Baccalaureate Set For Sunday Night

Baccalaureate services for the 1962 Abernathy High School graduating seniors will be held Sunday, May 20, at 8 p. m. in the school auditorium.

Rev. H. B. Coggin, pastor of Abernathy First Methodist Church, will be the principal speaker. Ministers of local churches are chosen yearly, on a rotation basis, to deliver the baccalaureate sermon.

The Rev. Mr. Coggin has served as pastor of the local Methodist Church the past five years, with he and Mrs. Coggin moving here from Lockney the first of June, 1957. He previously served two years as pastor of the Lockney Methodist Church, and was pastor of a Methodist Church at Amarillo for seven years prior to that. He is a 32nd degree Mason (member of Lockney Masonic Lodge), and is a member of the Abernathy Lions Club.

Others who will take part in the baccalaureate services will be Clyde Freeman, Abernathy Church of Christ minister, who will give the invocation; and Rev. Boyce Evans, pastor of Abernathy First Baptist Church, who will give the benediction. Frank Simpson, high school history teacher, will direct the congregation in singing two hymns, "Holy, Holy, Holy," and "My Faith Looks Up To Thee." Announcements will be made by School Superintendent Noel Johnson. Processional and recessional music will be played by Mrs. Herbert T. Hardin, high school math teacher.

Telephone Accounts To Be Moved To Ralls Business Office Effective June 1

Effective June 1, 1962, General Telephone Company's Abernathy accounts will be moved to the Ralls Business office, according to W. L. Frazier, Abernathy's District Manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

"Beginning at this time, payment of bills will be made by a business reply envelope, which will be enclosed in our customers' bills. No postage will be required to mail payments," Frazier said.

"The move is a result of long-range planning by our company," he added. "Leaving the business office in Abernathy after dial conversion was a temporary arrangement until further planning and space could be made in the Ralls office. Both Mrs. McMahan and Mrs. Beard will still be handling the Abernathy accounts in the Ralls office," Frazier added.

"By centralizing our business office, our company can provide better and more efficient service to the customers. Also, as it is now, no relief help is available in the event one of the local employees is ill or on vacation. The

work load is too great for one to handle for any length of time."

"As an added convenience, we have made arrangements with the Maclon Agency, 909 Avenue D in Abernathy, to accept cash payments. This is for our customers who normally pay by cash only. Payment by check or money order should be mailed in the postpaid envelope inserted in the bills each month.

"Should any of our customers desire information concerning their bills, or for ordering additional services, they should dial 'Operator' and ask for Enterprise 2413, Ralls Business Office. To report a telephone and ask for Enterprise 'Operator' and ask for Ralls, Enterprise 2469, Repair Service," Frazier concluded.

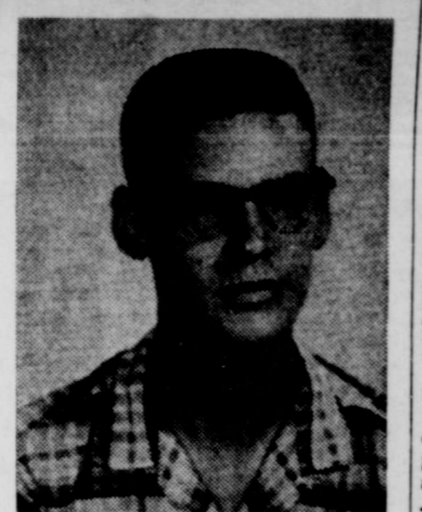
Eagles Win

Flame Cultivation Head Is Young Farmer Speaker

Jack Parks, head of the flame cultivation department at the High Plains Research Foundation, Halfway, was guest speaker at the Abernathy Young Farmer meeting in the high school agricultural department here Monday night.

With the aid of colored slides, Parks illustrated and explained to the 27 members and 12 guests present the types of flame cultivation, the types and sizes of crops flamed, and the effects of such flaming operations.

In addition to using the operation to kill weeds, workers at the Foundation rigged various types of flame units and conducted grain sorghum drying experiments prior to harvesting. In most cases the operation was successful, especially so on dryland sorghum.

