## Texans Will Vote On 14 Amendments

In this issue of the Review appears a full text of three Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the upcoming General Election (November 6). So that you may be fully informed, we urge you to read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your vote.

A brief digest of the 14 proposed Amendments follows:  
**Number 1 on the Ballot (HJR 25)**  
Provides Workmen's Compensation Insurance for the employees of all political subdivisions.  
**Number 2 on the Ballot (SJR 9)**  
Raise the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) to Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000).

**Number 3 on the Ballot (SJR 22)**  
Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties.  
**Number 4 on the Ballot (HJR 46)**  
Provides for a State program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs.

**Number 5 on the Ballot (HJR 51)**  
Creates hospital districts and limits their power.  
**Number 6 on the Ballot (HJR 30)**  
Authorizes retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more.

**Number 7 on the Ballot (SJR 13)**  
Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature.  
**Number 8 on the Ballot (SJR 7)**  
Establishes a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.

**Number 9 on the Ballot (HJR 70)**  
Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and permits the Legislature to authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County.  
**Number 10 on the Ballot (SJR 12)**  
Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency or any political subdivision thereof.

**Number 11 on the Ballot (SJR 25)**  
Authorizes resale of repossessed lands in the Veterans Land Fund, to any buyer, after having been first offered for resale to veterans.  
**Number 12 on the Ballot (SJR 19)**  
Delegates limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

**Number 13 on the Ballot (SJR 6)**  
Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizes the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.  
**Number 14 on the Ballot (HJR 32)**  
Provides for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government.

Registration began in the school cafeteria at 2 p.m., with election of officers, recognitions and program from 4 to 5 p.m. A barbecue supper was served at 7 p.m. in the cafeteria followed by a coffee. About 335 plates were served. Many classes held reunions at separate places over town.

Joe Thompson is the retiring president, and Adkisson was vice-president for the 1962 homecoming.

The Sabin oral polio vaccine will be administered at two places in Abernathy September 9, at city hall and at the school cafeteria. Every person in this area, children and adults, should take advantage of this opportunity to be immunized against polio.

There will be no charge for the Sabin oral vaccine or the doctors' services, but the PTA urges everyone who can to donate twenty-five cents, or more, to help defray expenses of the project.

## JAPAN FEED SPECIALIST TO CONFER IN GRAIN SORGHUM AREA

Hideo Tokoro, a top official in the Food and Agriculture Feed Import Division of the Japanese Government, will confer with grain sorghum production and marketing interests relative to expanding Japan grain sorghum imports, from August 18-21. Tokoro formerly was Japanese Agricultural Attache stationed in Washington, D. C. and has twice previously visited the sorghum area.

Japan's livestock and poultry feed consumption increased 53 percent during the past year. Grain sorghum exports to Japan have leaped from none in 1959 when grain sorghum promotional

efforts were initiated to an expected 500,000 tons this year, to make Japan the largest single country importing U. S. grain sorghum.

