**... Reagan Top SCD Farmer**

tion. During the past four years as much as three feet of top soil has been gained. Reagan remarked enthusiastically.

There is no erosion on the farm now and Reagan plans to run cattle on the grass later when it is properly re-established. "It will be a wonderful habitat for dove and ducks because of the excellent cover it provides," he said. He has already stocked the place with 160 Blue quail and will stock the lake with fish in the future.

"Because it takes longer to establish grass than most people realize, many become discouraged when they do not get a good stand the first time they try. But, if they put their land in some other crop and fail to achieve what they want, they do not quit planting cotton or wheat or grain, they just try again," the outstanding farmer reasoned.

The sloping land never has been fit for farming, but now it is difficult for any water to run over this ground because "the grass acts as a blotter," he explained. Reagan vows that as long as he is operating the farm it will never have anything but grass on it. Five acres in the southeast corner of the farm have been reserved—planned for a future home of the Reagans.

**Water Supply Limited**  
 Both farms are located in a section of very limited water supply, although in a general area of country that most people consider has an almost inexhaustible supply.

On the 160 acre farm there is one irrigation well and Reagan has applied 153 acres of improved water application, 153 acres of irrigation management and one half mile of 12-inch underground concrete pipeline has been laid, almost completing his irrigation system.

Reagan does everything he can to prevent runoff from rainfall or irrigation water. "It actually hurts me when I see water running off the ground and down the barrow ditches," he says, "because if people would properly care for

their rainfall we would have no depletion of our water."

The Abernathy farmer believes he can use from one third to one half as much water as he has been and come out as well on his yields. He has espoused the theory that he heard so often when a lad and his father was farming the place, "If we get winter moisture we are sure to make a crop." Of course he knows now that was because of the underground seasoning and that is why he gives his crop land one good pre-plant watering. After the plants are up he waters every other middle once or twice, depending on rainfall.

**Man Of Vision**

Reagan is a man of vision and practices what he preaches, both in material and spiritual matters. He applies organic material to the ground to prevent crusting. Residues are left on top of the ground and he makes his equipment as light as possible after chiseling to cut down on compaction of the soil. He is a firm believer in putting all of his cotton burs back on his land.

Although he was making "good money" with registered Suffolk sheep, when they began creating an erosion problem he got rid of them—to him conserving the soil is more important than money.

A conservation cropping system has been applied on 123 acres of land; he has applied 80 acres of cover crops; 123 acres of crop residue use and 82 acres of stubble mulching.

In addition a few years ago Reagan planted a windbreak of Cypress trees around the homestead which now serves as a habitat for robins and blue birds as they migrate.

The Reagan family, which con-

sists of Mrs. Reagan, Mark 9, Frank, 7, and Christy, 5, love life on the farm. They have their own milk cow and chickens and raise their own vegetables.

Reagan is often asked to speak on soil stewardship. Last year he spoke to a District Supervisors Training Meeting in Plainview where his speech was recorded.

The tape recording has already been used many places in Texas and is on the waiting list of many Districts to be used for their meetings.

A lover of good horses, his hobby is training them. When a child he had to ride calves or a draft horse and he vowed if ever he had children they would always have a good horse to ride.

Every time he gets a horse or colt well trained there is always some one who wants to buy them, so he keeps busy at his hobby and the children and their friends have fun too. One of the many ways he finds to share what he has with others is through pleasure he affords children in riding his trained horses. Each year he takes two to the Lubbock Chil-

dren's Home and leaves them until the children there have had plenty of time to get in some good riding.

Reagan has served on the Hale County ASC committee, Farm Home Administration Board and for eight years was a member of the Hale County Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors.

While a member of the SCD board, he helped introduce the organization of the Noxious Weed Control District, the cotton bur program, the beginning of the program in public schools to teach soil and water conservation to students and the Running Water Draw project which is now in progress.

Reagan is untiring in his efforts for the betterment of his community and serves as a deacon of the Abernathy Church of Christ.

He says it is easy to speak on anything he is "sold" on himself and wants to pass on to others. Thus, he seizes every opportunity to preach and teach the principles and importance of the conservation of soil, water — and souls.

**Rural Accidents In County Total Ten In January**

The Highway Patrol investigated 10 rural accidents in Hale County during the month of January according to Sgt. D. S. Lawson, Patrol supervisor of this area. These wrecks accounted for two persons killed, eleven persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$8,235. The Highway Patrol supervisor pointed out that rural motor vehicle traffic accidents in the 29 county North Texas district have declined slightly during January, 1962, as compared with the same month last year. Nine deaths were chalked up last month as compared to ten that were recorded in January, 1961, 147 injuries were reported this January which is higher than the 105 for the same period last year. A total of 217 rural traffic accidents were investigated as compared to 225 for January, 1961. "The slight decrease in the total number of accidents is encouraging to us, but the increase in the number of persons injured points out the need for compliance with the speed regulations by all motorists to reduce severity of these accidents," the Sergeant stated. The Highway Patrol Sergeant reminded motorists that Texas law requires all registered motor vehicles to have valid inspection stickers displayed by midnight April 15 and the best way to avoid the long lines expected in the last minute rush is to have your vehicle inspected now.

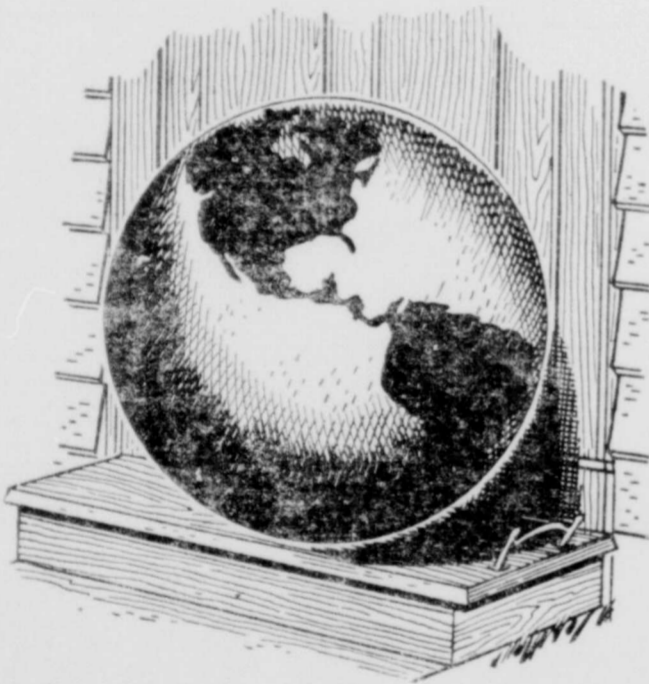

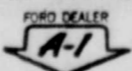

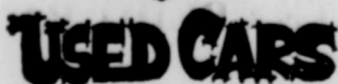
