Several local FFA and 4-H Club boys entered animals in the 29th annual South Plains Junior Fat Stock Show at Lubbock this week.

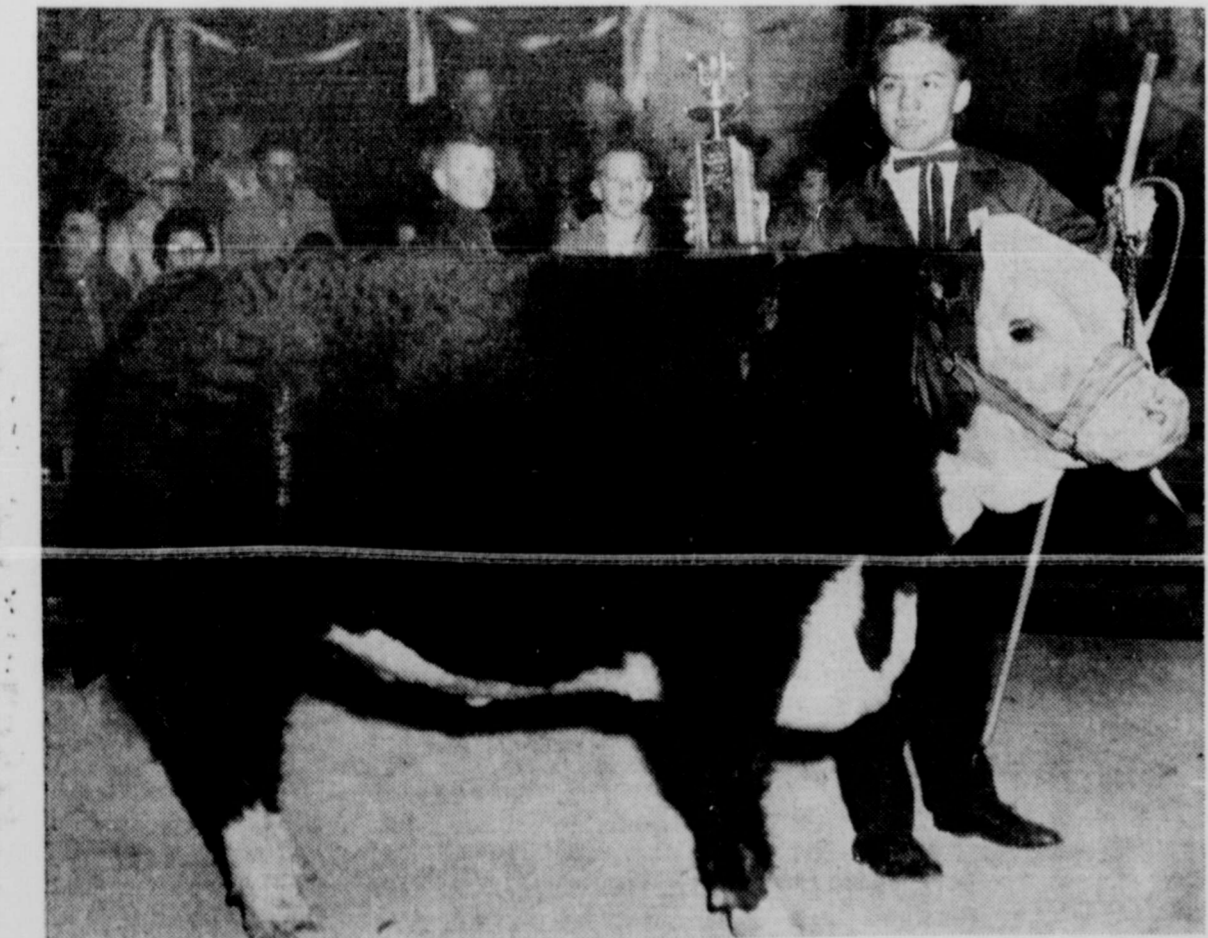

The animals were among 882 barrows which were not sifted from the original entry of 1387.

### Young Farmer Field Day At Tech Saturday

All young farmers of the area, whether members of the local Young Farmer Chapter or not, are invited to attend the second annual Young Farmer Field Day at Texas Technological College Saturday.

Jerry Adams, Abernathy vocational agriculture instructor and advisor for the local Young Farmer Chapter, stated that all farmers from this area wishing to attend are invited to meet at the High School agriculture building at 8 o'clock that morning, and leave from that point as a group. It was stated that a free lunch is planned for all attending.

