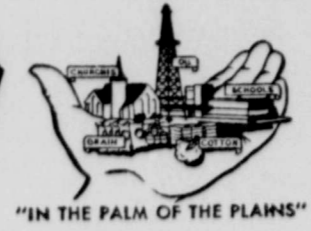

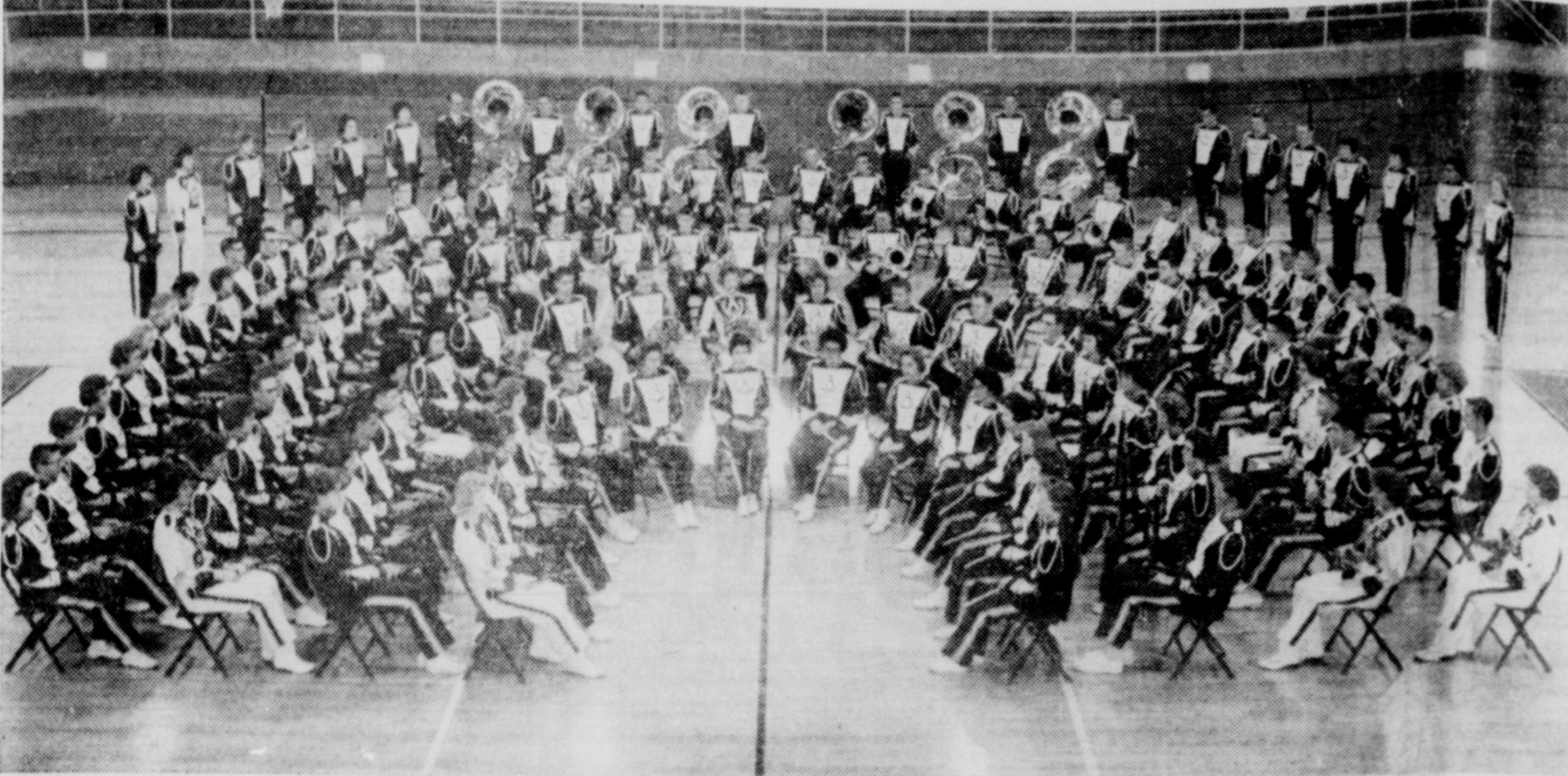

## Report Of Study Committee On Water, Sewer Utilities Accepted By City Council

At the March 5, 1962 Abernathy City Council meeting, the City Council accepted the final report of the Study Committee on Water and Sewer Utilities as presented by Chairman Ted Hill. The report itemized the recommendations of the committee on water and sewer capital improvements for the city utility systems to be spread over the next six years.

