

#### Soil Survey Is Under Way In Hale County

Hale County has been selected for a complete soil survey by soil scientists of the Soil Conservation Service, according to Jesse Jackson, who is in charge of the Plainview Soil Conservation Service work unit office. Soil Scientist, William M. Koos, of Lubbock, will begin the survey.

"All the different kinds or types of soils in the county will be identified and plotted on aerial photo-graphs by the soil scientist," said

B. G. Reeves, extension cotton ginning and machanization specialist, as an aid to better ginning and Abernathy improved quality. This is especial-(11-22c) ly true during periods of damp weather, explains Reeves. Here's an example. A bale of fairly dry cotton goes to the gin

which can be processed into a

low middling grade with a 31/32 inch staple without too much difficulty. But, what happens when this fairly dry cotton is ginned behind a bale with a much higher content? Reeves says a low middling plus grade could result but with a drop in staple length to 15/16 of an inch. There could also be a loss of 19 pounds in weight as a result of the over-drying. Currently, he says, the price of LM 31/32 inch and LM plus 15/16 inch are the same, 29.11 cents per pound. However, the 19 pound loss in weight means a loss of \$5.53 in the bale5s value. A higher grade but an actual loss in bale value. The same kind of loss results from the ginning of a damp bale of cotton following a dry one. It makes good sense, points out Reeves, to gin several bales of damp cotton after the heat and machinery have been properly set to handle it most effectively. When the ginning of such a groupnig has



County Committee Chairman E. J. Pope said that wheat produc-ers, in the referendum held last August, have already approved the use of marketing quotas for the crop. However, the new farm bill, passed by Congress, pro-vides for an additional voluntary wheat-diversion program.

The new program changes include the voluntary reduction of wheat acreage below the 1963 farm allotment or base acreage. Farmers become eligible for diversion payments by shifting the diverted acreage to an approved conservation use. Participating wheat growers who are also in compliance with their acreage allotment also will receive an extra price support payment of 18 cents per bushel, figured on the normal production of their 1963 wheat acreage. This is in addition to the acreage allotment.