Hal Howard, manager of Plains Gas of Abernathy, furnished a tractor-equipped flame cultivator which he "fired up" to demonstrate that the unit could be used at low pressure, or at high-pressure depending upon the size of the weeds and crop.

Two groups, consisting of 14 men in each group, will be instructed in the welding short courses. The first group will begin the course at 7 p. m. June 5, and the second group will begin July 2.

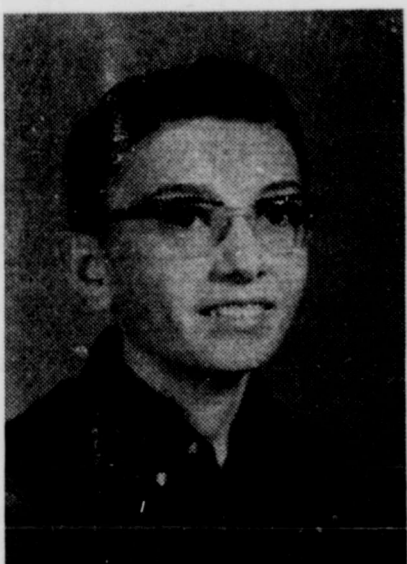

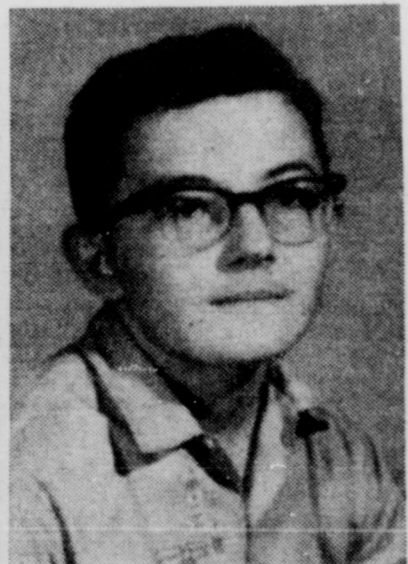
To Hale Center

Local Lions wishing to attend are urged to meet at Graham's Restaurant at 10:30 Tuesday morning.