Serving with Ted Hill on the committee were: W. L. Kerr, R. C. Patterson, Sr., Cliff Howard, L. G. Doering, Wesley Webb and Roy Cannon.

In the presentation of the recommendations it was pointed out that all items of recommendation were to be carried out on a pay as you go basis and that no taxes or utility rates be increased or bond issues be called for in order to put into effect any of the recommendations unless the City Council deems it of an immediate emergency nature. According to figures presented to the committee by City Manager Paul Noland from the City Office on projected city growth and reve-

nue a pay as you go plan should work out satisfactorily. Ted noted that no one can accurately predict the future with direct certainty, and for this reason the committee attempted to keep the recommendations general in nature so that they may be used solely as guidelines. They may be revised as deemed necessary of the officials in office at the particular time.

Ted then explained the procedure of the committee in arriving at the recommendations. He said the purpose and objectives of the committee were established at the first meeting. At the first and second meetings, financial information, utility needs and

## SETTLE, MYATT, WARD ELECTED TO CITY COUNCIL

Abernathy voters Tuesday elected three new aldermen to serve on the city council. They are W. T. Settle, A. B. Myatt and Dan Ward. A total of 313 votes were cast in the election. This number may be a record vote in a city election here. The 1961 election had 308 votes, and 225 votes were cast in the 1960 election.

Seven names were on the ballot. The votes were divided as follows:

Settle, 167; Myatt 152; Ward, 150; J. A. Bruce, 148; Ed Graham, 147; Pete Thompson, 123; Carl Barton, 50.

Ward is a former alderman and a former mayor.

3. Construct a 500,000 gallon storage water reservoir (ground type) with pump house at 12th Street well. Estimated cost, \$56,000.

4. Construct barn for mobile equipment at 6th Street pump house. Estimated cost, \$9,900.

5. Purchase of two standard type pickups in fiscal year, 1962-63. Estimated cost, \$4,500.

6. Purchase sites for water wells as needed. No cost estimated.

7. Further chlorinate city water supply as needed.

8. Purchase front end loader. Estimated cost, \$6,000. This item was given minimum priority and should be purchased only if surplus cash arises.

Estimated cost of all improvements, \$103,500.

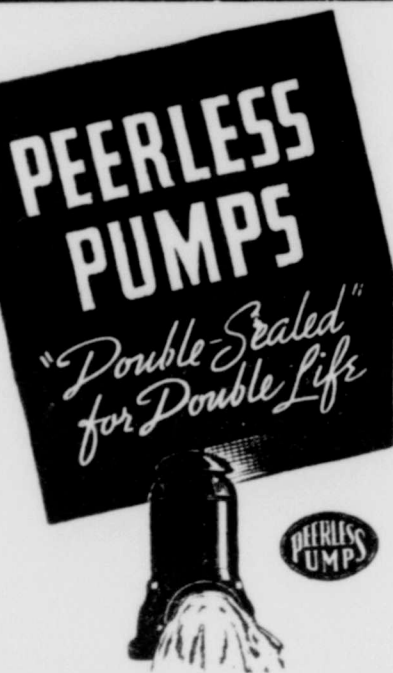

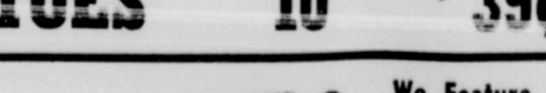

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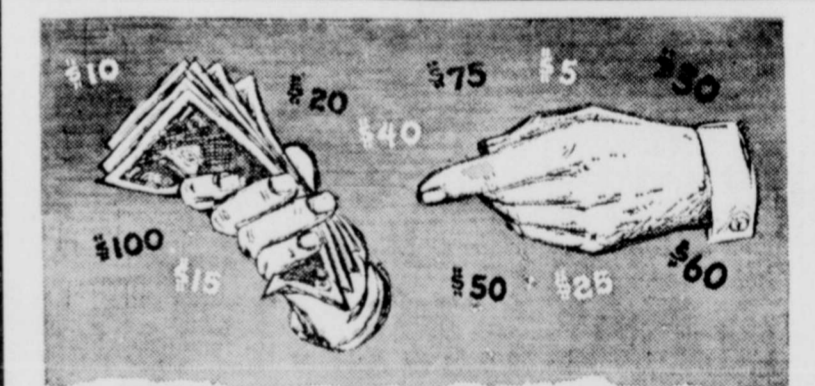

commanding officer of a Lubbock Naval Reserve Company. Mr. Parsley represented the Abernathy Lubbock County voters a few years ago and successfully arranged for the return to Abernathy of a voting box. Prior to his efforts on behalf of the local voters, ballots had to be cast at a box away from the area where most voters lived.

