Harvest Festival Activities To Begin At 4 p.m. Tuesday

Abernathy's annual Harvest Festival program is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, October 31, with various other activities slated prior to the program.

School superintendent Noel Johnson reported that school will be dismissed early Tuesday, with the buses scheduled to make their afternoon run at 2:10 p.m.

The parade is scheduled for 5:00 p.m. Tuesday, October 31, with the Harvest Festival program to follow that night at 7:30 in the school auditorium.

Parade and Route

J. B. Thames, chairman of the Parade Committee, reported that any local firms, churches, civic organizations, etc., wishing to enter a float in the parade should contact him through Mr. Jerry Moorhead, Phone CY-8-2812, by Friday, October 27. That is the deadline date for entering floats.

The parade committee will then number the floats by organization's float whereby they will know where to line up when the parade is being formed next Tuesday.

The parade route will be the same as last year, except for the ending. The parade will be dismissed from the south side of the new Elementary School building, enabling band members to easily gain access to the band hall. Also, this will eliminate traffic congestion in the parking area in front of the auditorium and Junior High building, which in previous years proved to be somewhat of a problem, hampering adequate parking of early arrivals for the ham supper and the program.

- A child must receive recognition on stage in costume or prize will be forfeited and prize money retained in Festival Fund.

School To Dismiss Early For Annual Festival Activities

Mr. Noel Johnson, Superintendent of Schools, announced this week that the Abernathy Public Schools will dismiss classes in all grades at two (2:00) p.m. on both Thursday, October 26, and Monday, October 30, in order that the students involved in the Harvest Festival may all meet to rehearse for the program.

On these two days, the buses will run on the regular schedule to take the students home from the rehearsals, Mr. Johnson said. Students not involved in the program will be permitted to leave school at 2:00 o'clock if they have a way to go or if they live close enough to walk. Those who do not have transportation and who live too far away to walk will be kept at the school and will be supervised.

Mr. Johnson also announced that school will be dismissed on Tuesday, October 31, at 2:00 p.m., and that the buses will run at 2:10 p.m. on that day. This early dismissal is in order to give time for final preparations for the parade and festival program which will be held that afternoon and evening.

Local Lad Has Grand Champion Barrow At State Fair Of Texas In Dallas

Steve Johnson, Abernathy 4-H Club member, drove his middle weight Hampshire to the lime light of the barrow show at the State Fair of Texas in Dallas last week. Steve won his class after driving ahead of tough competition, with his entry being picked as the Champion Hampshire barrow. The next drive produced the Grand Champion barrow of the State Fair for the young Mr. Johnson. (There were 740 barrows entered in the show).

Steve is the 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Auvie Johnson, at Route 2, Abernathy. Mr. Johnson is a local youth leader of the Abernathy 4-H Club, and Mrs. Johnson is also a strong supporter and worker in the Abernathy Community 4-H Club.

Steve received a record price of \$3.00 per pound for his 220-pound Grand Champion barrow. Ernest Harris of Ralls, representing the Plains Cotton Cooperative Association, Farmers' Cooperative Compress, and Plains Cooperative Oil Mill, made the purchase. Harris is one of the directors of the three Lubbock cooperatives.

Other Local Winners

Benny Lobstein's heavy weight Angus calf placed first in his class at the State Fair and Lester Edmestock placed a blue ribbon steer in the Commercial Steer Show.

In addition to showing the Grand Champion barrow of the show, Steve also placed 8th with a light weight Hampshire, and 19th with a

heavy weight Hampshire. Jim Johnson, Steve's younger brother, received two 5th places and one 8th place with a medium weight Hampshire, a heavy weight Poland China, and a heavy weight Poland China, in that order.

Benny Lobstein placed 5th with a medium weight Duroc and 19th with a heavy weight Poland China. Burt Montgomery placed 9th with a medium weight Poland China.

