## Area School Openings Set

### Abernathy Schools To Begin Tuesday

Abernathy Public Schools will open the 1962-63 school year at 8:45 a. m. Tuesday, September 4, announced Superintendent Noel Johnson.

Prior to the opening of school, general faculty and group meetings will be held Thursday, August 30. A general faculty meeting will be held in the school cafeteria beginning at 9:00 a. m. At 10:30, a meeting of the administration and all teachers new to the local system will be held, also in the cafeteria. Faculty meetings for elementary, junior high and high school will commence at 1:30 p. m. And at 3:00 p. m., a meeting of administration and bus drivers will be held in Room 117 in the high school building.

School buses will make their regular runs at the regular time Tuesday morning, September 4, and school will be dismissed at 2 p. m. that day. Regular all-day sessions will begin the next day. It was announced that lunch will be served in the cafeteria Tuesday for those who wish to take advantage of this service.

**Registration**  
High School Principal Ralph Stevenson announced that registration for high school students will be held Friday, August 31, in the high school library and the principals office.

Freshmen students will register from 8 to 10 a. m.; sophomore students will register from 10 a. m. to 12 noon; junior students will register from 1 to 3 p. m.; and senior students will register between 3 and 5 p. m. that day.

Mr. Stevenson also stated that a photographer will be present (Room 111) to take yearbook pictures of all high school students. Students may have their pictures taken either before or after registering, he stated.

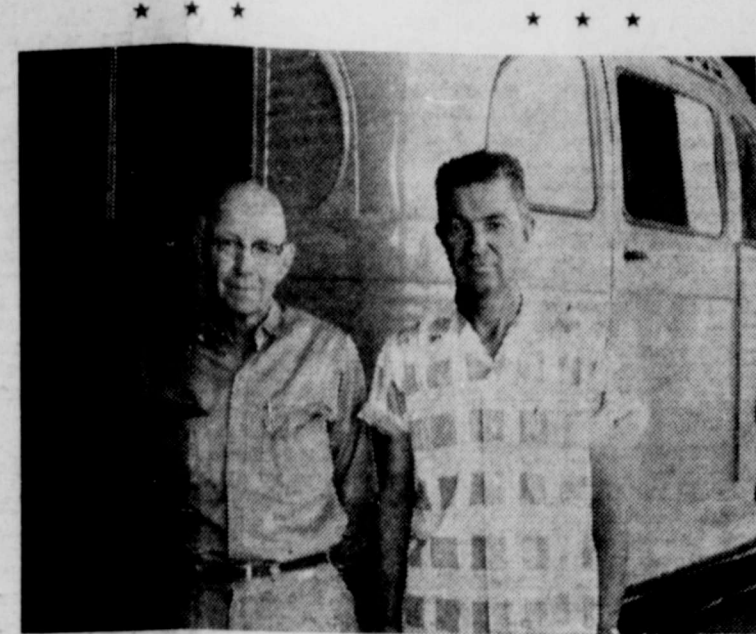

### Antelopes Lacking In Experience; Show Determination

Football practice for the Abernathy High School Antelopes got off to a good start August 20 with around 30 young men from the top three grades in school (and several freshmen) showing up for initial workouts.

The list of varsity lads now participating include 14 seniors, one junior and nine sophomores.

Freshmen lads are not required to workout with the varsity, but head coach Curtis Davenport stated that any who wished to do so were certainly welcome.

From the 30 sophomores, juniors and seniors who reported for workouts the first day, only 24 eligible players are left and five of those are on the injured list. Those who are unable to workout in pads include senior halfback Larry Boyce, junior quarterback Ronnie Anderson, sophomore guard Ray Mac Peage, and tackles Billy Barrick, senior, and Bill Lee, sophomore.

**Season Opens Next Friday**  
The Antelopes will make their initial bid in the 1962 season Friday night, September 7, against the Olton Mustangs at Olton. Game time is set for 8 o'clock.

