Greer offered these vacation hints:

For more relaxation and enjoyment, plan your vacation early.

For help in planning it, write to the Texas Highway Department, P. O. Box 5061, Austin, Texas.

The Highway Department maintains a complete file of descriptive and informative literature on points of interest and special events throughout the State. This material, including Highway Department publications such as the

1961 Official Highway Travel Map, is available free of charge to prospective Texas vacationers.

Vacation outings ranging from full-fledged trips of a week or more down to shorter drives on holidays or weekends can be planned with the help of these free informative pieces. Vacationers writing for information should specify the area of the State they wish to visit and indicate their preference of things to see and do.

Once the vacationer is on his way, more than 69,000 miles of smooth Texas highways make quick and easily accessible points of historical, scenic, and recreational interest.

"Yet Texas tourist attractions often pass unnoticed by many Texans living only a few miles away," he said. "It is like the famous 'acres of diamonds' story in which a man traveled all over the world seeking wealth, only to discover that he could have found it in his own backyard."

"Texans who know their State are aware that the Lone Star

State has an unequalled variety of scenery, climate, and tourist attractions within a few hours' drive. It is unfortunate that we have no funds to make these attractions known to residents of other states through tourist advertising."

Texas has one National Park (Big Bend), four National Forests, more than 600 miles of coastline, more than 50 mountains over 6,000 feet high, and numerous scenic underground caverns. Greer said, as well as many man-made attractions—artificial inland lakes, old

cattle trails, restored forts, monuments, and museums. More than 50 State Parks are available for outdoor recreation including water sports and camping.

The Texas Highway Department maintains some 1,000 Roadside Parks offering travelers a chance to rest or picnic.

"Plan your vacation with the aid of the free travel information available through the Highway Department," Greer urged, "then drive on a Texas highway to see Texas from a tourist's-eye view."

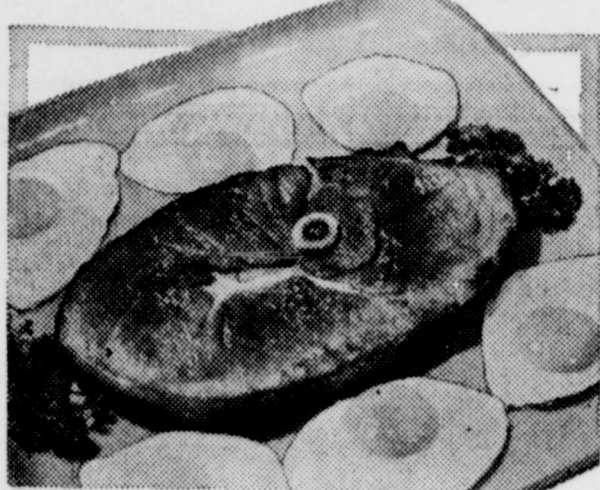

Legal Notice

Ordinance No. 123

AN ORDINANCE DETERMINING THE NECESSITY FOR IMPROVEMENT OF A CERTAIN STREET IN THE CITY OF ABERNATHY; NOTIFYING THE ABUTTING PROPERTY OWNERS AND INTERESTED PERSONS OF THE INTENT TO IMPROVE THE STREET IN THE CITY OF ABERNATHY; SETTING A TIME AND PLACE WHEREBY THE ABUTTING PROPERTY OWNERS AND INTERESTED PERSONS MAY APPEAR BEFORE THE CITY COUNCIL ON MATTERS RELATING TO SAID STREET IMPROVEMENTS; REQUIRING THE CITY ENGINEER TO PREPARE AND FILE COMPLETE SPECIFICATIONS AND PLANS FOR THE PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS SO AS TO ENABLE BIDS TO BE SECURED AND A CONTRACT FOR IMPROVEMENTS ENTERED INTO; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS:

Section 1. That a necessity exists for the permanent improvement of those certain portions of public streets hereinafter listed, by excavating, grading and paving the same, by the installation of drainage facilities therein, and by the construction of curbs and gutters where adequate curbs and gutters are not now in place, and such improvements are hereby ordered, and the portions of public streets to be so improved being designed and defined as follows:

On 6th Street from the east property right of way line of U. S. Highway 87 (now under construction) 150 feet eastward to the west right of way line of the north-south alley on 6th Street.