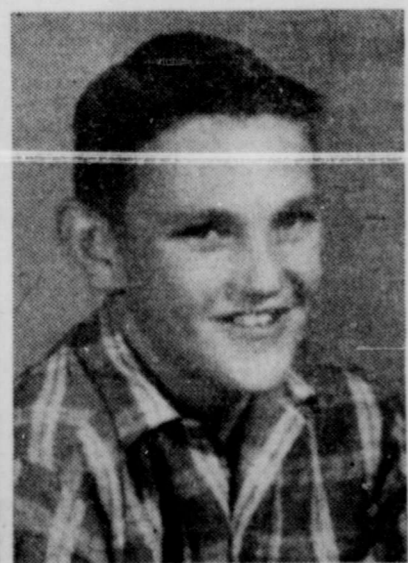

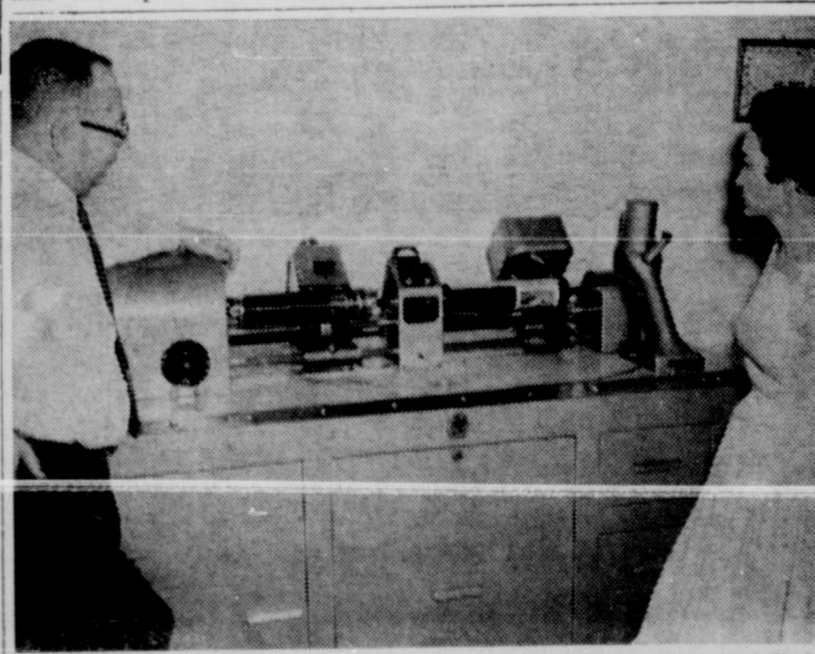

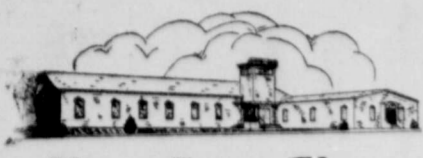

is the speaker. This is a workshop for all who work with publications, communications, and public relations for the church. Bulletin editors, church secretaries and other interested persons.

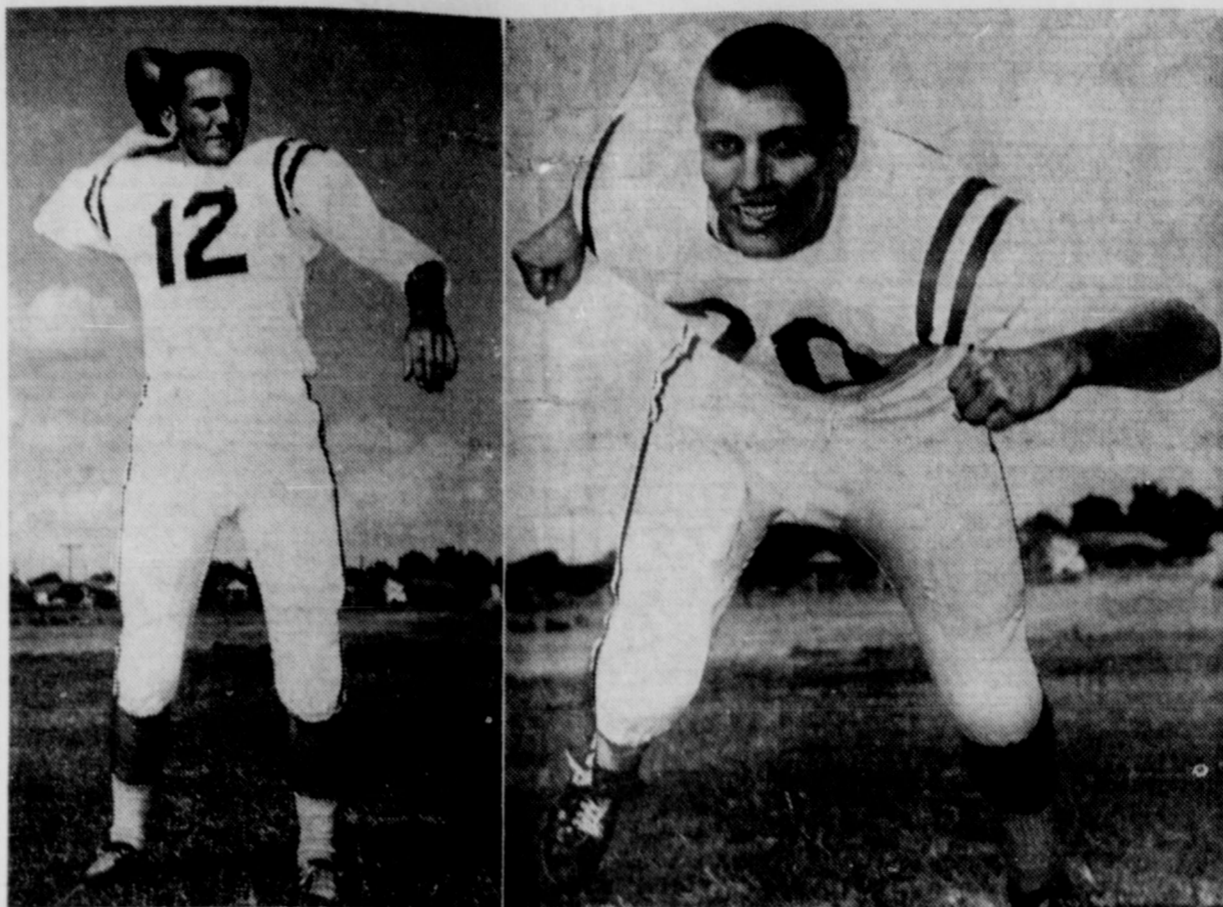

In the business session following Mrs. Elbert Harp, president, presided. Mrs. Harp also conducted the simple but impressive installation service immediately afterward.

