# Area Voters Favor Kennedy-Johnson

## Record 1,535 Votes Cast In Five Boxes

Voting in the five boxes in this area hit an all-time record high Tuesday as citizens flocked to the polls to mark ballots in the General Election. The hotly con-

tested presidential race accounted for the big turnout of voters here and across the nation. A total of the votes in Abernathy, New Deal and Lakeview

gave 831 to the Democratic ticket of Kennedy-Johnson, to 608 for Republicans Nixon and Lodge. Candidates of minor parties received a few votes. Some ballots in the various boxes could not be counted because voters failed to mark them so election officials

could determine the way they intended to vote. There were 22 such ballots in Abernathy's Hale County box at City Hall. **1,535 Vote Total**  
The two polls in Abernathy, two at New Deal and one at Lakeview had a total vote of 1,535. Aber-

nathy, Hale County, City Hall, paced the field with 729 votes, and Abernathy, Lubbock County, Joe Thompson Implement Co. had 198, giving Abernathy a total of 927 votes. Lakeview had 129 votes. **479 Votes at New Deal**  
New Deal boxes had a total of

479 votes, including 248 at Box 32, in New Deal Clubhouse, and 231 in Box 20, New Deal High School building.  
**Demos Win Here**  
The Hale County box at Abernathy City Hall gave 398 votes to Kennedy-Johnson, and 285 to

Nixon-Lodge. In the Senate race, Johnson received 480, to 209 for Tower. All amendments were favored.  
**Tie at 94-All**  
Abernathy's Lubbock County box at Joe Thompson Implement Co. voted 94 for Kennedy-Johnson and 94 for Nixon-Lodge. Lyndon B. Johnson received 122 for U. S. Senator, to 62 for John Tower. All four amendments were favored.

**New Deal Box 20**  
Kennedy-Johnson received 163 votes in Box 20 at New Deal, to 94 for Nixon-Lodge. Johnson was given 157 in the Senate race, to 58 for Tower. All amendments were favored.  
**New Deal Box 32**  
New Deal Box 32 favored Kennedy-Johnson, 152, to 74 for Nixon-Lodge. Johnson, in the Senate race, was given 167, to 59 for Tower. All amendments were favored.

**Vote at Lakeview**  
Voting in the presidential election was close at Lakeview, where Kennedy-Johnson received 64, to 61 for Nixon-Lodge. In the Senate race, Johnson received 79, to 47 for Tower. Vote was against Amendment One, and for the other three.

## Methodist Church Completes 50 Years Service

The First Methodist Church of Abernathy this week is celebrating its 50th anniversary, with special services planned for Sunday along with the dedicating of individual commitments of Christian Stewardship, announced the Rev. H. B. Coggin, pastor.  
The First Methodist Church of Abernathy was officially organized in November 1910, with Rev. J. P. Calaway appointed as pastor. Brother Calaway served this church for two years.  
Prior to the organizing of the Methodist Church here, there were preaching places at Bartonite, ten miles northwest of Abernathy, and at Lakeview, ten miles northeast of Abernathy. The Bartonite Church has long since been disbanded and many of the members transferred to Abernathy. The church has a record of one Rev. A. H. Hussy having preached at Bartonite in the year 1907 and he was followed by Rev. W. H. Carr who was pastor at Bartonite from November 1908 to November 1910.  
Abernathy Methodist Church constructed a basement type building, as its first building project, in 1925, at a cost of \$13,000.00. Services had been conducted in the school building from 1910 until 1925. A Sanctuary was constructed over the basement in the year 1942, at a cost of \$82,000.00; and a nice, two-story educational annex was added in 1953, at a cost of \$54,000.00; then in 1957 and '58 a new Sanctuary was constructed at a cost of \$117,500.00. Present membership of the church numbers 550.

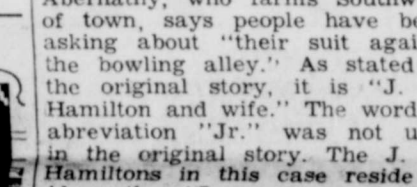

Curtis and Christine Lebow are both practically native Abernathians, as Curtis was only a fourth grade student when he moved to Abernathy in 1932 from Happy, Texas, where he was born. Christine was born at Slaton, Texas and moved to a farm five miles east of town with her parents when she was only an infant. (Her parents are Mr. and Mrs. Paul Hunt of San Angelo but formerly residents of Abernathy until a few years ago.)  
While Curtis was a high school pupil of the Abernathy Schools he lettered in both basketball and track under Coach Ralph Stevenson—our present high school principal. There was no football team in our school at that time. The 1939-40 senior class of which Curtis was a member is credited with getting football back into our school, with equipment getting in too late for that season, but being used the next season. Curtis not only was active in basketball and track, but was known as a boxer as well. In 1940 and 1941 he won the Golden Gloves and T.A.A.F. State boxing championship as a Flyweight and Bantamweight contestant.  
In September of 1942 Curtis volunteered for the Air Corps where he served as an M. P. (Military Policeman) and also a "Belly Gunner" on B-24's. He also served a time as Chief Gunner on a B-19, and was a Flight Cadet. In 1942 he won the Air Force Lightweight Boxing Championship at Lowery Air Force Base. In December of 1945 he received his discharge at Randolph Field, San Antonio.  
After his discharge, Curtis and Christine lived in Plainview for

