

past few years have learned that sunflowers are a valuable crop. Sunflowers are processed for their vegetable oil with a value equal to or better than

It seems the program was started in southern Canada where a group of farmers plant-ed a Russian variety. The flower is about the size of a breakfast plate, but when properly culti-vated its production is heavy. With a short growing season. the sunflower can be harvested and grain or sorghum planted on the ground for a later sea-

Last year Texas farmers harvested heavy crops of the seed. This was done through the efforts of the Texas Cotton Seed Crushers Association of Dallas. Seeds were processed at local cotton oil mills.

Perhaps the greatest concentration of the sunflower crop is around Pecos where some 2,000 acres are harvested. Other active areas include the Panhandle, the Mckinney section north of Dallas; the honey-producing fields of Uvalde and in Central Texas around Rockdale and Thorndale. and Thorndale.

Dove hunters like the sunflow the past these have been wild sunflowers, many of them not much larger than a silver dollar but a few are as large as a saucer. They grow in profusion along fence rows, country lanes and even low mesquite pasture land.