Section 2. The property owners of the above street are hereby notified of the intent of the City of Abernathy to order the improvement of the said street and are given notice that the City Council of the City shall meet in the City Hall at 10:00 a. m., Thursday, July 6, 1961 to allow property owners and interested persons to appear before the City Council on matters pertaining to the above mentioned street improvements.

Section 3. The City Engineer is hereby directed to prepare forth with and file with the City Council complete plans and specifications for the proposed improvements so as to enable bids to be secured, and said specifications shall be so arranged to enable the City to obtain bids for doing said work together with an estimate of the cost of such improvements, and a written statement which shall contain the name of persons, firms, corporations and estates owning property abutting upon said street said statement to have the number of front feet owned by each and described by lot or block number, or in any manner sufficient to identify it.

Section 4. The fact that the above street is in bad condition and should be improved immediately creates a public emergency requiring this ordinance be passed finally on this date, foregoing the rule of three readings, and shall take effect immediately.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN—Texas' tax debate continues! Not as lively now as during the legislative session — but many voices are being heard.

It's sort of a "speak now or forever hold your peace" period. Some type of tax bill, undoubtedly the biggest in Texas history, will have to be passed in July or August, and those with something to say are rushing to get in their licks.

Legislators report that the small-scale "great debate" is proving very helpful in stirring up opinions from previously silent constituents. They're hoping to discover enough home district reaction to guide them to a swift, sure solution when they return for the special session July 10.

Eight Central Texas lawmakers, in a reply to Gov. Price Daniel's report to the people, say that raising \$341,000,000 in new revenue will require a "broad coverage tax."

Although five of the eight voted with the governor during the session, several objected to a "hit and miss" tax approach.

Some say that people in their districts object to selective taxes on grounds that "it's not fair to tax my product and not my neighbor's."

IN THE WIND—A number of new approaches to tax plans already hatched around during the regular session are being worked on by law makers during this interim. Among plans being considered are these:

1. By Rep. Charles N. Wilson of Trinity (sponsor of the 2 percent sales tax passed by the House last session)—a new sales tax that would be linked, Siamese-twin fashion with a corporation income tax.
2. By Rep. George T. Hinson of Mineola (a frequent sponsor of legislation favored by the governor)—a 2 percent tax on everything selling for \$5.00 or more, with the usual food and drug exemptions.
3. By Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas—selective excise taxes of 2 percent on a long list of items, but generally exempting the bed rock necessities of life.

NEW COMMITTEE AT WORK—Governor Daniel's new tax study committee, made up mostly of the board chairmen for various state agencies, got off to a diplomatic, soft-voiced start.

Several lawmakers took a dim view of having "another study group," recalling that the last one had come up with a payroll tax plan that never caught fire.

Texas voters, they pointed out, selected their legislators to write the tax laws and will hold the legislators responsible for the outcome.

Members of the committee made it clear that they don't intend to dictate to the Legislature. But they do hope to be able to indicate some possible paths of compromise among the various plans for which the legislators have shown favor.

Committee is to meet July 6 to write its report for the special session.

DOWN THE DRAIN?—Some legislators are fretting over the loss in state revenue resulting from the Legislature's failure to pass a tax plan during the regular session.

Here is the way they see it:

1. Bills passed by a simple majority vote take effect 90 days after the close of the session. If a tax bill had been passed in the regular session, it would have taken effect the last of August and money from it would be accruing September 1 when the new fiscal year begins.
2. If a bill is passed by a simple majority in the special session —say about August 10—it will not take effect until November 10.
3. A \$340,000,000 tax bill covering the 24-month period would raise money at the rate of about \$14,000,000 a month. But between September 1 and November 10, nothing would come in from the new bill. This waiting period of two months, would mean the loss of some \$35,000,000 in state revenue which would have been raised if the same bill had been passed earlier.

Question that immediately arises is: Can the Legislature pass a tax bill by a two-thirds vote of both houses so that it will go into effect immediately? (As done in 1959).

Today legislators are dubious.

As the new tax bill is expected to affect more items, many Legislators feel that it would be unfair to expect businessmen and storekeepers to get ready overnight to charge all sorts of new taxes.

NEW WORLDS TO CONQUER—With the election of John Tower as U. S. Senator, exultant leaders of the Texas Republican Party feel they have a foot solidly in the door.

Beyond the door, that they hope to swing wide, is a two-party Texas with the GOP sharing political power in Texas on a roughly equal basis.

