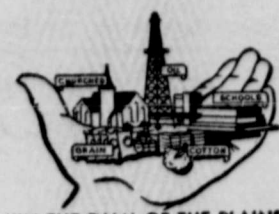

## Minutes Of City Council September Meeting

Sept. 3, 1962

On this date, Sept. 3, 1962, the City Council of the City of Abernathy met at its regular meeting place in the City Hall in a regular session with the following members present: Mayor W. V. Cunningham, Aldermen David Pinson, W. T. Settle, A. B. Myatt, Roy Jones, and Dan Ward. Absent: None.

The minutes of the Aug. 6 and Aug. 14, 1962, council meetings were read and approved as read.

On motion by Alderman Pinson, seconded by Alderman Ward, council unanimously passed Ordinance No. 129 authorizing the arrest, without warrant, of persons found in suspicious places, and under circumstances which would reasonably show that they had or would violate some State Law or some Municipal Ordinance.

On motion by Alderman Settle, seconded by Alderman Myatt, council unanimously passed Ordinance No. 130 prohibiting the keeping of swine within specified districts of the City of Abernathy. The district will read as follows: Beginning at the N.W. corner of Town Section and running East to the Highway 87 East Service road; thence South to 7th St., thence East to city limits, thence South to city limits. This ordinance repeals all conflicting ordinances.

Eids on the garbage packer and truck were not discussed and deferred until a later meeting.

The council then discussed the matter of installing a punch clock and key stations in the mercantile district of Abernathy. On a motion by Alderman Pinson, seconded by Alderman Ward, the City Council voted to have punch clock and key stations installed. Voting "Aye": Alderman Jones, Pinson, Ward, and Myatt. Alderman Settle abstained.

The proposed 1962-1963 budget was presented to the City Council by the City Manager.

The City Manager gave a report on complaints received during the month of August and presented the July financial report to the council.

The council discussed the possibility of changing auditors for the coming year. Following the discussion the City Council agreed to continue using Bolinger, Segars, and Burke of Lubbock, providing they will be available on the audit date.

Lonnie Brownlow met with the council to further discuss his proposed plans on a development program east of the city. No action was taken on this matter by the council.

By an informal agreement, the City Council instructed the City Manager to accept bids on a truck, hoist, and bed suitable for hauling garbage.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

## Antelopes Upset By Petersburg, 13-6

The Abernathy Antelopes played host to the Petersburg Buffaloes here last Friday night and lost their first home game of the season, 13-6.

Petersburg won the choice on the flip of the coin and received the opening kick-off. Stanley Self took Randy Henson's kick on Petersburg's 25 yard line and returned it to his own 35.

From that point Petersburg began a determined ground attack and 9 plays later were on the Abernathy 6 yard line. The big gainers in this drive were a 25 yard sprint on a quick opener over left tackle by Self and a 12 yard keeper by quarterback Mike Loyd. At that point on a fourth down and goal-to-go Abernathy's Tom Ritchey with a fine defensive play stopped Mike Loyd for no gain and the ball went over.

Showing no offensive punch the Antelopes ran 3 plays and gained 6 yards. Don Hughes was forced to punt from his own 12. The ball rolled dead on the home team's 42 yard line. Four plays later the Antelopes received a break when Joe Ybarra recovered Victor Mahagan's fumble on the Antelope 28 yard line. Failing to capitalize on this break the Antelopes were forced to punt 3 plays later after gaining 1 yard.

Hughes' punt was allowed to roll dead again on the Petersburg 30 yard line. Self, demonstrating his agile running ability, dashed for 16 yards on the first scrimmage play. Then the Antelopes,

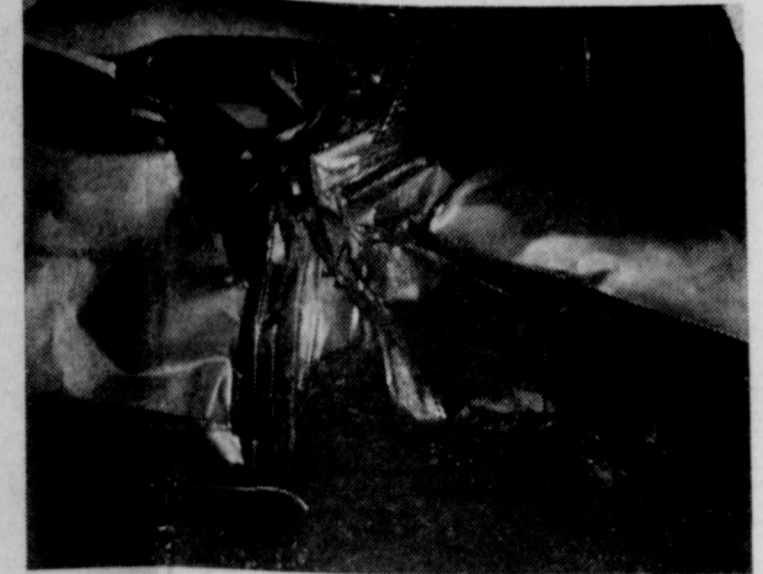

Taking the ensuing kick-off the Buffaloes moved from their own 18 yard line to the Antelope 11 yard line in 6 plays as the half ended.