The two clubs should be fairly well matched, as both teams are lacking in experience. Main experience of both clubs is in the backfield and end positions, while sophomores fill most of the positions "up front."

Coach Davenport stated that the Antelopes are coming along slowly, as the club is lacking in depth as well as experience. "Up front we're a sophomore club all the way, experience-wise, except for Hughes and Henson. Others in the line are either sophomores or seniors who haven't played since they were freshmen," Davenport stated.

A lot of responsibility will lie on the shoulders of the AHS backfield, where experience is the key word. Probable starters include four seniors, three one-year lettermen and one two-year letterman. "We feel we have better-than-average backfield this season," Davenport commented.

Line coach Richard Eddleman and assistant coach Danny Ward are working hand-in-hand with Davenport in bringing the ball club along, and stated that they can see some improvements as the workouts progress.

## Wheat Vote Is Set Today

The Secretary of Agriculture has proclaimed Wheat Marketing Quotas for the 1963 wheat crop and has set August 30, 1962, as the date of the Wheat Marketing Quota Referendum according to John B. Martin, county office manager, Hale County ASCS.

On the day of the Referendum wheat farmers in the commercial wheat producing areas (includes Texas) will go to the polls and cast their ballots to determine if Marketing Quotas and Marketing Penalties will apply to wheat produced in excess of the farm wheat allotment and price support will be available to cooperators (farmers who plant within their allotment) at \$1.82 per bushel, national average, (75 percent of parity).

If less than two-thirds of the votes cast favor quotas, there will be no marketing quota penalties. However, acreage allotments will still be in effect and the price support to farmers planting within their allotment will be at \$1.21 per bushel, national average, (50 percent of parity) with no price supports to farmers who harvest in excess of their allotments.

All persons are eligible to vote in the August 30 quota referendum who will share in the 1963 wheat crop from a farm in the commercial wheat area on which the wheat acreage to be harvested as grain will be more than 15 acres. Except that persons growing up to 30 acres of wheat under feed wheat exemption provisions and landlords of a standing rent, cash rent, or fixed rent tenants, shall not be eligible.

No person shall be entitled to more than one vote, regardless of the number of farms in which such person may have an interest in this county or any other county or state.

Each eligible voter shall vote in the community in which such person resides, except that an eligible voter may vote in the community in which the farm is located, in which he will share in the 1963 wheat crop, if such person does not vote in the community in which he resides.

Voting by mail, except in the case of an "Absentee" or by proxy, is prohibited. The wife of an eligible voter in Texas is also eligible to vote.

All eligible voters are urged to exercise their privilege by voting on this important issue, August 30.

**Smith's To Be Closed Thursday And Friday, Moving To New Building**  
Smith's Food Store, owned and operated for the past six years by James R. (Jim Bob) Smith and his father, Lee Roy, will be closed Thursday and Friday (today and tomorrow). The Smiths are moving to their new building at the corner of Avenue D and 4th Street, and the name of their firm will hence be known as Smith's Thriftway Super Market.

Construction of the building has been completed, and final stages of electrical and plumbing work were being done early this week.

The Smiths planned to begin moving merchandise from their old building at 717 Avenue C to their new building last night (Wednesday). Jim Bob stated that by being closed Thursday and Friday, they hoped to be able to complete enough of their moving to be open for business Saturday in their new store. He asked that their customers please excuse this inconvenience, but they will be able to serve them better and more efficiently in the future. (See their ad on page eight).

Space along the west wall of the new building is completely taken by frozen food and fresh produce display cases. The fresh meat department is centered at the north end of the building, with a 16-foot three-deck dairy case at the west end of the meat counter, and a 16-foot self-service meat display case at the east end. Three modern check-out counters have been installed at the southeast corner near the front doors of the building.

Most of the equipment throughout the store is new, but some of the shelving is that moved from the old building. The new store features all the modern conveniences, including refrigerated air conditioning. Jim Bob stated that they will feature a complete line of produce, frozen foods and meats, in addition to name-brand canned goods and other merchandise. He added that they will be competitive in price and service as they will try to equal other stores in this area. Effective September 1, all sales will be on a cash basis.

