Durning Is Candidate For Representative

Charlie Durning, Plainview, is a candidate for representative of the 89th Legislative District. The district includes Hale, Swisher, Briscoe and Floyd counties. Durning is a long-time resident of Hale County.

He served the people in the Legislative District which he seeks to represent for 28 years while employed with the State Comptroller.

"I will consider it a privilege and a weighty responsibility if I am chosen to again serve those people," Durning said in making his announcement.

Durning resigned from his post with the comptroller's department in February of last year to take a position with the State Oil Jobbers Association, Inc. His duties with that firm took him all over the state of Texas. He resigned this job to make the race for the Legislature.

This is the first time Durning has sought public office. He has had many years experience meeting the public, listening to their expressions of approval and disapproval and says he still likes "to help people with their problems."

Durning invited close inspection of his character and abilities by anyone considering supporting him for the state office which he said he had been contemplating seeking for a number of years.

"After a quarter century of association with people of all walks of life in the Plains legislative district," Durning said, "I feel positive that I know their problems and needs. If elected, I will do the very best job I can. I'll appreciate everybody's vote and influence."

Durning is 50 years of age. He is married and he and Mrs. Durning are the parents of three children, all of whom were schooled in the area which he seeks to serve as representative.

The AHS girls basketball team won its first conference game here Tuesday night, handing the Olton girls their first district defeat of the season, 57-42. Abernathy's boys continued their winning streak by downing the Mustangs, 74-46.

Betty Johnson, who has been ill since before Christmas, perked up Tuesday night and came through with more points than the opposition's total. Miss Johnson tipped the cords for 46 points. Janie Brown added 6 points, Martha Struve 4 and Donna Webb 1.

The local girls trailed, 12-10, at the end of the first quarter, then took commanding leads of 37-25 at halftime and 46-35 at the end of the third quarter. Gayle Nicholas led Olton with 25 points.

The local boys scored 18, 20, 20 and 19 points, respectively, in each of the four quarters as they drubbed the visitors, 74-46. Three local lads hit in double figures to lead the Antelope attack. Larry Florence snacked up 16 points, Eddie Davis had 15, and Mike Miller led Jimmy Irish and Pat O'Neil scored 6 points each, Robert Pope 5, John Kiker 4, William Smith 4, and Don Hughes 4. The Abernathy girls trailed throughout their contest. They were behind at the quarters, 10-7, 33-15 and 51-23.

Cold Water Pipes Freeze, Rupture In Home Ec Dept.

The cold water supply line in the new homemaking department at Abernathy High School froze and ruptured in three places in the attic last Wednesday night during extremely cold weather. Water flooded the floor of the Homemaking Department and ran out into the corridor of the high school building. The mishap was discovered early Thursday morning by school personnel.

The architects and the general contractor, A. P. Kasch, have surveyed the damage and have restored the facility to operational status. School superintendent Noel Johnson stated that it appears that much less serious damage was done than first expected.

Superintendent Johnson stated that a few of the suspended fiber glass ceiling panels will have to be replaced, but damage to the flooded vinyl asbestos floor appears to be very nominal due to the heavy coat of seal on it.

A little of the water crossed one corner of the living room carpet, but no damage was anticipated as the carpet is made of washable material. An electric fan has been used to blow air across the wet area of the carpet to dry it out.

FORMER ABERNATHIAN DIES JANUARY 2

Rayburn Rufus Darden, 59, of 875 Walker Circle, New Braunfels, died at New Braunfels Hospital January 2. Born at Petersburg, January 18, 1902, he was the son of Henry and Claudis Sanderson Darden. In 1930 he married Mrs. Cecil Collins Thomas in Corpus Christi. Retired from Humble Oil Co., he had lived in New Braunfels two years.

