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## TALK — In Print

Politically, the days are numbered for the person who votes for the man instead of the party. When voter registration replaces the poll tax, the independent voter will be forced to align with one party or the other.

As a political independent, I will have to make some readjustments when voter registration comes to Texas.

It's doubtful that either party would want me as a full-time member, because I cannot fully agree with Democrats or Republicans.

I have been accused of being a Republican. Be that as it may, I would not vote for New York Governor Nelson Rockefeller for president if he and JFK were in the election this year. Also, I prefer Kennedy over Republican presidential hopeful George Romney of Michigan. Turn of events could change my views by 1964 or 1968.

Each party has its liberal and conservative elements. I have more in common with a conservative Democrat than I have with a liberal Republican.

In fact, I have found myself, in recent weeks, in accord with views of some very liberal Democrats. I am not a supporter of Senator Ralph Yarborough, but I agree with his views on the government give-away of the Telstar communication satellite.

It was developed with several billion dollars of taxpayers' money, and turned over to big business, at the insistence of a president who supposedly is "anti-business." I am opposed to the Federal government being in business but, for the present, I believe the government should own and control everything connected with the taxpayers' investment in space research and development.

Among other senators joining Mr. Yarborough in opposing the Telstar give-away were ultra-liberals Paul Douglas of Illinois, Wayne Morse and Mrs. Maurine Neuberger, both of Oregon. As a conservative, I find myself in strange company, but it so happens that I agree with them on the Telstar deal.

Also, I appreciate Senator Yarborough's efforts to secure an increase from \$600 to \$800 a person for income tax exemption. Really, it should be \$1,200 exemption, but that's hoping for too much for the wage-worker who bears a heavy Federal income tax load.

Mr. Yarborough says exemption increases chances seem fairly good. There's no complaint from me on the heavy appropriation by this Congress for national defense. Dwight Eisenhower was critical of the defense budget in a partisan speech made before a gathering of Republicans. With all the valid areas for criticism available, why would he single out big defense spending, which most Americans feel is needed for national security?

Strangely enough, I was in favor of President Kennedy's tax reform proposals down the line as the administration wanted. After Congress finished hacking it to pieces, big business, as usual, was the winner. The most disgusting aspect of the action taken by Congress was to allow big business a tax deduction for lobby activities.

Except for appearing before committees, lobbying should be outlawed on both the national and state levels. It should be made a Federal offense for a person engaged in lobbying to contact, or make an effort to contact, a legislator outside of a committee room or at any time other than during a committee meeting. Although their activities supposedly are curtailed by certain laws, persons engaged in lobbying can make some legislators forget that their primary obligation is to the people they represent in Congress.

### Strong Area Sugar Plea Is Presented

A strong presentation of the case for sugar beet acreage for the Panhandle-South Plains area was made in Washington September 25, before the director of the Sugar Division, U. S. Department of Agriculture. Applications for acreage allotments for the years 1962, 1963, 1964 and 1965 were heard.

Hereford and Plainview are aspirants for enough acreage to warrant construction of sugar mills. Hereford has interest of Holly Sugar Co., second largest beet sugar producer in the nation, and Plainview is among areas Great Western Sugar Co., largest of all, has shown interest.

Hereford is seeking supporting acreage to have a sugar refinery in operation in 1964. They will present Holly as in contractual relationship for construction in the Hereford area.

Plainview area hopes Great Western will be in position to join them at the hearing with a declaration of desire to build here.

Supporting the Plainview application are the High Plains Sugar Beet Growers, Inc., through its president Homer Garrison, and directors Joe J. Barton and Loren West, Abernathy; Richard P. Stovall, Floydada. Also J. M. Collins, C of C industrial chairman, and Charles Young, executive official, and J. B. Wheeler, president, were in attendance. Assistant in presentation was Graddy Tunnell, attorney, and committee member, Cloyce Terrell, experienced grower, with others, including a delegation from Seminole, also planned to assist the High Plains organization.

Washington Hotel was Plainview headquarters.

Location of acreage for new growers, through existing mills, or in areas where facilities will be built, and, in effect, location of mills will depend on this hearing. It will be effective in allocating the 65,000 tons of domestic sugar quota each year for the next 4 1/2 years remaining of the term of the newly enacted five-year sugar law.

