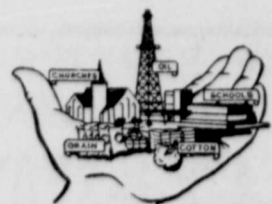

Mr. Lebow did construction work on the Santa Fe rail line through here, working out of Kress in 1910. He worked for the Frisco railroad in Eldorado, Okla., in 1913 and 1914. Kenneth Davis, Burn Victim, Is Responding to Treatment

Reports from John Sealy Hospital in Galveston indicate that Kenneth Davis, who was critically burned here Wednesday of last week, is progressing as well as could be expected at this stage of treatment.

Dr. Kenneth Gregory of Abernathy Medical Clinic called the Galveston hospital shortly after 6 p.m. Tuesday. He talked to the private nurse who was with Kenneth at that time and to Kenneth's father, Horace Davis.

Although his condition still is termed as critical, Kenneth apparently was responding satisfactorily to treatment at that time (Tuesday night). It has been determined that he will retain his vision. There was concern for a while about damage to his eyes. Kenneth had, to Tuesday night, been in surgery twice, with apparent satisfactory results.

When Kenneth's condition improves beyond the critical stage, there will remain for him many months of treatment for the damage the fire did to his body.

Pointing up the grave concern his many friends here have expressed was a sign on the bulletin board at the Dairy Mart Sunday. It said: "Tonight, say a prayer for Kenneth Davis." He is 18 years old, and a senior student in Abernathy High School. Reports said that he had enough credits at mid-term to graduate, but chose to continue in classes through the last semester.

Kenneth sustained the critical burns on the upper portion of his body at 5:30 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 15. He was helping his mother burn trash at their home about four miles southeast of town. To coax along the burning of magazines, he threw gasoline on them, reports said. His clothing

caught fire and he rolled in the grass to extinguish the blaze. Kenneth was brought to Abernathy Medical Clinic, then taken by Dennis & Chambers ambulance to Methodist Hospital, Lubbock. He was treated there Wednesday night. Dennis & Chambers transferred him from Methodist Hospital to an ambulance plane at Lubbock Municipal Airport Thursday for the trip to Galveston.

O. F. Rea, Review staffman, wrote the following account of the flight to Galveston:

Kenneth Davis was flown to a paved air strip 5 miles from Alvin Thursday afternoon where an ambulance was waiting for him. This was as near as they could get to Galveston on account of the weather. Stormy weather was encountered in the vicinity of Austin and numerous detours around, over, and under clouds were necessary.

Dr. Kenneth Gregory and Billy Shipman accompanied Kenneth in the plane which was a Piper Apache twin engine plane from West-Tex Air Service at Lubbock Municipal Airport. This is a six passenger plane and could accommodate the stretcher by removing the seat on one side. A local pilot employed by West-Tex Air Service piloted the plane.

Kenneth's mother and father and an aunt, Mrs. Davis, from Floydada, also flew down in a Cessna 210 based at Abernathy airport, and piloted by Virgil Rhodes. Both planes left Lubbock airport shortly after 1:00 p.m. and arrived at Alvin at 4:30 p.m., staying fairly close together all the way.

The Cessna landed at Alvin air strip in the mud and suffered slight damage to the front landing gear. The Piper then went to a paved strip about 5 miles away and landed without incident.

Dr. Gregory was attempting to inject a fluid into the patient but was having difficulty before take off, however, as soon as a little altitude was gained no trouble was had in administering the fluid.

The annual School Trustee election has been ordered by the Abernathy School Board and will be held in the city hall club room Saturday, April 1, from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m., announced School Superintendent Noel Johnson.

The deadline for filing for school trustees is 30 days prior to the election (or 5 p.m. March 1st). Forms for filing for the trustee election may be secured at the business office at the high school.

The terms of L. J. West, Joe Lovelace, and Marvin Floyd expire this year. It is expected that the incumbents' names will appear on the ballot.