Bids on approximately 75 blocks of street paving in Abernathy were opened at the regular monthly City Council meeting at Abernathy City Hall Monday night. Six bids were opened and reviewed, with the contract being awarded to Lubbock Pavers on the low bid of \$224,418.75. The bids ranged from that figure to a high of \$284,687.65.  
**Public Hearing Set**  
A public hearing has been set for 8 o'clock Monday night, Nov. 14 at Abernathy city hall, giving property owners the opportunity to ask any questions they may have in regards to the paving project. Individuals who want paving, but are not listed on the proposed paving project, are also urged to attend this hearing.  
Another public hearing will be held at a later date at which time the actual value to be assessed against the property of each individual for the paving will be available.  
It was stated that the cost to the property owners will be slightly lower than the cost of paving in the project here about four years ago.

## Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains  
Research Foundation

One hundred seventy-two bushels of corn per acre was the top yield in the 1960 Corn Variety Test at the High Plains Research Foundation. The low yield in the 16 variety test was 138 bushels per acre, Dr. Earl H. Collister, chief agronomist, announced.

These 16 varieties were planted April 21 and were sidedressed with 120 pounds of actual nitrogen (Uran) on May 23. They were harvested September 21. The corn was irrigated three times plus a preplant irrigation totaling 14 1/2 inches, with far above average rainfall during the growing season.

The percent of stalk breakage (lodging) ranged from 1.84 to 15.94 percent in the 16 varieties. Most varieties stood well until harvest with no root lodging. Early vigor ranged from good to poor. There was no significant difference between yields of the first seven varieties in the test.

All grain yields were calculated at a uniform moisture level of 14 percent. The yields in order were PAG 485—172.01 bushels; Funks GT11AA—171.39; Texas 28—167.52; Asgrow XP 2867—166.20; Watson 124-A—165.49; PAG 454—161.47; Texas 30—159.55; PAG 633W—155.63; Texas 36—155.28; Asgrow; 105W—155.21; Asgrow XP 2890—146.54; Texas 17W—145.31; Watson 111—143.94; PAG 434—140.31; Texas 26—138.62; and Texas 34—138.09.

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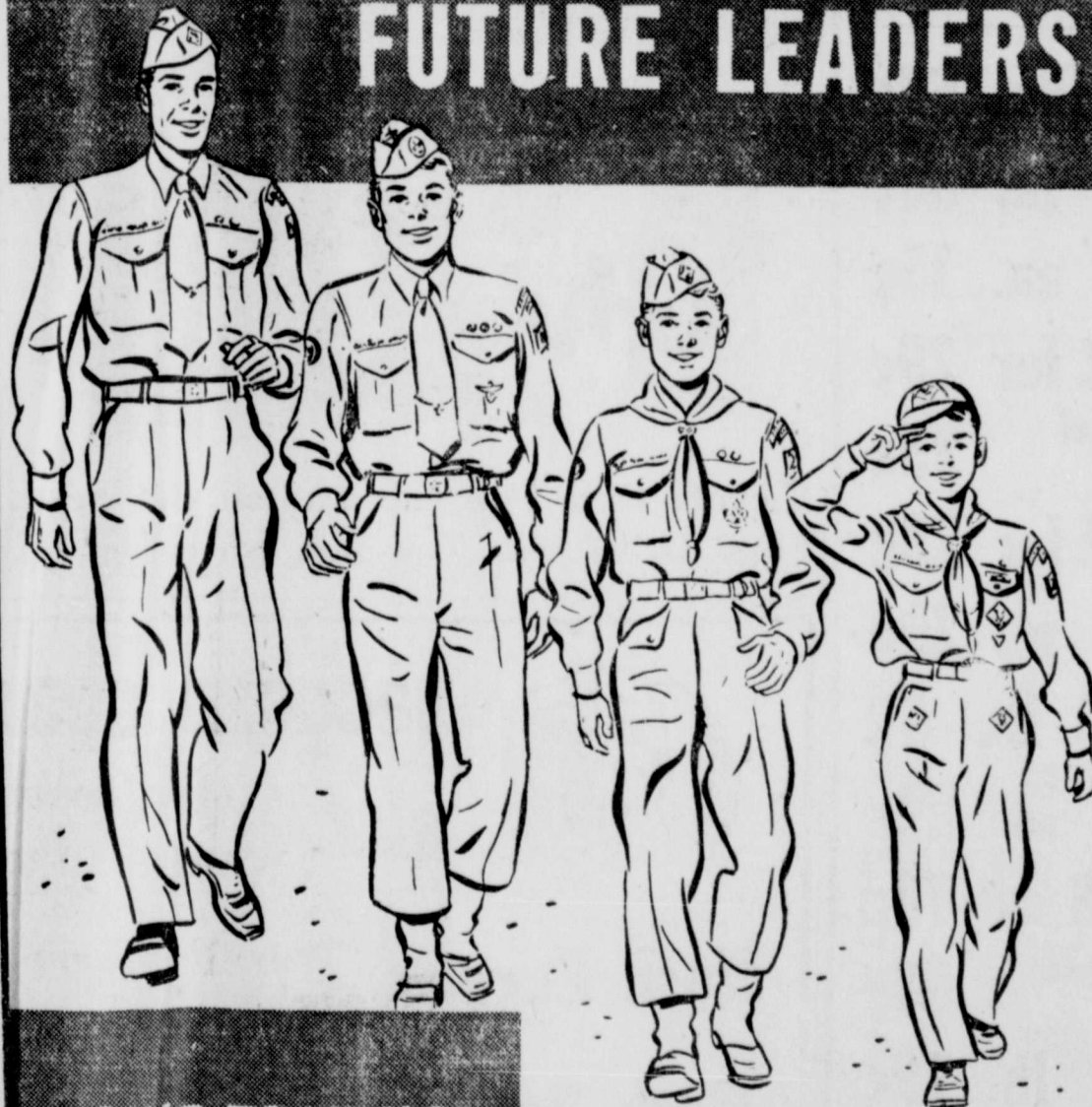