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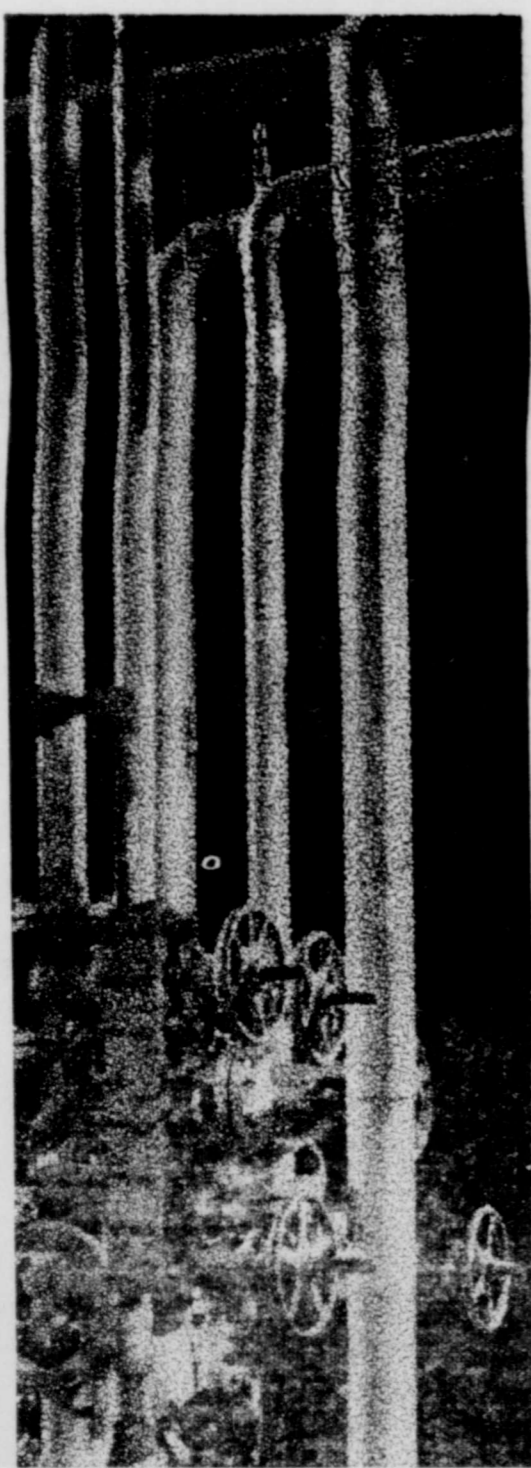
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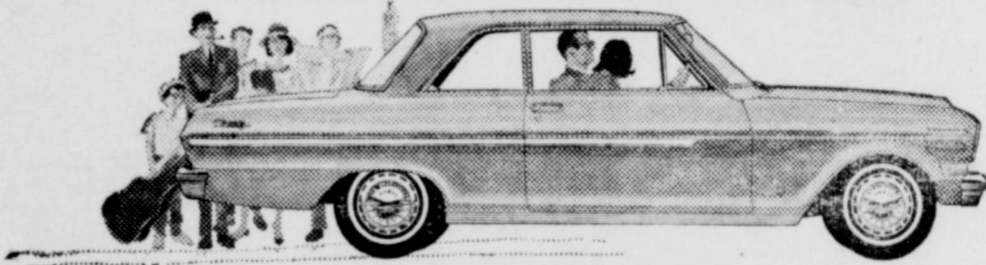
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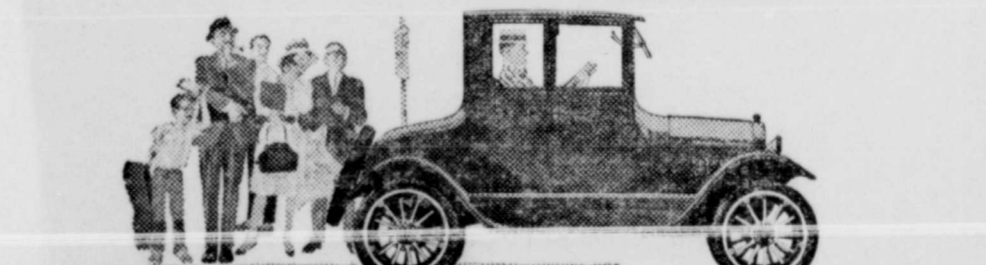

whenever it seems that God is slack in his promises.

Sometimes doubt comes when so called "men of honor" attack our Bible, our church, our faith in Christ.

Another major cause to doubt comes because of intellectual difficulty. We just cannot "figure things out." Some may doubt because they cannot "reason out" God and Christ. (Salvation is by faith and not reason, and even if man "reasons out" God, he still must accept him by faith.)

If there is doubt in your life . . . find the cause of your doubt. Then pray that God will help you overcome your doubt. Remember that in doubting there is no real spiritual strength. Strength comes to those who stand firmly . . . rooted in the faith of Christ.

If you find that sin causes your doubt, pray that God will help you live above sin, and then endeavor seriously to rid yourself of sinful practices.

If you find that others cause you to doubt, remember Psalms 27, which says "Fret not thyself because of evil doers . . . trust in the LORD."

If you are doubting because you cannot fully understand the Bible or Christianity, then make this your motto: "Lord, believe, help thou my unbelief." Be determined to accept the Bible and the part that you do understand. Then grow step by step as you study and pray about the meaning of the Bible.

It is sometimes helpful to take your doubts and discuss them with someone you know that is strong in faith. It is good to pray and talk with God about your doubts.

**GRAIN SORGHUM AND OTHER FEED GRAIN LEGISLATION STILL BEING DEBATED**

Last February, one of our highly regarded Washington information services advised us that nothing much could be expected in the way of grain sorghum legislation this session, except possibly a one-year extension of the current Emergency Feed Grain Program. Since then, there has been heated discussion of bills, amendments and laws, any of which could have been written into our farm policy, yet today, there still seems to be no "inside information" than an expected 50-50 chance for an extension of the 1962 Emergency Program. The effective support to High Plains producers would thus continue at about \$1.78 a hundred.

There is still, however, the possibility that no action will be taken by Congress and policy revert to the 1958 law. This would mean 90 percent of the three year average market price but not less than 65 percent of parity. This would be about \$1.23 effective support for area grain. Why not put the pencil to these alternatives and their effect on your individual situation and then let your Congressman know which would be, on your farm, the "best deal for sorghum."

