## BULLETIN!!

A six-year-old Latin American boy was attacked by a skunk early Wednesday morning as he sat beneath a truck on the Fred Blumenstock farm northwest of Abernathy. The skunk savagely attacked the lad, Adolf Trevino, inflicting numerous wounds on his left foot and leg, according to reports from Abernathy Medical Clinic. The animal had to be pulled off the youngster, it was reported.

The boy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Pedro Trevino, Route 2, Abernathy, who reside on the Blumenstock farm.

Although the skunk escaped, doctors at Abernathy Medical Clinic warn that the animal apparently was rabid, otherwise it probably would not have attacked the boy.

A series of 14 shots for rabies treatment was started on the boy Wednesday at the clinic, reported Dr. Kenneth Gregory.

Dr. Gregory warns that skunks are one of the most common carriers of rabies, and that persons in this area should be on the lookout for these animals. He also advised that all dogs should be vaccinated as a precautionary measure.

The 7,000 represented a mere handful of the total votes cast in the 19th District, however, it was a "big" vote for the rancher and the minor party to garner against a political veteran of the Democratic Party.

With the 19th District's big vote points of Plainview and Lubbock voting Republican Saturday, it's time for the Democratic leaders and candidates to sit up and take notice.

Locally, the tank was the last symbol of a railroading era that is now history. The tank was built here by the Santa Fe to provide water for the steam locomotives, which have been replaced by sleek diesel-electric engines.

When the Santa Fe ceased using the tank several years ago, it was donated by the railroad to the City of Abernathy, which has used it as a city water storage facility.

## Tower Wins In Senate Race; Local Voters Favor Blakley

John G. Tower, professor of government at Midwestern University, Wichita Falls, Saturday was elected to fill the U. S. Senate seat vacated by Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson. Tower defeated the Democratic candidate William A. Blakley by a narrow margin.

The new junior U. S. Senator has the distinction of being the first Republican ever elected by the people to serve Texas in the U. S. Senate. Texas was represented by some Republican Senators in the Reconstruction Days following the Civil War, but they were named by the legislature, not by popular vote of the people.

Abernathy area voters favored Blakley, who has served as interim Senator since Johnson resigned to become Vice President of the United States.

Abernathy, Hale County, voted 135 for Blakley and 100 for Tower.

## Members Named For Equalization Board At School

Members of the School District Equalization Board met Monday night, May 22, at the school for an organizational meeting and elected Dan Z. Ward as chairman of the board. Other members are E. J. Pope, Jr., Joe Barton, E. M. Crow, and Bill Jack Ingram.

The hearings on 1961 values will be held June 15, in the board room at the high school, announced Superintendent Noel Johnson. It was indicated that there would be no general raise in existing properties this year.

The board will devote the majority of its study to assessment of values on new construction that has not been on the tax roll before. Construction which is not completed before January 1, 1960, is not presently on the existing tax roll, it was explained.

Indications appear that a decrease in the tax rate will not be necessary, and the rate should remain the same for the third consecutive year. The effective rate for the 1959 and 1960 tax years was \$1.90 per \$100.00 valuation, and it is anticipated that the rate will be the same amount for the 1961 tax year.

ORDINANCE NO. 120  
 AN ORDINANCE CLOSING SANTA FE AVENUE BETWEEN B STREET AND THE SANTA FE RAILROAD RIGHT-OF-WAY, AND A STREET FROM THE NORTH LINE OF 7TH STREET TO THE SOUTH LINE OF SANTA FE AVENUE AS A PUBLIC THROUGHFARE;

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: The City Council finds that Hygrade Gin, Inc., is the sole and only owner of Block 122 abutting the East side of said

City Council further finds that Hygrade Gin, Inc., is the sole owner of Lots Numbered 19 through 28 inclusive, in Block 120 and Lots Numbered 7 & 8 in Block 122, and that C. F. Buske is the owner of Lots 14, 15, 16, 17, & 18, in Block 120, all of said Lots abutting on Santa Fe Avenue from the East boundary line of B Street to the West boundary line of the Santa Fe Railroad right-of-way; and that the said Hygrade Gin, Inc., and C. F. Buske have petitioned the City Council to close both the Santa Fe Avenue from the East boundary line of B Street to the West boundary line of the Santa Fe Railroad right-of-way, and A Street from the North boundary line of 7th Street to the South boundary line of Santa Fe Avenue and further, the alley running North and South through Block 122.

SECTION 2: The City Council finds and determines the following in connection with the portion of A Street, Santa Fe Avenue and the alley in Block 122, the streets and alley sought to be closed herein:

1. That portion of said street, avenue and alley has never been opened or graded or used as a public thoroughfare, and no necessity exists now, or will exist in the future for the opening of that portion of said street, avenue and alley.

2. No utility service lines are located in that portion of said street, avenue and alley to be closed, except that a water line is located in that portion of A Street sought to be closed, and the East end of Santa Fe Avenue, and the City of Abernathy and the traveling public will not suffer for any inconvenience by reason of closing that portion of such street, avenue and alley.

