Two New Deal Lads To Compete In State Track Meet

Two New Deal High School track men will represent the Class B district event from Region I at the State Track Meet in Austin this weekend.
The two lads are Jimmy Barrington, junior student, and Randy Peoples, freshman. Barrington and Peoples won first and second place, respectively, in the regional meet at Lubbock recently. The two track stars had gained a berth in the regional contest by capturing the first two places in the district meet earlier.
Jimmy, 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Barrington, set a new district record in the 100-yard dash with a time of 17.6. His regional throw was shorter, but he had no trouble winning the event with a 139-1/2 toss.
Randy, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. V. L. Peoples, placed second in regional competition with a heave of 133-1/2.
Both lads participated in the Red Raider Relays at Texas Tech last Saturday, but failed to place. They are coached by Bob Willis, head coach at New Deal, who will accompany them to the State Meet.

Texas will go to the polls Saturday to vote in the first Democratic Primary. Also, the Republicans will hold primary elections in many precincts over the state. Only Republican primary polling place in this area will be at Lakeview, in the home of O. A. Tooker.

A number of offices will have candidates in the second primary next month to nominate the party candidate in the November general election.
Hale County polling places for the Democratic Primary will be in Abernathy City Hall and at Lakeview Methodist Church, where the polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.
The Lubbock County Demo voting place in Abernathy will be at Joe Thompson Implement Co. (the John Deere House).
Demo polls in New Deal will be in the New Deal Clubhouse and in the New Deal School building.
Democratic Conventions will be held in the various precincts Saturday afternoon. One order of business will be the naming of delegates to the county Democratic Conventions.
The name of J. D. Webb, owner of an advertising specialty company in Abernathy, appears on the Hale County ballot as a candidate for Democratic chairman of Precinct 9. G. M. (Pappy) Carr, who has held that position for a number of years, is not seeking re-election. No candidate is listed for Lakeview Precinct II chairman.

Don Hancock Makes Statement In Bid For State Senate

Don Hancock, Denver City attorney and former county judge, has announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for state senator, 28th District (including Lubbock County).
Hancock makes the following statement in announcing his candidacy:
I am a graduate from Lubbock High School and Texas Tech where I was selected to Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities. I was a member of Kamas Social Fraternity (now Phi Gamma Delta), Alpha Chi, an honor society selected from students with grades in the top 10 percent of their class, and the Saddle Tramps. I was a student assistant in the government department and was a cheerleader. I received a Bachelor's Degree in Government from Tech.
I attended the Southern Methodist School of Law on a regional scholarship and received a law degree from the school. While there, I was elected to the Student Bar Association.
I am a member of the Texas, New Mexico and American Bar Association, the Denver City and Plains Lions Clubs, the Chambers of Commerce and Jaycees in both towns.
Serving as City Attorney of both Plains and Denver City before my election as County Judge, I have since been associated with Claude C. Freeman, Jr., in the law firm Hancock and Freeman.
As secretary-treasurer of Central Communications, Inc., I have been active in the community antenna television field for several South Plains towns, including Denver City and Seminole.
I am married to the former Miss Sharon Rutherford of Levelland and we have three children, Kim, Scott and Steve.
As a product of Lubbock Schools, Texas Tech (government major) and SMU Law School, living and working as County Judge and Attorney.

AHS Livestock Judging Team Qualifies For State Meet

The FFA livestock judging team of Abernathy High School, accompanied by vocational agriculture instructor and FFA advisor Jerry Adams, will compete in the State Judging Contest at Texas A&M College, College Station, Saturday, May 5. The local team, composed of James Waters, Kenneth Reedy and Charles Wisdom, won the right to participate in the State Meet by capturing eighth place in the Area I Contest at Texas Tech last Saturday. The top 10 teams in the Area contest are eligible to compete in the State Meet.
High Individual
James Waters, AHS junior student, was high individual in Area I, and was second high individual (being beaten by only two points) out of 378 competitors representing 126 teams in the entire Texas Tech contest, Area I, in the Texas Tech event, is made up of 97 eligible schools.
Placing high in the event is nothing new for young Waters, having done extremely well throughout the year in various judging events. James was third high individual in swine judging in the Texa contest; first high individual in sheep judging in the contest at Pampa, and was third high individual in the entire contest at West Texas State College, Canyon, out of 156 boys.
In addition to being first high individual in Area I and second high in the entire Tech contest Saturday, James was fifth high individual in grading feeder and slaughter cattle, scoring 94 points out of a possible 100.
At the State Meet Saturday, the local judging team will have a tough assignment. The lads will be competing for honors by judging the following classes of livestock:
One class of breeding beef cattle; one class of fat steers; one class of breeding sheep; one class of market hogs; one class of market hogs; one class of market hogs; one class of breeding swine (gilts or boars); to be placed on basis of type and production; one class of feeder calves weighing 250 to 450 pounds (10 calves to be graded individually according to U.S.D.A. Grades); and one class of 10 slaughter steers weighing 750 to 1000 pounds, also to be graded individually according to U.S.D.A. Grades.