Well Represented

The 4-H Clubs in Hale County were well represented at the livestock show at the State Fair. According to Payton Scott, Assistant County Agent, Hale County 4-Hers exhibited 27 barrows, eight steers, and two lambs during the event.

Coach Curtis Davenport's Abernathy Antelopes will be seeking their 3rd consecutive win in district 2-AA play Friday night when they travel to Floydada to tangle with the undefeated Whirlwinds at 7:30.

Abernathy and Floydada are the only two teams in District 2-AA who are undefeated in conference play. Morton has won one and lost one, as has Olton, while Lockney and Muleshoe have lost both conference tilts.

For the Antelopes to upset the Whirlwinds is not entirely impossible as the local lads have already proven their abilities in cracking down on previously unbeaten teams, especially when it really counts. However, the Whirlwinds know this, and know that they will have to play their best to beat the Antelopes. But, the Antelopes know they know it, and will be trying even harder for a major upset in 2-AA competition.

The Whirlwind team is ramrodded by Rodney Teague, a 6-2, 180 pounder. He is a 3-year letterman and has won almost all the honors available to a South Plains boy (twice all-district, all-regional, all-South Plains, all-Ford, honorable mention all-state, and captain of the team). Charles Christian joins him in giving the backfield class, and Max Campbell provides strength in the line.

This week's 2-AA slate, in addition to the Abernathy-Floydada game, features Olton at Lockney and Muleshoe at Morton.

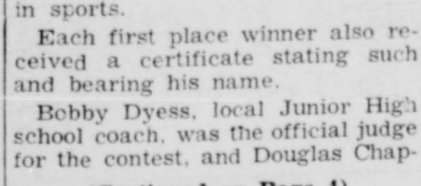
PP&K Contest Winners Listed

**Changes In Area Football Districts
Are Made By Interscholastic League**

Several changes were made in the alignment of Texas schoolboy football conferences during the University Interscholastic League meeting held last week. The League makes various changes every two years due to enrollment changes.

Abernathy was not changed from its present district (2-AA), but was affected by the shifting of various class AA schools from one district to another. Olton, Muleshoe and Morton were changed from district 2-AA to 3-AA, while Canyon and Tulia of 1-AA, were put in 2-AA with Abernathy, Lockney and Floydada. Dimmitt and Friona, formerly in 1-AA, were placed in 3-AA with Morton, Muleshoe and Olton. Denver City, Post and Slaton of 3-AA went to 4-AA along with Spur of 6-AA, and picking up Friendship which moves up from class A to AA. Tahoka was dropped from 3-AA to class A.

New Deal was also affected in the switch-around as the Lions were changed from District 4-B to 3-B. Other teams to be in 3-B are Amherst, Anton, Whiteface and Whitarral, after losing Meador and Popesville to 4-B.

Conference Breakdowns
Conference breakdowns, according to enrollments in the high

schools, are: Six-man and Eight-man, under 100 students; Class B, under 115 students; Class A, 115-200 students; Class AA, 200 to 400 students; Class AAA, 400 to 950 students; and Class AAAA, 950 students and up. Some 85 schools were affected by the recent changes.

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Antelopes Whip Lockney, 18 - 13

Abernathy's rebounding Antelopes captured their second win in District 2-AA here last Friday night when they outplayed the Lockney Longhorns, 18-13. The win was also the Antelopes' second victory of the season, having lost all five non-conference games prior to the start of district play.

Abernathy scored six points in the first, second and fourth quarters, while Lockney managed six points in the second stanza and seven points in the final period. The "Dads" of the local boys enjoyed the game from the sideline where special chairs had been placed for them.

