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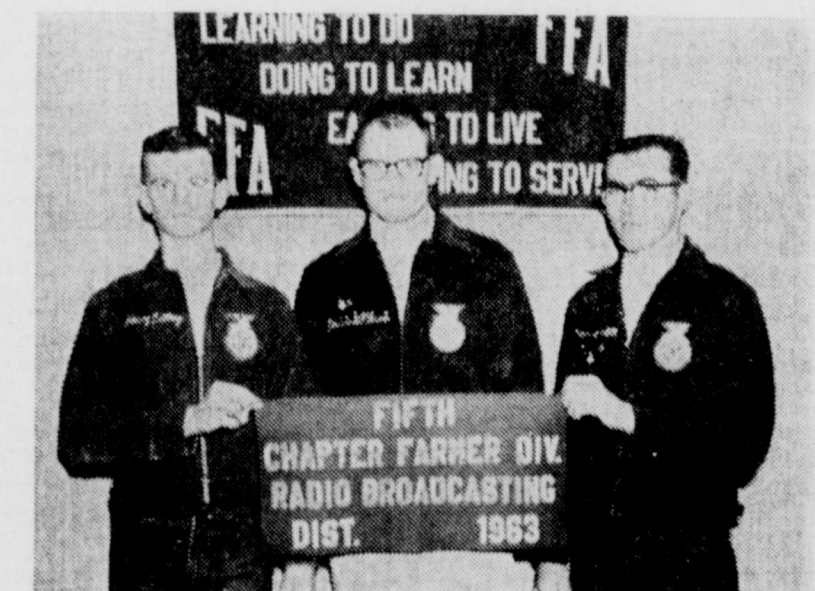

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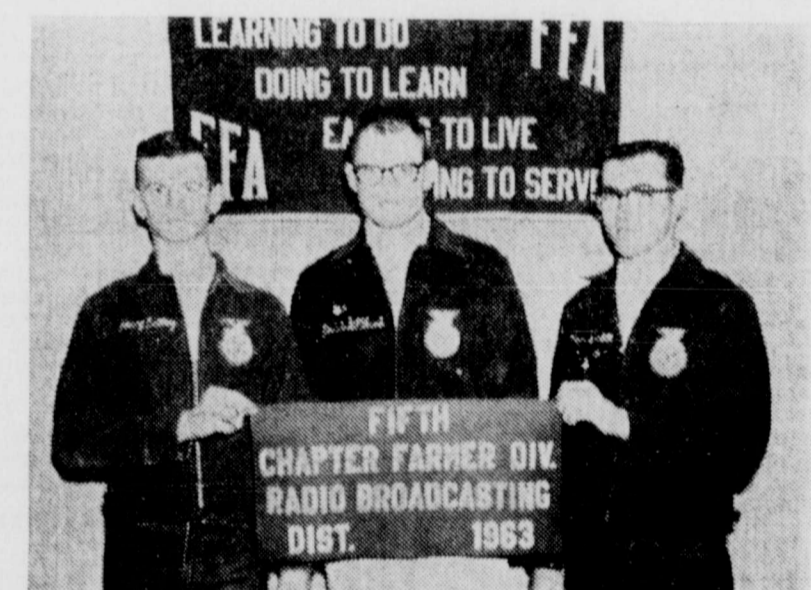

## LCC Granted Full Membership In The Southern Association Of Colleges And Schools

LUBBOCK (Special) — Officials of Lubbock Christian College were informed Wednesday, December 11, in Memphis, Tennessee, that the college has been granted full membership in the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the highest accrediting body in the region.

The announcement was made during the annual business session at the Sixty-Eighth Annual Meeting of the Association held at the Peabody Hotel in Memphis. Lubbock Christian College officials on hand to meet with members of the Association and receive the announcement were President Dr. F. W. Mattox, Vice President Dr. Jack W. Bates, and Dr. Herman O. Wilson, Registrar.

The Southern Association is one of six regional accrediting agencies in the United States. It has members in ten Southern states; membership is synonymous with accreditation.

The purpose of the organization is to designate institutions which have met criteria and standards of achievement and to give national and international recognition to the credits of the institutions which meet the standards.