New goals are being carefully considered. All but one (Travis) of Texas' big metropolitan counties went for Tower, as well as large sections of West Texas. In these areas, except where a very popular Democrat is entrenched, the Republicans can be expected to charge all sorts of new taxes.

First test is due in Bexar County where Congressman Paul Kilday is due to resign to become judge of the Court of Military Appeals. Bexar County went for Tower last month.

Under the present law, Kilday's successor will be determined in a one-shot, high-man-wins special election, probably next fall. There is some talk of trying to get the Legislature, during its special session, to pass a law which would require a run-off in special congressional elections. This would reduce Republican chances.

CONTEMPT OF COURT—Court of Criminal Appeals ruled that a person cannot be held in contempt of court for an act committed outside the court room.

In the case in point, a district judge had held a man in contempt of court for assaulting him (the judge) at a filling station. Judge sentenced his assailant to 72 hours imprisonment and a \$100 fine.

Nope, said the appeals court. Contempt of court has to take place in the court room.

1961-62 Football Scheduled Released

The 1961-62 school football schedule has been completed and was released by Pete Wilson, athletic director at AHS.

It was pointed out that all conference games this coming season will be played at 7:30 p. m. It is not yet known whether or not the starting time of the non-conference games will be changed to 7:30 or will remain at 8:00 p. m.

The AHS Antelopes will meet the same teams this coming season as they did last season. Only the dates and the places to be played have been changed.

School Business Services Workshop Set For June 22-23 At Texas Tech

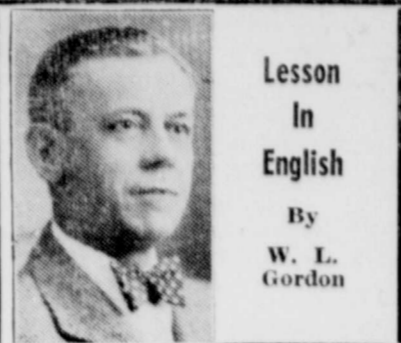
"Trends in School Business Management Today and Tomorrow" will be theme of the 1961 School Business Services Workshop June 22-23 at Texas Tech.

Words Often Misused

Avoid such expressions as, "Empty out the bookcase," or "We must empty out the garage." The "out" is redundant, and should be omitted.

Do not say, "She was overly anxious to hear from him." Say, "She was overanxious."

Do not say, "I can't say as I care to go." Say, "I can't say that I care to go."

"Concur in" should be followed by an action, and "Concur with" should be followed by a person. Thus: "I concur in the decision to place this matter in your hands," and, "I concur with my colleague in his opinions."

Avoid the use of "completed," when speaking of a person's complexion. Say, "He is of dark complexion," or, "He is dark-complexioned."

"Sympathy for" implies a feeling of grief for another who is in trouble or distress, as "Sympathy for a friend who has lost his father." "Sympathy with" implies similarity or identity of circumstances between persons, as, "The refugees' sympathy with each other's plight drew them together."

Words Often Mispronounced

Worsted (defeated) and worsted (of yarn). In the first meaning, the word is pronounced werst-ed, and in the second meaning it is pronounced woots-ted, with the "oo" as in "foot."

Mikado. Pronounced mi-k-a-w-doe, accent on second syllable.

Bremen (German city). Pronounce bray-men, accent first syllable.

Sagittarius (sign of the zodiac). Pronounce first syllable as "saj, not as in "sag."

Viands. Pronounce vigh-and, accent on first syllable.

Marshal (as a verb, to gather; as a noun, an official; martial (military).

Words Often Misspelled

Disassemble (to take apart); dissemble (to disguise); to reign. Rarely, observe the "ri"; rarefied, observe the "re." Merchandise, "ise"; mercerize, "ize." Deceive (the noun), and devise (the verb). Inoculate, only one "n"; innocuous, two "n's." Allude (to refer to indirectly); elude (to evade or avoid).

Word Study

"Use a word three times and it is yours." Let us increase our vocabulary by mastering one word each day. Words for this lesson:

THEOLOGICAL: pertaining to the science of God or religion. "It is never wise to become entangled in any theological arguments."

ROTATIVE: turning, as a wheel. "Her mind was as rotative as a wheel."

ARROGATE: to assume, or claim as one's own, unduly, or presumptuously. "How can this man dare to arrogate the position of leader?"