### Vaccination Set Here For Dogs Oct. 4

City Manager Charles Norwood has announced that arrangements have been made to have Dr. Moore, a veterinarian from Lubbock, at Abernathy City Hall Thursday, October 4, between 5:30 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. to vaccinate dogs for rabies. The charge for the vaccination will be \$2.00 per dog.

During the vaccination, city officials will be on hand to issue 1962 dog tags. Ordinance No. 85 provides that every dog owner or keeper residing within the city limits shall pay an annual tax of \$2.00 for each male dog and \$3.00 for each female dog; where by each dog owner or keeper will be provided with a dog tag which is to be securely fastened around the neck of the dog.

In no event, the ordinance states, shall a dog tag be furnished until each owner or keeper furnishes a vaccination certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian stating the dog has been vaccinated against rabies.

All dog owners are urged to avail themselves of this opportunity.

## Antelopes Blast Owls 41-0

The Abernathy Antelopes, displaying an inspired defense and a devastating offense, defeated the Hale Center Owls 41-0 for their second win of the season last Friday night at Hale Center.

The Antelopes wasted little time after taking the opening kickoff

and in 10 plays marched 68 yards for the first score of the ball game. The six points were racked up by halfback Tom Ritchey as he scooted 21 yards around right end on a quick pitch from quarterback Bobby Pettit. Randy Henson added the point after from placement and with 7 minutes 58 seconds left to go in the first quarter, the Antelopes led 7-0.

The Owls took the ensuing kickoff and were stopped by the fine defensive play of the Antelope line, led by tackle Billy Barrick and linebacker Pat O'Neil. Forced to punt, the Owls' Sid Berry punted 64 yards to the Antelope 22 yard line. Ritchey returned the punt three yards.

On the first play, quarterback Pettit, doing a magnificent job of faking, wheeled around his left end and sped untouched 75 yards down the sideline into the end zone for the second Antelope touchdown. Henson's attempt to kick the extra point hit the crossbar and fell to the ground, and the Antelopes led 13-0.

Owens Blocks Punt  
The Owls returned the kickoff to their own 34 and moved for two first downs on short ground gains before being forced to punt again. Jim Owens' aggressive defensive play enabled him to block Berry's punt and the fleet-footed Don Hughes picked up the loose ball.

pigskin and raced 40 yards for the third Antelope touchdown with 2 minutes 4 seconds left in the first quarter. Henson added the extra point kick and the Antelopes were out front 20-0.

Hale Center took the kickoff and from their own 33 yard line moved to the Antelope 42. On a second-and-four situation Billy Barrick pounced on an Owl fumble as the first quarter ended.

After two running attempts and a pass that fell incomplete netted only five yards, the Antelopes were forced to punt for the first time in the ball game. Don Hughes' kick sailed 40 yards and the Owls took over on their own 36 yard line. With the aid of a 15 yard personal foul penalty against Abernathy and an eight-yard pass from Brooks to Flores, the Owls moved to the Abernathy 36 where a fine defensive play by John Reagan, Joe Ybarra and the line held the Owls and the Antelopes took over on downs. Again on the first play from scrimmage Tom Ritchey had the Antelope fans on their feet as he squirmed and twisted around left end, jerking loose from two would-be tacklers, and pranced 64 yards for the fourth touchdown. Charlie Stallings booted the extra point and the score read 27-0.

Taking the following kickoff, the Owls made one of their deepest penetrations of the night as they moved from their own 37 yard line in nine plays to the Antelope 18 yard line, only to see their drive for a score stymied as Don Hughes fell on Oliver's fumble and the Antelopes got possession again. The Antelopes being able to gain only 6 yards in three plays, Hughes punted to the Abernathy 44 yard line. On the first play, Brooks passed 25 yards to Flores and the Owls were deep in Antelope territory once again.

With fourth down facing the Owls on Abernathy's 14, Antelope sophomore John Reagan hit quarterback Brooks' arm, deflecting a pass to the left flat and enabling alert defensive end Don Hughes to pick it off and dash 86 yards uncontested for the fifth Abernathy touchdown of the night. Stallings again added the extra point, and

with 2 minutes 10 seconds left in the first half the Antelopes were out front 34-0.