General contractor for construction of the new building is Cecil McCurdy Lumber Company of Abernathy. The new building, constructed of painted haydite blocks with brick trim, features vinyl tile flooring and consists of approximately 6,000 square feet of floor space. A paved parking area will accommodate 41 cars.

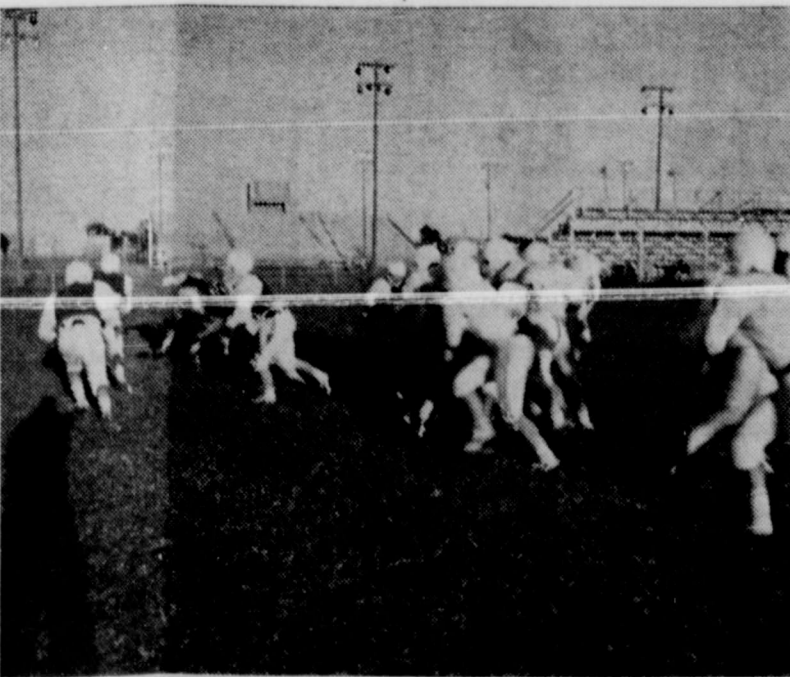

## DPS Now Taking Applications For Uniformed Services

Monthly examinations are now being given to fill vacancies in the uniformed services of the Texas Department of Public Safety, according to Major Harry Hutchison, Regional Commander of this Region for the Texas DPS.

The Commander said this new method of recruiting has not been used in the entire history of the Texas Department of Public Safety prior to this year. Entrance examinations were formerly given two or three times a year, now the examinations are given the second Saturday of each month throughout the state of Texas.

The cities in this region where the entrance examinations are given include Lubbock, Amarillo, and Wichita Falls. December 8, 1962 will be the last date for entrance examinations to be given for entrance in the next student patrol school, a sixteen week training period which will begin at the Department of Public Safety Law Enforcement Academy in Austin February 26, 1963.

When all benefits are considered, as well as the fact that these jobs offer a career of service to their fellow Texans, we regard them as outstanding opportunities for young men. They will have an opportunity to attend the best state police academy in the nation, to receive training in police science and administration under the direction of some of the nation's foremost professional authorities.

Hutchison said that upon successful completion of the sixteen weeks training course, graduates will become commissioned officers and will be assigned to the field. The salary while in training will be \$331.00 per month and will increase to \$395.00 or \$412.00 per month upon graduation, depending on the nature of the patrolman's assignment. Longevity pay increment of \$10.00 extra per month will be added for each five years of service for each of the uniformed services, which are the Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Driver's License, and Motor Vehicle Inspection. In addition, uniforms and equipment will be furnished, and the officers will participate in the state retirement plan. There are other personal benefits they will have,

The "practical" joker, pranksters and/or maliciously-minded who may consider having a field day with Abernathy's new fire reporting telephone hook-up had better give it a second, and serious, thought. While you have the firemen's telephone lines tied up

with a "practical" joke call, someone with a real emergency may be trying to dial the fire number. Under certain circumstances, your "practical" joke could result in the death of some person.