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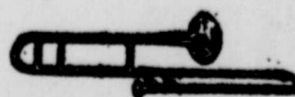

### S C D Offers Information On Cover Crops

In Hale County cover and green manure crops are not used too much in the conservation cropping system on most farms. However, this practice has gained momentum on diverted grain sorghum land.

Just what is considered a cover crop? A cover crop is using close growing grasses, legumes, or small grain primarily for summer or winter protection and for soil improvement. Cover crops usually occupy the land for a period of one year or less.

The purpose for planting cover crops is to protect vegetative cover on areas subject to erosion during periods when the major crops do not furnish adequate cover. They also improve the physical, chemical and biological condition of the soil.

Cover crops are applicable on most any cropland where a protective cover is needed to reduce soil and water losses. Such crops may also be used as green manure for soil improvement between periods of regular crop production, interseeded with cultivated crops, or for short or long-term cover.

Perhaps you are wondering what could I plant now that would give me these benefits. Vetch and rye mixture could be interseeded with row crops from August 15 until Nov. 1, or vetch

by itself could be planted now as could biennial sweetclover. Winter peas could be planted about August 15 to November 1. After one gets cover crops established there are some management principles which should be applied. If legume seeds are harvested, all residues should be left on the land at a rate of at least 750 pounds of residues per acre on most soils in Hale County. Some soils need as much as 1250 pounds per acre to get desired protection.

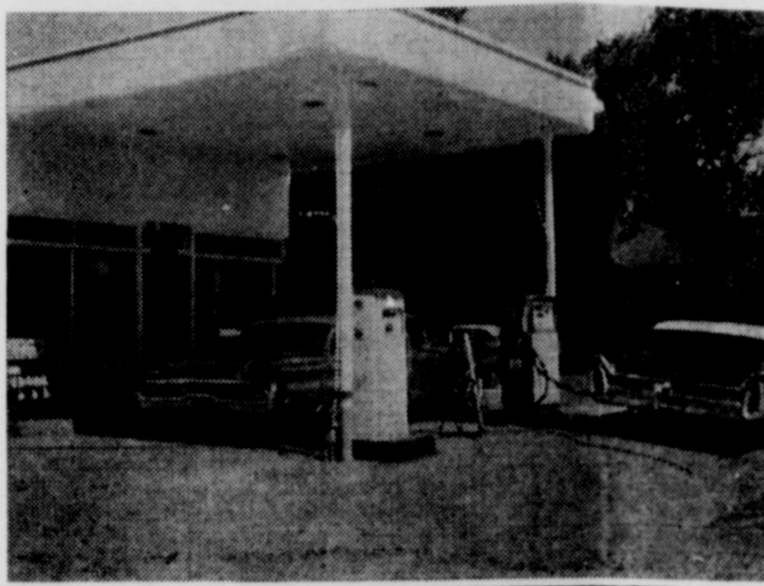
When another crop is to be planted within two or three weeks following growing cover crop, the cover crop should be shredded and/or double disked and allowed to wilt prior to normal seedbed preparation. Shredding prior to disking is recommended on crops which have reached the bloom stage unless they are to be stubble mulched. Reducing residues to short lengths make subsequent tillage operations much easier.

Cover crops can also be used as a dual purpose crop both for grazing and soil improvement. They may be grazed at any time, provided enough growth is left to protect land at all times. Generally, a four inch average stubble should be left on legumes. At least 50 percent of carbonaceous type plants should be left.

If you have cotton on the same land it has been on for the past few years, you should consider interplanting a cover crop or if you are going to have layout grain sorghum acreage this would be a good opportunity to get started into improving your soil by use of cover crops.

### Hale County ASCS Committee Election Slated Next Month

Public notice of the forthcoming Hale County ASCS Committee election for 1963 is hereby given by Mr. E. J. Pope, Jr., present ASCS County Committee Chairman, and will be conducted according to the schedule outlined below.

Election of Community Committee-men will be conducted by mail for each of the twelve ASCS Communities and all ballots will be mailed to eligible voters by not later than September 3, 1962, and must be marked by the voter and returned to Hale County ASCS office by not later than September 14, 1962.

Nominations for a place on the ballot for each Community may be made by petitions signed by not less than ten eligible voters who reside in the community, and will be made for membership on the committee without designation of a specific position. Such state of nominees must be received in the ASCS office, Box 1271, Plainview, Texas, not later than August 24, 1962. Additional nominations required to bring the slate of nominees up to ten will be made by the present ASCS Community Committee-men.

