## 4 'Lopes Make All-District

Four of Abernathy's outstanding Antelope football players were named last week to the 1961 2-AA All-District teams. Two of those making the first team, one offensively and one defensively, were second-team choices of the opposite units, respectively.

Antelope quarterback John Kiker, who was named to the All-District team last year as a guard, landed on the second team offensively this season and was a first-team choice as a defensive linebacker. Kiker is a senior this year.

Jack Waters, also a senior, was named to the All-District offensive unit as an end, and made the second team on defense as a half-back.

Other first team choices from Abernathy included four-year letterman Larry Florence, offensive tackle, and senior Ray Ingram as a defensive linebacker. Florence was an All-District choice at tackle last year also.

Joe Ybarra, junior halfback who became one of Abernathy's most consistent ground-gainers late in the season, was the only Antelope to receive honorable mention.

AUSTIN — The State Highway Department has invited contractors to submit bids by 9 a.m. December 12 on a construction project on Farm-to-Market Highways 1315 and 2060 in Hale County.

The job calls for grading, structures, base and surfacing on FM 1315 from the Lamb County line south and east to FM 594 at Cotton Center; and on FM 2060 from US 87 in Abernathy east five miles to the Abernathy Airfield. The project is to be completed in 100 working days under the supervision of H. C. Weaver of Plainview.

**Music Club Meets**

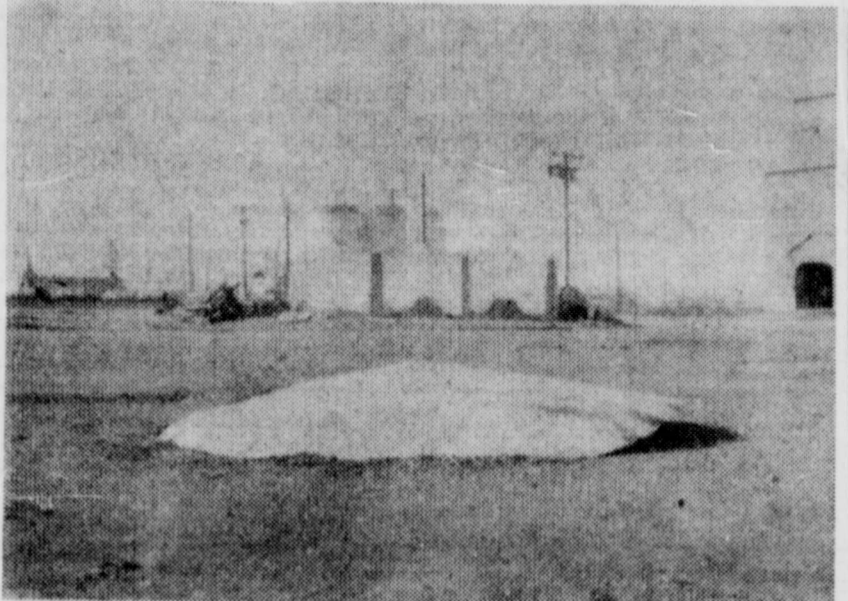

## Fertilizer Tank Blows Its Top

A heavy sound resembling the familiar sonic boom heard Thursday around noon was a very real explosion, not in the sky but on the ground right here in our home town. The Plains Grain Company had engaged two welders to make an opening near the bottom of the liquid fertilizer tanks which are located across the street just south of the old original elevator.

The opening was to be a flanged opening and the flange was being welded to the outside of the tank which the hole would be cut out and further welding done. The tank had no opening that was open and was empty.

Welding was proceeding when one of the men heard a hissing sound and noticed the tank had changed shape slightly and at almost the same time the man actually using the torch noticed the tank rising up off the concrete slab. Knowing something was taking place he dropped his torch and ran.

Both men ran and the top blew off the tank and luckily no one was hurt. The concussion was so great that it shook all buildings in that part of town. It caused a draft of air through the old elevator building that blew out so much dust that some people further north thought the elevator had exploded and was on fire.