Two other Abernathy judging teams were entered in the Texas Tech event, but failed to place among the top 10 teams in Area I. The team members were:

Abernathy, which features the largest number of Derby contestants of any town in the world, now has 42 representatives entered in the 1962 version of the "greatest amateur racing event in the world." The South Plains race is slated for July 16, in Lubbock.
Still more entries from here are expected. Last year Abernathy had 43 representatives in the Lubbock race. Abernathy has been called "the South Plains' hottest Soap Box Derby town."
Andy Reid, owner of Reid Chevrolet, announced that the annual barbecue supper at his home for Soap Box Derby entrants will be held Thursday night (tonight), beginning at 7 o'clock. The Reids have sponsored a barbecue for the youngsters for the past "10 or 11 years."
Soap Box Derby officials from Lubbock will be present to talk to the youngsters, and a film or slide pictures will be shown, Crow stated.
The preliminary inspection at Abernathy probably will be held around July 5 or 6, Crow said.


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

It looks as if Abernathy is on its way to another record year in water usage, city manager Paul Noland reported. Last week 4,035,000 gallons of water were pumped by city wells. "At this rate we are well on our way toward our monthly record of 16,683,000 gallons pumped in the same month last year," Noland stated.

On the average, residents of Abernathy use 123 gallons of water per day per person—this is 33 gallons below the national average. Noland continued, "water is one of the things we take for granted. In truth, the unending flow of pure, safe water is possible only because of farsighted planning, sound engineering and constant vigilance on the part of responsible citizens and officials."

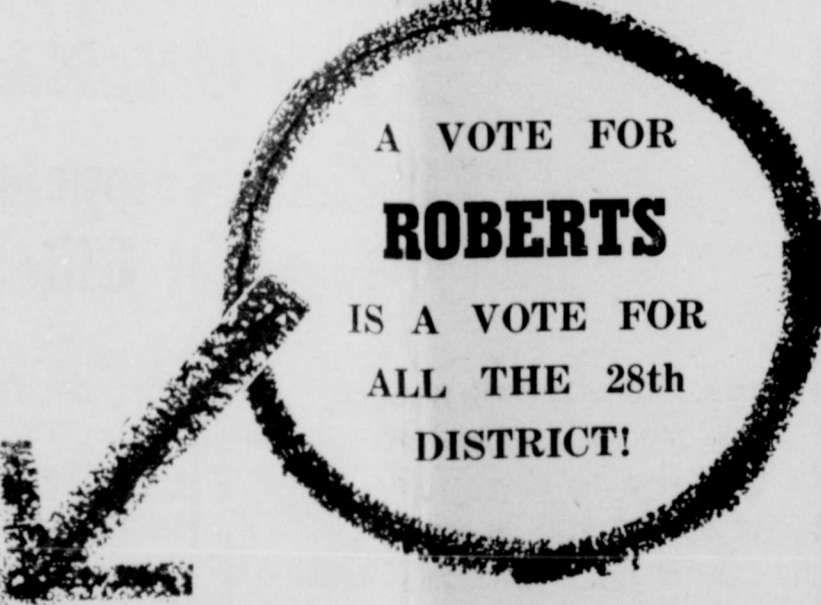

WHEAT QUOTAS AFFECT MORE GROWERS IN 1962

The 15-acre market quota exemption does not apply to the 1962 wheat crop, E. J. Pope, Jr., Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, reminded farmers, recently.

"This is a change from marketing quota programs for previous wheat crops," the chairman declared, "and we want all growers—especially those with small wheat acreages—to understand fully how the program differs for this year. Since the quota exemption has been lowered for 1962-crop wheat, the quotas will effect more growers this year."