**Program**  
The morning program will include the following:

Registration and coffee; general session in the auditorium of the Texas Tech agriculture building; welcome; introduction of Young Farmer groups; introduction of special guests; drawing for door prizes; report of the Arizona and California Feeders Tour; and three tour groups, (1) Lubbock Experiment Station and Soil Fertility Laboratory, (2) swine at the Sherman Nelson farm, and (3) beef cattle and artificial beef marbling.

After lunch visitors will view a display of automatic feeding equipment in the pavilion; there will be another general session; another drawing for door prizes; a session on home farm shops; a program on screwworm control; and three more tour groups, (1) Lubbock Experiment Station and Soil Testing Laboratory, (2) fiber testing and spinning laboratory, and (3) beef cattle feeding and artificial beef marbling.

His talk was very humorous and entertaining, as well as informative.

He told of the schools in Germany, how the students are graded and how they have to make their grades or get "kicked out" of school. They are required to take many more subjects and do not have co-educational schools.

He said that he expected to find horses, cowboys and Indians in Texas, in fact he was warned that he might get shot the first week he was here. However, he likes Texas very much and wants to come back some day, he said.

## Farmers And Grain Dealers Invited To Amarillo Session

Farmers and grain dealers throughout the High Plains area will have an opportunity to hear legislation currently before Congress, analyzed by national leaders, Monday, March 26. The information and education session is being jointly announced and sponsored by the Texas Association of Wheat Growers and the Grain Sorghum Producers Association. The meeting will be at the Herring Hotel, Amarillo, beginning at 9:00 a.m. through 12 noon.

Dr. John A. Schmittler, Economic Analyst on Secretary Freeman's Staff, Washington, D. C. will evaluate and discuss the "Food and Agriculture Act of 1962" which is generally referred to as the Administration's bill, calling for continued price supports, acreage adjustment and gradual stock reduction together with reduced Treasury outlay.

The "Cropland Retirement Act of 1962" which is commonly referred to as the "Soil Bank Act," calling for diversion of whole farms from production and a rental payment for voluntary participation will be analyzed by a nationally known speaker now being selected.

The "Projected Economic Outlook and Needs for Effective Farm Policy" will be discussed by the head of the Department of Agriculture Economics at Texas Technological College, Dr. J. Wayland Bennett.

The presidents of the two sponsoring organizations, Mr. Frank Moore of Plainview and Mr. Kenneth Kendrick of Stratford, stress that there will be ample time for discussion of comments and questions from the floor. They urge that anyone seeking further information about current farm programs take full advantage of the opportunity to receive first-hand information from these nationally known experts who will be at the meeting.

Directors of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association will hold their regular annual meeting and election of an Executive Committee at 1:30 p.m. also on Monday, March 26, at the Herring Hotel, Amarillo.

He is a 1957 graduate of Abernathy High School and was employed by DeKalb Agriculture Association, Inc., in Lubbock before entering the Army.

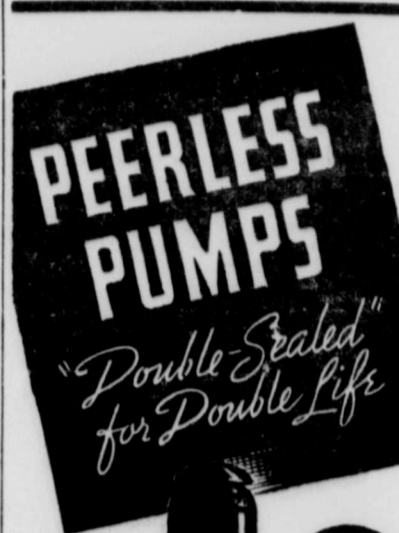

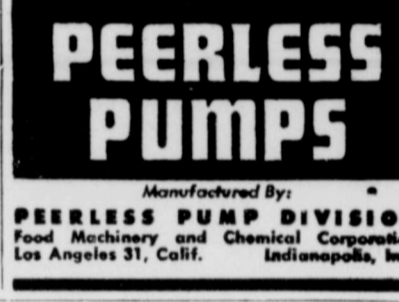

The event is a cooperative project between the Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. and the Experiment in International Living, an organization whose principles and objectives are similar to our own. The opportunity was made possible by the Juliette Low World Friendship Fund. However, the Experiment Organization also assumes a portion of the leaders' expenses. Martha will accompany 12 Senior Girl Scouts to Germany and will serve as their leader. One Senior Scout was selected from each of the twelve Regions.