**Accreditation Defined**  
Accreditation is the recognition of intellectual or academic respectability, which implies a sound over-all program. Purposes of accreditation are to encourage schools to improve their programs according to these standards, to allow students to transfer courses from one school to another without difficulty, to inform employers about the quality of training a graduate has acquired, and to provide some guidance to prospective students in selecting a college.

Lubbock Christian College's accreditation was achieved after only six years of operation, the shortest possible time in which a college can achieve membership in the Southern Association.

Commenting on the announcement, Dr. Mattox stated, "This high achievement, the fulfillment of plans which have been foremost in our minds from the founding of the institution. We are gratified that the faculty, students, and supporters have worked together with such dedication to make this achievement possible. We express our sincere gratitude to all who have had a part in the founding and development of Lubbock Christian College."

Lubbock Christian College is an independent liberal arts junior college which opened in 1957. In its first four years the school justified the faith of its founders by growing substantially each year so that it became the largest, non tax-supported junior college in Texas.

Lubbock Christian College was granted full state accreditation in April of 1961. College officials met with a board representing the Texas Association of Colleges and Universities and were informed that LCC had been given full membership, bypassing the second stage in accreditation, that of associate membership. The Association made their decision retroactive to the beginning of the 1960-1961 school year.

As soon as the college received accreditation in the Association of Texas Colleges and Universities, the administration began active re-evaluation in its efforts to meet the standards for regional accreditation.

As the first step in applying for membership, school officials began work on an intensive self-study. The self-study and application for membership were completed in the fall of 1962, and college administrators went to Dallas on November 26 for an interview with Southern Association officials. At this time the Association approved the college's self-study and the sending of a team of examiners to the campus.

The examining team, made up of three college presidents from Mississippi, Virginia, and Florida, was on the campus in April of 1963. The school was examined according to standards set up by the Southern Association. The term "standards" as used in accreditation refers to a minimum level of achievement. It may be a minimum level of faculty training, minimum enrollment, or an outline of basic organization within a college.

**Steady Growth**  
Since Lubbock Christian College's beginning in a cotton field on the western edge of Lubbock, members of the Board, administration, and faculty have transformed this cotton field into a thriving college.

The college's broad scope of influence is indicated by the steady growth in enrollment and by the number of states and cities represented in each semester's enrollment.

From 110 in 1957, the enrollment has grown to 468, with students representing 205 towns in 17 states and two foreign countries.

The college has grown from a 20-acre campus with a few remodeled barracks buildings to a 120-acre campus with a physical plant valued at three million dollars.

## 64 - 65 Texas Almanac Ready

Many new features in the 1964-1965 Texas Almanac, just published by the Dallas Morning News, have been added to material that has made this 100-year-old publication the "Encyclopedia of Texas."

Texas' increasing urbanization containing photographs and comparative statistics for 21 metropolitan areas, including the cities of Abilene, Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Fort Arthur, Corpus Christi, Brownsville, Harlingen, San Benito, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Galveston, Texas City, Houston, Laredo, Lubbock, Midland, Odessa, San Angelo, San Antonio, Texarkana, Tyler, Waco and Wichita Falls.

Maps of 154 counties and data on all counties and cities of Texas have been brought up-to-date, including population and other figures from the 1960 U. S. Census. New features are a County Economic Index, and maps showing leading Texas counties in production of crops and livestock.

Texans who like to brag will find ample ammunition in two pages showing the rank of Texas among states, and in proportion of the United States total, in leading categories.

Other data appearing for the first time include carlot shipments of fruits and vegetables and ad-Texas landmarks are listed by counties in a special section, revised through information obtained from authorities on county histories.

All Governors of Texas and Presidents of the Republic of Texas are pictured in the historical section.

Agricultural information has been completely revised, with the help of authorities of Texas A&M, the U. S. Department of Agriculture and others. For this and other sections, several thousand Texans have supplied information and photographs, according to Walter B. Moore, editor.

Election returns, the text of the Constitution of Texas with amendments adopted through 1962, a list of wet and dry counties, maps of Texas Senatorial, Representative and Congressional Districts, lists of state, county and municipal officials, and other information are found in the discussion of politics and elections.

Water, soils, plant life, weather, wild life, minerals, employment and labor, manufacturing, service industries, and hundreds of other topics are summarized in the 588 pages.

A widely-used section is the list of more than 500 state-wide civic organizations, with their chief executives and home addresses.

