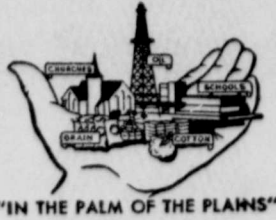

Dates for baccalaureate services and commencement exercises for the 1962 Abernathy High School graduating seniors have been set, according to high school principal, Ralph Stevenson.



The baccalaureate services will be held Sunday, May 20, in the school auditorium. School Superintendent Noel Johnson stated that the Rev. H. E. Coggins, pastor of Abernathy First Methodist Church, will present the baccalaureate sermon. The invocation will be given by Clyde Freeman, Church of Christ minister, and the benediction will be given by Rev. Boyce Evans, pastor of Abernathy First Baptist Church. Mrs. Herbert Hardin will furnish the professional and recreational music.

Commencement exercises for the AHS seniors is scheduled for Friday night, May 25, also in the school auditorium. The commencement speaker will be announced in next week's issue of The Review.

Abernathy's FFA livestock judging team, in competition at College Station last Saturday, placed 18th in the State Judging Meet out of 83 teams entered, and was third-high from Area I.

New Deal's judging team was close behind Abernathy, capturing 22nd place in the State event. Both local teams had advanced to the State Meet by placing

among the top ten teams in the Area I contest at Texas Tech the week before. Abernathy placed 8th in that event, and New Deal was 10th. Young Farmers Launch Safety Campaign For Shaft Guards

The Abernathy Young Farmers have launched a community-wide Safety Campaign in a bid to cover as many drive shafts as possible on irrigation wells in this area.

The Young Farmers kicked off the drive last Friday with the installation of a drive shaft guard to one of Lonnie Brownlow's irrigation wells southeast of town. Installation was done by Brownlow, community service chairman of the local chapter, and Don Presley, Young Farmer president.

The drive shaft guards are expandable in length from 24 to 48 inches, "which will accommodate just about any well in this area," Presley explained.

The drive shaft guards, manufactured in Plainview, were acquired locally for the Young Farmers by Bill Wolf and Sons Irrigation Supply. The guards, which take only minutes to install, may save many hours, days, or even weeks through the prevention of possible serious bodily injury.

The Young Farmers are selling the drive shaft guards at \$12.50 each, or \$13.50 installed. They may be purchased from any members of the Abernathy Young Farmer Chapter.

Those who own and/or manage places of business selling merchandise or service will play a vital role in Abernathy's Goal - '70 campaign. By alert, efficient management, they can prevent Abernathy from being a "no have" "can't do" town, and make it a "yes, sir, we have it" and "can do" bustling market place.

Every business and service firm in Abernathy can self-educate itself through magazines and other material published exclusively for specific businesses and trades. They can keep abreast of what is happening in their respective lines of merchandise or service. These trade journals tell what is new on the market. And the firms that sell service can improve their work through study of their trade magazines.

Abernathy merchants cannot be expected to have every item of merchandise that is on the market. Once they have a call for something not in stock, they should move fast to obtain the item and advise the customer that they now have it available.

Mrs. Douglas Chapman told about an incident which happened a year or two ago. She went to Struve's for a small item of hardware. They did not have it. A few days later, she was amazed when Arno Struve walked into the beauty shop and handed her the called-for item. Time counted in the 2-block round trip from Struve's to the beauty shop, Arno lost money on the 30-cent sale, but he had a satisfied, and surprised, customer.

I ran into a "no have" in Abernathy a couple weeks ago and came home empty-handed after several calls found it in Amarillo. "No have" even reaches into Dallas stores, I have discovered.

And, Big D stores goof on their merchandise at times. I bought a 1444-page dictionary at a Dallas bookstore and did not discover until I started using it that a dozen or more pages were blank. Dealing direct with the publishers in New York City, they sent me a replacement.

Stranded in downtown Lubbock

for five hours by the car trouble mentioned in a previous paragraph, I had time to roam that section. It was the first time I had taken a second look at downtown Lubbock in several years. It's a ghost town compared with the hustle and bustle there ten years ago. I stood at the corner of Broadway and Texas and counted five or six empty buildings in that general area. Shopping centers have killed that section.