Also, consider the unfairness of useless calls. The men are volunteer firemen, who sacrifice their time and lay their personal safety and lives on the line to protect their neighbors and neighbors' property. It would be unfair to these men and their families to disturb their rest by a "practical" joke call.

A "practical" joke call should carry the same penalty as turning in a false fire alarm. Also, there are state laws under which a person can be prosecuted for misuse of a telephone. The joker who thinks he can remain anonymous because of the telephone system may be surprised by the hot breath of a policeman on his neck in a matter of minutes after he calls. There are ways to trace dial telephone calls.

The following is merely my suggestion to the city council, and in no way is to be construed as an approved or official use of the new fire reporting telephone hook-up. DO NOT use the fire number for any other purpose than reporting a fire unless a published "OK" is given by the city council.

Residential Abernathy is sadly lacking in fast police protection at night. If a policeman is needed in the residential section at night, it might take a long time to contact him. The proper remedy for this would be a police base radio station and a night operator. Until this is obtained, residential Abernathy cannot have prompt police protection at night.

Until this situation is remedied, I suggest that the city council clear the 10-phone fire hook-up for use in certain emergencies requiring a policeman. The caller with such an emergency first should dial for the police.

If they are unable to establish contact, they should be permitted to dial the fire number.

This, of course, would be adding worries for the volunteer firemen. They should be consulted before such an arrangement is given official sanction.

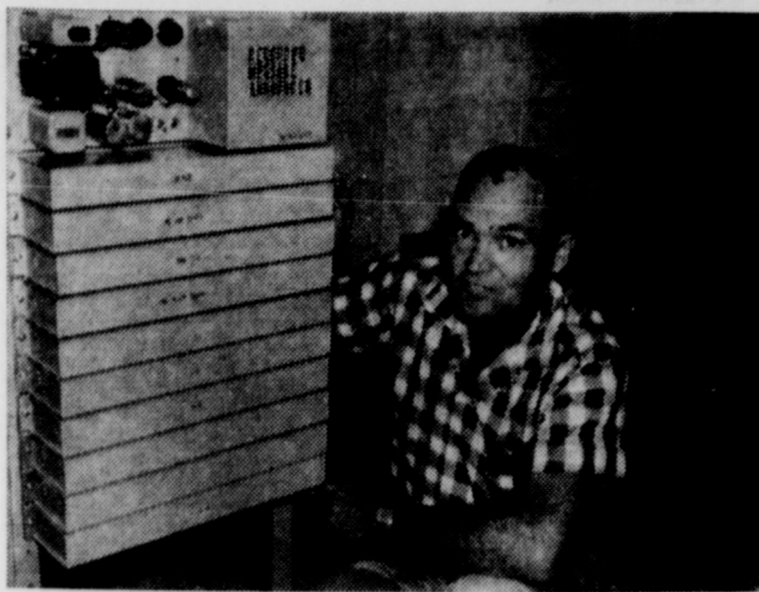
Abernathy has a large number of widows living alone, and dozens of women alone at night while their husbands are working. They deserve faster police protection than now is available. These women should be allowed to call the fire number at night if prowlers are around their homes. Ten or more men converging on a home would have a good chance of catching a prowler or a peeping-tom.

Again, I emphasize, this is only a suggestion to the council. The fire reporting hook-up may never be cleared for such use.

The ten long, narrow units mounted under the tube arrangement are automatic "telephone ringers." When the Abernathy fire telephone number listed in front of the telephone directory is dialed, the home telephones of ten Abernathy volunteer firemen will go into a continuous ring until the telephones are answered. Each of these ten firemen has been assigned to call another member of the department whose telephone is not connected to 10-ringer hook-up.