Abernathy's speedy halfback Tom Ritchey spurted four yards around end for one touchdown, passed to end Jack Waters for a six-pointer, and raced 46 yards for another. Halfback Joe Ybarra turned in several fine yard-gainers and fullback George Reagan plugged away at the middle of the line. Quarterback John Kiker not only did a fine job of piloting the Antelopes to victory, but also turned in a fine defensive game. Defensive linebacker Bobby Pettit ably relieved Kiker at various times at the quarterback position. Tackle Larry Florence and linebacker Mac Houston, along with Jim Stillwell, Ray Ingram, Kay Don Habbinga, Billy Jack Hackler, Billy Barrick, Randy Henson, and Waters turned in fine defensive games for the Antelopes. Abernathy reserves played the final 47 seconds of the game with small but courageous quarterback Charles Lusty at the helm.

Not only those boys mentioned above, but all on the squad turned in fine games in a concentrated team effort.

Antelopes Score
Pettit took the opening kickoff and returned it to the 26 yard line from which point the Antelopes cranked up and went the

distance for the first score. A 20 yard pass to Waters and a 29 yard burst by Ritchey to Lockney's 15 yard line aided in the 74 yard drive which was climaxed by Ritchey on a four yard scamper around left end. Ybarra was stopped short of the goal on the try for extra points.

A pass interception set up Lockney's first TD, which came early in the second quarter. Abernathy had kicked off to the Longhorns who kept the ball only four plays before they fumbled and Waters recovered for Abernathy on the Antelope 47 yard line. A five yard penalty against Abernathy aided the Longhorns in holding the Antelopes, forcing them to punt. Waters' punt was partially blocked and bounced out of bounds on Lockney's 46.

Lockney had the ball only six plays before Abernathy took over on downs on their own 37. On the first play from scrimmage Lockney's quarterback Johnny Belt, playing defensive safety, intercepted a Kiker pass on his own 40 and returned it to Abernathy's 44. 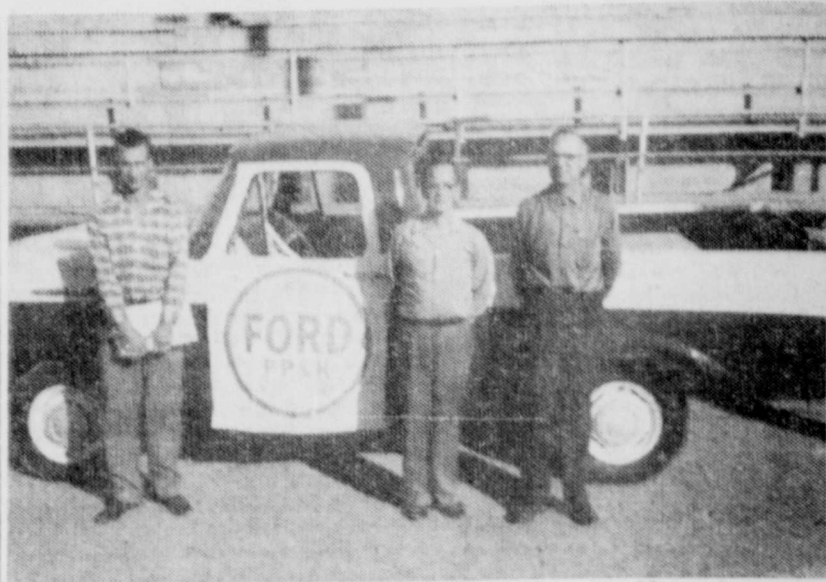