It can happen in Abernathy, and it will unless steps are taken to prevent it. The hard core shopping area on Main from Avenue D to Avenue C and on Avenue D from Main to Tenth Street is committing suicide. Store owners and their employees are taking up street parking space that should be reserved for customers. Those cars should be parked behind the stores.

Now that through traffic is off Avenue D, city officials should ask the state highway department's permission to return to angle parking. That would bring some relief for the parking problem.

The business block on the west side of Avenue D between 9th and 10th Streets has all parking areas behind stores paved or gravelled and owners and employees use that area for their cars. Their neighbors on the east side of Avenue D and on the North side of Main Street should pave areas behind those buildings.

What can you do to improve your business in the Goal - '70 campaign? Every firm in Abernathy should concentrate on better service to the public. This will increase your business and help make Abernathy a better place to shop. Stock merchandise the people want and advertise it . . . in the Review, of course.

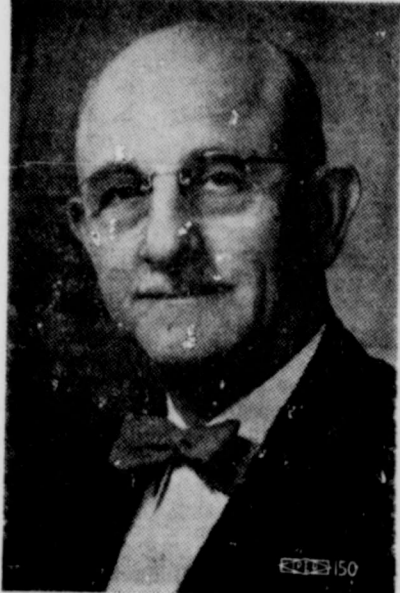

REVISED STANDARDS FOR GRAIN SORGHUM

The revision of U. S. Standards for grain sorghum, which will become effective August 1, increases the minimum test weight per bushel for Grade No. 1 from 56 to 57 pounds, for Grade No. 2 from 53 to 55 pounds, Grade No. 3 from 51 to 53 pounds, and Grade No. 4 from 49 to 51 pounds. Maximum moisture limits have been reduced for Grade No. 1 from 14 to 13 percent, for Grade No. 2 from 15 to 14 percent, and for Grade No. 3 from 16 to 15 percent. No change was made for Grade No. 4. Revision also eliminates all the subclasses, and eliminates non-grain sorghum as a specific grade determining factor. Special grades "Bright Grain Sorghums" and "Discolored Grain Sorghums" have also been eliminated. Area farmers and grain dealers consider the change highly discriminatory in that the acceptable moisture for No. 2 corn remains at 15.5 percent.

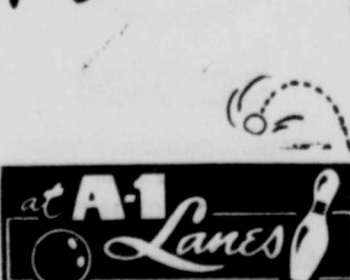
One of the prints, titled "Columns of Industry," was given a distinguished print award.

