At School Cafeteria, 1 to 5 P. M. Sabin Oral Vaccine For Type II Polio To Be Given Here October 14

Type II of the Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine will be given Sunday, October 14, from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. at Abernathy school cafeteria.

The Type II vaccine has been given to millions of Texans of all ages without incidence of ill effects. Doctors Kenneth Gregory and M. F. Friddy wish to assure the people of this area that the Type II vaccine is perfectly safe and urge everyone, regardless of age, to take advantage of this immunization against Type II polio.

Each person who took the Type I vaccine received an immunization card showing name, date and type of vaccine. Persons wishing to take the Type II vaccine must bring these cards with them so that the date and second type may be marked on their permanent immunization card. Anyone who did not receive the Type I vaccine may take the Type II and get Type I at a later date.

This phase of the program is being sponsored by Abernathy Parent-Teacher Association. The doctors, nurses, and pharmacists will again assist in the administering of the vaccine.

There will be no charge for this Type II dosage; however, donations will be appreciated to help cover the cost of the vaccine.

Mr. Thomas discussed the farming outlook briefly, stating that more people need more information about farming and the risks a farmer has to take in farming.

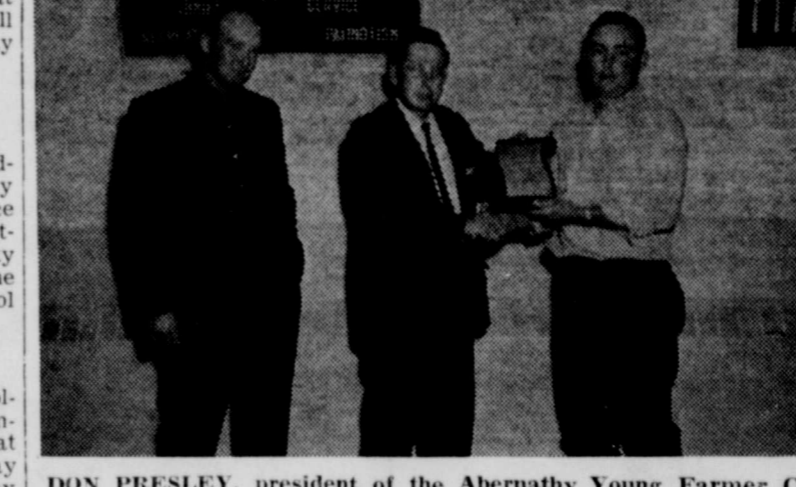
In closing, he congratulated the Abernathy chapter on a fine job done so far, and urged them to continue in their outstanding program.

School Enrollment Report Given Here

School Superintendent Noel Johnson reported that the enrollment for the Abernathy Public Schools, including East Ward and students from Abernathy going to Dunbar High School in Lubbock, totaled 1,286 at the end of the first month of school.

There are 664 students in the first five grades at Abernathy Elementary School. Of that number, 42 percent are Latin Americans, it was pointed out. In Junior High School, there are 212 students, and in Abernathy High School, there are 229 students.

Sixty-six students make up the first eight grades in East Ward, and there are 16 students from here going to Dunbar.

Antelopes Down Frenship, 31-0

The Abernathy Antelopes, behind the flying heels of Tom Ritchey, ground to their fourth victory of the season last Friday night as they completely outclassed the Frenship Tigers to the tune of 31 to 0.

The Antelopes won the coin toss and chose to receive the opening kickoff. Tom Ritchey returned the kickoff 31 yards and the Lopes were off and running, taking only 12 plays and 5 minutes, 54 seconds to move from their own 46 yard line across the Tiger goal line, the Antelopes sent Ritchey bouncing over from the Tiger six for the first touchdown of the night. Charlie Stallings' attempt to add the extra point from placement was blocked and the Antelopes led 6 to 0.