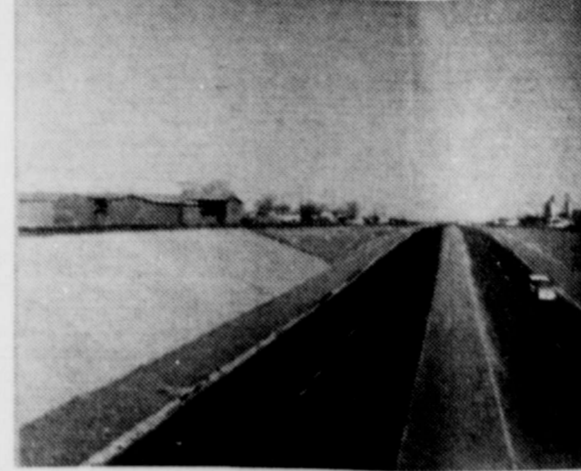
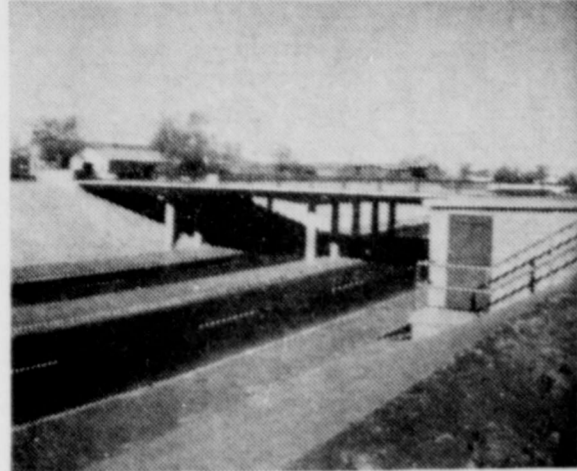
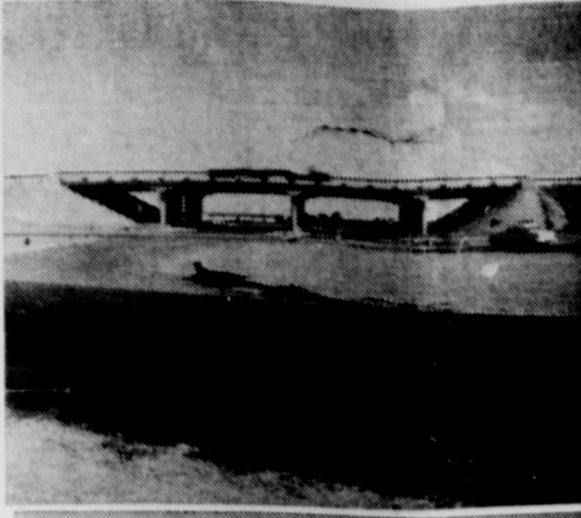
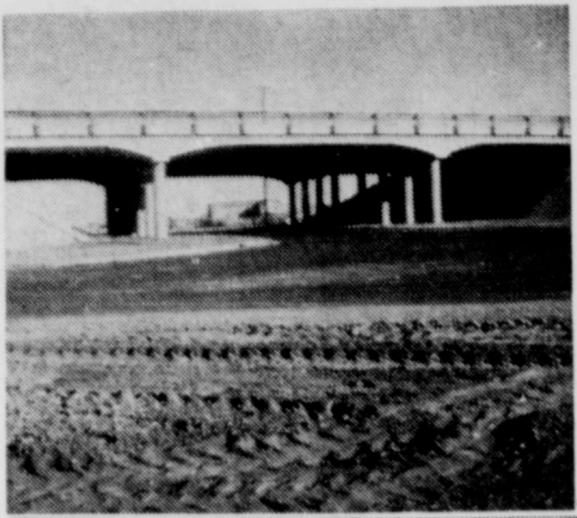
Using the theme "Abiding Values in a Changing World," the president said, "As parents and as teachers we leave a mark on every child with whom we make contact."

