



A brief digest of the 14 proposed Amendments follows:

Number 1 on the Ballot (HJR 25)

Provides Workmen's Compensation Insurance for the employees

of all political subdivisions. Number 2 on the Ballot (SJR 9) Raise the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,-000,000) to Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000)

lars (\$52,000,000). Number 3 on the Ballot (SJR 22) Permits creation of hospital dis-tricts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Countie Number 4 on the Ballot (HJR 46)

Provides for a State program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs. Number 5 on the Ballot (HJR 51) Creates hospital districts and

limits their power. Number 6 on the Ballot (HJR 36) Authorizes retirement, disabili-ty, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12)

years or more. Number 7 on the Ballot (SJR 13) Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of pub-lic office, except members of the lic office, except members of the

Legislature. Number 8 on the Ballot (SJR 7) Establishes a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.

Number 9 on the Ballot (HJR 70) Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and fi-nancing of a home for the aged in Titus County and permits the Legislature to authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts

Number 10 on the Ballot (SJR 12) Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency or any political subdivi-sion thereof.

Number 12 on the Ballot (SJR 19)

Number 14 on the Ballot (HJR 32) Provides for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government.



this your motto, "Lord I believe, help thou my unbelief." Be de-termined to accept the Bible and the part that you do understand. Then grow step by step as you study and pray about the meaning of the Bible. It is sometimes helpful to take your doubts and discuss them

with someone you know that is strong in faith. It is good to pray and talk with God about your doubts.

Remember that Jesus said to doubting Thomas, "Be not faithless, but believing."







Just what is considered a cover crop? A cover crop is using close growing grasses, legumes, or small grain primarily for summer or winter protection and for soil improvement. Cover crops usually occupy the land for a period of one year or less.

If legume seeds are harvested, all residues should be left on the land at a rate of at least 750 pounds of residues per acre on most soils in Hale County. Some soils need as much as sired protection.

When another crop is to be planted within two or three weeks following growing cover crop, the cover crop should be shredded and/or double disked and allow ed to wilt prior to normal seed bed preparation. Shredding prior to disking is recommended on crops which have reached the bloom stage unless they are to be stubble mulched. Reducing residues to short lengths make subsequent tillage operations much easier.

Cover crops can also be used as physical, chemical and biological condition of the soil.





HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 25 proposing an Amendment to Section 60 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 60 of Article III of the State Constitution, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions."
Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. INCOME TAX FAX

How To Lessen Wage Levies A workable plan to reduce the chore of employers in handling wage levies against ther em-ployees for delinquent federal income taxes, was presented by Ellis Campbell, Jr., Dallas district director, Internal Revenue

The plan, he said, solves the major cause for wage levies against delinquent workers, namey, that the amount of tax withheld from wages or salaries is lower in many cases than the amount of tax due at the end of the year.

Campbell said the worker someimes in unable to pay the addi-tional amount due when he files his income tax return and thus becomes delinquent. This necessitates a wage levy for collection purposes in many cases. "To solve this problem," Camp-

bell said, "workers have the right under law to eliminate one or more exemptions for tax with-holding purposes on Form W-4.
This automatically increases the amount withheld by approximate-ty \$120 a year for each exemp-

tion dropped."

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
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
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