Ronald Wittie was able to return the ensuing kick off only 6 yards as Bobby Pettit stopped him on the Tiger 26 yard line. With the aid of two off-side penalties by the over-eager Antelope line, and a neat pass play from Mike Burgamy to Royce Wittie, netting 49 yards, the Tigers found themselves with a 1st and 10 situation on the Antelope 17 yard line. Any glimpse of pay dirt by the Tigers was quickly erased by the fine

defensive play of the Antelope line led by Billy Barrick, Pat O'Neil and Bill Lee as the Antelopes took over on downs on their own 27 yard line.

After a first down was picked up, resulting from 2-yard plunge by Joe Ybarra and a nine yard dash by Pat O'Neil, O'Neil took a pitch-out and started around his own 50 yard line, he fired a strike and Tom out-raced the slower Tigers into the end zone for his second 6-pointer of the night. Stallings' kick for the extra point was blocked and with 1 minute, 54 seconds left in the first quarter the Antelopes led 12 to 0.

Henson's kickoff rolled into the end zone and the Tigers took over on their own 20 yard line. Able to gain only 7 yards in 3 plays, the Tigers were forced to punt. Parham's kick sailed 42 yards.

The Antelopes using 7 plays, the most outstanding being a 32 yard sprint around left end by Pat O'Neil, were held on downs and forced to give up the pigskin on the Tiger 30 yard line.

The Tigers moved to the Antelope 17 yard line only to have this drive halted by a fine interception by Eddie Davis. Moving from their own 3 yard line to the fifty in 5 plays with Ritchey pick-

ing up 44 of the yards in 3 carries, Pat O'Neil took a pitch-out around his left end, cut down the side line and raced to the Tiger 20 where Eddie Davis made an outstanding block to spring him loose and into the end zone for the third Antelope counter of the night. Stallings' kick was wide and the score read—Antelopes 18, Tigers 0.

No scoring threat was made by either team in the remaining 3 minutes 46 seconds left in the first half.

The Tigers took the second half kickoff and moved from their 35 to their 41 only to see Don Hughes intercept Burgamy's pass on the Tiger 49 yard line. Ybarra and O'Neil carried the ball to the Tiger 21 where Ritchey's number was dialed again and he waltzed into the end zone with 7:15 left in the 3rd quarter. Henson's attempt to kick the point failed and Abernathy led 24 to 0.

After two exchanges of the ball, Davis fell on a fumble on the Tiger 7 yard line. Three running plays lost 3 yards, then Ritchey hit Ybarra in the end zone and the Antelopes led 30 to 0. Henson's kick was good and with 7 minutes left in the game the Antelopes had their 4th victory wrapped up to the tune of 31 to 0.

The Antelopes will entertain the

Morton Indians, who stand 2 won, 2 lost, 1 tied for the season, this Friday night on the local gridiron.

News From The High Plains Water District

Now that the grain sorghum crop is being harvested in most areas of the Southern High Plains and the cotton crop soon will be ready for harvest, the staff of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District is hoping that each irrigation farmer who has been plagued with "tailwater" problems this summer will commence to do some real hard thinking about what he can do to better control his water next year.

A Water District spokesman says, "If the farmer waits until it's time to bed up his land next spring, we fear he won't have sufficient time in which to genuinely consider the various methods that others are using successfully to retain irrigation 'tailwater' on their farms."

He continued, "Many methods work well in the mixed in sandland areas—borders at the row ends to retain irrigation water to give it an opportunity to soak into the soil, shortening the length of irrigation runs, and reducing the size of syphon tubes all seem to work successfully."

"In the hardland areas, however, the problem is not quite so simple. The tighter soils must have water on them for a longer period of time to obtain the penetration necessary for supplying adequate crop moisture. If the land is not extremely level, then the result usually is a large amount of 'tailwater' at the bottom of the field."

The Water District staffer stated, "We have seen some who farm under these conditions reduce the amount of 'tailwater' by simply changing the direction of their rows so that they do not run directly down the slope. We don't necessarily suggest that they be put on a perfect contour, but merely reduce the grade so less 'tailwater' will result."

He continued, "By adding such things as cotton burrs and grain sorghum stubble to the soil, the water intake rate on the heavy soils may be increased. These things all help."

"We have also seen many in the hardland areas use re-circulation systems to carry excess irrigation water from the bottom

"The High Plains Water District is ready to help anyone plan for minimizing their 'tailwater' problems. We hope that our services will be called on and used by our people."