With this equipment and arrangement, 20 or more firemen will know, in a matter of seconds, the location of a fire. This promptly received information could, under certain circumstances, result in the saving of a life. In any event, it will give the firemen a better opportunity to save property in case of fire.

When reporting a fire, be as calm as possible. Give exact location, street and number, and name of house occupant or business. Don't spend too much time trying to fight the fire before you call the department. Stay on the telephone as long as possible so the ten firemen in the special hook-up will get your message. 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### Abernathy Wins Title In Latin Baseball League

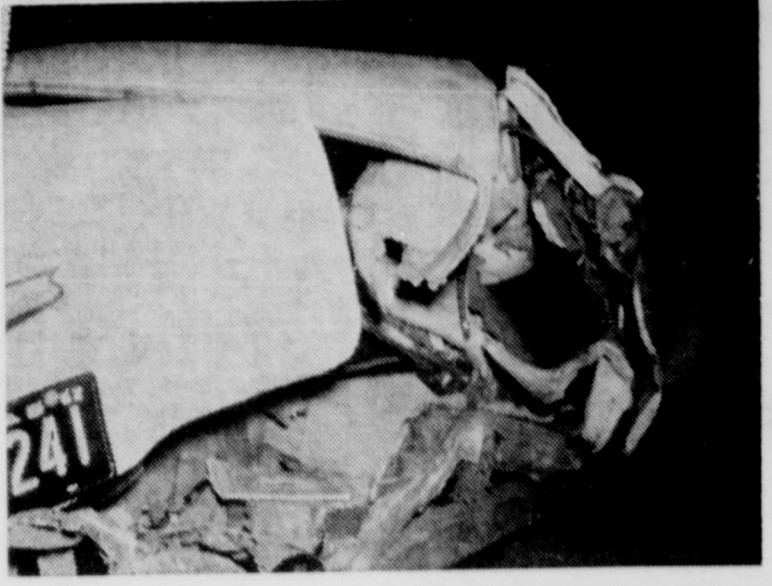
The Abernathy Eagles defeated the Plainview Indians 9-8 in play here Sunday to win the Latin League title. The Eagles had to play two extra innings to win.

### 30 Texans May Die During The Labor Day '72'

Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced the official estimate that 30 persons will be killed in some 3,000 traffic crashes during the upcoming 72-hour Labor Day weekend.

Commenting on Labor Day travel, Garrison said:

"Many Texas families will take advantage of this long summer weekend to take trips prior to the opening of school. As a result, traffic will be heavy and the possibilities of traffic crashes will be increased.

"Because this holiday is so much a family affair, more people will be occupying cars. Thus any traffic accident might result in several casualties. This has been evidenced several times on Texas highways in recent weeks. During one seven-day period in August, three crashes claimed the lives of 20 persons."

Garrison noted that during the past eight weeks traffic deaths have increased from four percent below to two percent above the toll for the corresponding period of last year.

"But the most alarming thing is that the number of fatal traffic accidents is now running four percent above last year's figure," he said. "Experience has shown that in nearly every fatal accident a violation of traffic law has been a major causative factor."

In an effort to focus public attention on the hazards of holiday travel and to compile additional data which will be helpful in improving the State's traffic management program, the Department of Public Safety will conduct "Operation Motorcade" from 12:01 a.m. Saturday, September 1 thru 11:59 p.m. Monday, September 3.

During this period, the department will tabulate all traffic deaths in the State and will issue daily bulletins at 10 a.m., 3 p.m., and 8:30 p.m.

