

Juliette Low established the first troop of 12 girls on March 12, 1912. in Savannah, Georgia. She brought from England the principles of Scouting as set forth by Baden - Powell, founder of the Scouting movement, and adapted them to the needs of girls in the United States.

Since 1912, almost 181/2 million girls, women and men have beonged to the Girl Scouts. They carry on their program in every state of the Union, in its possessions and in 49 other countries where American families live. The program itself has expanded and changed to keep pace with our changing times. The basic purpose of Girl Scouting, however, remained the same, "To Inspire Girls with the Highest Ideals of Character, Conduct, Patriotism. and Service that they may become

#### VA To Boost Direct Home Loan Outlets

The Veterans Administration an nounced that \$75 million will be distributed to field offices on July 2 for the purpose of making direct nome loans. Approximately \$25 million will be obtained from principal repayments received from orrowers who have direct loans and the balance will come from Treasury borrowings under current authorization

VA officials estimate that it will be possible in May to notify field offices of their respective allotments. At that time VA Regional Offices will be authorized to furnish direct loan applications to veterans on their waiting lists in advance of the distribution on July 2.

The VA decision to make \$75 million available to field offices in July was made after a continuing review of direct loan activity since October 1961. The VA said that additional allocations would be made during Fiscal Year 1963 but that the amount and timing would be determined at a later

direct loans for a total of \$244.9 million. These loans were made to veterans residing in rural areas and in small cities and towns where GI financing by private lender historically has not been generally available

During 1961 the VA made 23,488

As of January 31, 1962 the VA had made 202,794 direct loans totaling \$1.7 billion. The direct loan program started in 1950. Direct loan borowers have proved themselves to be good credit risks. Since the program began in 1950 farm.

proper management. The first step toward a good stand is preparing a good seedbed. It should be clean, firm and moist and free of other growing grasses. 'rew says farmers are expecting o much of Coastal Bermuda hen they expect it to take over om established grasses.

Next is planting at the proper me. It is usually best to plant the spring, after the soil warms South Texans, however, can ant in the fall.

A satisfactory stand cannot b spected unless fresh, viabl rigs are used, the specialist pints out. Sprigs should be planed the same day they are dug and they should contain at least three nodes. It is important to keep sprigs shaded and moist until they are planted. Tests have shown that exposing sprigs to unlight for four hours

riability by as much as 97 percent. Recommended planting rate is to 15 bushels of sprigs per firmed around the sprigs after planting, says Trew. This can be lone with the tractor wheel or large compress wheels.

Before fertilizing, the farmer should have his soil tested. #### Germination Test Advised For Cotton Planting Seed

There is one sure way to know ? whether cotton planting seed will germinate when planted. Fred C. Elliott, extension cotton specialist, says it is through the use of ger-

mination tests. In recent visits with ginners and farmers, Elliott reports that many are finding the seed which was saved to plant this year's crop isn't measuring up to expectations. And, points out Elliott, getting a good stand on the first planting may have a lot to do with yields
