One Person Killed; Five Injured On Rural Highways In County In June

These crashes resulted in one person killed, five persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$5,530.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1970 shows a toof 49 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 33 persons an all time reco-injured, and an estimated prop-deaths in 1970."

During the first six months of 1970 in Texas, there were 1,482 traffic deaths which was twelve mere as compared to the 1,470 traffic deaths for the same period of 1969. However, if past trends continue, the last six months will far exceed the first six months; as a matter of fact,



Farm Safety Week, July 19-25

Accidents can be prevented! But, most of the 116,000 Ameriicans who were killed and the 10.8 million disabled by accident in 1969 failed to realize this simple fact. Farm people shared in these depressing statistics, too-more than 7,000 lives were lost and 600,000 injured. Accidents cost our nation some \$23.5 billion last year, and losses to farm residents accounted for \$2 billion of this figure. The tragedy is that nearly all of this could have been

Although heart disease, cancer and stroke claim more lives, 2 out of 3 accident victims are under age 45. In terms of productivity and years trimmed from life expectancy, the seriousness of accidents looms much larger than its rank as the fourth leading cause of death in the U.S.

Even though safety information and protective equipment are readily available to farm people, accidents continue to pose a dangerous problem. To reduce this threat to life, limb and financial solvency, each should, and can, do much more to insure his own safety. Here are some thoughts that might help:

Make your homes and farms less hazardous by good planning and housekeeping. Use machinery guards on the job, and wear the personal protective equipment designed to save hands, feet, eyes and head from injury. Conduct your work, play and driving in ways to minimize chance of accident. Then, every week of the year will be SAFETY WEEK on your farm.

> Imagine yourself in the following situation: You are driving along a country road at an easy 60 mph enjoying the scenery when suddenly you spot something ahead, with a bright orange triangle on it. What should you do?

> 'Slow down and be prepared stop' advises William D. to stop" Hanford, an agricultural safety engineer at the National Safety Council.

> 'That orange triangle," says Hanford, "is the Slow-Moving Vehicle emblem now required in many states on the rear of all vehicles traveling on public roads and having a top speed of less than 25 mph. Examples of slow moving vehicles are farm machinery, road maintenance and construction equipment, and animal drawn ve-

Hanford goes on to caution Notice is hereby given that the "25 mph" example is that a hearing will be only a rule of thumb. "The average tractor or combine has a top speed of 15 mph. A heavily loaded vehicle may be doing only 5 or 10 miles per hour, or maybe slowing down or even stopped in preparation for a turn, Obviously, a car traveling a slow vehicle in seconds. If the motorist is sleepy, distracted or cannot identify the situation ahead, he might not react in time to avoid a collision.

This highly visible emblem is a warning to the motorist that the vehicle in front of him is slow moving and that prompt safe driving action is required." The use of the SMV emblem

In passing a farm tractor or combine, it is suggested that you watch for signals which indicate that the operator knows that you are present and wish to pass. Note any sudden move on the part of the operator of the slow moving vehicle to turn into a field, farm drive way or other exit. Before making your move, check traffic both shead and behind. When you are sure the way is clear, properly indicate your intention and move

around the vehicle. Every motorist should know what the SMV emblem means and be able to pass a slow mov-ing vehicle safely." Hanford says. "It is especially important for urban residents traveling in the country to know the hazards and defenses of rural driving as as those associated with city streets and expressways.

OFFICERS ARREST TRIO FOR ILLEGAL NETTING

tion and surveillance paid off for Texas Parks and Wildlife game management officers this menth when a fisherman and his wife were arrested for possession of 346 illegally caught catfish on Lake Texarkana,

The pair used a well-equipped boat and numerous small-mesh barrel nets to make the haul of catfish ranging in size from three inches to three pounds. A total of \$2,400 in fines was assessed against the couple.

Their catch, which would be considered large by most standards, reportedly was rather small for this illicit operation. As a bonus, while searching the lake for additional illegal fishing gear, the GMOs discovered approximately 1,000 feet of undersize trammel net. The owner of this equipment paid a fine of \$400 for his part in the

fishing operation. All the illegal fishing equipment, including the hoop nets, trammel nets and a "Tennessee fishing log" or log size catfish trap were confiscated and de-

Apprehension of the illegal netters followed a long and careful study of suspected illicit fishing operations on Texarkana, Caddo, Tawakoni and several other Northeast Texas lakes by GMOs under the direction of District Supervisor Bill Daniel of Mount Pleasant.

Officers assisting Daniel in the seizure were Allen High-tower and Jesse May of Mount Pleasant, Wayne Chappell of Clarksville, Larry Williford of Daingerfield, Lawton Peacock of DeKalb and Dexter Harris Texarkana.

LCC Retains Accreditation During Change

Texas A&M University will conduct a six-week law enforcemulti-county West Central Texas Council of Governments starting Monday, July 27. Ira E. Scott, chief instructor

for A&M's Police Training Division, said all classes will be held in Breckenridge. He explained the Abilene-

based council is paying for the training program through an action grant approved by the Texas Criminal Justice Council from the state's share of federal Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act funds. Classes will meet four hours

each day with approximately 30 officers enrolled. Law enforcement officers are expected from Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Stephens, Young, Throckmorton, Shackleford, Jones, Haskell, Nolan, Fisher and Stonewall Counties. Chief Scott noted the officers

will receive the required courses to complete minimum requirements for certification under Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Education require-

However, Scott pointed out the men must have one year of law enforcement experience before being fully certified. The law, passed by the 61st Legislature, is effective in mid-September.

Federal funding comes from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration of the U. S. Department of Justice to the state, which has funneled \$13 million through the Criminal Justice Council to local governments.

Texas A&M's Police Training Division is a part of the Texas Engineering Extension Service. The seven-man staff trains officers on-campus and through extension programs throughout the state