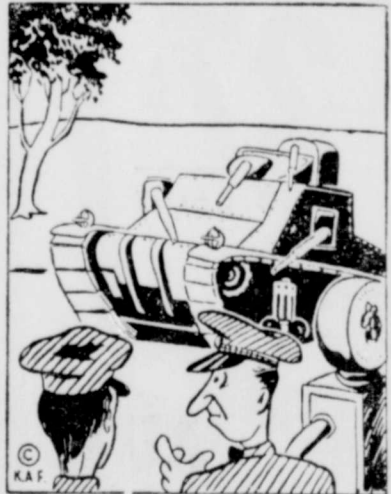

FUNERAL HELD FOR CRENSHAW INFANT

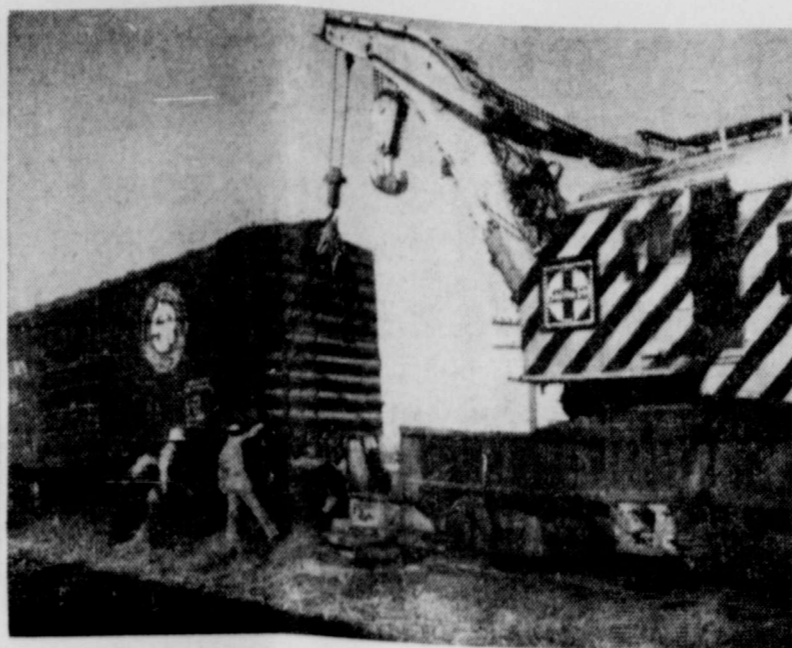

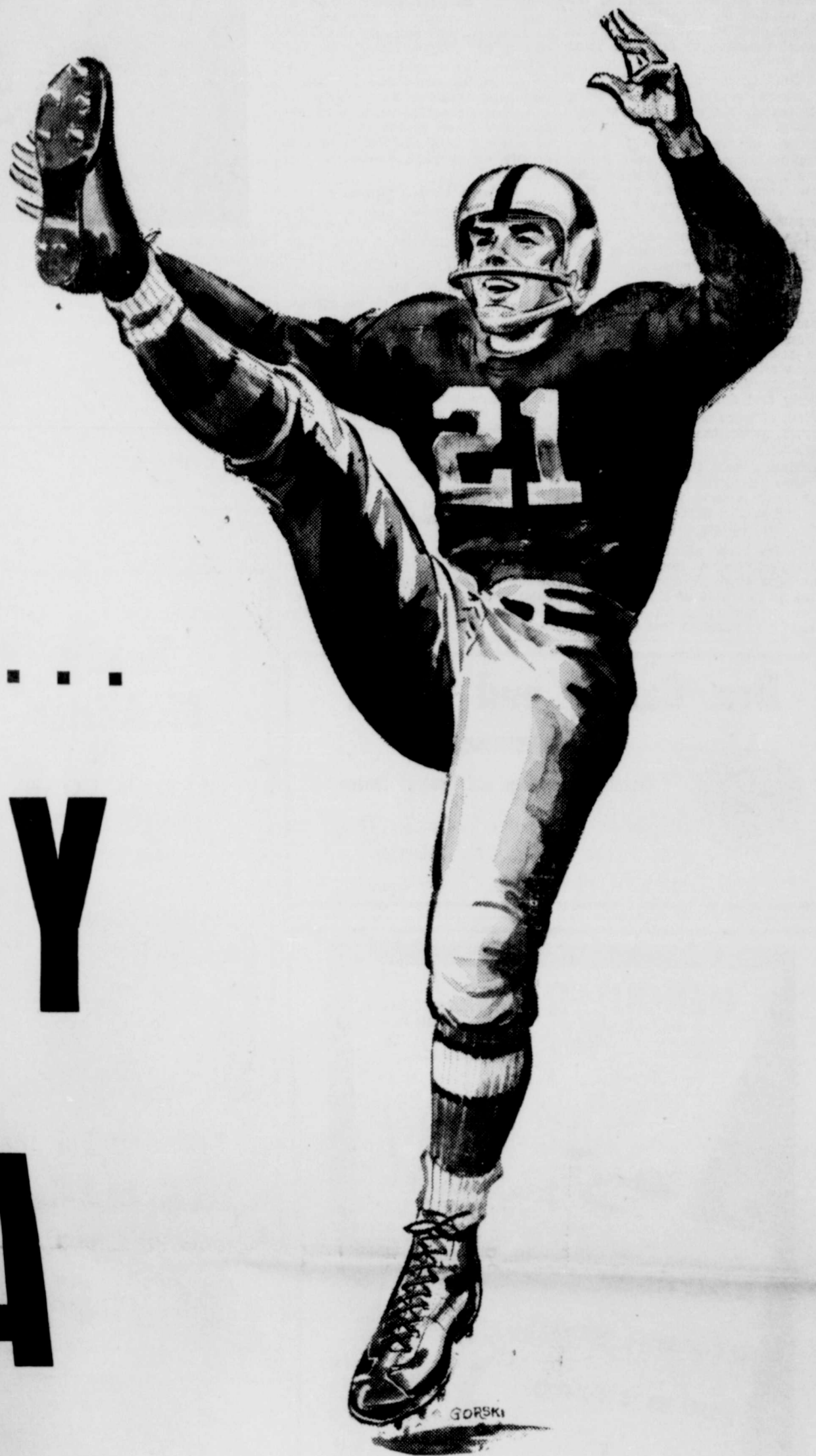

Vernon McDougal Heads Lubbock Co. Farm Bureau

Lubbock County Farm Bureau members named a slate of officers, headed by Vernon McDougal, and adopted 24 resolutions at their annual meeting in Lubbock Tuesday night.

Attending were 50 of the 1,240 members of the group—the largest membership in the group's history.

Other officers named to serve with McDougal, who lives in the New Deal community were Bobbie Henderson, who lives near New Deal, first vice president, Earl Forrester, the Slaton area, second vice president, and J. W. Hairson, who lives north of Lubbock, secretary-treasurer.

Cotton Hike Urged

Of the 24 resolutions, which will formulate policies of the organization during the coming year, one recommended "that the 1962 cotton allotment be increased and to be realistic with reference to supply and demand."

New officers will assume duties Nov. 1, when the new fiscal year begins.

Officials said the annual membership campaign begins Monday, with a goal of 1,300 set for the end of the first day.

Storm Plan Offered

"In the event allotted crops are destroyed on a farm," bureau members said in one resolution, "and as a result of that loss, the farm is underplanted, then one-half of the acreage lost should be

added to the next year's base allotment of such crop."

In taking note of the recent controversy over training of Yugoslavian pilots by the U. S. Air Force, bureau members passed a resolution urging their membership "to support every effort to halt the training of any and all Communist personnel by the U. S. Army, Air Force, Navy and Marines."

"We recommend that any training programs of this nature be canceled immediately due to the fact that these programs give aid to a form of government that is openly an avowed enemy of our country."

