

Texas Masons Level School Cornerstone

The cornerstone of a \$350,000 high school and auditorium being erected in Fort Worth for Masonic Home and School of Texas will be leveled Saturday, November 3, in a program involving prominent Masons from throughout the state.

The announcement was made by George R. M. Montgomery of Fort Worth, president of Masonic Home's board of directors. He said Robert L. Dillard, Jr., of Dallas, Grand Master of the Masonic Grand Lodge of Texas and president of the Dallas Independent School District board of trustees, will level the cornerstone in a traditional ceremony beginning at 11 a.m.

Third major construction project in Masonic Home's long-range expansion program (others are the chapel, dedicated 1960, and the infirmary, dedicated 1962), the high school and auditorium will be a one-story red brick and glass structure linked by a large lobby.

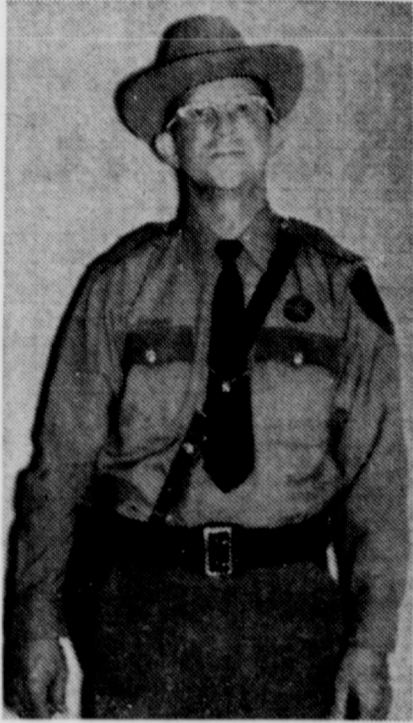
Completion is expected in time for the start of school in September, 1963.

The auditorium will seat 500, while the classroom area is designed for 200 students with provision for expansion to 500. Included besides general classrooms will be specially designed and supplied rooms for arts and crafts, orchestra and chorus, homemaking, typing and science. Complete summer and winter air-conditioning will be installed.

The structure will serve approximately 195 students presently at Masonic Home; children and grandchildren of Texas Masons whose parents are deceased, divorced, separated or in some way unable to provide for them properly.

The formal Masonic leveling program November 3 will be under the auspices of Fort Worth Lodge No. 148, A.F. & A.M., original donor of the 212 acres on which Masonic Home and School is located.

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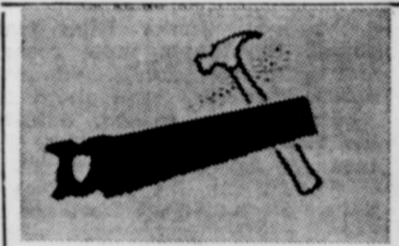

Wheat Farmers Are To Sign Up Through Dec. 14

Winter wheat farmers may sign up to participate in the special voluntary 1963 wheat program authorized by the Food and Agriculture Act of 1962 between October 15 and December 14, Secretary of Agriculture Orville

L. Freeman announced.

The legislation raises the support price on 1963-crop wheat to \$2.00 to farmers who participate in the special program. The 18-cent-per-bushel support increase will be paid in-kind based on the normal production of the farm's harvested average. The voluntary program, Secretary Freeman said, gives wheat farmers an opportunity to continue to make needed adjustments and thus protect the gain

made this year under the 1962 program.

Under the voluntary reduction provisions for 1963, farmers will be able to divert from 20 to 50 percent of their wheat acreage with special diversion provisions for small farms. On diverted acres, a payment will be made at 50 percent of the county loan rate (reflecting the \$1.82 per bushel national average) on the normal production (1959-60 average yields) of the diverted wheat acreage. The minimum diversion for participation is 20 percent of the wheat allotment or in the case of small farms 20 percent of the allotment or the average 3-year wheat acreage (1959-61), whichever is larger.

Of the \$2.00 per bushel 1963 average support price to participating farmers, \$1.82 per bushel will be available through loans or purchase agreements and 18 cents per bushel in the form of a payment in-kind based on the normal production of the harvested acreage.

Farmers may receive 50 percent of their acreage diversion payment at time of sign up to participate in the program. Re-

mainder of the acreage diversion payment and all of the price-support payment will be made after compliance is checked.

In a change from the 1962 program, the signed acreage will be a binding agreement. Farmers will be required to divert the

full acreage for which they sign up to be eligible for payments. Diverted acreage must be put in a conserving use and kept free from erosion, insects, weeds, and rodents and in addition to the average acreage of conserving and idle land of the farm for 1959 and 1960.

For farmers who do not participate in the voluntary reduction program, the legislation makes no change in the mandatory provisions of the 1963 wheat program as voted on by farmers in the August referendum on marketing

quotas. Those who remain within their acreage allotments will be eligible for price support at a national average minimum price of \$1.82 per bushel. There is provision for exempting wheat farms with 15 acres or less in 1963 from marketing quotas.