During World War II, he served with the U. S. Navy. Survivors are his widow; two daughters, Mrs. Helen Greer of Arlington, and Mrs. Patricia Mehall of Dallas; a stepdaughter, Mrs. Everett Price of El Cajon, Calif.; two stepsons, Fred Thomas of Round Rock and Bill Thomas of LaMarque; two sisters, Mrs. Raymond Bowers of Calallen and Mrs. Raymond Jones of Abilene; and 16 grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at Zoeller Funeral Home with Mr. James Eubank of the Church of Christ officiating. Interment was in Gaudalupe Valley Memorial Park.

Rufus Rayburn Darden was a son of Henry Darden, an early settler of Abernathy, who was a first cousin of Robert Lutrick. Mrs. Lulu Darden of Abernathy is an aunt of Rayburn Darden. Rayburn's mother, Claudia Sanderson Darden, is a sister of Mrs. Robert Lutrick.

HOME-MADE COTTON HARVESTER IS CONSIDERED A LABOR-SAVER



Harold V. Davis, who farms about four miles northwest of Abernathy, built the unique cotton harvester pictured above. The one-man harvester features a blower that throws the cotton into the above-tractor mounted receptacle. The unit has a capacity of about 1500 pounds, which can be easily dumped into a trailer by means of a hydraulic lift located on the right side of the unit. The harvester pictured above was used to harvest more than 200 bales of cotton this past season. Using a portion of his barn as a shop area, Mr. Davis built three such harvesters with two of them being put into operation this past season. Where normally three men are needed to operate cotton harvesters of other types (one on the tractor and two in the trailer), only one man is needed for the one shown above. Mr. Davis stated that the harvester has attracted a number of people from other towns in the areas of Plainview, Littlefield, Petersburg, and others.

Improvement And Equipment Needs For City Considered

The Water and Sewer Study Committee for the city of Abernathy met at the City Hall Monday night with the following members present: W. L. Kerr, Cliff Howard, Roy Cannon, Lowery Deering, Ted Hill and R. C. Patterson Sr. Also attending the meeting were W. V. Cunningham, mayor, and Paul Noland, city manager.

The first action of the committee was the electing of Ted Hill as Committee Chairman.

The main purpose of the committee's appointment is: "To make a detailed study of all phases of city owned utilities with the objective of determining steps needed to insure utility systems which will adequately serve present and future residents of Abernathy."

During the meeting, committee members took under consideration engineering reports made by the consulting city engineers.

Looking toward the future, the committee has considered several capital improvements and equipment needs for water and sewer utilities covering a six-year period, 1962 to 1968. Some of the capital improvements which they have considered for installation during that period are:

1. Extend the sewage system to the east side of town. This would require a sewage lift station. Estimated cost, \$25,000.

2. Recondition a part of the sewage treatment plant. Estimated cost, \$3,000.

3. Construction of a 200,000-gallon overhead water storage tank. Estimated cost, \$65,000.

4. Construction of a 200,000 to 500,000 gallon water storage tank with pump house. Estimated cost, \$19,000.

5. Acquisition of a new water well site. Estimated cost, from \$1,000 to \$8,000.

6. Installation of a chlorinator for one of the water wells. Estimated cost, \$1,000.

7. The City Council has under consideration water purification plans for this year. The chlorinator mentioned above is for a future water well.

8. Construction of a barn for storing mobile equipment. Estimated cost, \$10,000.

The above capital improvement needs represent a total estimated cost of around \$122,000 for the next six years.

Equipment needs for water and sewer utilities for the same period of time include: a bulldozer, estimated cost, \$9,000; two pickup trucks, estimated total cost, \$4,000; a loader, estimated cost, \$6,000; and a sewer cleaning machine, estimated cost, \$3,000.

The estimated total cost for equipment needs for the six-year period is \$22,500, making a total of roughly \$150,000 needed from now to 1968 to carry out both phases of the program.

Figures presented to the committee Monday night show that revenue from the water, garbage, and sewer systems during the six-year period should be around \$125,000 over and above operating expenses and bond payments. (The figures are estimated according to the present growth of Abernathy, and the estimated water, garbage and sewer revenue for six years, then deducting operating expenses and bond payments, leaving about \$125,000 available for capital improvements and equipment needs.)