In an all-out effort to insure driver compliance with traffic regulations and to hold traffic crashes to a minimum, the DPS has made plans to augment its

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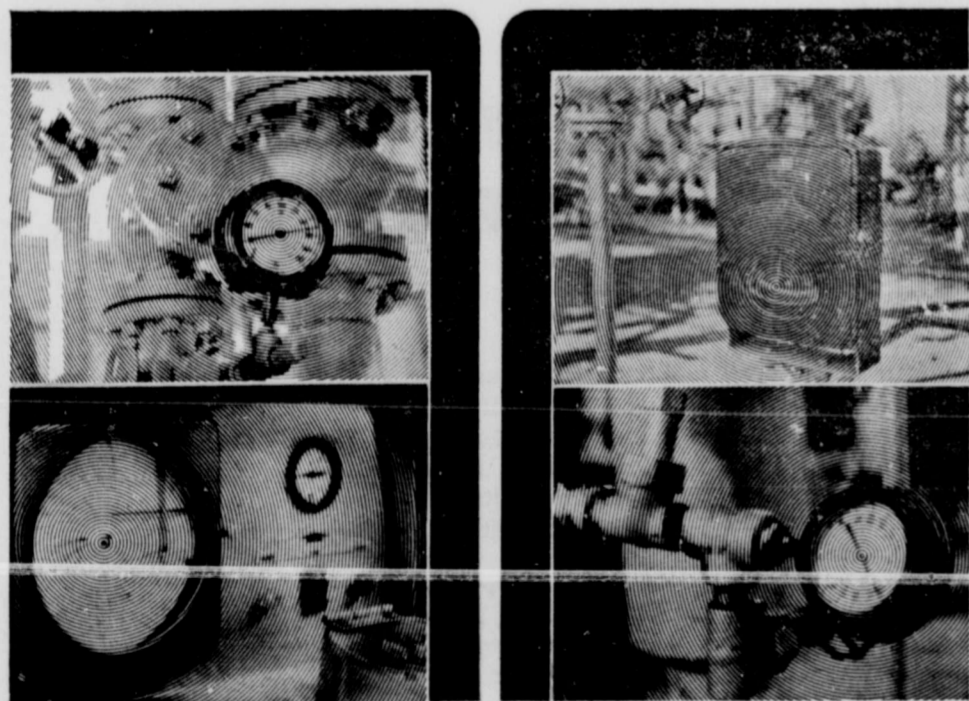

**TRAFFIC FACTS**

Texas traffic deaths for the first half of 1962 were 30 below the first six months of 1961, 1,074 to 1,104, down 3 percent.

Fatal traffic crashes in Texas for the first half of 1962 reached a total of 820, as compared with 805 for the same period in 1961, an increase of 2 percent.

While Texas traffic fatalities were 3 percent below 1961 for the first half of the year, nationwide traffic deaths rose to a new all-time high for the same period, up 7 percent over last year.

June traffic deaths in Texas, tragically, set a new all-time high for traffic deaths in that month, when 254 persons died on Texas streets and highways. Of these, 54, or 20 percent, died in the first three days of the month in 35 fatal crashes.

June, 1962, was the first month since December, 1958, in which Texas traffic deaths exceeded 250 in a single month, a total of 41 months between such "monster months" in Texas traffic.

When June, 1962, traffic deaths in Texas reached 254, they set a new record for such deaths in that month. The previous record was 245 in June, 1957.

Despite the June, 1962, tragedy in Texas traffic, when 254 persons died, the first half of the year showed a 3 percent reduction from

the average of the past six first-half figures, which was 1,104. The first-half for 1962 recorded 1,074 deaths.

Those three first tragic days of June, 1962, recorded 20 percent of all June traffic deaths, and the month of June recorded 24 percent of all traffic deaths during the first half of 1962 in Texas.

During the first half of 1962, traffic deaths were down 3 percent, traffic crashes were up 2.5 percent, traffic injuries were up 14 percent, economic loss was down nearly 1 percent, miles traveled increased 4 percent.

In the first half of 1962, traffic deaths increased 35 percent in Texas towns under 2,500 population, 1 percent in cities over 2,500, but they decreased 24 percent on farm-to-market roads and 5 percent on county roads over last year.