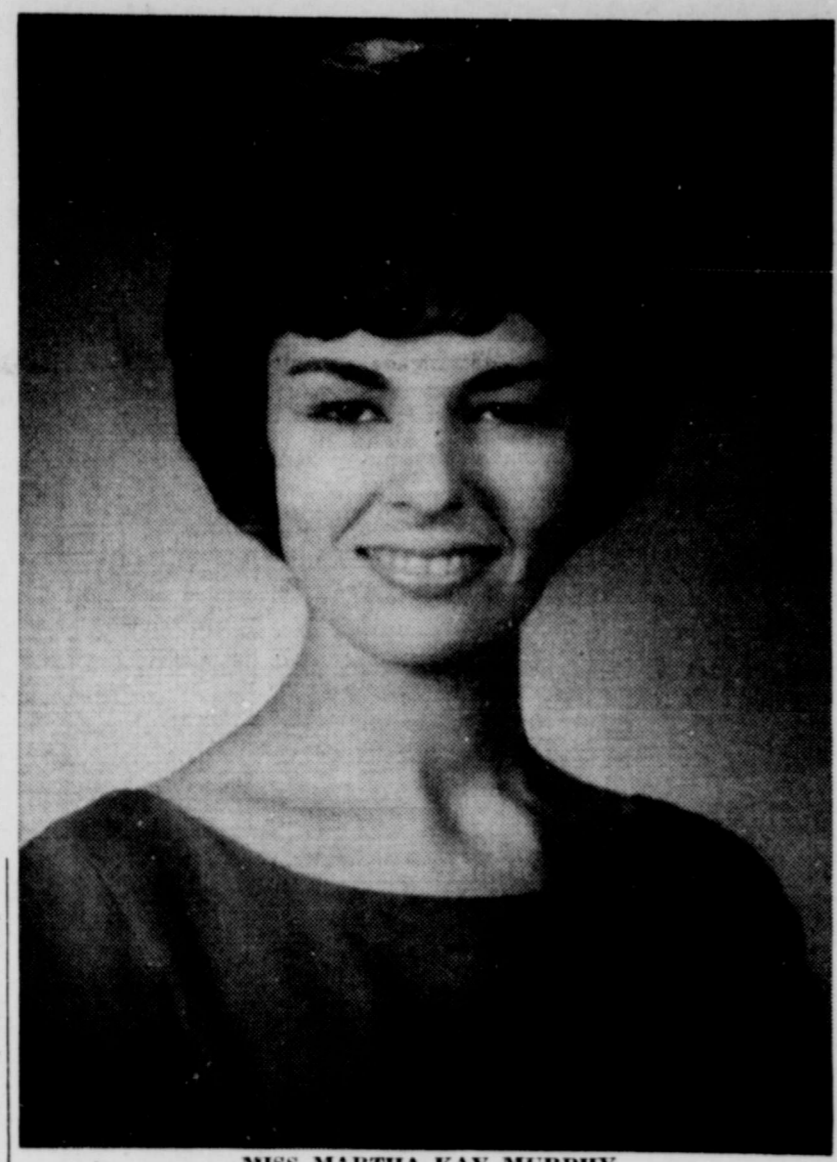

One part of the program is of particular interest to backyard enthusiasts. The city will fog or dust a particular area of the city on request. That is, if someone is planning an outdoor party, a telephone call to city hall (298-2545) between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. will bring the dust or fog machine, depending on weather conditions, to the area immediately prior to the party. Regardless, every part of the city will be fogged or dusted at least once each week by city forces.

Residents can help control mosquitoes by spraying shrubbery, by keeping weeds down and getting rid of old tires, cans, buckets, etc. Casual water is the cause of nearly all our mosquito problem.

CARRIERS TO DISTRIBUTE STOCK SURVEY CARDS

Acting postmaster Herbert Hardin reminds rural patrons of the Abernathy Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Hardin explains. "It's important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are: Larry Deering, Rt. 1; and Jack Hackler, Rt. 2.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions, Mr. Hardin concludes.