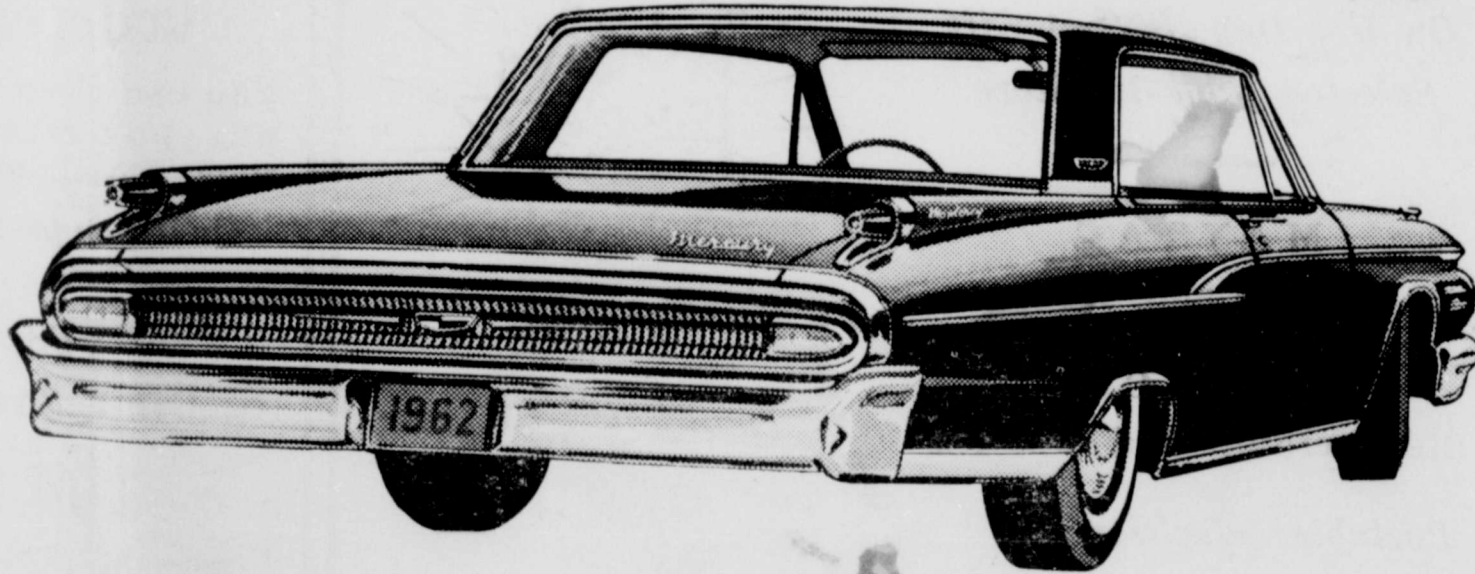

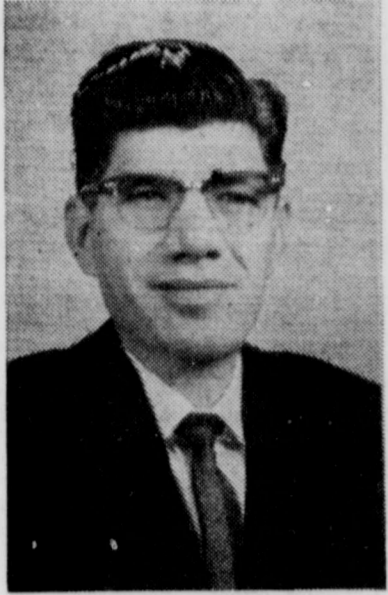

11,975 Housing Units In Hale County

The 1960 Census of Housing counted 11,975 housing units in Hale County. Of these—8,268 were in sound condition with all plumbing, 10,462 were occupied, 6,962 were occupied by owners, \$9,090 was the median value of owner-occupied places, 4,400 were occupied by renters, with \$61 the median gross rent of rented places, 10,102 had hot and cold running water, 10,011 had flush toilet, 9,954 bathtub or shower, and 671 had basements.

