

Social security has taken over much of the load once carried by aid to families with dependent children and by old-

age assistance, The number of children getting monthly social security survivors benefits increased from 18,000 in June 1940 to 2.6 million in 1970. In 1940, almost half of the children receiving welfare payments were orphans. Today, the large majority are not orphans, but children in needy families.

Since 1950, the percentage of the older population getting oldage assistance has been cut by more than half, dropping from

22 per cent to about 10 percent. "But," he pointed out, 'Social security does much more than reduce the need for public assistance.