He has also been active in other affairs having served as Vice-Chairman of the Community Planning Council of Lubbock and a Director of the Lubbock United Fund. Currently, he is active in the Lubbock Optimist Club, Texas Tech Ex-Students Association, Lubbock County Bar Association, State Bar of Texas and the American Bar Association. Parsley was, prior to his engaging in the general practice of law, an Assistant County Attorney for Lubbock County, and while in Law School, served as a Legislative Assistant for the 54th Legislature in Austin.

Parsley stated that he announced his candidacy on the basis of his past experience in law and government, his training and background in farming and business interests, and his desire to continue to be of service to the people of Lubbock County. Parsley said "during my campaign, I will stress the urgent need for a return to individual and local responsibility in all areas of government. On specific issues, I believe, of course, that there is a need to simplify the present sales tax and to remove existing inequities in the automobile insurance laws.

"But," he added, "our primary concern should be this. We have not and are not achieving the economic growth in this area that we should. Our taxes seem to grow faster than our salaries and business profits. Reasons behind this may be traced to the existence on the books of old fashioned, out of date and inconsistent tax

laws that smother potential growth. I would like to do all I can to help correct these out of date laws and by representing all of the people of Lubbock County, program a long range, realistic set of laws that will encourage business expansion, development of agricultural products, and will attract new industry and thus produce more jobs and more per family income.

Parsley stated that his platform consisted of five points: 1.) Sound economic growth instead of taxes upon taxes; 2.) Encouragement of state and local soil and water conservation measures; 3.) Simplification of the sales tax; 4.) Removal of inequities in the automobile insurance laws; 5.) Strengthening and protecting our educational institutions.

**Filing Dates Extended For Feed Sign-Up**

The sign-up period for the 1962 feed grain program has been extended through April 15, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service officials announced Saturday.

Friday originally had been the deadline to file an intention to participate in the 1962 program at county ASCS offices.

Floods and severe weather over parts of the nation, however, have prevented many farmers from getting to ASCS offices to sign agreements, officials said.

As a result, they said, blanket extension was granted across the nation.

At least 20 percent of the feed grain base acreage must be diverted to conservation uses for producers to qualify for price supports on the 1962 corn and grain sorghum crops.

Producers who do not comply with the program cannot qualify for 1962 corn and grain sorghum price supports.

Payments are made on diverted acreage to complying producers.

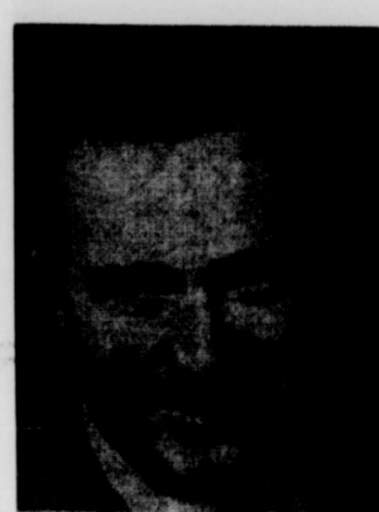

## April 8-14 Proclaimed Weed Control Week In Hale County

The week of April 8 through the 14 of 1962 has been proclaimed Weed Control Week in Hale County. The week will be emphasized by the Fifth Annual Hale County Weed Control Conference on April 11 at the National Guard Armory in Plainview beginning at 9:30 a.m. Program chairman for the meeting will be E. O. Snelling, chairman of the board of directors of the Hale County Noxious Weed Control District.

The conference will present some of the nation's outstanding weed control specialists. Principal speakers will be Dr. B. E. Day, Plant Physiologist from the University of California and Dr. A. F. Wiese, Agronomist from the experiment station at Bushland. Dr. Day is recognized as a foremost authority in the field of research with such hormone type chemicals as 2,4-D and its hazards to crop plants. Dr. Wiese will discuss new chemicals for weed control in

cotton and grain sorghum. Some of the chemicals he will discuss are to be marketed in the near future and show promise of permitting crop production without hand labor for weed control being involved. These two subjects alone should be of sufficient interest to warrant the attendance of every farmer in the area.

Other items on the program will include the annual Progress Report of the Hale County Noxious Weed Control District; a 4-H Club Weed Control Demonstration; and the election of three board of director's members to the Weed Control District. Also five Hale County farmers will be presented with awards as outstanding Weed Control Farmers of the Year. The program will be terminated at noon by a free lunch to be served through the courtesy of the agricultural chemical dealers in Hale County. The public is invited.

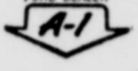

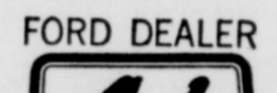