The top of the tank was blown off intact and carried about 250 feet southeast where it landed in an open space.

It was not known at this writing whether there was a flammable gas in the tank or the air expanded due to the heat sufficient to blow off the top.

An Abernathy couple was injured Sunday morning in a pickup truck-car crash two miles south of here on U. S. Hwy. 87.

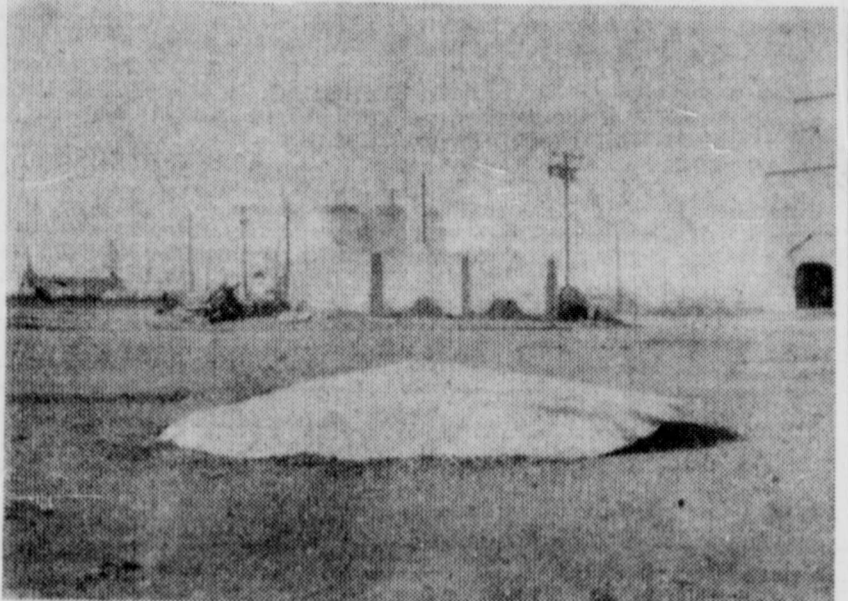

An Abernathy Negro man, Willie Campbell, narrowly escaped death Sunday afternoon when he was pulled into a cotton stripper on the Morris Thomas farm northwest of town.

It was reported that Campbell had run an auger into the harvester to unclog it. The mechanism caught his right arm, pulling it into the operating machinery.

Campbell had to be extracted from the machine with a cutting torch, the operation taking approximately one and one-half hours. Dr. Kenneth Gregory had been called, and he administered anesthetics at the scene.

When the mishap victim had been freed from the machine, he was rushed to Hi-Plains Hospital, Hale Center, by Chambers ambulance. Dr. Gregory accompanied him to the hospital and assisted in the 4 1/2-hour surgical operation which followed.

Campbell sustained severely cut muscles in his right forearm, and suffered a deep laceration on his right wrist.

Campbell, who has 11 children, was reported to be in fair condition early this week.

Formby, Plainview attorney and West Texas radio station owner, has said in January he will make a formal announcement as Democratic candidate for governor of Texas.

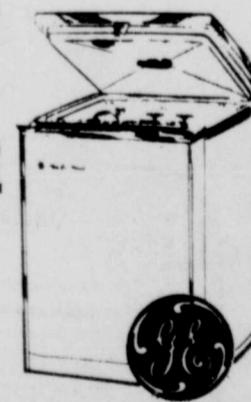

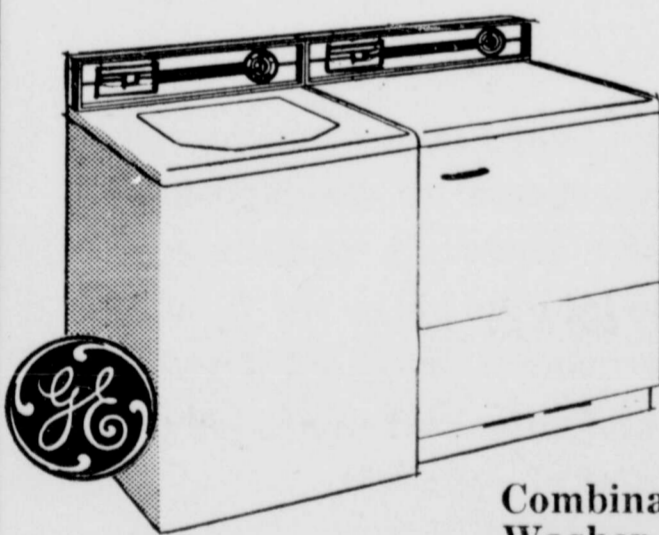

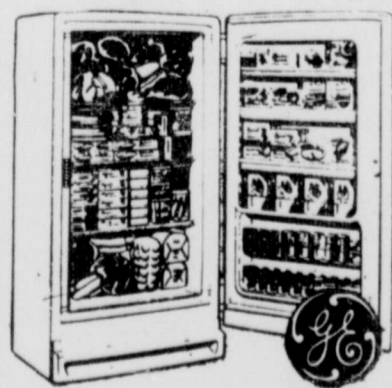

### Texas Rehabilitation Center On Par With Finest Centers Of Its Type In Nation

The results of a recent national survey indicates that Texas ranks nearly last among the 50 states in services provided for the rehabilitation of the severely physically disabled—those persons who have been handicapped following accidents and diseases.

"In spite of this deficiency in over-all services to the physically disabled, Texans can proudly take note of the fact that they have a rehabilitation center which is on a par with the finest centers of its type in the nation," said Arno Struve of Abernathy. This is the Texas Rehabilitation Center of Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation, the largest rehabilitation facility for in-patients in the Southwest.

abilities to regain his place in society and in business.

What does this mean to a person living in Abernathy? It means simply that support of the Texas Rehabilitation Center can be looked upon as a form of "insurance," Struve noted. "Crippling accidents can happen to anyone, especially in today's industrial society. And, though we dislike the thought, the possibility of handicapping diseases—muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis, polio, and others too numerous to mention—is always present.

Physical rehabilitation is a complex, expensive process. Between January 1 and September 30, TRC spent \$8,938.88 providing free services for patients from Hale County alone.

The gap between funds paid by the patient and his insurance company or other agencies and the actual costs of operation of the Center amounts to more than \$25,000 a month—\$300,000 a year. This "gap" explains the huge amounts which are spent for welfare treatments and which must

be made up from contributions from Texans.

A breakdown of total operating funds for a fiscal year shows that 46 percent of the budget came from patient revenues and 54 percent from contributions and other sources. Of the 46 percent made up of patient revenues, about 12 percent came from the National Foundation in payments for polio patient care; 13 percent from insurance companies; 10 percent from state agencies; and 11 percent from private patient pay.

muscular systems. The ages of the patients range from two to 82.

Walter H. Richter, executive director of Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation announced that the people of Abernathy are invited to visit the Texas Rehabilitation Center whenever they can, to see for themselves the work that is being done there. The Center is located between Gonzales and Lubbock off Highway 183, and contributions may be mailed to TRC, Box 58, Gonzales.

Percentages of the total funds received from sources other than patient revenues were: united funds and community chests, 14; clubs and organizations, 6; direct mail and other campaigns, 12; estates and bequests, 6; foundations, 10; memorials, one; and miscellaneous, 5.

No patients are accepted for treatment at TRC without a referral from a physician, and referring doctors receive frequent periodic reports on their patient's progress. Only patients who can be helped by the Center's program are accepted.

Eighty percent of the case load at the Texas Rehabilitation Center is made up of patients who have been physically disabled as the result of accidents, strokes, polio, and cerebral palsy. Others receive treatment for the effects of muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis, arthritis, brain damage, fractured spines and spinal cord injuries, and disabling diseases and conditions of the nerve and
