Results Given On Grain Plot Tests Near Abernathy

The planting of the recommended varieties for your area may be as important as your fertilizer or water management program, according to Hale County Agricultural Agent Ollie Liner. This was clearly brought out in grain sorghum variety demonstrations conducted by Liner and the Hale County Extension Office in 1960.

Another variety demonstration was conducted on the Elton G. Settler farm north of Abernathy. A total of 12 varieties were planted on June 9. The row spacing on the test was two in and one out and at the time of planting, every third row watered one time. It had two additional waterings on the 1st and 24th of August. On the 27 of July, 57 pounds of nitrogen was side dressed.

Mike Willis Former Local Boy Is One Of 300 Living At Cal Farley's Boys Ranch

Mike Willis, a former Abernathy boy and one of the nearly 300 youngsters from all over the nation who make their home at Cal Farley's nationally famous Boys Ranch, is a member of the largest combined graduating class in the 22-year history of the home for homeless and delinquent boys near Amarillo, Texas.

Mike arrived at the Ranch one year ago and is an 8th grade graduate of the fully-accredited Boys Ranch School. He will enter high school classes next fall.

Forty-six boys of the 8th grade and 15 boys of the school's senior class will participate in formal ceremonies that will combine graduation exercises for both grades. The combined exercises are a tradition of long standing at the Ranch.

In addition to his formal education, Mike will also have an opportunity to learn a trade from one of the 14 skills that are provided for the older boys in the Ranch's vocational training program. He is also participating in the year-round athletic and recreational programs that are available for all the boys.

Boys Ranch was founded in 1939 by Cal Farley, former world-champion athlete and successful Amarillo businessman. Since that year more than 1,200 boys have been cared for, trained and educated at the Ranch and are now scattered all over the world, making their own ways and raising families of their own.

LIONS CLUB NEWS

Jim Bob Smith, program chairman, introduced his brother-in-law, Y. F. Snodgrass of Lubbock, at the Lions Club's noon luncheon at Graham's Restaurant Tuesday. Mr. Snodgrass in turn made a brief talk and introduced the guest speaker, W. L. (Bill) Broadhurst, also of Lubbock.

Mr. Broadhurst's talk was entitled, "Cost Depletion For Underground Water." He outlined the basic reasons why it is felt that irrigation farmers should be allowed a percentage allowance on water, and explained what steps have been taken toward getting the government and the internal revenue to recognize the farmers' need for such.

Mr. Broadhurst also presented a brief rundown of the number of irrigation wells, approximate acres irrigated, and the acre feet of water pumped during a period of 1910 through 1960. He used a graphic chart to illustrate the figures. In 1911 there were practically no irrigation wells on the South

Plains, and in 1960 there were 45,000. In 1915, approximately a quarter-million acres were being irrigated, and in 1960 around four million acres were irrigated. In 1945, one-half million acre feet of water were pumped, and in 1956 nearly six million acre feet of water were pumped, and from three and one-half to five million acre feet have been pumped each year since 1955.

It was pointed out that 80 percent of the total pumpage has been done in the past 10 years. In closing, Mr. Broadhurst stressed that water is worth more in dollars and cents than most people realize, and his final remark was, "Don't waste it."

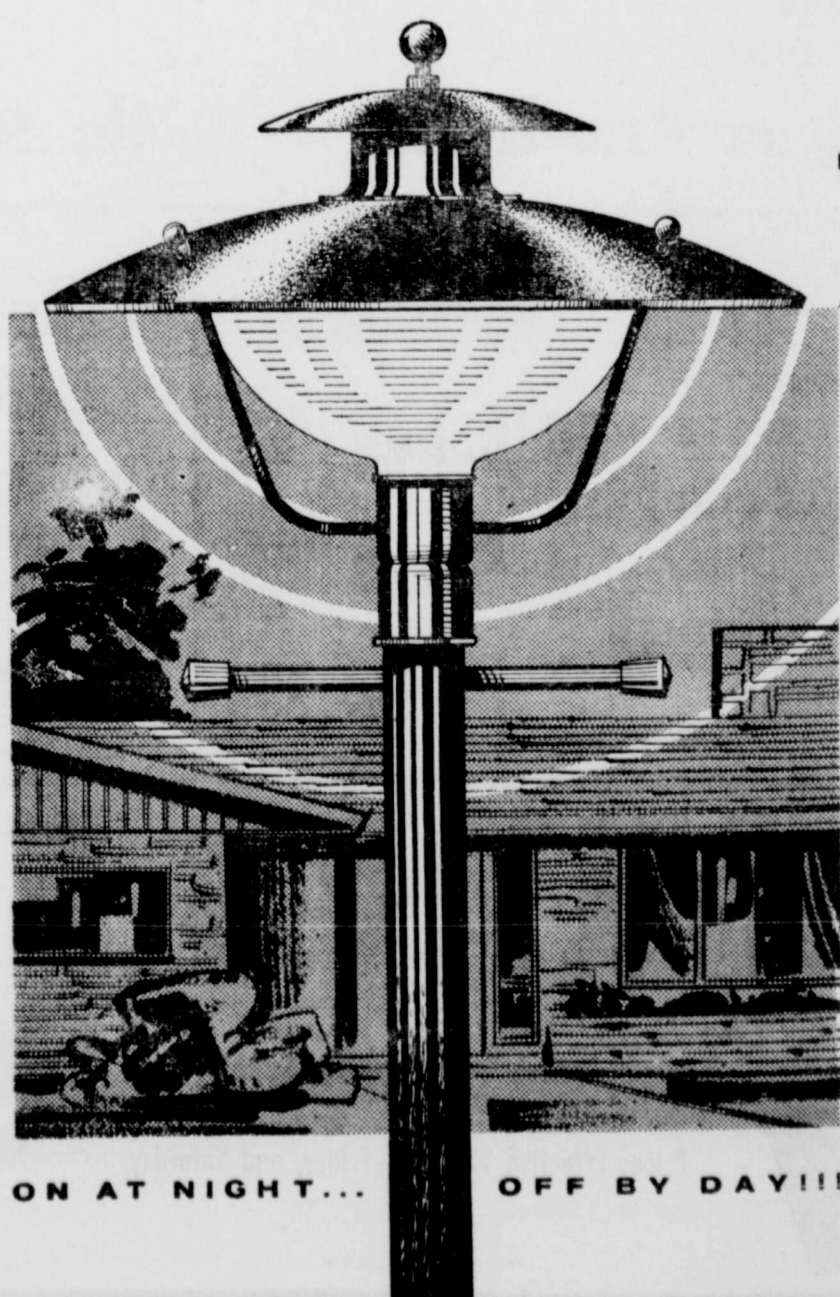

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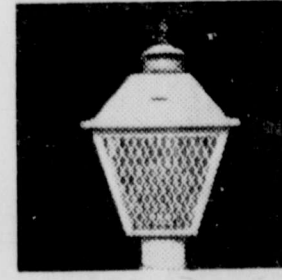

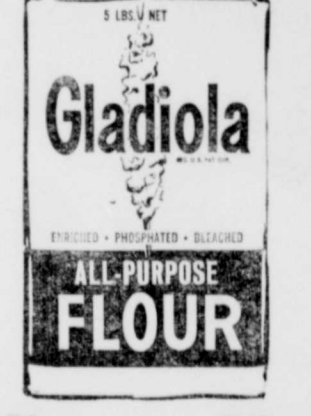