As the second half began Ritchey returned Self's kick-off from the Antelope 8 yard line to the 38 yard line. The Antelopes led by O'Neil and Ritchey gained more yards in 8 plays than they had made the entire first half, only to bog down due to the fine defensive play of Buffaloes Jim Brashers, Terry Scarborough, and Bobby Pearson. 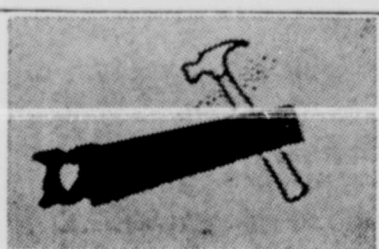

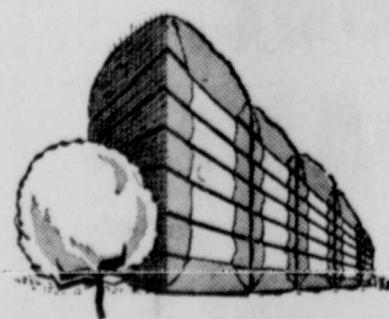

### 10 Die In Hale Rural Accidents During August

The Highway Patrol investigated 15 rural accidents in Hale County during the month of August according to Sergeant D. S. Lawson, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for ten persons killed, twenty-five persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$14,340.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for Hale County from January through August of 1962 shows a total of 107 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were 19 persons killed and 91 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$76,337.00.

The veteran patrol supervisor stated, "With fall and winter approaching, now is the time to have vehicles checked in preparation for the cold winter ahead."

The Vehicle Inspection Program in Texas has proved itself to be a valuable tool in reducing accidents on Texas streets and highways. All vehicles registered in this state are required to be inspected once a year, he added.

Five of the ten people killed in traffic accidents in Hale County during August were from Abernathy. They were Mr. and Mrs. Billy Joe Owens and their three small children, killed along with a Hale Center man and his young daughter. The seven died in a collision of a pickup and butane truck nine miles north and four miles east of Abernathy Aug. 11.