Issuing New Auto Stickers In Texas

AUSTIN—Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced a new-type motor vehicle inspection sticker is now available for the new inspection year beginning September 1.

"The only thing new about the inspection this year is the sticker itself," he said. "This new sticker is a dry mount decal which we believe will adhere regardless of weather conditions and one which has been used very successfully in other states."

More than five million vehicles registered in the state are required by law to be inspected at one of the 5,000 official inspection stations between this date and April 16, 1963. Owners of vehicles not displaying the current inspection sticker after that date will be in violation of the law.

Garrison urged motorists to get their vehicles inspected as early as possible, and pointed out:

"With hard summer driving coming to an end, fall is an excellent time to have vehicles checked in preparation for the winter months."

In announcing the new inspection period, the public safety director said the Vehicle Inspection Program in Texas has proved itself to be a valuable tool in reducing accidents on Texas streets and highways.

CHURCH CONFERENCE SLATED FOR TEXAS A&M

College Station—The role of the church in or modern society will be discussed by outstanding educators, laymen, and clergymen during the 17th annual Town and Country Church Conference. It will be held October 17-19 in the Memorial Student Center on the Texas A&M College campus, explains Dr. Bardin H. Nelson, program coordinator and professor in the College's Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology.

Under this year's conference theme, "The Dignity of Man in Town and Country Living," emphasis will be placed on youth development and dignity and purposeful family living, according to Nelson. Workshop sessions will consider problems of the community and the influence of church activities in youth development and family life stability, he adds.

The conference will feature such speakers as Dr. George J. Beto, director, Texas Department of Corrections; Dr. Marvin T. Judy, School of Theology, Southern Methodist University; Mrs. Eloise T. Johnson, family life specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service; Mrs. Florence O. Woltman, president, Oldham Little Church Foundation; Dr. Carl Clark, professor, Rural Church Department, Southwestern Theological Seminary; Dr. Tyrus R. Timm, head, Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology, Texas A&M College, and others, Nelson states.

"The program committee has recognized that our institutions have an increasing responsibility today in helping every citizen to develop his maximum capacity for service," continues Nelson. In conference sessions the attention of church leadership will be directed to those areas in which deficiencies are apparent and methods of strengthening the social structure will be explored.

"The church representatives and lay leaders will seek to define those activities that might bring about a richer, more fruitful Christian life for Texans in every vocation and throughout every community," Nelson concludes.

It's the Law in TEXAS



Watch It! School Children

Thousands of school children are now trooping back to school throughout Texas. Many of them are transported by school buses. Most people are careful when approaching a school bus which may be standing beside the road or school to pick up school children or allow them to alight. However, we have already had some very bad accidents this year because a child or motorist, or both, were careless at that very time.

Most Texans are aware of the law which requires a driver to come to a complete stop when overtaking from the rear a school bus which has stopped to receive or discharge school children. After stopping immediately behind the bus, he is then allowed by law to proceed past same at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children.

What many persons do not realize is the very same rule applies when MEETING a stopped school bus. While everyone is interested in protecting our children, unthinking violators of this simple safety rule greatly outnumber those who comply. Failure to follow the law in this case can lead to fine up to \$300.00 even when no accident occurs.

Following an accident in which some child is injured or killed, the penalties are naturally much more serious.

Although the above rule does not always apply when passing a stopped school bus in a business or residential district of a town, the necessity for extreme caution even in those locations is obvious.

When it comes to overtaking and passing moving vehicles, exercise of ordinary common sense will generally keep a driver within the law. For instance, when passing a car it is only common sense to proceed on past it a safe distance before cutting back to the right side of the highway. Also, any driver would realize the danger of increasing his speed while another is attempting to pass him.

In the same category is the prohibition against passing on the right under most ordinary conditions. Of course, you may legally pass on the right in a few specific instances, such as when the vehicle overtaken is making or about to make a left turn, or upon a one-way street with two or more lanes, or upon a four-lane highway.