The Owls controlled the ball for the remainder of the first half, but were unable to score. Incidentally, the confusion at half-time as the players ran to the dressing room and had to be called back for one more play was caused by the person running the clock who did not detect the official's signal for time out with approximately three seconds left in the half.

The Antelope substitutes (the few that we have) playing most of the last half were able to contain the Owl attack. Highlights of the second half included a fumble recovery by John Reagan resulting from a bone-crushing tackle by Billy Barrick. The last Antelope score came in the fourth quarter as Tom Ritchey passed from the Owl 37 yard line to Hughes, who gathered in the pass on the 20 and scampered into the end zone. Stallings again added

the extra point, and the Antelope scoring machine registered its 41st point of the night.

Late in the fourth quarter, Stallings made a nice 14 yard gain as the result of possibly the best block of the night as sophomore guard Jim Owens cut down three Owl pursuers. Some fine gainers were also turned in by Mickey Pettit and Jake Mallow.

**Teamwork Prevailed**  
The outstanding defensive players of the night for the Antelopes would have to be the entire team led by Billy Barrick, Joe Ybarra, Pat O'Neil, Don Hughes and John Reagan. Offensively, halfback Tom Ritchey, quarterback Bobby Pettit, and fullback Joe Ybarra were constant threats.

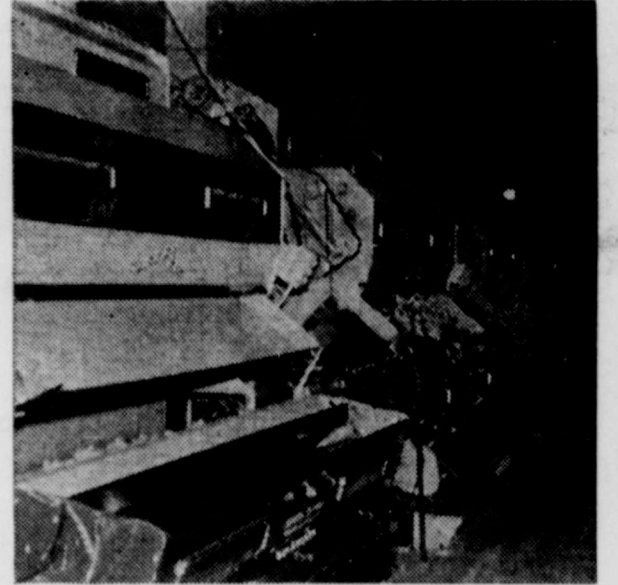

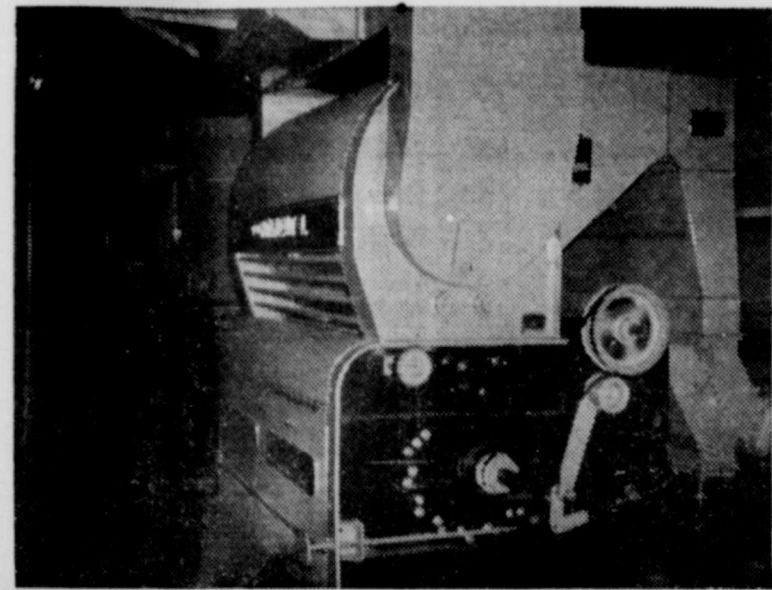