The local school began announcing over radio station KFYO at 2 p.m. Monday for parents to pick up their children as soon as possible. Most of the children were called for by closing time, and buses left with light loads of passengers (10 to 13 per bus). All children were delivered or accounted for by 8 p.m., with about a dozen youngsters staying at homes in town. Four buses failed to return to the bus garage but the drivers were returned to their homes. The buses were left at the following places: one mile south of County Line, at the Ted Watts home, Johnny Davis home, and one by Lee's Sausage Factory at the northeast edge of town.

Traffic in town and on highways and roads was snarled Monday afternoon and night, but began moving Tuesday. There was some damage to shrubs and trees, and a carport at the Billy Shipman home caved in on their car causing some damage.

School was dismissed Tuesday. Classes were held at the high school with buses traveling paved roads only.

The new Hale County Judge is a son of Mrs. Mary E. Joy of Abernathy.

Joy plans to secure an attorney-partner in his local law office and continue his practice in Abernathy.

12-Inch Snow Hits Here

A rapid-moving snow storm took this area by surprise Monday, dumping 11 inches of soggy-wet flakes in a matter of a few hours. This, added to about an inch of snow and sleet Sunday, brought the snow fall total to 12 inches for the early part of the week. M. O. Hood, local weather observer, said the area received about 1.52 inches of moisture from the 12 inches of snow.

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James Joy, Abernathy City Attorney, Appointed Hale Judge To Follow Lee Nowlin

PLAINVIEW (Special)—James A. Joy, 43-year-old Abernathy attorney, was appointed Hale County Judge late Friday to succeed Lee Nowlin.

The appointment, which will be effective March 1, was made unanimously by the Hale County Commissioners Court in a 5 p. m. session here.

Joy will serve out the remainder of Nowlin's term, which expires Dec. 31, 1962. Nowlin, county judge for 10 years, resigned Monday to enter private law practice here. There were 12 applicants for the post.

Joy, a native of Foard County and a graduate of Crowell High School, attended Tyler Commercial College and Texas A&M College. He received his law degree in 1952 from St. Mary's in San Antonio, then did one year of post-graduate work at New York University. He practiced law in San Antonio before moving to Abernathy in August of 1956.

For the past year, he has doubled as city attorney and city judge at Abernathy and did law practice.

Joy was pilot in the U. S. Army Air Force from 1941 through 1945. Mrs. Joy is the former Ruth Stephens of Edinburg. They are members of the Church of Christ.

Antelopes Lose To Dimmitt

The Abernathy Antelopes fell to the Dimmitt Bobcats Tuesday night at Plainview in a bi-district tilt. Producing a "better than average" team this year, Coach Wayne Preston used 10 boys during the contest. This is the third year in succession that the Antelopes have met Dimmitt in bi-district play, with the Antelopes being beaten by the Bobcats each time.

The Antelopes played fine defensive ball, but got off to a slow start in getting their eyes on the basket. They held the high-scoring Junior Coffey to only 22 points, but Mike Calvert contributed 18 points for the Bobcats. Coffey had been scoring in the mid 30's, and had scored 41 points in one of the playoff games with Tulia last week.

Mike Ritchey was the only Antelope to hit in double figures, netting 11 points.

Dimmitt jumped to a 5-0 lead with 3:35 elapsing before Abernathy scored. Dimmitt and Abernathy exchanged free throws to put the score 3-6. Coffey scored on a jump shot, then Jerry Givens hit from the corner to cut the lead back to 3 points, 5-8. The Bobcats were never ahead by more than six points at any time during the first period, leading 16-10 going into the second quarter.

The Bobcats racked up 9 points in the first three minutes of the second period while Abernathy went scoreless, then two free tosses by Tom Ritchey put the score at 12-25. Abernathy trailed by 17 points at one time during the second stanza, 13-30, but pulled to within 10 points by halftime, 26-36.

The two teams played on even terms the last half, each team

netting 14 points in the third quarter, and 14 points in the final period.

By defeating Abernathy, Dimmitt thus advanced to the Regional Tournament to be held in Lubbock this weekend. The Bobcats will meet Fort Stockton at 11 a.m. Saturday. Fort Stockton downed Denver City, 65-56, in a bi-district encounter at Odessa Tuesday night.