The needs in capital improvements and equipment for the next six years total approximately \$155,000. Purpose of these improvements is to uphold good utility systems, provide the people of Abernathy with good water facilities and the protection of life and maintenance of public health.

The amount of money which will be available during the six-year period is a little short of the estimated needs. No firm decisions have yet been made, but the committee members feel that a solution can be worked out whereby all objectives may be accomplished. When the committee has determined all the improvement and equipment needs, it will make recommendations to the City Council.

The committee is to meet again Monday night, January 29, at the city hall. Meeting time is set for 7:30 that evening. The meetings are open to the public.

Members of the committee other than those named above are Harold Fielding, Joe Yeager, Alvin Hardin, Wesley Webb and Billy Shipman.

C. L. Abernethy Seeks Election As County Judge

County Judge C. L. Abernethy has announced that he is a candidate for election to his first full term as Hale County Judge. He is now serving in that capacity by appointment made in August of last year.

A former Mayor of Plainview, Abernethy has been in the real estate and insurance business for many years, having also owned and operated an abstract and title company prior to the time he served as Mayor. He was actively engaged in the real estate and insurance business when he was appointed to fill out the unexpired term as County Judge.

"I want to continue to serve Hale County as Judge, and to carry out various programs which we have recently started," Abernethy said in announcing his candidacy. "I will appreciate the support of all the voters in the Democratic Primary to be held May 5."

Since his appointment last year, Abernethy has been instrumental in completing the formation of the Plainview-Hale County Health Department and has taken the lead in setting up the Hale County Child Welfare Department. "I deeply feel that the health and the welfare of our people—particularly of our children—are two of our most important problems," Abernethy said. "The cases coming before me as Juvenile Judge forcefully impress me with the importance of attempting to improve conditions in these matters," he continued, "and I would like to have the opportunity of being a part in getting these new Departments in full and successful operation."

In addition to holding court in criminal and civil matters and serving as Juvenile Judge, Abernethy as presiding officer of the County Commissioners' Court is chief administrative officer and is responsible for the orderly handling of the general operations of the County.

Abernethy is a native Texan, born in Waco. His education was obtained in Oklahoma, having attended Southwestern Tech College and Oklahoma Baptist University. Coming to Plainview after World War II, during which he served in the Army, he has taken an active part in city affairs. He has served as a Director and as President of the Plainview Chamber of Commerce and Board of City Development, served some years on the Hale County Fair Board, and as an officer and director of various other organizations in Plainview. He has been active in his professional organizations and is a Director of the Texas Real Estate Association.

Abernethy and his wife, who reside at 125 S.E. 10th Street in Plainview, have three daughters. All of the daughters graduated from Plainview High School, two of them later attending Wayland College. He and his wife are members of the First Baptist Church. He is a member of the Plainview Chamber of Commerce, the American Legion, the Rotary Club, and is a Mason and a Shriner.

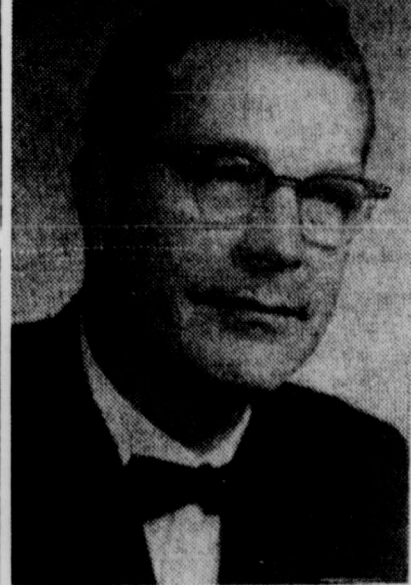

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11 Persons Killed, 94 Are Injured In Traffic Wrecks In Hale County During 1961

At the stroke of twelve midnight December 31, 1961, "Old Father Time" quietly slipped away. But the resounding echoes and visions of his destruction of grinding metal bodies, crashing glass, torn and broken limbs and smashed lives will live long in our memories. His record in Hale County has been an expensive one.

