



### Harp Explains Grain Bill

Elbert Harp, local farmer and resident of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, explained early this week that the extension of the present farm bill in regard to grain sorghum should advantageous to local farmers. Had the bill not been extended, a bill the same as the 1958 law would have been put into effect, Harp said. Harp compared the

sorghum acreage as an example, in the following manner: 1958 law - 300 acres at 5,000 pounds yield per acre, if sold at \$1.25 cwt., would amount to \$18,-

two bills, using 300 acres of grain

1962 Feed Grain Program-300 acres, less 20 percent layout, would be 240 acres at 5,000 pounds ribbons from the Panhandle South ears of corn; wheat seeds; 10 per acre. 



Variety, Fertilizer, Soil Test Important the forces of hail. In Small Grains

najor factors in the production of wheat or any small grain, reports Associate County Agent, Charlie Cypert. Adapted varieties, adequate fertilization, and efficent water utilization are all part f economical production of small

Selection of wheat varieties pose omewhat of a problem to many farmers since there are so many varieties available. There continte to be many questions concerning strains of Triumph wheat. For the most part, these strains are very similar, and, when grown under the same conditions, tend to be much alike. Several years ago the Texas Station approved certification of Improved Triumph. Tests since have proved this to be the best in yield trials.

Other new varieties which possibly will be marked in this area are Rodco, Ottawa, Omaha, Warand Gaines. However, these varieties need several years more testing before they can be recom-mended for the High Plains.

In Hale County area, Tascosa, in many farmers' opinions, is still the Number 1 wheat. Others acceptable varieties include Coman-che, Concho, Kaw, Crockett, and Bison. However, Tascosa is the one variety which combines high yield, shatter resistance, strong straw and high quality. Many farmers will plant Tascosa pri-marily because of its resistance to hail damage, Cypert reports. This is due primarily to the fact that the glumes are much strong-

er than the other varieties and are able to hold the grain against

Barley varieties suited for the Hale County area are somewhat limited. Meimi, a new Colorado Variety selection is one of the variety, is winterhardy and pro-Plains area. However, it has not been adequately tested, and under some conditions, shatter rather badly. Rogers, a relatively new Oklahoma variety has produced outstanding yields on the High Plains. It is recommended for all areas of the High Plains and has produced well in the Hale County area. New Mexico Winter, a variety which has been grown in variety which has been grown in this area for years, has proved acceptable. However, many samples of New Mexico Winter have been found to be nothing but Wintex and in many cases been susceptible to lodging and shattering. In view of these factors, it is recommended that farmers plant Rogers or Meimi.

Oat varieties acceptable to Hale County conditions include Mustang or Cimarron, with Cimarron having the greatest resistance to winter killing.

The selection of the best adapted variety without considering a sound fertilization program is of little value. The entire operation must be planned. A fertilization program based on a soil test recommendation is the ebst way in which to receive the most from your fertilizer dollar spent. These tests may be made from a soil sample submitted to the Extension Soil Testing Laboratory at Lubbock. This test costs \$2.00 and information sheets and soil car-tons are available at the Extension Agents' Office.



### Weed District Now Checking For Noxious Weed Seed

The Hale County Noxious Weed Control District is again soliciting full cooperation of every Hale county citizen in a drive to eradicate one of the counties most erious noxious weeds, bindweed. The district wishes to remind each and every person that moves any type of machinery carrying noxious weed seed into or from place to place within the county, s a violation of the State Law supporting a pentalty not to exceed \$250 for each offense.

The district is now making spot checks of all machinery within the county, especially combines and other harvest machinery, for noxious weed seed, authority granted by the Texas State Ligislature, House Bill 288.

The district requests that all machinery operators have their machines cleaned free of all noxious weed seed, by the approved method of cleaning, water under pressure.

The district also requests that all land owners refuse entrance to all non-clean machines and that representative of the Lubbock all machines be cleaned before fal Security Office will be in leaving the farm or before moving from one farm to another or oom at 10:00 a.m. on each Tues- from one portion of the farm to

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