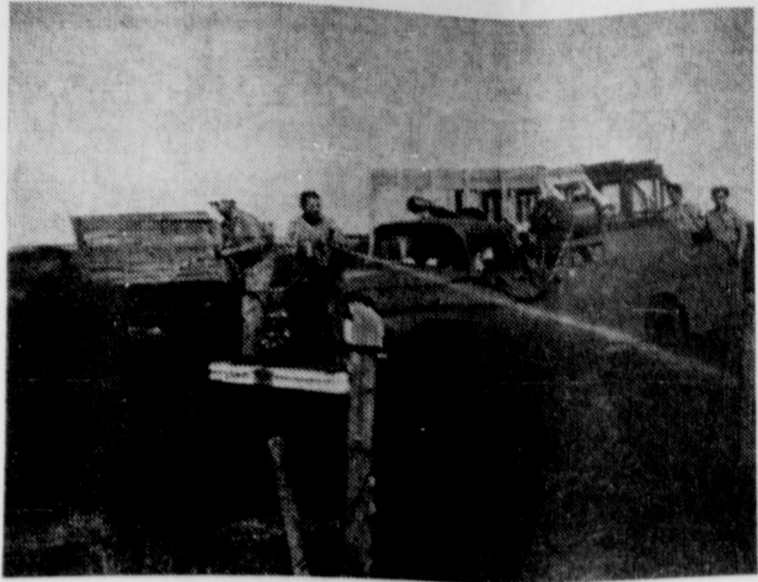
Farm Unions Opposed

Bureau members also said they opposed unionization of farm labor and recommended that "Texas laws should clearly spell out and place the responsibility for the violation of the child labor laws on the parents or recognized guardians of children workers and not on the employers."

Also recommended was exemption of farm trailers from lighting requirements when the vehicles are used for daylight operation and an increase of the permissible load limit to 14,000 pounds.

License fees, the resolution continued, should be set at \$1 per trailer because "most farm trailers operate less than 30 days in any 12-month period."

Lubbock firemen said a cotton trailer and loose cotton were damaged in a blaze near New Deal Tuesday afternoon, Oct. 17.

The trailer belonged to Simmons-Henry Gin Co., a mile south of New Deal, firemen said. Damage estimate was not listed. Heaviest damage was to the trailer, firemen added.

Hale Accident Report Given For September

The Highway Patrol investigated 14 accidents on rural highways in Hale County during the month of September, according to Sgt. D. S. Lawson, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

Those wrecks accounted for 2 persons killed, 7 persons injured and a property damage of \$8,508.

The rural traffic accident summary for Hale County from January through September of 1961 shows a total of 104 crashes. As a result of these crashes, there were 5 persons killed and 52 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$60,147.

"Shorter days and longer nights spell disaster on the streets and highways," Sgt. Lawson said. Next time you turn on your headlights, glance at your watch and see how much earlier you are using lights than you did only a week or two ago. And, as time moves on during the next three months, car-

lights will be needed earlier day by day.

No matter what anyone may tell you as to how good a driver he is after dark, you had better take it with a grain of salt, because no human sees as clearly or as well after dark as he does in the daylight. Some people may see better than others, and some may not be bothered too much by bright lights in traffic; but, if they will be honest with you, they will admit that they do not consistently employ the same driving tactics after dark as they do in the daylight. The veteran Highway Patrol Supervisor added that night driving is different; therefore, it calls for a driving technique very different from that used during the daytime.

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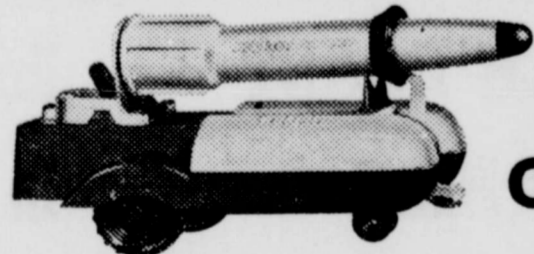

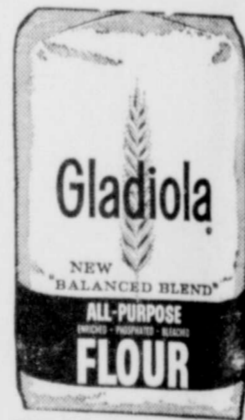

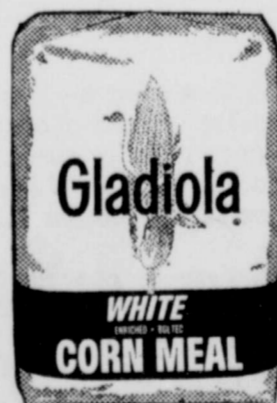
