go along and appraise the live-stock and later, or as soon as the trade was arranged, he would pick up the stock and resell it.

Having very little space for storing new or used cars, arrangements were soon made with Bill Wolf to place the older cars on his lot. He could either sell them or junk them. This proved a profitable arrangement for both parties as the automobile factories were very anxious to rid the

country of a surplus of used cars which had built up during the depression.

The Reids proved capable business men and the business prospered, although at times it was almost "gasping for breath" as shown by some of the low years. The bottom was scraped when the low year turned up a total of only six cars sold, new and used. Another year, only fourteen new and used cars were sold. And still another year, only four new and forty-eight used cars were sold.

These were the low years and during the war.

However, when the up-turn in business came, the Reids were right in there pitching and their top year to date is a record of 198 new and used cars sold. In the last eleven years they have sold 3,996 new and used cars. They have sold a total of 6,305 new and used cars, at the approximate time of this writing, since their beginning in 1937.

Beginning with a total force of five to start with, they now have a crew of seventeen here at Abernathy, several of whom have been with the firm 20 years or longer.

Edwin Crow, born in Hedley, came to Abernathy in 1913. He joined the Reids in November 1939, and began washing cars. He is now sales manager for the firm.

Later, Joe Tom Brown and Edward Anderson also started with the firm by washing cars. Brown is now service manager and Anderson is body shop manager.

These men have spent most of their life right here at Abernathy or near by. Andy was born in Olyphant, Penn., moved to Kansas at an early age, and then moved to near Beeton on February 14, 1914. Bob was born at Mt. Hope, Kansas, and of course came to Beeton when the family moved there. Both men went to school at Beeton. Ed Crow, Ed Anderson and Joe Tom Brown all went to school here at Abernathy.

Andy had gone to work for the bank in 1925 and was cashier for many years before actively joining the firm in October, 1938.

On March 1, 1947, Reid Chevrolet moved into its own building at the present location, 711 Avenue D. Also, in 1947 the Chevrolet dealership at Levelland was purchased and in 1949 Bob Reid assumed the managership there and is still successfully running that part of the business.

Reid Chevrolet would like to say a hearty "thank you" to all in this area for 25 years of friendship and pleasant business relationship.

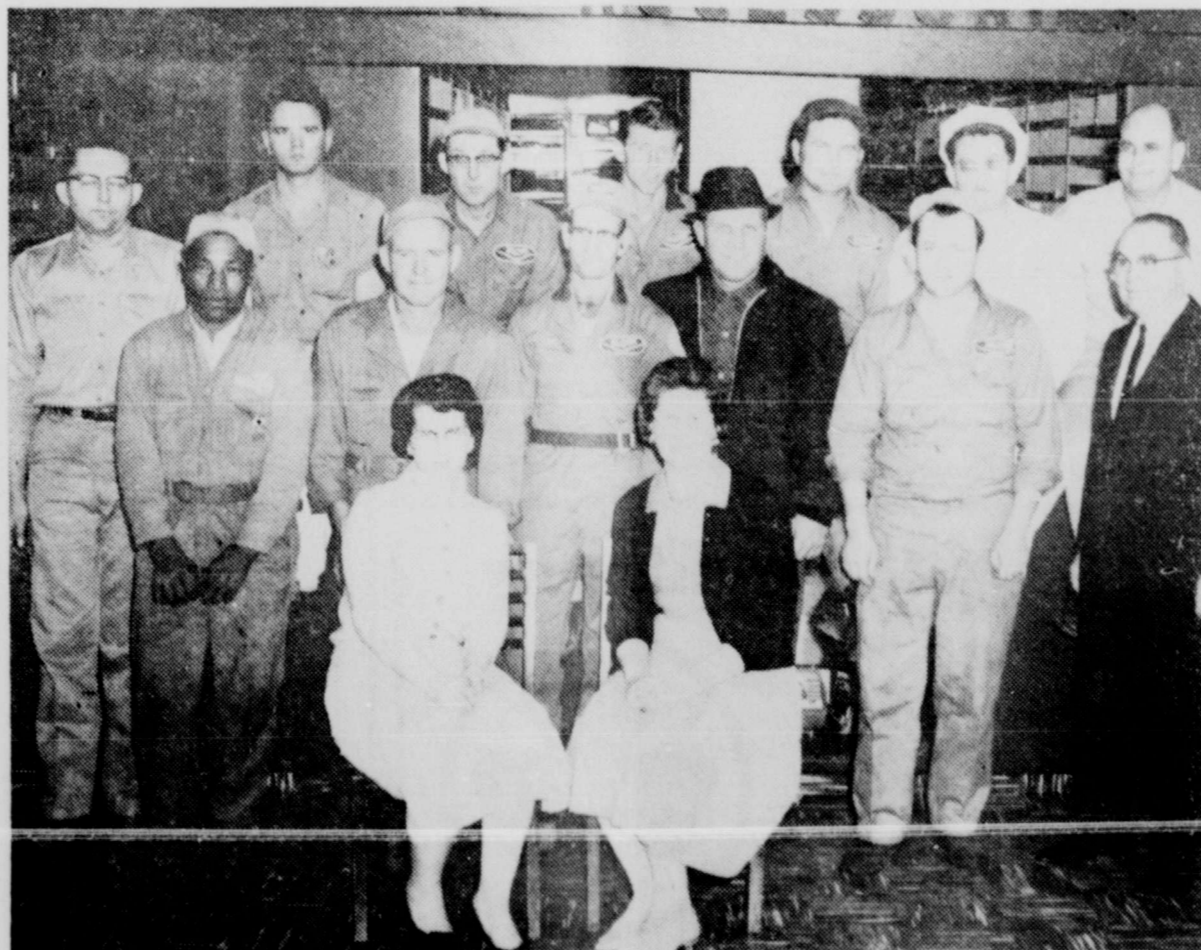