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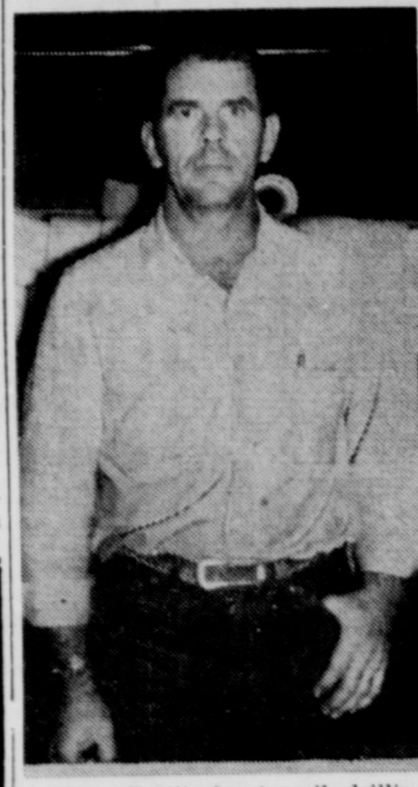

DPS Now Taking Applications For Uniformed Services

Monthly examinations are now being given to fill vacancies in the uniformed services of the Texas Department of Public Safety, according to Major Harry Hutchison, Regional Commander of this Region for the Texas DPS. The Commander said this new method of recruiting has not been used in the entire history of the Texas Department of Public Safety prior to this year. Entrance examinations were formerly given two or three times a year, now the examinations are given the second Saturday of each month throughout the state of Texas. The cities in this region where the entrance examinations are

given include Lubbock, Amarillo, and Wichita Falls. December 8, 1962 will be the last date for entrance examinations to be given in the next student patrol school, a sixteen week training period which will begin at the Department of Public Safety Law Enforcement Academy in Austin February 26, 1963. When all benefits are considered, as well as the fact that these jobs offer a career of service to their fellow Texans, we regard them as outstanding opportunities for young men. They will have an opportunity to attend the best state police academy in the nation, to receive training in police science and administration under the direction of some of the nation's foremost professional authorities. Beginning Drivers Need License, Too

What must a Texas teen-ager do to learn to drive?

Captain Sanford B. Lee, Driver's License Service supervisor for this region of the Texas Department of Public Safety, says if you want to learn to drive or need to practice before you take the driving test, you must make application and pass the vision, signs and rules test.

Then a license will be issued to permit the beginner to drive only when there is a licensed driver in the front seat with the driver. If the applicant is at least 16 years of age or has

successfully completed the Driver Education "Behind the Wheel" training, the restriction will be removed from the license when the driver completes his test by passing the driving test.

License Required

Every resident of the state who drives a motor vehicle must have either a valid Texas operator's, commercial or chauffeurs license.

Lee says if a youth is under 18 years of age, his application for a license must be signed under oath by someone who is willing to assume responsibility for any negligence or misconduct on his part while driving.

If the father is living and has custody of a minor, he is required to sign the application, otherwise

the application must be signed by the mother or guardian.

If neither, father, mother or guardian has custody of the minor, then the application must be signed by the employer or judge in the county in which he lives.

"It is unlawful for any person who has the custody of a minor to permit such minor to operate a motor vehicle without a valid license," Captain Lee said.

If a minor is under 16 years of age, he must meet one of three requirements before being examined for license.

ONE—he must present a certificate signed by a certified driver education instructor and the school superintendent or principal showing he has successfully passed an approved driver education course in the public school system.

TWO—the applicant must present an authorization from the Department of Public Safety showing an emergency necessity for driving.

THREE—the applicant may apply for a commercial operator's license restricted to motorcycle or motorbike only, not to exceed 5 brake horsepower.

None Under Fourteen
 A person under fourteen years of age in Texas may not be licensed and must not drive.

Lee stressed that boys and girls driving motorscooters must have a license and obey traffic laws and signs just as a driver of an automobile. "This same rule applies to motorscooter drivers, that no one under fourteen years of age be allowed to drive them," Lee said.

"Motorscooters must also be inspected and licensed annually just as an automobile," he added.

Some parents think it is permissible to let their children drive on dirt roads or country roads while they are learning. "This is not legal because these roads are the same as any other public highway that is open for use of the public and are controlled by Texas statutes," Lee said.

Everyone should know that ignorance is no excuse for disobeying the law, because a person can ask any officer what the correct procedure is on a beginner learning to drive or can obtain a digest of traffic rules or a driver's handbook from any DPS office.

When a person without a license drives the automobile of a friend, if stopped by an officer, the friend can be fined on in court for allowing an unauthorized minor to drive.

If a parent or guardian permits an unlicensed person to drive, they too can be fined on for permitting an unlicensed minor to drive.

Lee advised that both offenses are subject to \$1 to \$200 fines. The Driver's License Office in Lubbock is located at 4010 Avenue R and is open Monday thru Friday, 8 to 12 a.m. and 1 to 5 p.m., on Saturdays till noon. Written examinations begin at 8 a.m. and at 1 p.m. and are followed by the driving test. Captain Lee concluded.