The Antelopes used Semline for a warm-up game last Saturday night, and lost to the Indians, 73-67. The results of the contest were encouraging as the Indians had previously won 14 games in a row.

Abernathy carried a 57-51 advantage into the final quarter, but the powerful Indians, champions of District 2-AAA, outscored the Antelopes 19-10 in the final period. Both clubs played most of the

Candidate Filing Deadline In City Election Is March 4

Preparations are now being made at City Hall for the forthcoming city election which will be held on Tuesday, April 4.

Article 2.02 of the Election Code states that the deadline for filing to get one's name on the ballot in cities and towns shall be thirty (30) days before the date of the election. Since there are 31 days in March, the deadline will fall at midnight March 4th.

Candidates desiring to run for city office may get their name on the ballot in one of three ways: the first and most common way is to file as an independent by asking that his name be placed on the ballot; another way to place

a name on the ballot is by a petition containing names of qualified voters of the city; or candidates may be nominated by a political party through a regularly conducted primary or mass convention held more than thirty days before the April election.

The mayor's office and two council positions are to be filled this year. The following people have been nominated for office to date:

For mayor—Dr. John Hale, For councilmen—David R. Pinson (running for re-election), Roy Jones, W. A. Scott, James R. (Jim) Bobb) Smith, and Rudolph Struve.

Clarice Madora (Bell) Hood, known in Abernathy as Grandmother Hood, was born February 27, 1867, in Maury County, Tennessee. She has been a member of the Baptist Church for 78 years.

She was married to James L. Hood, March 8, 1886, in the same county in which she was born. She moved with her family from Tennessee to Travis County, Texas, in 1894, and moved again to Erath County, Texas in 1895. Her husband passed away in 1932 at Dublin, Texas.

To the Tennessee marriage, there were born five sons. Three are living and two are deceased. Living are: M. O., Abernathy, and Lee and Archie, both of Ft. Worth. Sons deceased are William, 1958, and George, 1960.

Making her home with her son, M. O. Hood, she lived at Rising Star, Texas, and in Dickens County, and finally at Abernathy. The Hoods are well known here at Abernathy where Mr. Hood taught in the Abernathy school for 11 years, and has resided here since 1937.

Grandmother Hood suffered a

stroke in 1943, and part of the time since then she has been confined to either a hospital bed or a wheel chair. At the present time, Grandmother is at the Poplar Grove Convalescent Home, 3512 Idalou Highway, Lubbock, Texas. Her two sons above mentioned have passed away since she was taken to the Convalescent Home.

The 94th milestone rolls around Monday, February 27, 1961, and Grandmother is remembered here among her friends and especially in church circles where her deep and abiding faith in the common task of Christian people will be long remembered by one and all.

She belongs to a class of hardy pioneer women of great courage who, through sacrifice and hard-ship, brought this country in on a silver tray and presented it to this generation.

In her Tennessee family of long ago, there were 10 children, but Grandmother Hood is the only one remaining as of this day.

Among her greatest sorrows of life was when her 20-year-old grandson, Thomas Hood, paid the supreme sacrifice in the Battle of Iwo Jima in World War II. The local Legion Post carries the

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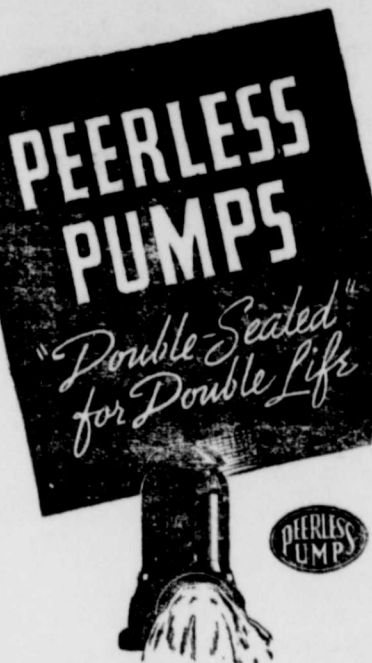


