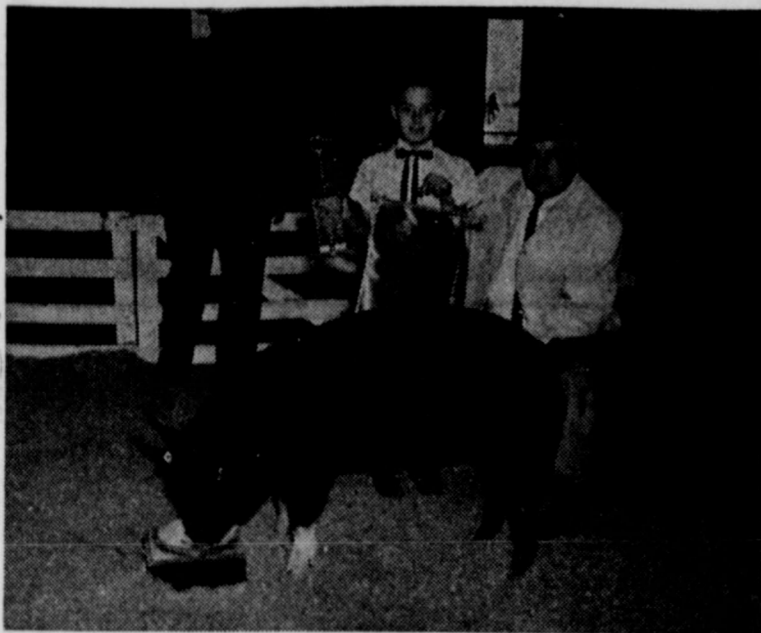

## Roy Jones On Ballot For Mayor Here; Filing Deadline For Candidates Given

Tuesday, April 2, 1963, has been designated as the date when city voters will go to the polls and elect a Mayor and two City Councilmen. Terms ending in April are Mayor W. V. Cunningham and Aldermen Roy Jones and David Pinson.

At the regular City Council meeting February 11th, Mr. Cunningham told the Council that he will not seek re-election for Mayor. Roy Jones, an alderman for the past two years, will run for the Mayor's office, while Mr. Pinson has declined to seek re-election to his council seat.

March 2nd at 5:00 P. M. is the final day to file for election for the office of Mayor and the two Council positions. The filing deadline is 30 days prior to the election date.

Other members on the Council whose terms will not expire until April 1964, are Dan Z. Ward, A. B. Myatt and W. T. Settle.

Other important action taken by the City Council in its regular meeting consisted of keeping closed the Spanish dance hall after Eddie Eldredge, the operator, requested a hearing on re-opening of the dance.

## Antelopes Have 17-6 Record For '63 Cage Season

The Abernathy Antelope Basketball team has completed the 1962-63 season with an impressive 17-6 record. Included in the 17 wins were eight of nine tournament game victories, two Tournament Championships, and the consolation title in the Caprock meet in Lubbock Municipal College. The Antelopes soundly whipped Slaton in the Abernathy Tourney finals 69-42 and then trounced Idalou 65-48 in the Idalou meet finals. In the Caprock consolation finals, Abernathy posted an 88-69 win over Denver City. The final scores in the three games bear evidence of the consistent offense displayed by the Antelopes this year.

Prominent in the string of wins were victories over teams who are currently winning district championships such as Slaton or Denver City, Petersburg, Roosevelt, and Seagraves.

The Antelopes finished in a second place tie with Tulla in Dist. 2AA. This was well above the prediction of the district pre-season poll that had the Abernathy team sharing the cellar with Floydada. Canyon won as expected but the hustling Antelopes kept them in one game to a narrow 63-61 win. This was the only time in the district that the Eagles were extended. Extended the Antelopes are, one time in the third quarter the Eagles fell six points behind the Antelopes. Six frigid minutes in which Canyon team outscored the locals 18-2 sent the team victory.

In presenting the proclamation to Jerry Clark, President, Texas FFA Association from Buna, the Governor pointed out that the importance of agriculture in our State increases as Texas progresses, and it is vital to our well-being that we train skilled farmers and ranchers to provide a plentiful supply of food in years to come.

Jerry Clark received the proclamation on behalf of the 33,000 active FFA members in 937 chapters and more than a quarter of a million former students.

The FFA is composed of boys who are studying vocational agriculture in the public schools in preparation for careers in farming, ranching and related fields. In studying the science of agriculture, these future farmers are striving to improve this great industry for the welfare of all citizens.

**Cotton Center To Get Water System**

A \$71,000 soil and water association loan by the Farmers Home Administration to the Cotton Center Water Supply Corporation, in Hale County to drill a well, erect an overhead storage tank and construct a metered water distribution system was closed Wednesday, of last week, according to Ralph W. Dent, the agency's county supervisor.