A comprehensive index increases the usefulness of the Texas Almanac's data for schools, businessmen, public officials, writers and speakers, and others. While it is primarily a reference publication, more than 400 illustrations,

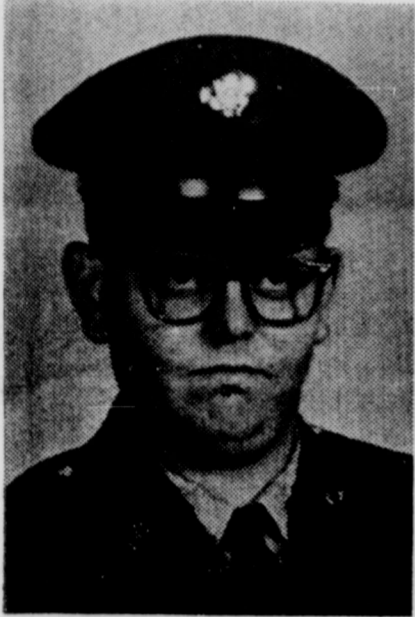

### POSTMASTER SIGNALS START OF '63 YULE MAIL RUSH

The advent of December marked the start of one of the biggest races in town—the annual race against time at the Abernathy post office as its Christmas mail rush went into high gear. Postmaster Herman Lambert noted today.

New reports from Postmaster General John A. Gronouski in Washington to Mr. Lambert indicate an anticipated nationwide record mail volume for this Christmas season of nearly 12 billion pieces during December.

Locally, Postmaster Lambert expects December's mail volume to total another heavy record. "Shopping and mailing early benefits everyone," the postmaster observed. "Customers who buy early get the pick of the Christmas stocks; the local economy is aided by the business activity thus created, and everyone—including the postal service—is happy about the additional time that early mailing allows."

"Early mailing also gives us time to get gifts and cards in the hands of addressees in good condition with less chance of damage or delay due to human error."

"Our employees need public help and patrons of the Abernathy post office can assist us by shopping and mailing right now and by using ZIP Code in both return and destination addresses." Abernathy's Zip Code is 79311.