For the entire year of 1961 in this county there were 172 crashes resulting in 11 persons killed, 94 injured and an estimated property damage of \$94,344.00. In comparison of the year 1960 there were 152 crashes resulting in 5 persons killed, 92 injured and an estimated property damage of \$82,980.00.

For the month of December the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 22 rural traffic accidents in this county according to Sergeant D. S. Lawson Highway Patrol Supervisor for this area.

These wrecks accounted for 11 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$7,825.00. The veteran Patrol Supervisor

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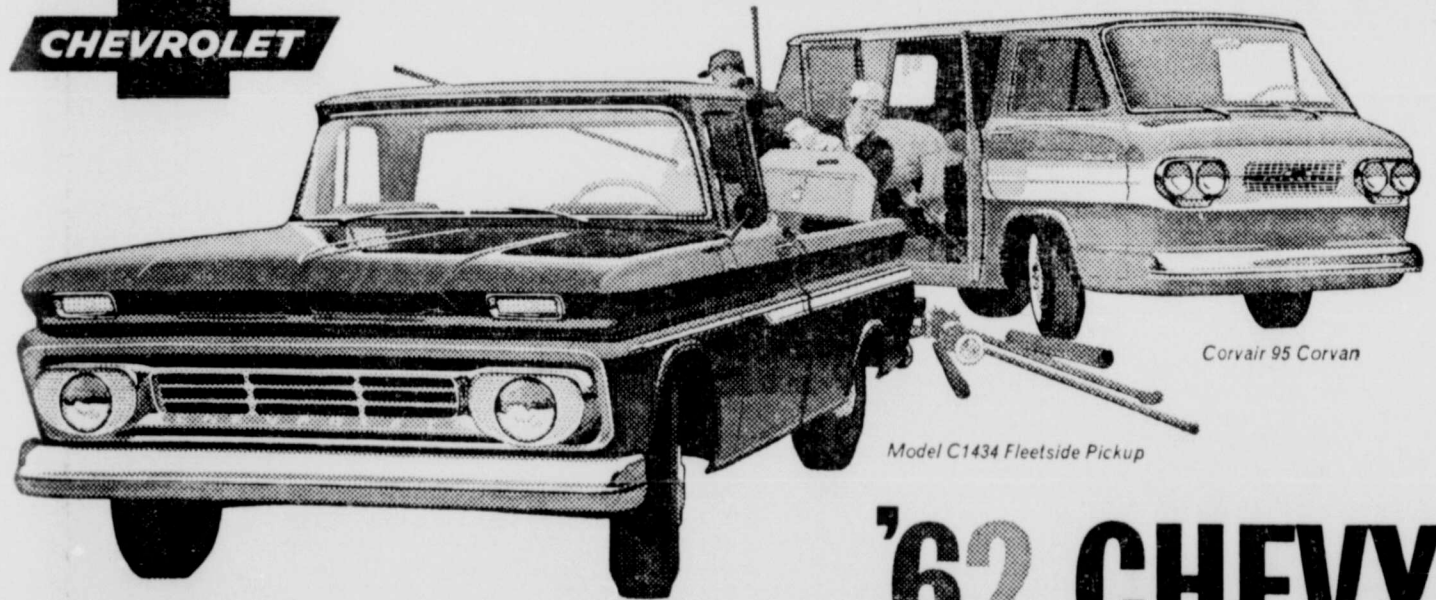