Under previous programs, farms which produced no more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest were not subject to wheat marketing quotas, Mr. Pope explained. Under the 1962 wheat program, farms subject to marketing quotas are those on which the acreage of wheat exceeds the smaller of (a) 13.5 acres, or (b) the highest acreage the farm had for harvest in the 3-year period, 1959, 1960 and 1961. Wheat farmers may therefore avoid marketing quota penalties on their 1962-crop wheat by complying with (1) their farm wheat allotment, or (2) their wheat quota exemption (if this is larger).

For 1962, the penalty will be 65 percent of parity as of May 1, 1962; previously, it was 45 percent. And the amount of wheat subject to penalty will be twice the farm's normal yield on all of the acres in excess of the wheat allotment (or the wheat quota exemption if the farm has no wheat allotment). This amount may be reduced if the proved 1962 actual yield is less and a request is filed by a stipulated deadline.

Chairman Pope also reminded farmers that price support on 1961-crop wheat will be available only to those growers who have filed applications to participate in and who then actually comply with provisions of the wheat stabilization program. Diversion payments are also available to wheat growers who participate in the 1962 wheat program.

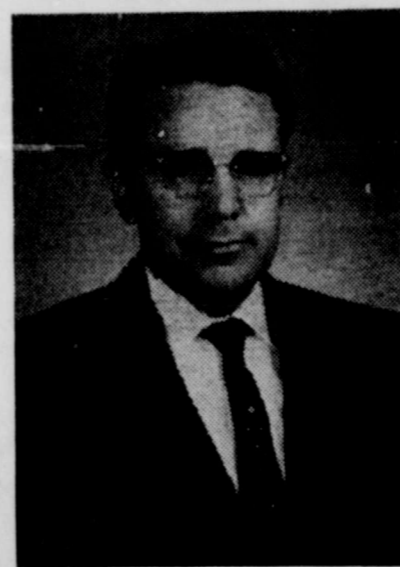

Tornado Season Arrives; Safety Information Given

It's tornado time again in West Texas—and time again to learn review precautions, safety rules and information to avoid public excitement and panic.

City warning equipment is now being checked to be sure it is in operation. Anytime there are storm or tornadic weather conditions reported by the Lubbock Weather Bureau for our area, the state, county and city police departments are alerted.

Efforts of the three departments are concentrated in case of approaching tornadoes and all mobile radio units are put into operation for tracking speed and direction of travel of the tornado.

The fire siren used in cases of extreme emergency will sound long blasts in case of a tornado approaching the city of Abernathy. Short blasts are used to warn citizens to take immediate cover.

An important thing to remember is to not telephone civil defense, police or weather bureau during time of alert, but get in-

formation from newspapers, radio and television.

Emergency plans for every school, church, clinic, business houses and industry should be made and each citizen should enroll for Red Cross first aid and nursing courses.

Tornadoes can occur any place at any time of the year, however they happen most frequently in the midwestern, southern and central states from March through September.

Tornado "weather" can be hot, sticky days with southerly winds and a threatening, ominous sky. Familiar thunderstorm clouds are present. An hour or two before a tornado, topsy-turvy clouds appear sometimes bulging down instead of up. Clouds often have a greenish-black color. Rain, frequently hail, precede the tornado with a heavy downpour after it has passed.

Tornadoes occur mostly between 3 and 7 p.m., but they are occurred at all hours. In most cases they approach from a westerly direction, usually from the southwest. Its path is on the average 16 miles long and is about 400 yards wide. Tornadoes usually travel about 25 to 40 miles per hour with wind speed estimated as high as 500 miles per hour within the tornado.

Safety rules published by the Defense Division include:

When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave, or underground excavation which should have an air outlet. Underground excavations are the only universal protection against tornadoes.

In the open country a person should move at right angle to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at 25 to 40 miles per hour. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

If in a city or town, seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building and stay away from windows. In homes the corner of the basement toward the tornado offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the side of the house away from the tornado may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.

If in schools in city areas, stay inside, if building is of strongly reinforced construction. Stay away from windows and remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums with large, poorly-supported roofs.

It is of prime importance to keep calm, people have been killed by running into the street and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively few places in a warned area are directly affected.

Also important to remember is to keep tuned to your radio or television station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tie up lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.

Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

Thirty-two varieties and hybrids of forage sorghum were tested under irrigation at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1961. There was no significant difference in the yield of the top four varieties. The yields of these four were Honey Sorgo, 27.12 tons dry weight and 39.35 tons green weight per acre; P.A.G. No. 3147, 26.24 tons dry and 39.68 tons green weight; Steckley F. S. 400R, 25.27 tons dry and 39.1 tons green weight; Sart, 23.96 tons dry and 33.99 tons green weight per acre. The dry weights yields were calculated at 12 percent moisture.

The four leading varieties in terms of pounds of crude protein per acre were Tracy with 5,813 pounds; P.A.G. No. 3147 with 5,772 pounds; Sumac M. D. 5,712

The percent mineral content analysis showed Sumac M. D. with 17.4 percent; H.P.R.F. No. 4, 16.5 percent; Tracy, 14 percent and Lindsey 77A, 12.3 percent.

Data showing the complete results in the 1961 forage tests is included in report No. 37 of the High Plains Research Foundation for 1961. The report of the tests conducted by Dr. Earl H. Collister and Paul Belcher at the Foundation included data on early vigor, bloom date, plant height, lodging percent, moisture percentage at harvest, as well as the dry and green weight.

The chemical analyses were conducted by the state chemist, Texas A & M experiment station, College Station, Texas. The analyses included the percent total dry matter, percent crude protein, pounds protein per acre, percent crude fat, percent fiber and percent carbohydrates.

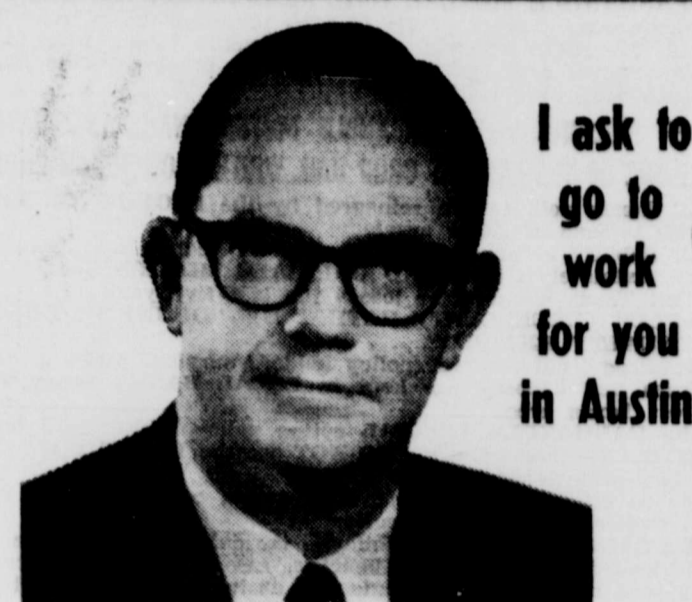

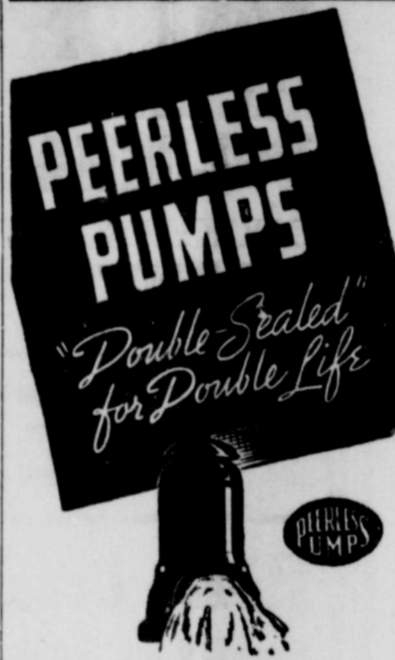

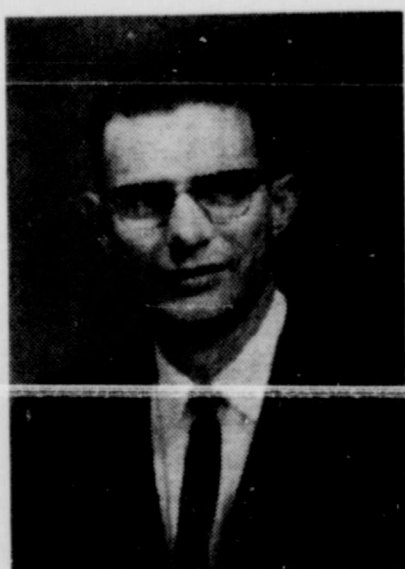
