## Regional Track, Tennis Results

Abernathy tracksters and tennis players failed to place high enough to advance to the state meet, to be held in Austin May 4-5, when they were outclassed in regional competition at Lubbock last weekend.

Coch Waydelle Hill's three regional-qualified track men brought home two fifth places, but only the first and second place winners are eligible for the state meet.

Coch Sheryll Oswald's six tennis stars made a good showing, with the boys' double team advancing to the finals before being defeated.

Larry Florence, AHS senior, placed third in the shot put in the preliminaries Friday with a 49-2 1/2 heave, but placed only fifth in the finals Saturday with a one-fourth inch shorter toss.

John Kiker, also a senior student at AHS, placed fifth in the 880-yard run, and Pat O'Neil, local junior student, failed to place in the broad jump event.

In the tennis preliminaries Friday, both AHS singles entrants, Mike Miller and Donna Webb, and the boys' doubles team, Eddie Davis and Danny West, were victorious in the quarter-final round and advanced to the semi-finals.

Abner's girls' tennis team composed of Sherry Wilson and Martha Struve, was defeated by the Granbury team in quarter-finals Friday, 6-4, 8-10, 6-1.

In semi-finals rounds, Miss Webb was defeated by Betty Dejan, Granbury, 6-0, 6-3, and Miller was defeated by Charles Bower of Crane, 6-2, 6-1.

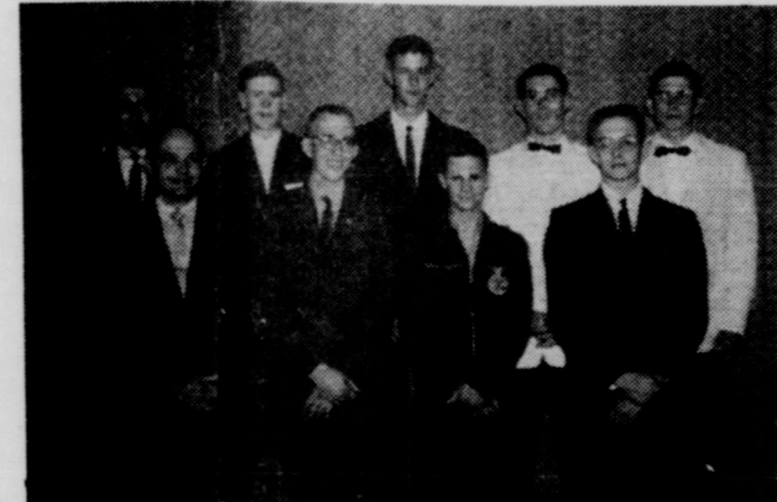

## Local Teacher "Increment Pay" Set At \$216.00

The Abernathy Independent School District board of trustees, at the April 9 board meeting, set the amount of "increment salary" on a local basis at \$216.00 per teacher per year.

In order to qualify for the \$216.00, a teacher must have at least six hours of college credit within the five-year period prior to September 1, 1962, stated Superintendent Noel Johnson. The plan was set up and approved by the board early this year.

Superintendent Johnson stated that the increment salary would not necessitate a tax raise.

## TALK - In Print

GOAL - '70

Abernathy should establish a set of Goals to reach by 1970. Setting these Goals for 1970 for themselves should be the following:

Churches, school system, City of Abernathy, Lions Club, American Legion, lodges, Rebekkahs, Eastern Star, cemetery association, women's clubs, Young Farmers, Abernathy Riding Club, Abernathy Recreation Center, business places and home owners.

The U. S. Census the past 20 years indicates a rate growth for Abernathy of 80 persons per year increase in population. We had 2,491 in 1960. At the old rate of growth, add 800 to make a population of 3,291 in 1970.

The first goal in the GOAL - '70 campaign should be to increase this rate of growth to 100 per year plus nine. This would make a growth for 1960-1970 of 1,000 plus nine, to give us an even 3,500 population count in the 1970 Census.

To attract more new residents, we first should make the town more attractive. Clean it up, fix it up and paint it up! And, keep it clean, keep it in good repair and painted throughout the GOAL - '70 campaign (and, thereafter, too).

Also, to make the town grow, every 2,491-plus citizens we now have should be an enthusiastic ABERNATHY BOOSTER at every opportunity. When you knock Abernathy you knock the place you live. Every knock kills a town a little, and every boost helps a little to build it up. You hold it within your power to knock or boost... kill or build! Be a builder, not a killer, in the GOAL - '70 campaign.