However, our traffic laws state that when passing on the right is allowed, it shall be done only under conditions permitting such movement in safety. And, in no event should such passing be accomplished by driving off the pavement or main-traveled portion of the roadway.

Familiar to all are the no-passing zones designated by yellow lines placed to one side of the center line on our highways. Not so well known are the restrictions against crossing the center line when approaching within 100 feet of or when traversing any intersection or railroad grade crossing.

A driver should never cross the center line of a highway when the left side of the road is not clearly visible and free of oncoming traffic. Generally speaking, when not engaged in passing another vehicle, one should not drive to the left of the roadway.

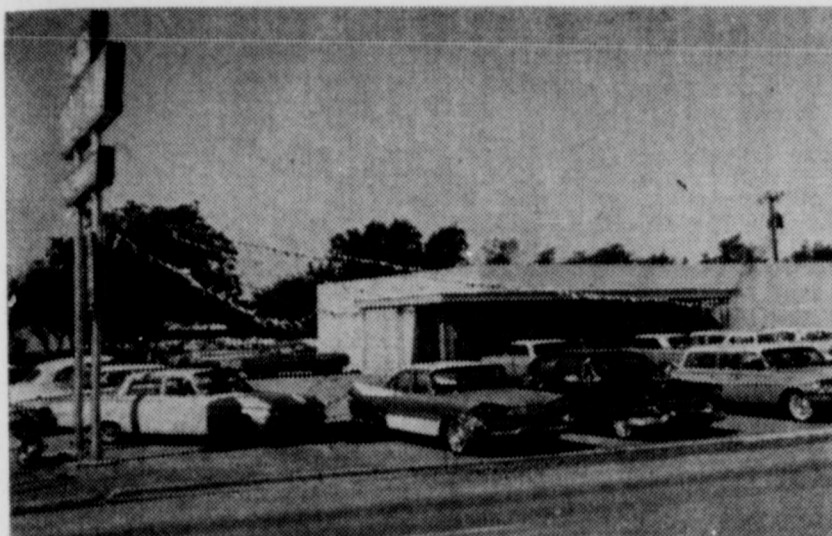

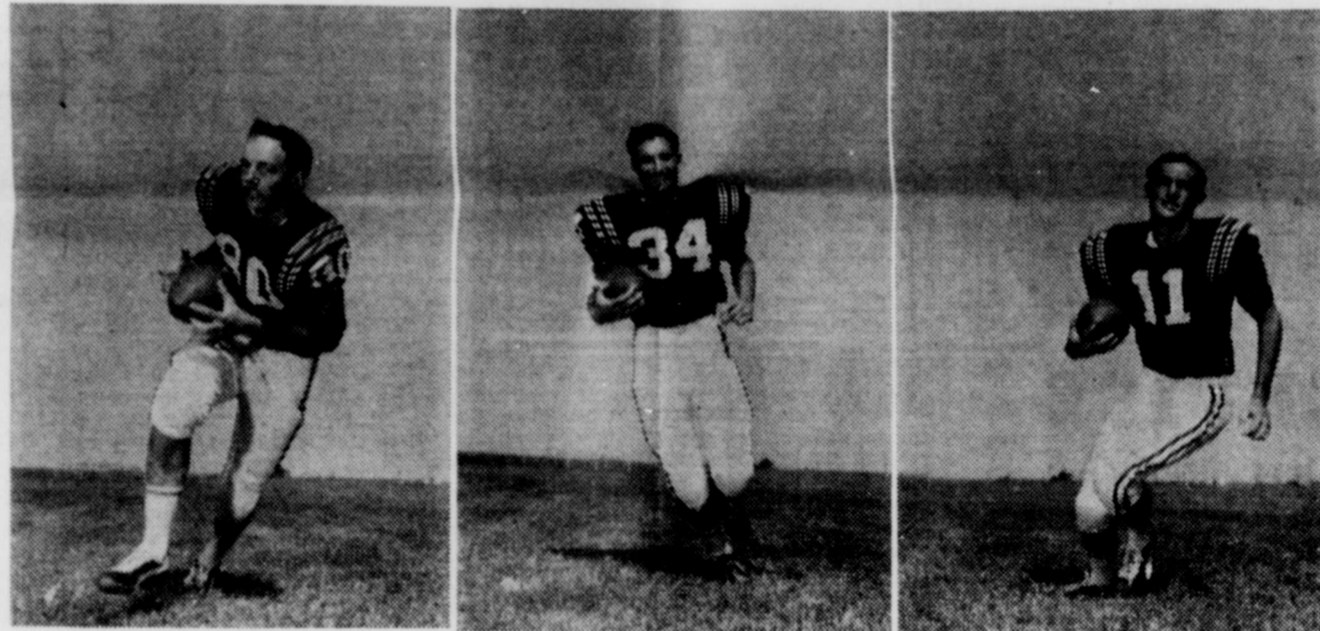

No sedimentation premiums will apply to any of the varieties listed.

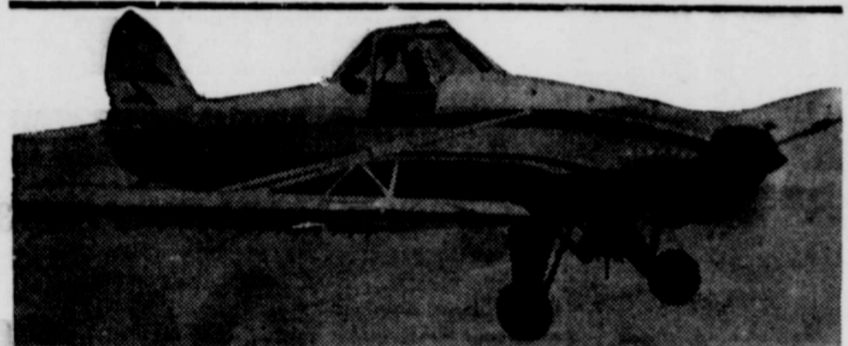

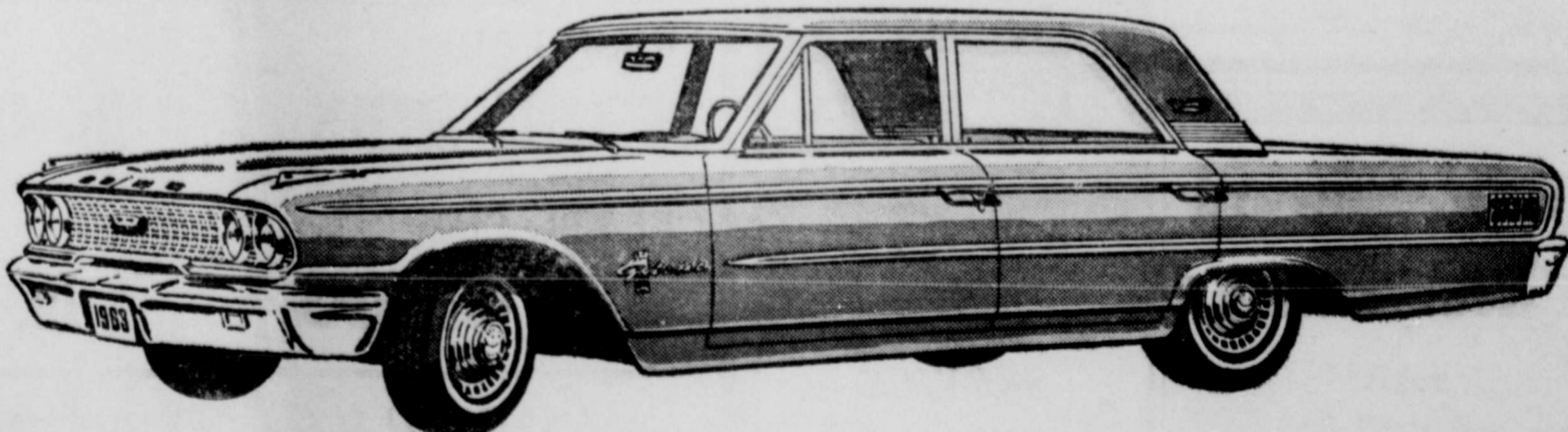
