOPLES PADRE, was given by Mr. Harvey Pruitt of Lubbock, Texas, at the Club room of the City Hall, Monday, October 24th at 8 p. m. Buford Davenport Abernathy Review Abernathy, Texas Dear Mr. Davenport: This is an appeal, directed generally to Texas Newspapers, to help spread the word among Texans as to their voting rights in the General Election November 8. While we all may have our own ideas as to HOW Texans ought to vote, I think we could all agree on two things: (1) every qualified voter ought to exercise this great right in the General Election, and (2) each voter should be adequately informed as to his legal voting rights. As you know, the Texas Election Code has been amended to require the stamping of the word "Democrat" or "Republican" on poll tax receipts or exemption certificates when one votes in a party primary. This has nothing whatever with General Election voting, but some confusion has resulted. Governor Daniel stated the facts succinctly when in a newspaper interview appearing October 21, 1960 he said that there is no "legal or moral" bar to an individual's voting to his own conscience in the General Election, no matter how or whether he voted in the primaries. The Governor further stated correctly that the "pledge" on the Democratic ballot, supporting the voter's intention to support the nominees of the primary, has no application or bearing upon the General Election. Many Texas newspapers have already taken steps to advise their readers that (1) they can vote as they choose in the General Election, regardless of what they have done in the past, and (2) it is legal to split a ballot in Texas. These are fundamental rights of which the voters should be informed. I certainly would appreciate any further effort on your part in this regard. News From City Hall

On October 17, 1960 in a special meeting at City Hall, the City Council of the City of Abernathy passed an ordinance rescinding penalty and interest on delinquent taxes for the period October 15—November 25, 1960. The ordinance means that during this period, all persons appearing on the delinquent tax roll of the city may pay the principal owed, without being charged any penalty or interest. Many citizens may realize substantial saving by taking advantage of the ordinance. For example, where the delinquency is over seven years old, penalty and interest would amount to approximately 100 percent of the principal.

During discussion on the matter, Alderman Carmickle stated, "Through the recent attempt to collect delinquent taxes, it has become evident that many people have never received any notice whatsoever that they had delinquent taxes, regardless of the year of delinquency. It would not be fair to these people to charge them penalty and interest." Alderman McAlister pointed out, "The city's only objective is to reduce our delinquent tax roll, which now is approximately 40 percent of our current roll, and to straighten out our tax records. Since we have found so many instances where the city has been negligent in notifying the people on the roll, we should give these people a chance to correct the situation. A six-week period should be ample for anyone to make arrangements to settle their accounts." Mayor Graham noted that he too had received a delinquent notice, and "had no idea at all that he was on the delinquent roll." The other councilmen, Hale, Wolf and Pinson, all related instances where they had been approached by people receiving notice that they were liable for delinquent taxes when no prior notice had been given.

AN ORDINANCE DETERMINING THE NECESSITY FOR IMPROVEMENT OF CERTAIN STREETS IN THE CITY OF ABERNATHY; NOTIFYING THE ABUTTING PROPERTY OWNERS AND INTERESTED PERSONS OF THE INTENT TO IMPROVE SAID STREETS IN THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, SETTING A TIME AND PLACE WHEREBY THE ABUTTING PROPERTY OWNERS AND INTERESTED PERSONS MAY APPEAR BEFORE THE CITY COUNCIL ON MATTERS RELATING TO SAID STREET IMPROVEMENTS; REQUIRING THE CITY ENGINEER TO PREPARE AND FILE COMPLETE SPECIFICATIONS AND PLANS FOR THE PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS AND TO ESTIMATE THE COST OF SUCH IMPROVEMENTS SO AS TO ENABLE BIDS TO BE SECURED AND A CONTRACT FOR IMPROVEMENTS ENTERED INTO; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS.

SECTION 1. That a necessity exists for the permanent improvement of those certain portions of public streets hereinafter listed, by excavating, grading and paving the same, by the installation of drainage facilities therein, and by the construction of curbs and

gutters where adequate curbs and gutters are not now in place, and such improvements are hereby ordered, the portions of public streets to be so improved being designated and defined as follows:

On 2nd place from the East Property Line of "F" Street to the West Property Line of "E" Street.

On 2nd place from the East Property Line of "E" Street to the West Edge Pavement on "D" Street.

On 1st place from the East Property Line of "F" Street to the West Property Line of "E" Street.

On 1st Place from the East Property Line of "E" Street to the West Edge Pavement on "D" Street.

On 3rd Street from the East Property Line of "J" Street to the West Property Line of "H" Street.

On 3rd Street from the East Property Line of "H" Street to the West Property Line of "G" Street.

On 3rd Street from the East Property Line of "G" Street to the West Property Line of "E" Street.

On 3rd Street from the East Property Line of "E" Street to the West Edge Pavement on "D" Street.

On 4th Street from the East Property Line of "H" Street to the West Property Line of "G" Street.

On 4th Street from the East Property Line of "G" Street to the West Property Line of "E" Street.

On 4th Street from the East Property Line of "E" Street to the West Edge Pavement on "D" Street.

On 6th Street from the East Property Line of the Alley between "K" Street and "L" Street to the East Property Line of "H" Street and "J" Street.

On "L" Street from the North Property Line of 12th Street to the South Property Line of 13th Street.

On "L" Street from the North Property Line of 15th Street to the South Property Line of 16th Street.

On 2nd Street in front of Lot 12, Block 179.

On 2nd Street in front of Lot 9, Block 177.

On 4th Street in front of Lot 4, Block 141.

On "E" Street in front of Lots 8, 9, and 10, Block 93.

On 14th Street in front of Lot 9, Block 27.

On 14th Street in front of Lots 10 and 11, Block 23.

On 14th Street in front of Lot 4, Block 34.

On 14th Street in front of Lot 4, Block 36.

On 16th Street in front of Lot 4, Block 8.

SECTION 2. The property owners of the above named streets are hereby notified of the intent of the City of Abernathy to order the improvement of said streets and are given notice that the City Council of the City of Abernathy shall meet in the City Hall at 7:30 p. m. November 14, 1960, to allow any property owners and interested persons to appear before the City Council on matters pertaining to said street improvements.

SECTION 3. The City Engineer, Parkhill, Smith & Cooper of Lubbock, Texas, is hereby directed to prepare forthwith and file with the City Council complete specifications and plans for the proposed improvements so as to enable bids to be secured, and said specifications and plans shall be so arranged as the City shall be enabled to obtain bids for doing the said work; together with an estimate of the cost of such improvements and with a written statement which shall contain the name of persons, firms, corporations and estates owning property abutting upon said streets with the number of front feet owned by each, describing such property either by lot or block number or in any manner sufficient to identify it.

SECTION 4. The fact that the above streets are in bad condition and the same should be improved immediately creates a public emergency requiring that the ordinance be passed finally on the date of its introduction, and the mayor having in writing declared the existence of such emergency and requests the passage finally on the date of its introduction, this 3rd day of October, 1960, and shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor.

Thus the farmers in this area would realize about \$16.00 per ton, it was pointed out. It was also stated that the average production in this vicinity is around 20 tons per acre. At one time Bill Fortenberry of New Deal raised a state record of 39.7 tons per acre, reports said.

Knowing that this region is capable of producing this type of yield, the refinery companies are even more interested in the construction of a refinery somewhere in this vicinity.