Completion of U. S. Highway 87 as a 4-laner from Abernathy to Lubbock, and Loop 289 around Lubbock should come before 1970. This aid to traffic could be an inducement for more people who work in Lubbock to make their homes in Abernathy. This potential field of population growth could be reached by a consistent, well-planned advertising campaign in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal. Local builders, addition developers and real estate men could use the A-J's real estate classified section to tell the suburban-minded Lubbockites about the available home sites in Abernathy, and about Abernathy's good churches and schools.

DEATH CARS—four people in the two cars pictured above were killed, two instantly, when the vehicles collided on FM 54 Sunday night. The accident happened at 7:15 p.m. about 2 1/2 miles west of Petersburg. Driver, and only occupant, of the car on the left was Atreil Benard Young, 35, who was instantly killed by the head-on impact. Formerly of Ralls, he had lived at Snyder and in the Olton area since leaving there three months ago.

Killed instantly in the car at right was Paul Canales Segura, 24, of Kress, driver. Two other occupants of that car were dead on arrival at a Plainview hospital. They were Segura's 2-year-old son, Paul Canales, Jr., and his nephew

Zenon Segura, Jr., 2.

Critically injured was the victim's wife, Juanita, 24, and a daughter, Elvia, 4, and Mrs. Zenon Segura, Sr., 25, whose husband, 25, sustained serious injuries.

Chambers ambulance carried some of the dead and injured to Plainview.

The crash occurred about five feet north of the highway center stripe. The Segura car was being driven west and the Young car was traveling east when the vehicles hit head-on at an estimated speed of about 60 miles per hour. ones left in the Original Town section.

The Virgil Phillips Addition on the north is filling, but many good sites remain. Should a building boom hit, he could start Virgil Phillips Addition East, on that side of U. S. 87 Highway.

Another addition, with a good many acres available, would be the Ray Pinson Addition Northwest.

With the fine home construction in that part of town, W. T. Settle has a potential gold mine in his farm for a W. T. Settle Addition South.

Church, GOAL — '70 Churches are ahead of the rest

of the community in the "goal" department. They always work toward pre-set goals. What their roles could be in the GOAL — '70 campaign would be up to the individual churches.

School, GOAL — '70

Like the newspaper business, schools face a never-ending challenge in the area of improvement. School administrators strive to make a system to please a majority of the patrons it serves. They have the ability to, and are willing to, make improvements that a majority of the patrons want.

Plant-wise, no town of this size has better school facilities. The school administration wisely planned for the future in the last building program. We have space available for four more classrooms when they are needed. Looking still further into the

future, Superintendent Noel Johnson says there may be a day when we will need building sites in other parts of town, especially for elementary school construction.

Present plant facilities should serve population growth for the next several years.

We have the plant and the personnel to make Abernathy schools one of the best systems in the state. The school's progress in the GOAL — '70 campaign will depend upon the attitude and cooperation of patrons.

Patrons need to support and boost the curricular work of the schools with the same enthusiasm that they now lavish upon sports activities.

I am not "anti-sports." I recognize all of the basic values of a good sports program in our schools. No reflection on coaches or student participants is intended or implied. Most student sports participants earn honor roll ratings every six weeks.

Abernathy schools' GOAL — '70 work should be aimed at graduating outstanding students, who can make a smooth transition to college life. Have them so well prepared for college work that fewer AHS grads will drop out of college after one or two semesters.

Facts in a Review story last week were a source of embarrassment to this community. Abernathy placed 6th (number last) in the senior high division of the District 2-AA U.L.L. Literary Meet at Floydada. First place Floydada High made 141 points and last place Abernathy High had six points. These six points were earned by our typing team, which placed second in that event.

Bright side of that story was the first place taken by Abernathy Junior High students in that meet. Abernathy Elementary School students also did well in the meet.

Citing the schools' accomplishments in other fields, the bands are fine examples. The Review has given good coverage in this area.

The Review would like to have more news and pictures from two very important departments in AHS, the FFA and FFA Chapters.

The spotlight of publicity has focused on the FFA in the Project Shows. Patrons liberally support this activity. The AHS vocational agriculture department is gaining other recognition, thanks to the

newly-organized Abernathy Young Farmer Chapter. A tip of the hat to the Young Farmers for their efforts to draw attention to this valuable department of our schools. GOAL — '70 objective for the high school should be a manual arts department. It is as important as the home ec and vocational ag departments. Training received in a manual arts department might help some students work their way through college.

Another worthwhile GOAL — '70 project would be required courses in etiquette and social graces, starting in elementary school with the teaching of good manners. Courses could be upgraded through junior high and senior high.