**Wheat Outlook Is Gratifying**

College Station — The domestic supply of wheat for the marketing year July 1, 1960 to June 30, 1961 is estimated to be about 2,682 million bushels, another record, says John McHaney, extension agricultural economist. This large supply is the result of a carryover on July 1, of 1,313 million bushels, and a 1960 crop estimated to be about 1,362 million bushels. Added to this will be about 7 million bushels of imports.

Domestic disappearance in the present marketing year 1960-61 will probably be about 610 million bushels, about the same as in 1959-60. McHaney continues. The expected slight decline in per capita consumption will be offset by the population increase, however. Seed and feed use of wheat will be about the same as last year.

Exports during the present marketing year will probably be higher than in 1959-60. About 525 million bushels will be exported as compared to 508 million exported last year. Government export programs, which will account for about two-thirds of the exports, will continue to play a major role in the movement of wheat abroad, the specialist points out. Less favorable crop conditions in Europe, however, will also aid U. S. exports.

The 1959-60 price to U. S. farmers averaged \$1.76, about 5c above the average support rate after allowing for storage charges. The price in 1960-61 is expected to again average above the effective support, storage deducted. This is mainly because large quantities of wheat continue to be placed under the price support program, explains McHaney. The support rate for the 1960 crop is \$1.78 as compared to \$1.91 for a year earlier.

With minimum allotments in effect for 1961, it is estimated that about 53 million acres will be harvested. If average yields are obtained, a crop of about 1,235 million bushels would be produced, the economist continues. A 1961 crop of this size would be about 9 percent below the 1,362 million indicated for 1960, but 13 percent above the 1950-59 average. Assuming that domestic disappearance and exports are the same as that estimated for 1960-61, the carryover on July 1, 1962, may be increased about 100 million bushels. The minimum national average support price for the 1961 crop wheat is \$1.78 per bushel, the same as the 1960 average support price, McHaney concludes.

**SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION**

You do not have to completely retire to draw social security benefits and under recent changes in the social security law, many social security beneficiaries who work in 1961 and later years will have less of their benefits withheld than they do now. As before, however, a person is considered retired if he or she is not earning more than \$1200 per year. A beneficiary who earns more than \$1200 loses only \$1 of benefits for every \$2 that he earns between \$1200 and \$1500. For every \$1 of earnings above \$1500 he loses \$1 of his benefits.

Under the rules in effect before 1961, a beneficiary who earned over \$1200 in a year would lose a whole month's benefit check for every \$80, or fraction of \$80 by which his earnings exceed \$1200. So, if his earnings were over \$2,080, he would lose all benefit checks for the year.

However, under both the old and the new rule, a beneficiary can be paid his full benefit check for any month in which he neither works for wages of more than \$100 nor renders substantial services in self-employment. It does not matter how high his total earnings for the year may go, he will still be paid his checks for those months.

If you are a man age 65 or older, or a woman, age 62 or over, and are still working part time, you may be entitled to social security benefits for some of the months in the calendar year. If you are past retirement age, but have not yet applied for your social security benefits because your earnings are too high, get in touch with your social security office now. The new rules that go into effect in 1961 may make it possible for you to collect some benefits even though you are working.