A total of 67 farm and rural families and private businesses are expected to benefit from the loan. State Director L. J. Capleman reports the Cotton Center Water Supply Corporation with funds furnished by the Hale County State Bank, Plainview, and insured by the Farmers Home Administration and \$2629.50 contributed by the borrower members will enable residents of the Cotton Center area to have running water in their homes, install bathroom facilities and generally improve the standard of living in the community. A water line is to extend about a mile east and a half mile north of Cotton Center.

The Farmers Home Administration insured loan is to be repaid over a period of forty years with a five percent interest rate.

Officers of the association are: Earl Beach, John W. Starves, M. E. Neve, Alfred E. Ebeling and R. E. Lee.

Association loans of this type are available to organizations operating on a nonprofit basis, such as irrigation, drainage and water supply districts, cooperative water users' associations, mutual water companies, soil conservation district and municipalities.

Loans may be made in amounts up to \$500,000 when funds appropriated by Congress are used and 1 million when funds are provided by private lenders and insured by Farmers Home Administration.

Since the beginning of the association loan program, the Farmers Home Administration has made 37 loans in Texas totaling \$3 million.

## County Line Women Visit Post Mill

(By Mrs. G. M. Carr)

Tuesday, March 5, 37 wives of County Line Co-op Gin members enthusiastically accepted an invitation from the gin manager, Mr. Mathew Goodrich, to go on a tour of the Post-Text Cotton Mills at Post, Texas. Since we depend upon cotton for our livelihood and use cotton materials to such a great extent, we were especially interested in learning how cloth is made.

We assembled at the gin office at 10 a. m., boarded a comfortable chartered bus with a friendly driver and were off for the day. We enjoyed a buffet lunch at Levi's Restaurant in Post, then spent about two hours in the plant.

We were divided into three groups, each with a guide, for the tour and saw every step from the blender-feeder where 24 bales of cotton are fed into the big hoppers to obtain the desired blend to the packing of the finished product. We learned that these combined processes require about 6 weeks for completion.

Various machines - breakers, cleaners, pickers, carders, drawers and rovers prepare the fiber for the spinning process. We marvelled at the speed and dexterity of many of the workers, especially of a woman at a spinning machine that wound the thread off small bobbins onto larger, round "cheeses".

The warp is strengthened and coated smoothly with starch and is then ready for the weavers. After this the cloth is sewed into continuous lengths of 40,000 yards and fed into a singer which burns all hanging threads from the face of the cloth. The material then goes through several cleaning and two bleaching baths and on to the finishing range where it is ironed, folded and wound into rolls of 1,000 yards each.

Sheets are then cut, stacked and passed on to the hemmers. Most of the work throughout the mill is on the hourly basis, but the guide spoke of the "incentive" work of the hemmers who are paid according to their out-put.

The side-seamer folds the cloth for pillowcases and sews the selvages into a continuous tube about 1,000 yards in length. A machine cuts the cases and passes them on to the hemmers who finish and label them. Formerly the cases were turned by hand but this is now done by a machine.

Sheets and pillowcases are finished according to the specifications of the buyers and labeled with their brand names-not just "Garza" alone but about 30 others, including many very familiar to us.

Sheets and pillowcases pass a final inspection and are put into polyethylene bags, sealed and conveyed to the room where they are packed one dozen per box. Shipments are made to all parts of the United States and to some foreign countries.

The mill employs about 600 persons, and, at the same time of our visit, had operated 354 days without an accident. They turn out annually 700,000 dozen sheets and 500,000 dozen pillowcases.

Since some of the mills in the Burlington Industries, of which Post-Text is a part, do not have finishing facilities, enormous rolls of cloth are sent there from two other mills to be bleached and finished.

The use of Texas-grown cotton

## Nazarenes To Open Revival Here March 27

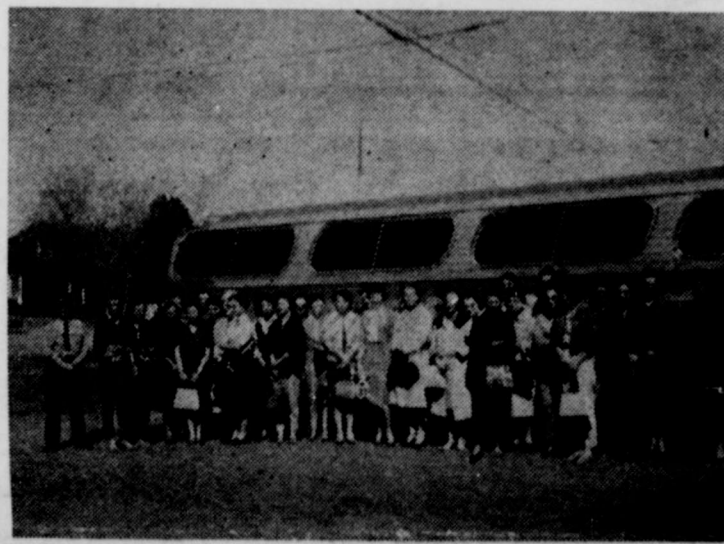
Abernathy First Church of the Nazarene has scheduled its Spring Revival for March 27-April 7, it was announced by the Rev. James H. Robertson, pastor.

