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



Waterways established to permanent grasses do not require annual seedbed preparation and planting. The grass plant is established and ready to produce when the growing season arriv es and no moisture is lost by cultivation.

Many farmers cooperating with the Soil and Water Conservation Districts have waterways planted to permanent grasses, such as Coastal Bermuda grass, King Ranch bluestem. Caucasian bluestern, sideoats grams and other plants which are summer season plants. Others have planted western wheat grass which is a winter season, perennial grass that provides good ground cover.

These grasses may be graz ed, cut for hay and some may be harvested for seed. Grasses should not be over used or grazed too short leaving a stubble of about six inches or more at all times. Sufficient leaves are needed on the plants to provide food for healthy, productive plants, Cowger said.

Grassed waterways fit well in a eropland grazing program of small grain and summer annuals filling in during spring and fall seasons. Proper fertilization is needed for maximum