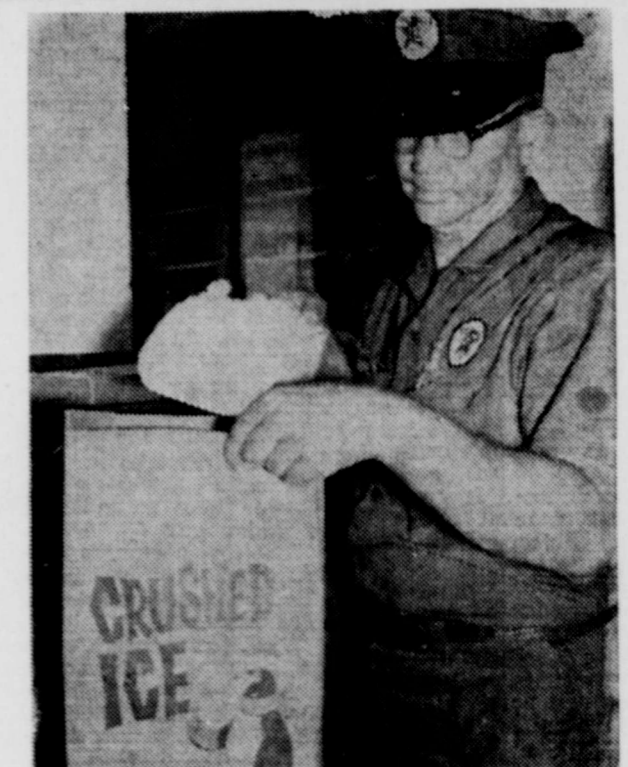

## USDA TIGHTENS RULES ON CCC OWNED COMMODITIES

**NEW REGULATIONS INVOLVING THE TIGHTEST MEASURES YET TAKEN TO GUARD AGAINST SHORTAGES OF COMMODITIES STORED BY THE COMMODITY CREDIT CORPORATION IN COMMERCIAL WAREHOUSES HAVE BEEN ANNOUNCED BY SECRETARY ORVILLE L. FREEMAN.**

### THE REGULATIONS INVOLVING NEW PROCEDURE FOR DEALING WITH SHORTAGES WHICH GENERALLY FALL INTO THREE MAJOR CATAGORIES:

1. If the shortage is small and does not exceed the normal operational loss which can be attributed to shrinkage and handling losses, the warehouseman can make up the shortage through purchase of grain from outside sources. Within a short period of the time after the initial discovery of shortage, an inspector will check the warehouse to determine if stocks are back in balance.
2. If the shortage exceeds the normal margin for operational losses, warehouse examiner will be stationed at the warehouse to determine the cause of the shortage. If it has occurred through no fault of the warehouseman, the examiner will remain at the warehouse until the deficit in stock has been corrected.
3. If it is determined that improper conduct on the part of the warehouseman—such as conversion carelessness of operation, or other liability—has caused an unjustifiable loss of quantity or the quality of the commodity, the USDA will take the following steps:
  - \*...AN EXAMINER WILL BE PLACED AT THE WAREHOUSE TO KEEP OPERATIONS UNDER CONSTANT SUPERVISION.
  - \*...ALL EXISTING CONTRACTS WILL BE SUSPENDED, AND THE WAREHOUSE REMOVED FROM THE APPROVED LIST.
  - \*...ALL PAYMENTS FOR STORAGE AND OTHER CHARGES WHICH ARE CURRENT AND ACCRUER WILL BE STOPPED.
  - \*...THE WAREHOUSEMAN'S BONDING COMPANY WILL BE NOTIFIED OF USDA ACTIONS.
  - \*...ALL GOVERNMENT OWNED GRAIN WILL BE PLACED ON LOADOUT ORDERS.
  - \*...ALL SHIPMENTS FROM THE WAREHOUSE WILL BE STOPPED, EXCEPT THOSE FOR WHICH USDA HAS ISSUED LOADING ORDERS.
  - \* IF THE WAREHOUSEMAN CONTINUES TO REMOVE GRAIN FROM THE WARHOUSE IN VIOLATION OF THESE ORDERS, IMMEDIATE STEPS WILL BE TAKEN TO OBTAIN A COURT INJUNCTION TO STOP THE LOADOUT EXCEPT ON USDA ORDER.