Do The Taxpayers of Hale County Know

1. That every City and Town in Hale County and on the Plains, including Amarillo, Canyon, Happy, Tulia, Kress, Hale Center, Abernathy and Lubbock as well as Olton, Springlake and many other cities have their Highway improvement completed and in use except Plainview and the By-Pass Loop?

(e) That there are still fifteen tracts of land that the County is still responsible for, where the acquisition to the State Highway department has not been satisfied?

(f) That the State Highway Department cannot make its layout work, its plans, its designs and detail drawings, until they get a clearance from the County and property ownership satisfied?

(g) That the records show that the property of the metes and bounds of the designated Highway system through the Estes Enterprises Elevators south of Plainview could have been purchased as late as 1960 for \$7,500.00; and that the Santa Fe Railway and Estes Elevators have a scales interfering with the approved Highway system—why was this permitted?

(h) That there is no visible progress made on this problem in the last year and no information given to the public?

1. That because of the aforesaid lack of action the Highway system is now going to have to be constructed in four separate sections.

(a) By-Pass Loop from Highway 87 North to Highway 87 South, West of Plainview.

(c) South Leg, from 3rd Street South to Highway 87 By-Pass Loop.

(d) Columbia Street—to connect North leg at 15th Street to South leg at 3rd Street.

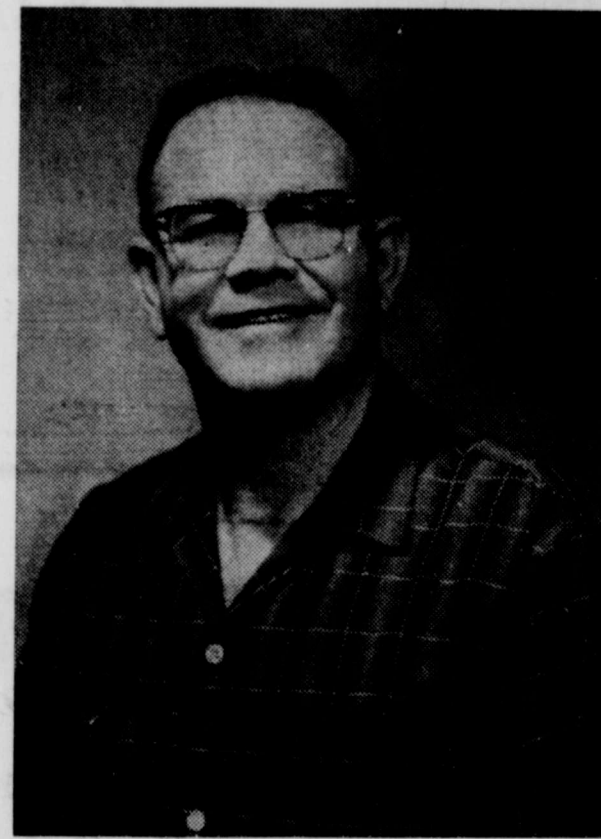

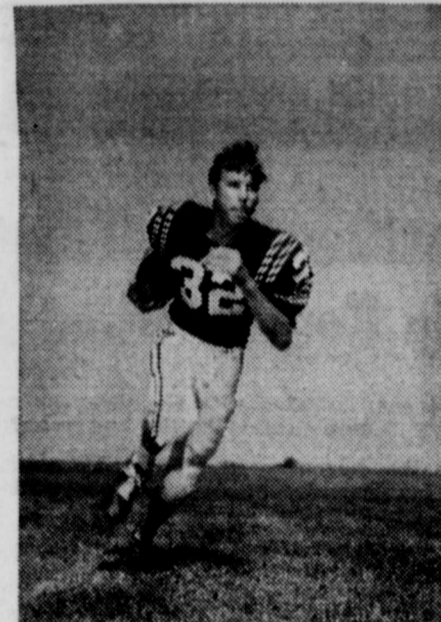

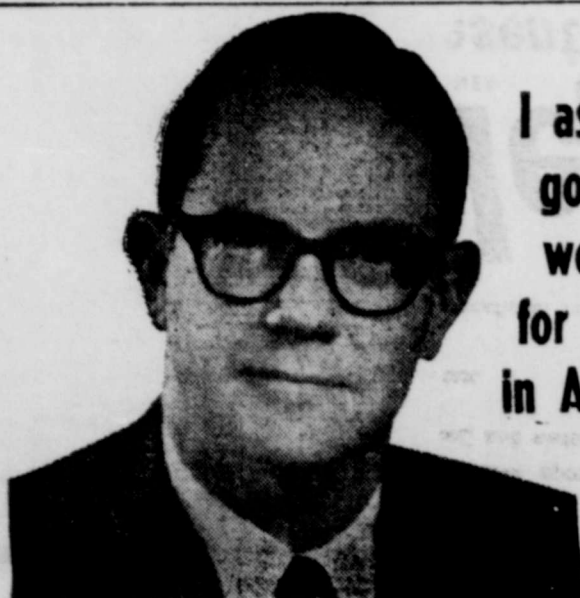