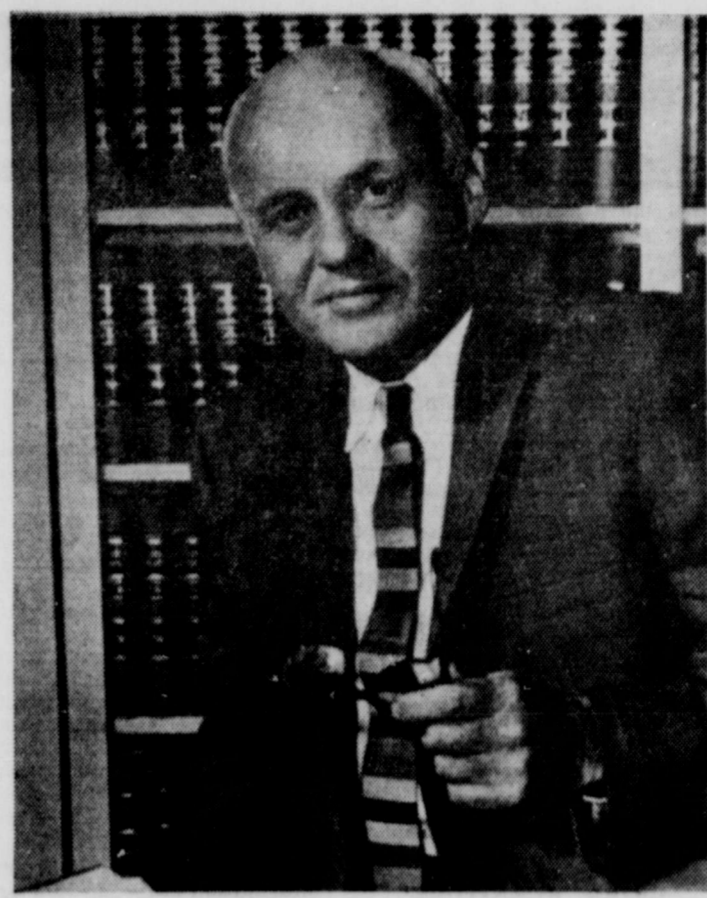
There were 125 trailer homes, 2,972 households had air conditioning, 8,913 had TV, 9,524 radio, 7,218 telephone, 6,804 had washing machine, 1,819 clothes dryer, 3,623 had one or more home food freezers, 5,091 had one automobile, 2,823 had two automobiles and 1,083 had three or more automobiles.

Abandoned Wells Must Go

Taking the view that the hundreds of abandoned irrigation wells on the Plains that have been left either uncovered or inadequately plugged constitute a threat to the safety of children and adults alike, the board of directors of the High Plains Water Conservation District have moved toward forcing proper closing of such wells.

The board recently approved a new rule and instructed that enforcement start April 1. The rule provides that if a landowner refuses or fails to properly plug up and cover an abandoned or unused well, district personnel may go on the land and do the job. Expense of such a job would be charged to the landowner, and if necessary to secure payment a lien on the farm would be instituted. It was estimated that such charges probably never would exceed \$100, and in most cases would be less.

Tom McFarland, manager of the water district, said the board felt the move was necessary to protect human and animal life and to prevent possible pollution of water from the surface. He said there are numerous ways of plugging and covering the wells, and that district personnel will be glad to discuss individual situations and suggest remedies.

The public is invited and thousands of persons are expected for the open house from 9 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.

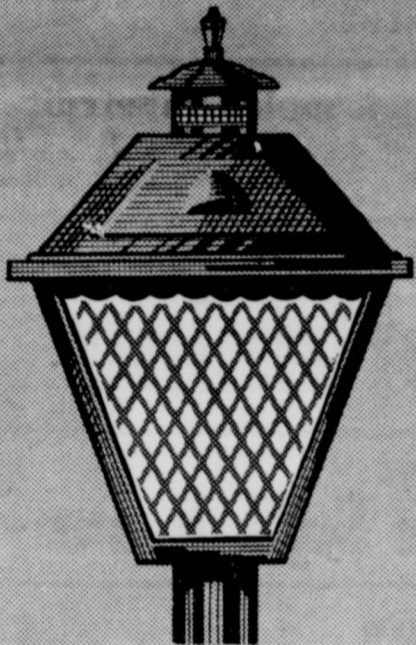

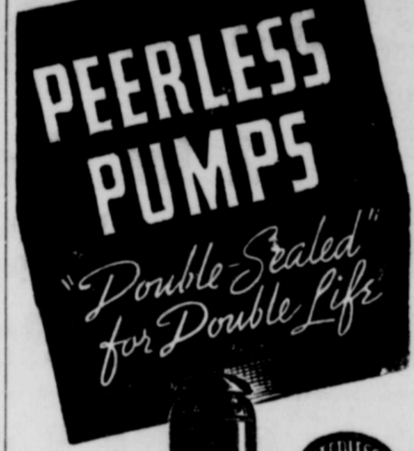