THE SECRETARY SAID THE NEW PROCEDURE WILL APPLY TO ALL COMMODITIES OWNED OR UNDER LOAN FROM CCC.

## Cotton Harvesting, Ginning Changes Are Being Studied

Shifts in the cotton producing areas of Texas and changes in harvesting methods have greatly affected investments in gins, according to the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The report shows that the Blacklands and East Texas have shown the greatest decreases and the High Plains the largest increase in cotton production. The areas with great decline in production have had comparable declines in the number of gins and those areas with increased production have had opportunities for expanded investment in gins, the report explains.

Cotton harvesting has almost completely shifted from hand picking to hand snapping and machine harvesting and thus has created a greater need for cleaning devices in the gin to handle this cotton. This additional equipment has increased the investment that a gin owner must make, the report continues.

There are wide differences in the amount of cotton each gin handles and in the areas of falling production they are not handling enough cotton to be economical, the report points out. The gins in the Blacklands and East Texas are not being fully utilized as are the gins in the High Plains.

These preliminary studies show that model gin plants should be developed as a guide for installing and remodeling gins to get the most efficient operation under different conditions and in different areas of the state.

A farm management short course for adult farmers will be held September 17-21 under the sponsorship of the Abernathy High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Noel Johnson, Superintendent and Mr. Jerry Adams, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Carl G. Anderson, Jr., farm management specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Economics at Texas A & M College, will do the instructing in the course. He is quartered at Texas A & M College.

Mr. Anderson holds two college degrees in Agricultural Economics, a BS degree from Texas A & M and an MS degree from LSU. He conducted research in the field of farm management at LSU. In addition to college work and research work in farm management, Mr. Anderson has had several years of on-the-farm experience.

The short course at Abernathy is scheduled to begin Monday, September 17, at 8:00 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series will be announced at the first meeting. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Anderson will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Jerry Adams.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Noel Johnson, or the vocational ag teacher, Mr. Jerry Adams. An enrollment fee of \$2 will be charged; no fee will be charged for wives accompanying their husbands. Farm Management Short Course Certificates will be presented to each farmer and/or wife who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Anderson states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled, but he expects to cover such subjects as agricultural outlook, keeping and using farm records, income tax management, how social security affects farmers, financing your farm operation, and planning the use of farm resources.

"Short courses in farm management, as well as in other subjects, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between Texas Education Agency and Texas A & M College," stated Bob Craig, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education, who coordinates the program for Texas A & M.

"This cooperative program," states Craig, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef cattle, insect control, farm management, farm electrification, farm welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, and dairy cattle.

Procedure

Mr. Stevenson announced the following registration procedure for high school students:

1. For good reason students will be permitted to change schedules from that made out during pre-registration. All such cases shall be handled in the principal's office.

2. Students will report first to the counter in the principal's outer office where they will pick up their registration cards, book cards, and schedule cards. Schedule cards will show the student's schedule and, in the upper right-hand corner, his or her assigned locker number. New students will make out these two cards at this point and will also obtain an Age, Grade, Residence Certificate to be filled out, signed, and returned by the parents.

3. Students will then proceed to the library to any one of the six registration tables (one for each class period of the day). From this table they will move to any other of the six tables and continue until they have each been to all tables. At these tables schedule cards will be checked, books and covers will be issued and the book numbers will be recorded on the book card and the class card filed in the proper place for the class registered in for the period. Each student will retain his schedule card and registration card until he has completed the six registration tables.

4. Students' final step in the registration procedure will be to check out at the "Check-Out" table. Here a checker will ascertain if a check mark has been placed by each class or activity registered for at each of the six periods. If there is a check by each period on the students' registration card, he will be given his schedule card. The registration card and book card will be re-
