partment's Statistical Services, indicated that although the number of motorcides increased, the death rate—the number of deaths per 100,000,000 miles traveled — decreased from 4.9 to 4.8, the lowest rate on record in Texas. In 1961, Texans traveled 47.9 billion miles, or 3.42 percent more miles than they did in 1960.