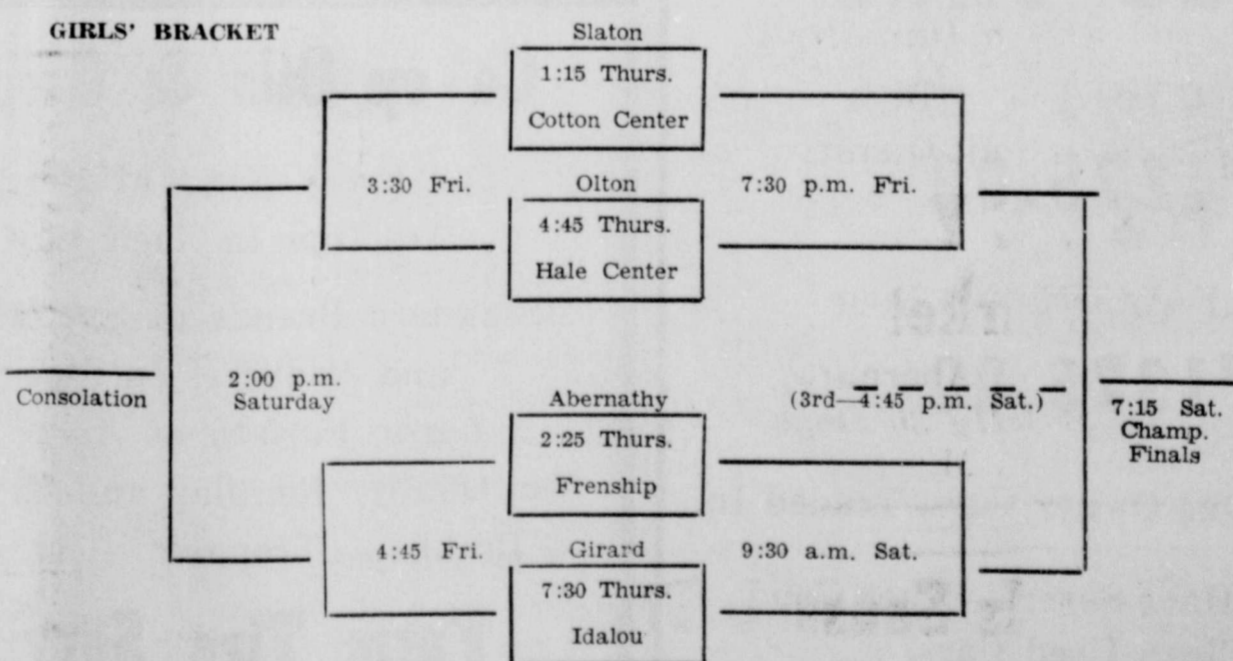
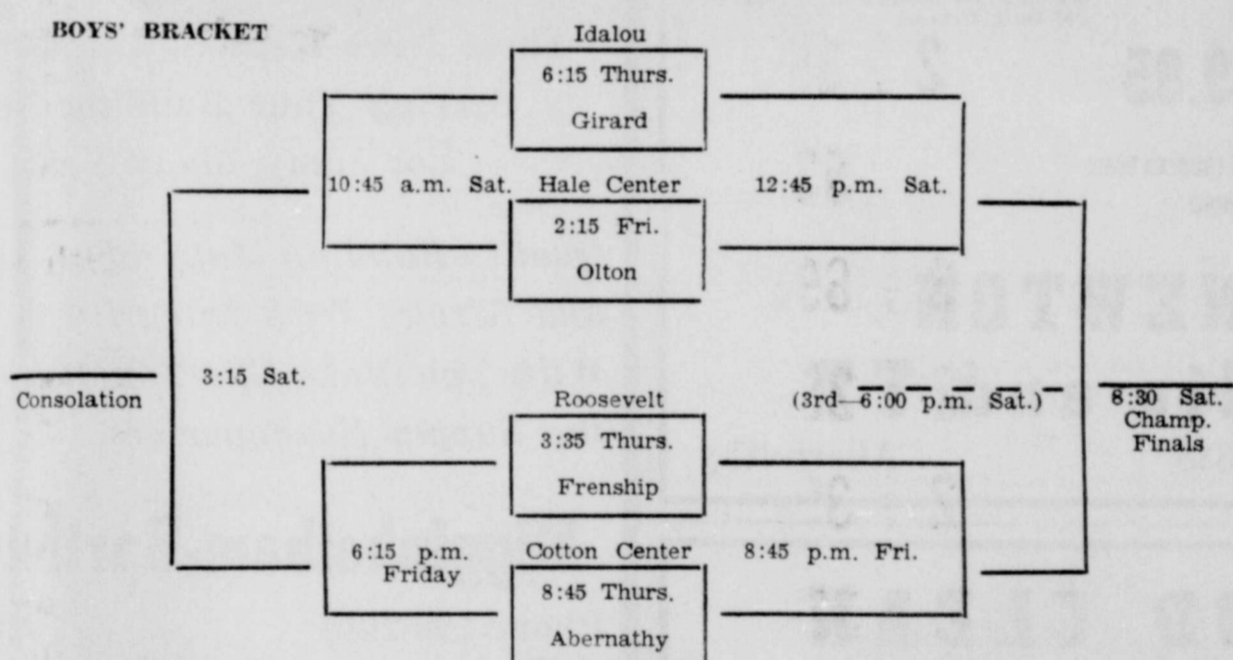

#### Soil Testing Is Investment For Area Farmers

The value of applying fertilizer according to soil test recommendations has been well established by test results of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock and by Extension Service demonstrations in Hale County in recent years. Results of a recent demonstration give further proof of the economic advantages of soil testing, reports Dave Weaver, Associate County Agent.

A demonstration on the Donald Huffaker farm, north of Abernathy, showed that grain sorghum fertilized according to a soil test recommendation of 120-60-0 yielded 1084 pounds per acre more grain than grain sorghum that received 120-0-0 as it had for years. This yield increase of 1084 pounds per acre produced a gross added return of \$18.42 per acre more than grain sorghum receiving nitrogen only. Subtracting the

cost of the 60 pounds of phosphorus which was \$6.10 leaves a net return of \$12.32 added income due to the addition of phosphorus.

Weaver points out that now is the time to begin taking soil samples to determine the fertilizer needs of next year's crops. Samples should be sent to the Soil Testing Laboratory at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock. Information sheets which must accompany all samples and soil sample cartons may be picked up in the County Agent's office.