CONFUTE: to overwhelm by argument; to refute. "He was finally able to confute his severest critics."

DIRE: extremely evil or terrible. "Their armies are in dire peril."

REDOUBTABLE: formidable; dread; also, worthy of respect or reverence. "How can he hope to cope with such redoubtable adversaries?"

Dr. John G. Chapman, Noted Professor, To Head Wayland History Department

PLAINVIEW (Spl.) — Appointment of Dr. John Griffin Chapman, St. Augustine, Fla., as head of the department of history and director of the American Studies Program at Wayland Baptist College brings a distinguished history professor to the campus, according to President A. Hope Owen. Dr. Chapman, now chairman of the division of social sciences at Florida Normal College, has spent many years in the Far East. For five years he was political and social adviser on the staff of General Douglas MacArthur at the Supreme Commander Allied Powers General Headquarters in Tokyo and immediately after that was asked to organize the University of the Ryukyus on Okinawa under the United States Occupation Forces.

From 1921 to 1930, Dr. Chapman was professor of history at Seinan Gakuin University, Fukuoka, and director of Student Center, Kago Matchi, Tokyo, under appointment from the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board. Dr. Chapman has also been superintendent of the Des Arc, Mo., public schools.

His educational background includes the B. A. degree with a major in history from Carson-Newman University, the M. A. degree in history from the University of Houston and studies in Far Eastern history and culture for three years at Tokyo College in Japan. In 1954, Dr. Chapman earned the Ed.D. degree at the University of Houston from which he also received the M.Ed. degree. Further study in history has been done at the University of Tennessee and Harvard University and in philosophy at Southwestern Seminary.

For his M.A. degree he wrote on "An Historical Study of the Japanese-American," and for his Ed.D. he wrote on "The Re-education of the Japanese People." He has written and lectured extensively on his experiences which include representing the United States at the ceremony when Emperor Hirohito promulgated the New Constitution of Japan.

Dr. Chapman served as chaplain of the Army of the United States from 1942 to 1945 and was decorated with the bronze star by General Patton for services in the Battle of the Bulge. He was with General Patton's Third Army in Europe in three campaigns. He then served as special consultant for the War Department on problems of the Far East. He retired from the United States Army with the rank of major in military intelligence.

Dr. Chapman has been elected to membership in Kappa Delta Pi, Asiatic Society of Japan, National Geographic Society, National Association of Social Science Teachers and the American Association of University Professors. The Chapmans will move to

Plainview in the late summer when he will take up his duties as professor of history and director of Wayland's American Studies Program that includes the Plains American Heritage Program for public schools of the area. Their children are John G. Chapman, Jr., Houston, and Mrs. E. J. Gregory, Jr., San Antonio, both of whom are graduates of Baylor University.

