

It should be made a Federal offense for a person engaged in lobbying to contact, or make an effort to contact, a legislator outside of a committee room or at any time other than during a committee meeting. Although their activities supposedly are curtailed by certain laws, per-sons engaged in lobbying can make some legislators forget that
