To attract more new residents, we first should make the town more attractive. Clean it up, fix it up and paint it up! And, keep it clean, keep it in good repair and painted throughout the GOAL '70 campaign (and, thereafter,

Also, to make the town grow, every 2,491-plus citizens we now have should be an enthusiastic ABERNATHY BOOSTER at every opportunity. When you knock Abernathy you knock the place you live.
