





### **Band Festival** Set Saturday **In Hale Center**


Some 15 area bands will com-pete for top honors in the Fifth Annual Band Festival at Hale Center, Saturday, February 23.

### **County Line Women Visit Post Mill**

#### (By Mrs. G. M. Carr)

Tuesday, March 5, 37 wives of County Line Co-op Gin members enthusiastically accepted an invi-tation from the gin manager, Mr. Mathew Goodrich, to go on a tour of the Post-Tex Cotton Mills at Post, Texas. Since we depend upon cotton for our livelihood and use cotton materials to such a great extent, we were especially interested in learning how cloth is made.

We assembled at the gin office at 10 a.m., boarded a comfortable chartered bus with a friendly driver and were off for the day. We enjoyed a buffet lunch at Levi's Restaurant in Post, then spent about two hours in the plant.

We were divided into three We were divided into three groups, each with a guide, for the tour and saw every step from the blender-feeder where 24 bales of cotton are fed into the big hoppers to obtain the desired blend to the packing of the finish-ed product. We learned that these combined processes require about 5 weeks for completion.

Various machines - breakes, cleaners, pickers, carders, draw-ers and rovers prepare the fiber for the spinning process. We mar-velled at the speed and dexterity of many of the workers, especially of a woman at a spinning mach-ine that wound the thread off small bobbins onto larger, round 'cheeses". 'cheeses".

The warp is strengthened and coated smoothly with starch and is then ready for the weavers. After this the cloth is sewed into continuous lengths of 40,000 yards and fed into a singer which burns all hanging threads from the face of the cloth. The material then goes through several cleaning and two bleaching baths and on to the finishing range where it is ironed, folded and wound into rolls of 1,000 yards each.

Sheets are then cut, stacked and passed on to the hemmers. Most of the work throughout the mill is on the hourly basis, but the guide spoke of the "incentive" of the hemmers who are work paid according to their out-put. The side-seamer folds the cloth for pillowcases and sews the selvages into a continuous tube a-bout 1,000 yards in length. A machine cuts the cases and passes them on to the hemmers who finish and label them. Formerly the cases were turned by hand but this is now done by a machine. Sheets and pillowcases are finished according to the specifica-tions of the buyers and labeled with their brand names-not just "Garza" alone but about 30 others, with including many very familiar to Sheets and pillowcases pass a final inspection and are put into polyethelene bags, sealed and conveyed to the room where they are packed one dozen per box. Shipments are made to all parts of the United States and to some foreign countries. The mill employs about 600 persons, and, at the same time of our visit, had operated 354 days without an accident. They turn out annually 700,000 dozen sheets and 500,000 dozen pillowcases. Since some of the mills in the Burlington Industries, of which finishing facilities, enormous rolls of cloth are sent there from two other mills to be bleached and finished.



#### **Changing Times**

A number of weekly newspapers over the state also are experimenting with distribution dates other than the usual Thursday paper. And, papers in larger towns, in the Littlefield and Hereford range of populations, have added Sunday editions to supplement their mid-week papers. The Review can publish two separate editions each week when the town grows enough to support them.

Changing times have altered the usual business pattern in towns the size of Abernathy. Time was when stores did a booming business on Saturdays. The trend is changing. Saturday, in the general run of businesses here, usually is a "slow" day. Now, the busiest days for most firms are Monday through Wednesday.

The changed pattern of "shopping days" prompted this experiment. The Review is changing to Saturday distribution to better serve the advertisers and the readers. 