3. Petitioners are the sole owners of all the property abutting the street, avenue and alley sought to be closed, and they will not suffer any damage by reason of the closing of said street, avenue and alley; and any claim or right for damages for closing said street, avenue and alley is waived and the City is in all respects released.

4. The City reserves herein a 15 foot easement, extending 7 1/2 feet on either side of the center of that portion of A Street sought to be closed and extending from the North boundary line of 7th Street to a point 7 1/2 feet past the center of Santa Fe Avenue; and a 15 foot easement, being 7 1/2 feet on either side of the center line of Santa Fe, extending from the West boundary line of the Santa Fe Railroad right-of-way to the East line of the easement hereinabove referred to.

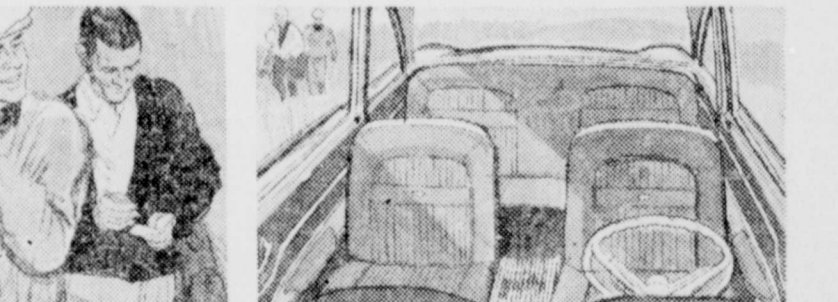

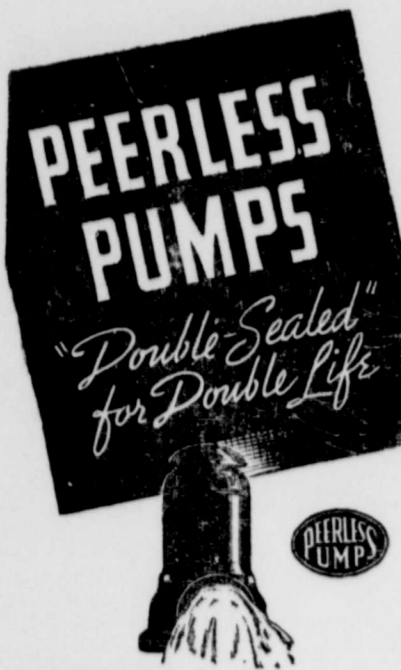

# Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains  
Research Foundation

"The 1960 cotton fertilizer tests at the High Plains Research Foundation disclosed the importance of proper amounts and placement of phosphate fertilizer," Delbert

Langford, Associate Agronomist, remarked as he released the reports recently. "Placing phosphate in bands of 3 inches to 10 inches from the seed and 2 to 3 inches deeper than the seed, produced the best results in the fertilizer placement tests with yields of 1011 to 1016 pounds of lint per acre compared with 928 pounds with no fertilizer." Several methods of placement were compared in the test. "Eighty to one-hundred twenty pounds of phosphate combined with 40, 80 and 120 pounds of nitrogen produced significant increases over no fertilizer. The low rate of

application of 40 pounds of phosphate per acre did not prove profitable with any rate of nitrogen. Phosphate applied without nitrogen was not profitable. This has been true in four years of experimentation at Hattway."

Cotton that was planted in May had to be replanted on June 16, 1960 due to wet weather blight and seedling disease. The highest yield under these circumstances was obtained from an application of 40 pounds of nitrogen and 120 pounds of phosphate. In a longer season, as in 1958, the highest yield increase was received from an application of 120 pounds of nitrogen with 80 pounds of phosphate.

The cotton fertilizer reports released last week show results of six different tests. These are: (1) rates and ratios of nitrogen and phosphate application, (2) preplant and side-dress application of nitrogen, (3) six sources of phosphate, (4) different methods of phosphate placement, (5) various treatments of magnesium, potash and trace elements and (6) four sources of nitrogen.

# Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains  
Research Foundation

"The 1960 cotton fertilizer tests at the High Plains Research Foundation disclosed the importance of proper amounts and placement of phosphate fertilizer," Delbert

Langford, Associate Agronomist, remarked as he released the reports recently. "Placing phosphate in bands of 3 inches to 10 inches from the seed and 2 to 3 inches deeper than the seed, produced the best results in the fertilizer placement tests with yields of 1011 to 1016 pounds of lint per acre compared with 828 pounds with no fertilizer." Several methods of placement were compared in the test.

"Eighty to one-hundred twenty pounds of phosphate combined with 40, 80 and 120 pounds of nitrogen produced significant increases over no fertilizer. The low rate of

application of 40 pounds of phosphate per acre did not prove profitable with any rate of nitrogen. Phosphate applied without nitrogen was not profitable. This has been true in four years of experimentation at Hallway."