And, papers in larger towns, in the Littlefield and Hereford range of populations, have added Sunday editions to supplement their mid-week papers. The Review can publish two separate editions each week when the town grows enough to support them.

Changing times have altered the usual business pattern in towns the size of Abernathy. Time was when stores did a booming business on Saturdays. The trend is changing. Saturday, in the general run of businesses here, usually is a "slow" day. Now, the busiest days for most firms are Monday through Wednesday.

The changed pattern of "shopping days" prompted this experiment. The Review is changing to Saturday distribution to better serve the advertisers and the readers. Sometime between Saturday morning, when the subscribers receive The Review, and Monday morning when they start shopping, prospective customers of local merchants will read the advertisements in The Review.

### Deadline Unrealistic

Also, these changing times have made The Review's long-established deadline of 5:30 p. m. Mondays unrealistic, and a relic of the days when people did their shopping toward the last part of the week.

Under modern conditions, we have very few callers at The Review office Thursday through Saturday. With shopping and business starting its boom in town on Monday, news starts pouring in that day and continues through Wednesday morning. This is the schedule the people want to follow in contacting us on news,

so we have yielded to the modern trend. With distribution day on Saturday, we can have a Wednesday noon deadline for accepting news. We believe that we can give you a better newspaper on this new schedule.

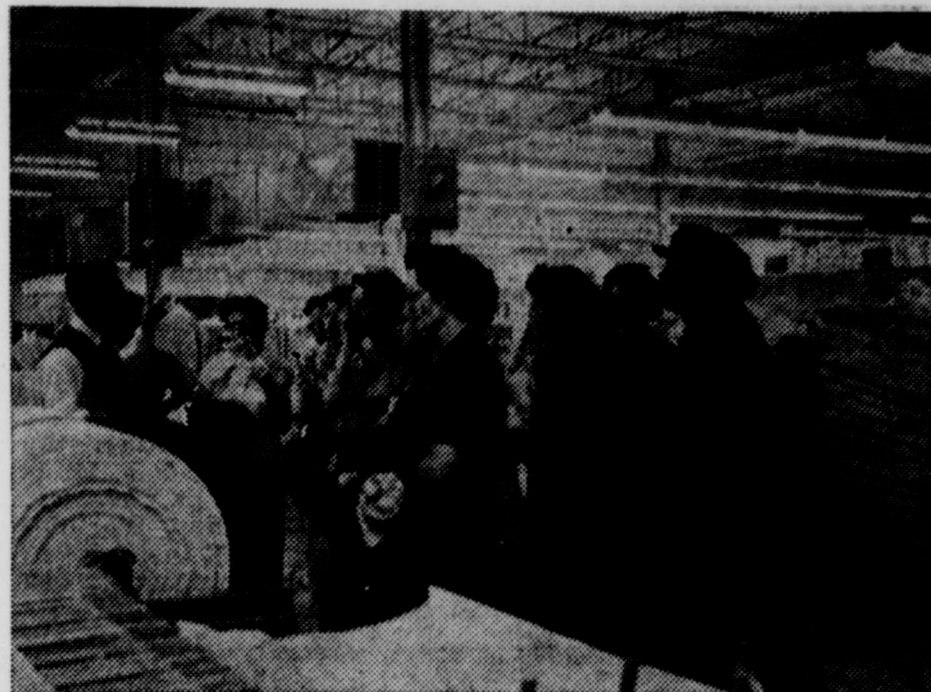

In the bread and cereal group Sharon Amerson received a red ribbon on jelly popovers.