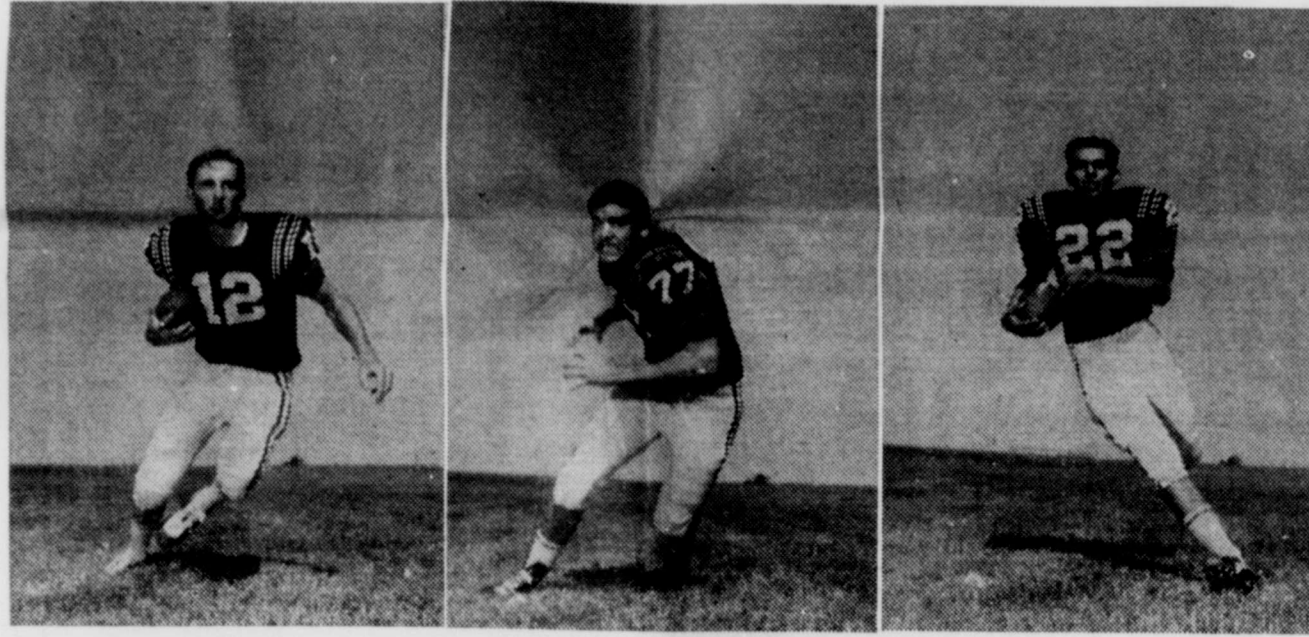

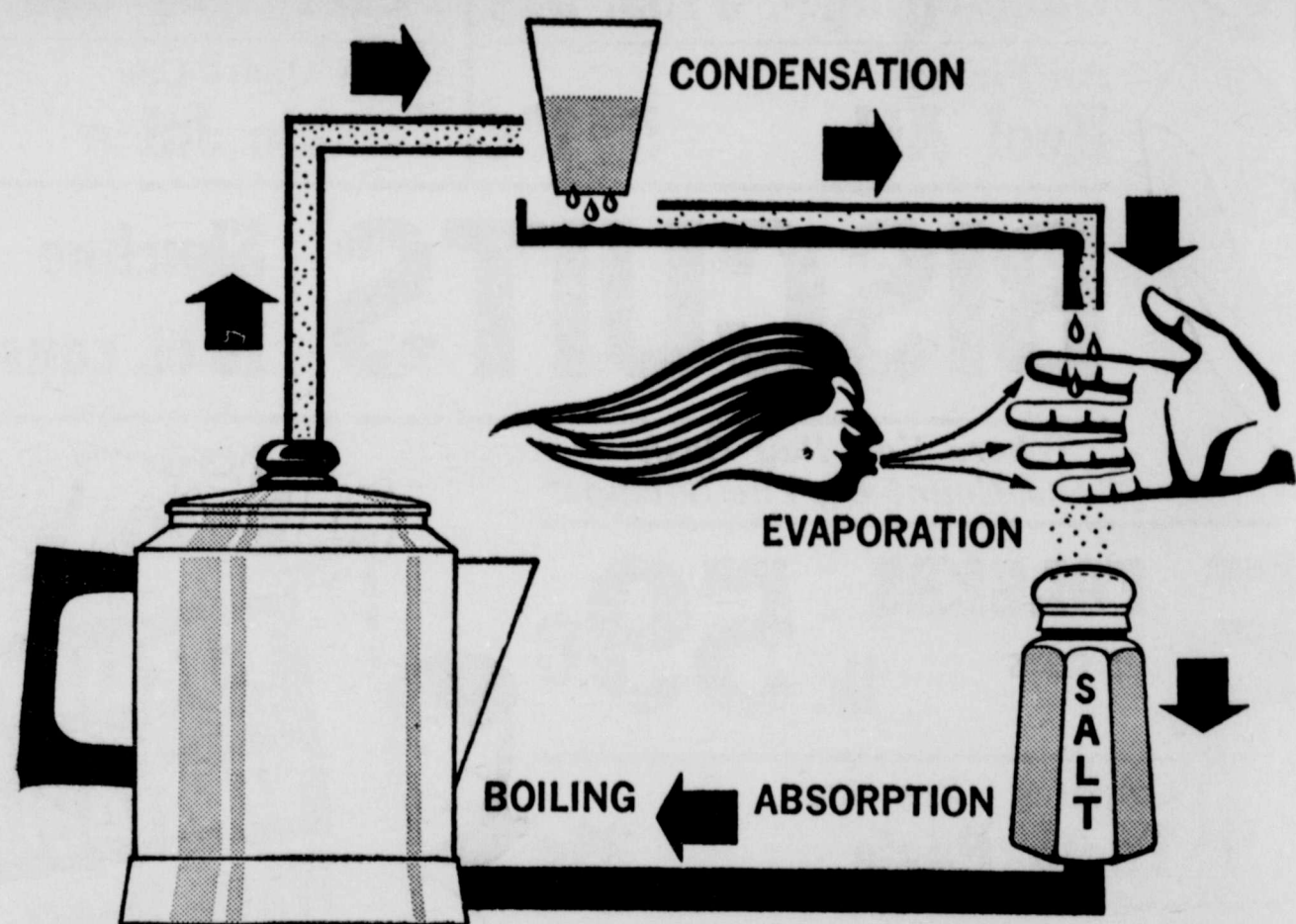

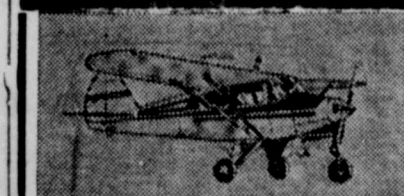