Cotton that was planted in May had to be replanted on June 16, 1960 due to wet weather blight and seedling disease. The highest yield under these circumstances was obtained from an application of 40 pounds of nitrogen and 120 pounds of phosphate. In a longer season, as in 1958, the highest yield increase was received from an application of 120 pounds of nitrogen with 80 pounds of phosphate.

The cotton fertilizer reports released last week show results of six different tests. These are: (1) rates and ratios of nitrogen and phosphate application, (2) preplant and side-dress application of nitrogen, (3) six sources of phosphate, (4) different methods of phosphate placement, (5) various treatments of magnesium, potash and trace elements and (6) four sources of nitrogen.

# Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains  
Research Foundation

"The 1960 cotton fertilizer tests at the High Plains Research Foundation disclosed the importance of proper amounts and placement of phosphate fertilizer," Delbert

Langford, Associate Agronomist, remarked as he released the reports recently.

"Placing phosphate in bands of 3 inches to 10 inches from the seed and 2 to 3 inches deeper than the seed, produced the best results in the fertilizer placement tests with yields of 1011 to 1016 pounds of lint per acre compared with 928 pounds with no fertilizer." Several methods of placement were compared in the test. "Eighty to one-hundred twenty pounds of phosphate combined with 40, 80 and 120 pounds of nitrogen produced significant increases over no fertilizer. The low rate of

application of 40 pounds of phosphate per acre did not prove profitable with any rate of nitrogen. Phosphate applied without nitrogen was not profitable. This has been true in four years of experimentation at Halfway."

Cotton that was planted in May had to be replanted on June 16, 1960 due to wet weather blight and seedling disease. The highest yield under these circumstances was obtained from an application of 40 pounds of nitrogen and 120 pounds of phosphate. In a longer season, as in 1958, the highest yield increase was received from an application of 120 pounds of nitrogen with 80 pounds of phosphate.

The cotton fertilizer reports released last week show results of six different tests. These are: (1) rates and ratios of nitrogen and phosphate application, (2) preplant and side-dress application of nitrogen, (3) six sources of phosphate, (4) different methods of phosphate placement, (5) various treatments of magnesium, potash and trace elements and (6) four sources of nitrogen.

**Purchasing Agent For Hale Not Possible This Session**

Dear Mr. Madera:

I am today in receipt of your

letter of May 25, 1961, enclosing a copy of the Hale County Grand Jury Report which was submitted on May 17, 1961.

After a check with the attorney general's office and the legislative council, it was determined that legislation which would allow Hale County to have a purchasing agent would affect 18 other counties in Texas. A strictly local bill allowing only Hale County to have a purchasing agent would not be constitutional and the necessary constitutional legislation would affect five or six other Senator's districts. It would, therefore, be controversial at least to the extent that permission or agreement from the other affected counties would have to be secured before we could take care of Hale County's grand jury request also. Therefore, the request for this legislation came too late for any possible serious consideration at this regular session of our legislature.

Certainly I, and I am sure your Representative, H. G. Wells, will be glad to try to carry out this grand jury request if the need is still felt and seems to be favorable with Hale County citizens at the very first opportunity. This could be done at a special session of the legislature if the Governor would submit it in his call. This latter would be necessary because only that legislation recommended by the Governor can be considered by the legislature in a special session. If not, your Representative and Senator would certainly have a good chance of securing such legislation for Hale County at the next regular session of your state legislature.

As it will be necessary for a delay before such legislation could be passed, I hope that we will have opportunity to see if this would be a popular thing with the citizens of your county.

Thanks for your courtesy and your letter, and please remember it is always a privilege for us when we can be of service to you and the people of Hale County.

## NYSTELS VISIT FORMER HOME AREA

J. P. and A. C. Nystel recently made a business trip through Eastland, Meridian, Fort Worth and Denton. They report that crops are no further advanced in the lower country than here. Around Anson the ground was cracking badly showing a marked lack of moisture. Crops were also in need of rain from Denton west to the caprock.

An interesting side trip was made while at Meridian. This is the part of the country where the Nystels settled in the early days. At a certain place on which the Nystels lived in 1867 a little pile of rocks placed there by Mr. J. P. Nystel's father to mark the spot where he was captured by a band of Comanche Indians, March 29, 1867, at the age of 14.

Young Nystel and a neighbor were cutting cedar posts atop a bluff and tossing the brush over the cliff when they were surprised by the Indians. Figuring death was fairly certain both ran and jumped off the cliff. Young Nystel landed on a pile of the brush they had thrown over and the neighbor landed in a tree top. Nystel was hit in the thigh by an arrow and could not get away and the Indians came down and picked him up and carried him with them.

The neighbor was fired at by one of the Indians, for two missed then hit in the arm and the Indian threw the pistol at him in

disgust. He was able to avoid capture as he had his gun with him when he jumped, and the Indians then had only bows and arrows after losing the pistol.

After some three months during which time the Indians were on the move all the time ranging northwest up into northeast New Mexico near Capulin mountain and back into southern Kansas where they sold young Nystel for ransom of some \$250 or \$300. Nystel then made his way back to

Meridian and home to his folks with the help of some white men, some friendly and some not so friendly.