The names of each person nominated in accordance with the above procedure will be placed on the ballot, if found eligible and willing to serve.

Any person who is nominated by petition and found to be ineligible to serve will be notified of such determination prior to completion of the slate of nominees and will have the right of appeal to the County Committee prior to the completion of the slate of nominees.

An eligible voter is any person who is of legal voting age and who has an interest in a farm as owner, tenant, or sharecropper and any person not of legal voting age who is in charge of the supervision and conduct of the farming operations on an entire farm shall be eligible to vote for committee-men and delegates in the community in which he has such an interest if he meets any of the following requirements:

A. A payment or grant of conservation materials or service is or will be made with respect to the farm under the current agricultural conservation program or there is being carried out on the farm one or more of the current program practices approved for the State by the State Committee.

B. A marketing quota or acreage allotment is currently established for the farm.

C. The person is eligible for a cooperator's loan or other price support.

D. The person is eligible for a payment under the Sugar Act Program.

E. The person is eligible for a payment under the National Wool Act Program.

F. The person is eligible for a payment under the Soil Bank Act.

G. The person is eligible to participate in any other program administered by the County Committee.

Any person whose name appears on a farm deed as an owner shall be considered as having an interest in that farm as owner and is eligible to vote if otherwise qualified.

Interpretation of voting eligibility. An eligible voter may be an individual, partnership, association, corporation, estate, trust, other business enterprise or legal entity, or wherever applicable a state, a political subdivision of a State, or any agency thereof. In case of joint ownership by two or more individuals, each is an eligible voter.

In any state having a community property law, the spouse of a person who is eligible to vote is also eligible to vote.

Eligible voters are encouraged to make nominations by petitions, Mr. Pope said.

The election chairman and vice chairman of each Community Committee will serve as a delegate and alternate delegate respectively to a county convention for the election of the 1963 Hale County ASCS, County Committee to be held at 9:30 a.m., September 27, in the Hale County

ASCs office, 811 West 5th St., Plainview, such convention will be open to the public.

All Committeemen elected will assume their duties on October 1, 1962 and will serve for one year or until their successors are elected.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1962.  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 9 to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of hospital districts composed of all or part of one or more counties; the assumption by the district of any included city, town or county hospital indebtedness and the transfer of all hospital facilities thereof to the district; the issuance of bonds for hospital purposes and the levy of taxes to pay the district's bonds, assumed indebtedness, and for operating and maintaining the district; providing other terms and conditions for accomplishing the purposes of this Amendment.  
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby, amended by adding thereto another Section to be designated as Section 9, which shall read as follows:  
"Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that such district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its newly inhabitants; and assuming the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less than all the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (\$0.75) on the one hundred dollar valuation of taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property taxing electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose; and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district."  
"Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected; and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxing voters in the district concerned."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create hospital districts and prescribing limitations upon the powers of such districts."  
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create hospital districts and prescribing limitations upon the powers of such districts."  
Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 25** proposing an Amendment to Section 60 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 60 of Article III of the State Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all employees of the county or political subdivision as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties or political subdivisions of this State and for the payment of

the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November A.D. 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions;" and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said Election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**INCOME TAX FAX**

**How To Lessen Wage Levies**  
 A workable plan to reduce the chore of employers in handling wage levies against their employees for delinquent federal income taxes, was presented by Ellis Campbell, Jr., Dallas district director, Internal Revenue Service. The plan, he said, solves the major cause for wage levies against delinquent workers, namely, that the amount of tax withheld from wages or salaries is lower in many cases than the amount of tax due at the end of the year. Campbell said the worker sometimes in unable to pay the additional amount due when he files his income tax return and thus becomes delinquent. This necessitates a wage levy for collection purposes in many cases. "To solve this problem," Campbell said, "workers have the right under law to eliminate one or more exemptions for tax withholding purposes on Form W-4. This automatically increases the amount withheld by approximately \$120 a year for each exemption dropped." Campbell continued, "If this doesn't cure the problem, workers may enter into an agreement with their paymasters to increase their withholding further by amending their W-4 form. Convenient tax withholding tables, provided by IRS in Circular E, give this computation at a glance." The IRS official urges area employers to encourage their employees to take advantage of these two devices so as to prevent their becoming delinquent and thereby eliminate wage levies. "Dropping exemptions for tax withholding purposes," Campbell explained, "doesn't mean that taxpayers lose their exemptions. It's merely a system for increasing the amount of tax withheld. The exemptions can be claimed for tax computation purposes when the taxpayers file their returns." Floyd Lebow has moved to 1311 Avenue G.