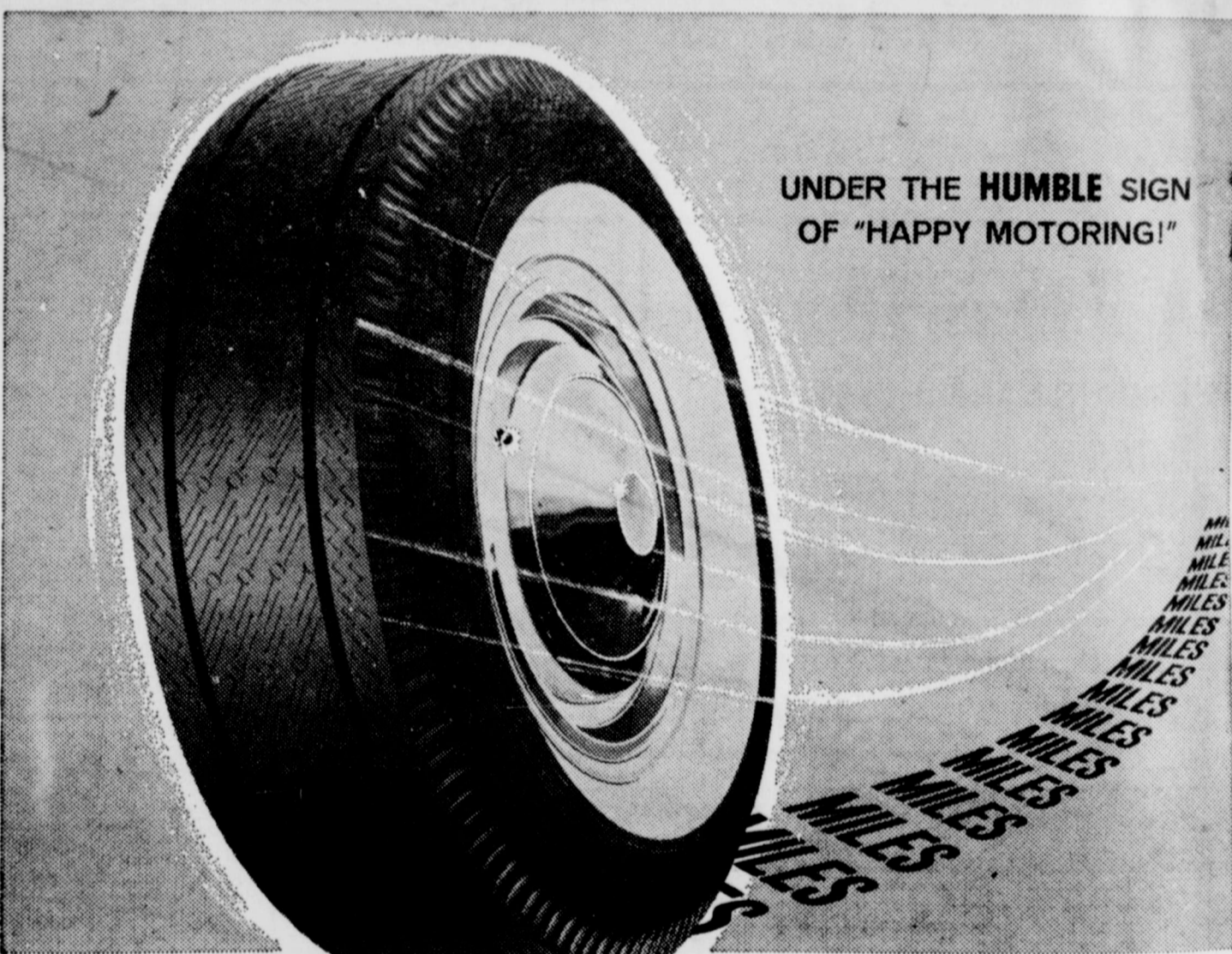

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation Grain Sorghum

Grain sorghum planted on benches produced a higher yield than the same amount planted on sloping land in the water conservation study conducted by James C. Valliant, Water Engineer at the High Plains Research Foundation.

None of the water was wasted on the benched acres which had a total irrigation application of 16.9 inches. A yield of 5,795 pounds of grain sorghum produced a gross return of \$81.71 on the bench. The pumping costs, at \$9 per acre-foot, totaled \$12.69, giving a net return of \$69.02.

Two slope areas were tested in comparison with the benched area. Number 1 slope had the same irrigation treatment as the bench. There was a loss of 2.5 inches through run-off, which amounted to 15 percent. The net return on 3,900 pounds of grain sorghum was \$42.30. Slope Number 2 had 24.5 inches of irrigation water applied at a pumping cost of \$18.36. The run-off loss was 5.9 inches or 24 percent of the total application. The yield was 3,500 pounds per

acre, which gave a net income of \$30.99 per acre. Each plot had same fertilizer treatment of 80 pounds of nitrogen and 40 pounds of P2O5. The crops were cultivated twice with a sweep cultivator and twice with a flame cultivator.

Cotton
One benched and two sloping areas were planted in cotton on May 5 and replanted on May 26 in an irrigation comparison test at Halfway. These tests followed the same plan as that used on grain sorghum.

Ten and nine-tenths inches of irrigation water were applied to the benches and the number one slope. Seventeen and 9.10 inches of irrigation water were applied to slope number two. The run-off was none on the bench, 2.7 in./A. on slope number one and 5 in./A. on slope number two. Twenty-five percent of the water was wasted on slope number one and twenty-eight percent on slope number two. The net return from the benched area on 720 pounds of lint was \$175.00. On slope number one, with 790 pounds of lint cotton per acre, the net return was \$188.77. On slope number two, the yield was 894 pounds of lint cotton per acre. The net return was \$203.16. The results from these tests indicate that cotton is a much better crop to plant on sloping land than grain sorghum. The irrigation test will be continued, to give further data on the most efficient management of sloping land.