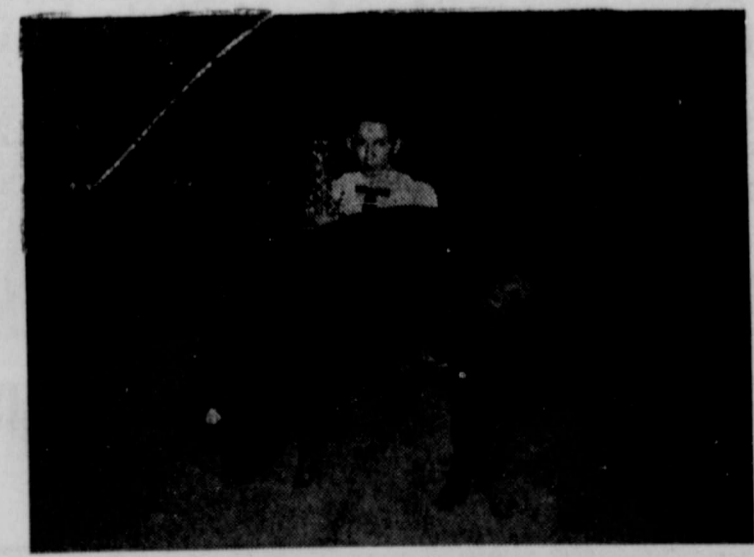

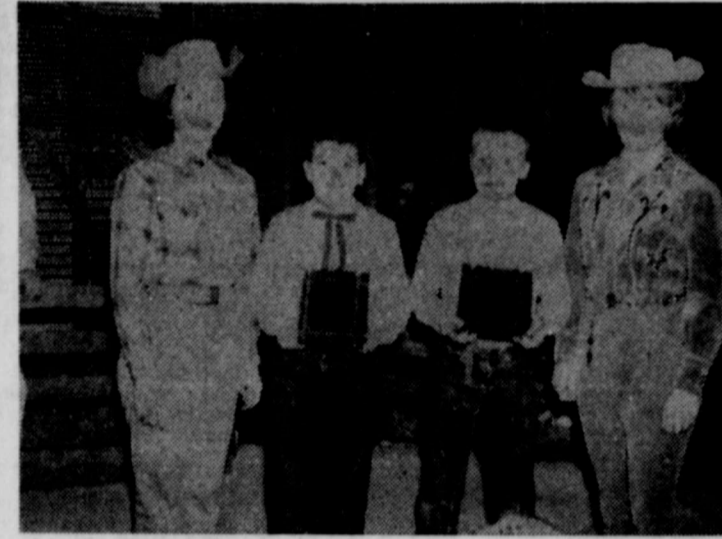

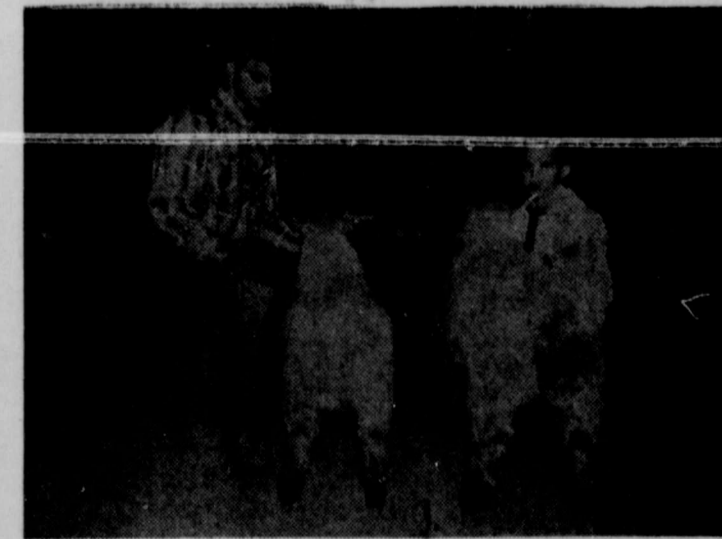

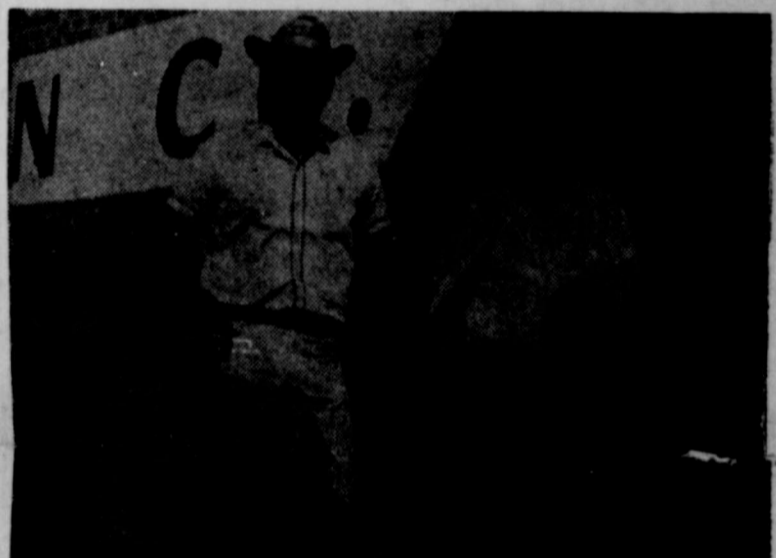