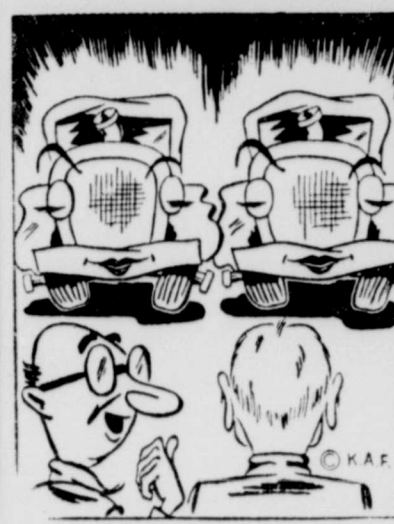

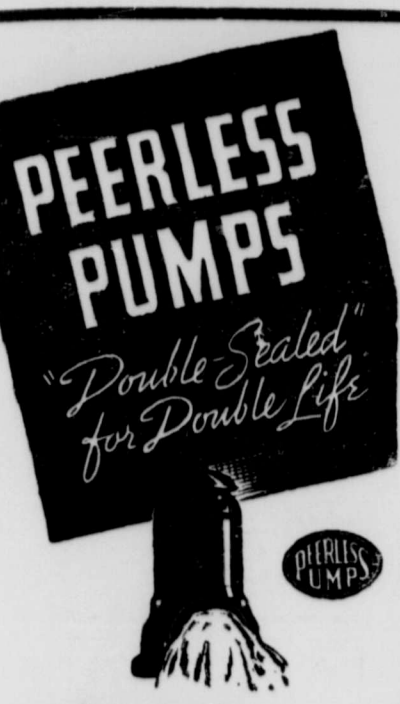

These 700,000 people often change their address between the time they file their return and the time the refund check arrives. Every year Internal Revenue gets back thousands of refund checks. The returned checks are caused by poor writing, wrong addresses, and an occasional mistake on the part of electronic machines. If you have never received your tax refund this past year and you have not been discussing your return as a result of a pre-refund audit of your return, you should write Internal Revenue Service, tell the tax folks when you filed, what kind of form you filed, how much refund you had coming, and any other facts concerning your case. You may get a check.

**Formby Book
Off The Press**

"These Are My People," by Marshall Formby, Plainview attorney and business man, will be released this week by the publishers, The Naylor Company of San Antonio.

The story of Dickens County, Formby's home from five years of age until he grew to manhood, the book is a panoramic history of the land and its conquest. Written in narrative form, the story is plotted around a restless ambitious young man, not wanting to be tied down to a small town.

Woven into the theme, the author tells of the big ranches, the Spurs (Espuelas), the Matadors, and Comanche raids, General MacKenzie's famed Indian campaign. While some of the characters are fictitious, they are based on fact, and many references are made to real people who helped to settle and develop the county.

The writer tells with simplicity and Western charm the compelling story that is typical of the settlement and development of West Texas.

Formby took his BA degree from Texas Tech, his masters from the University of Texas in journalism, and attended Baylor University Law School.

He served as County Judge of Dickens County and for the last year of his term was president of West Texas County Judges and Commissioners Assn. In 1940 he was elected State senator from the old District 30 in the Lubbock area. He served in the Corps of Engineers during World War II, with 20 months in the European Theater. He was a member of the Texas Highway Commission from 1953-59, and for the last two years was chairman of the Commission.

He is a practicing attorney in Plainview, a farmer and co-owner of several radio stations. He has been a reporter, editor and publisher of weekly newspapers.

He is married, and the father of two small children. Mr. Formby said he will formally announce his candidacy for governor in the next few days.