Again, no reflection is intended. Most parents teach their children good manners, and a majority of the students are well mannered. This would supplement home training in a formal sort of way, using modern, authoritative books and other teaching aids.

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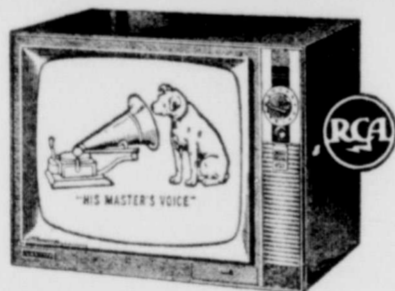

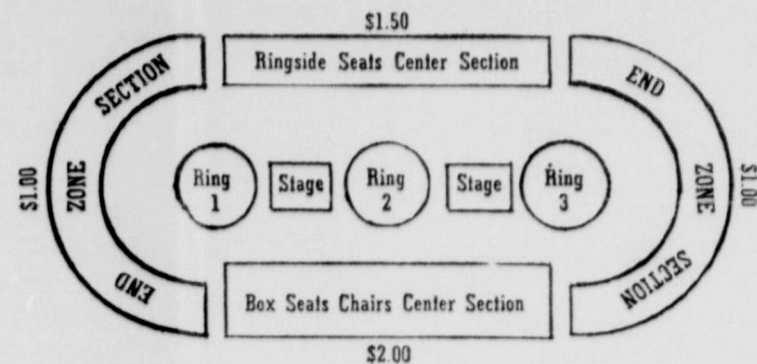

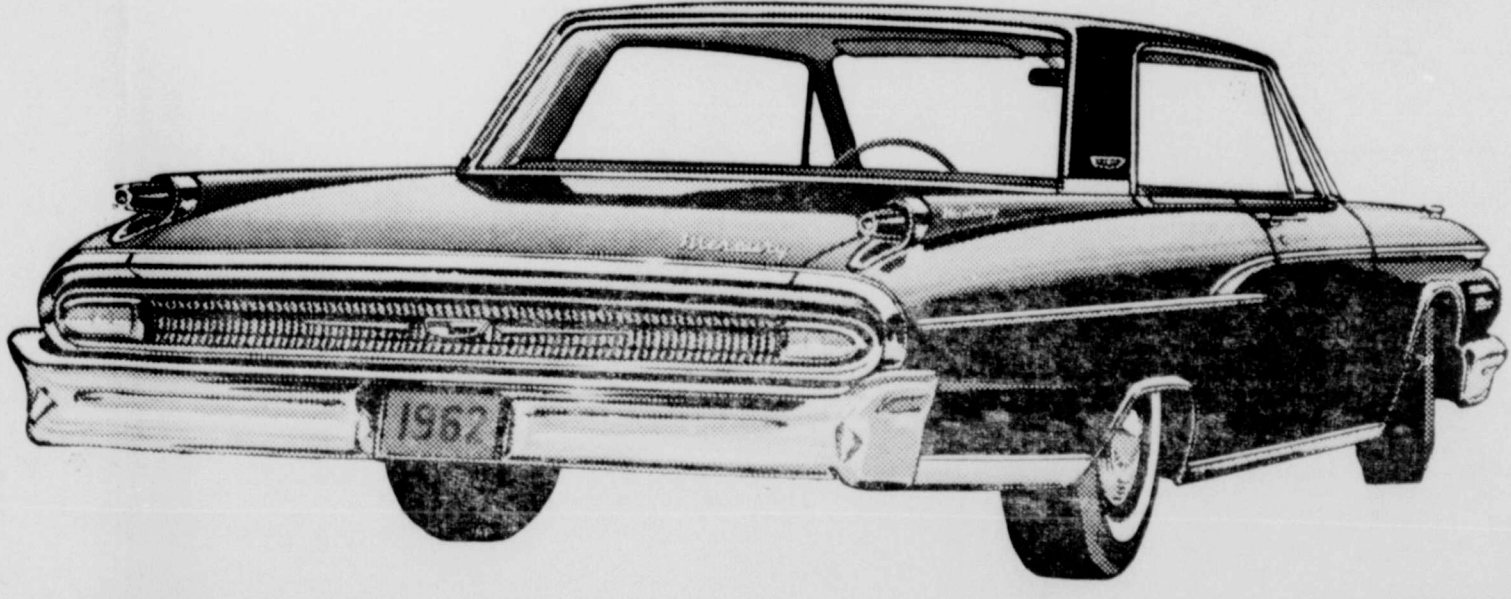