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Plainview on each Tuesday at 10:00 a. m. in the County Court room and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to social security.

**80.7% Of School Taxes Were Paid In October**

School Business manager Earl Carter reported that as of last Monday, October 31, 80.7 percent of the 1960 total collectable school taxes had been collected.

The total amount of collections for 1960 and the delinquent taxes that have been collected totaled \$310,925.50, Carter stated.

Percentage wise, the taxes paid during the first month of collection this year were slightly below last year's first month figures. During the month of October last year, 82.39 percent of total collectable taxes were collected, which was the highest percent ever to be paid here during the first month of collection.

**TAKE ANOTHER LOOK, PLEASE**

Some people may have been misled by a recent statement printed in this paper referring to delinquent taxes for the City of Abernathy.

The City of Abernathy has enjoyed very good tax collections for the past Thirty-Six years, the grand total of delinquent taxes on the City Books represents more than Twenty years accumulation of delinquent taxes and if compared to the grand total of taxes assessed for that same period will be about two percent of uncollected taxes, of which approximately 10 percent are uncollectable due to statute of limitation, 10 percent due to double and erroneous assessment, 10 percent reserved for non collection, another 20 percent would be collected over the current year by standard collection procedure and the balance would be collected over a period of about four years. The City did not make a practice of mailing statements for hopelessly uncollectable taxes due to erroneous or double assessment, reserve for non-collectable and limitation.

The City of Abernathy collected from 96 percent to 99 percent each year and this rate of collection is considered excellent by any small town standard, it was considered so by all Bond Companies, The Municipal Advisory Council, and Certified Public Accountants, and all agreed that the City maintained clean and up to date tax records.

Some large Cities claim 100 percent collection but only after deducting double and erroneous assessments which will average a-

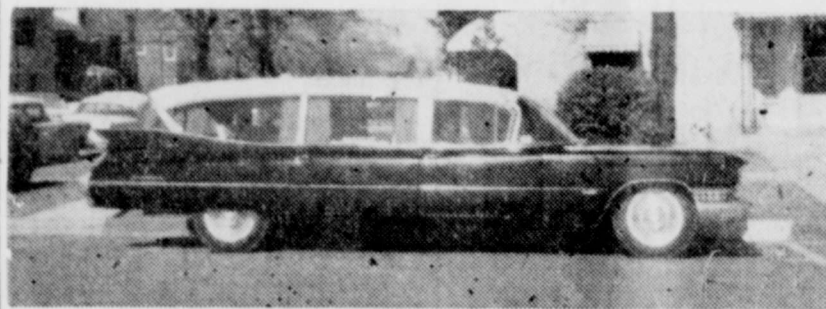

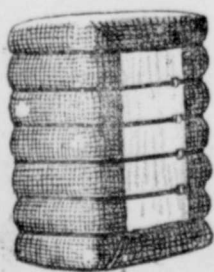

ORDINANCE NO. 103

AN ORDINANCE DETERMINING THE NECESSITY FOR IMPROVEMENT OF CERTAIN STREETS IN THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, NOTIFYING THE ABUTTING PROPERTY OWNERS AND INTERESTED PERSONS OF THE INTENT TO IMPROVE SAID STREETS IN THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, SETTING A TIME AND PLACE WHEREBY THE ABUTTING PROPERTY OWNERS AND INTERESTED PERSONS MAY APPEAR BEFORE THE CITY COUNCIL ON MATTERS RELATING TO SAID STREET IMPROVEMENTS; REQUIRING THE CITY ENGINEER TO PREPARE AND FILE COMPLETE SPECIFICATIONS AND PLANS FOR THE PROPOSED

IMPROVEMENTS AND TO ESTIMATE THE COST OF SUCH IMPROVEMENTS SO AS TO ENABLE BIDS TO BE SECURED AND A CONTRACT FOR IMPROVEMENTS ENTERED INTO; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS.

SECTION 1. That a necessity exists for the permanent improvement of those certain portions of public streets hereinafter listed, by excavating, grading and paving the same, by the installation of drainage facilities therein, and by the construction of curbs and gutters where adequate curbs and gutters are not now in place, and such improvements are hereby ordered, the portions of public streets to be so improved being designated and defined as follows:

the West Property Line of "E" Street.

SECTION 4. The fact that the above streets are in bad condition and the same should be improved immediately creates a public emergency requiring that the ordinance be passed finally on the date of its introduction, and the Mayor having in writing declared the existence of such emergency and requests the passage finally on the date of its introduction, this 3rd day of October, 1960, and shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor.

fullback Robert Priest slanted off right tackle and raced the distance to the goal line 60 yards away. The kick for the extra point was wide and Olton led 6-0.