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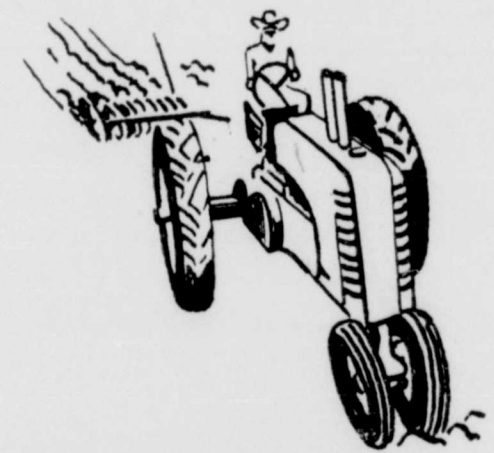
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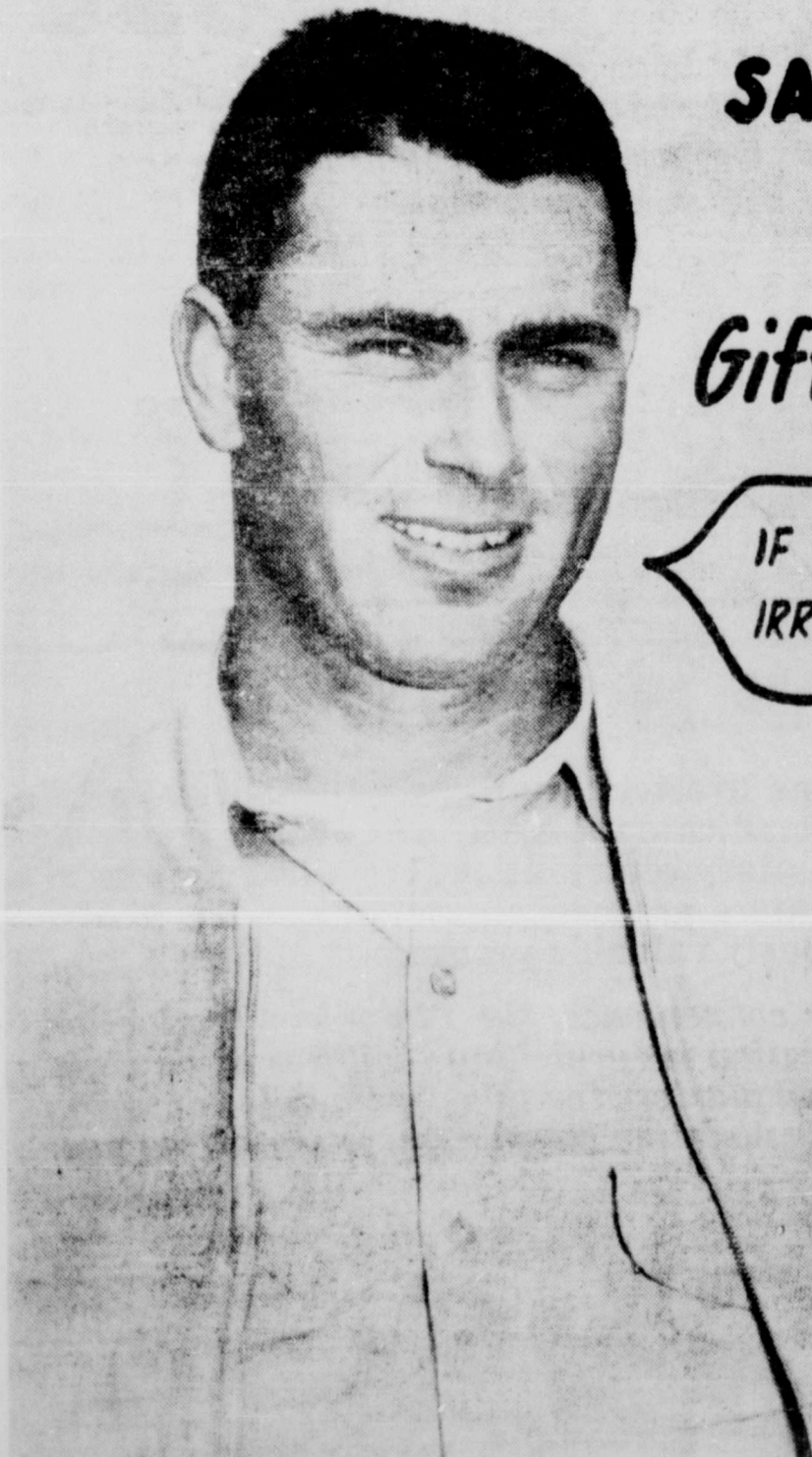
