

Officials at Co-op Grain Eleator were surprised Wednesday July 31 to receive their first load of milo of the season.

L. J. West pulled on to the scales about 4 p.m. with a 12,-000-pound load of dryland milo grown by V. L. Peeples, on a farm eight miles southwest of

Glen Hammond, manager of the elevator, pointed out that the load marked one of the earliest dates grain sorghum had been harvested n the area and may be the first load cut on the South Plains. Hammand presented Peeples with a \$50 bonus for the load.

Peeples estimated that yield for the dryland crop would average between 1,000 and 1,500 pounds to the acre. Moisture content for the load was 14.61 percent.





### PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vôte, shall be deemed a qualified elector: provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which have the resided at the time of the may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1983.

"Section 4. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret ballot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of bailots and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of elections, and may provide by law for the registration of all voters. Should the Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:




