



Who Will Pay The Increased Sales

No one has a kind word to say about the sales tax. Even the members of islature who vote for it have some reservations about its legitimacy and work. face of it, the sales tax is the most difficult of taxes to administer, and produce most costly. It is unquestionably a regressive tax, which means that it falls be the shoulders of those who are least able to pay.

Occasionally, farmers are heard to say, out of sheer desperation, more a burden should be placed on the sales tax because property taxes are complete proportion with their return, particularly from farming. Big business lobby that has traditionally opposed a corporation income accused the anti-sales tax forces of being arbitrary and inflexible because distermined opposition to the sales tax. Yet, when Rep. Tom Moore of Waco into balanced tax which would share the burden between the consumers and business are the sales tax. evident that it is the business lobby that is inflexble, and that the House least unwilling to buck the powerful business lobby.

Some view the sales tax as a "painless" tax, not because it doesn't cause those who pay it, but because it is passed "painlessly" through the Legislature hurts the old, the impoverished, the working man, the farmer and the consum of these people seem to count very much when the votes are tallied in Austin.

HOW FARMERS UNION FEELS ABOUT DRIVERS OF FARM TRANSPORTATION

EXEMPTION OF DRIVERS OF SMALL FARM TRUCKS ing drivers under 21 years of age provided they meet requires state laws and regulations, was requested March 22, by Farmers Union President Tony Dechant. In a letter to Sects of Transportation John Volpe, he asked that drivers of farm under 10,000 lbs. gross weight be permanently exempt from driver qualifications when hauling supplies or products to or in farm. Regulations removing such exemption are scheduled wi effect July 1. In addition, Dechant urged that agriculture be st a local haul exemption comparable to the commercial zone in urban areas. The exemption would be applicable in two i circumstances: (1) When trucks are used to transport agree products the farmer has produced from the farm to the point marketing or to another farm; and (2) When trucks are used products acquired for farm consumption or production purp truck controlled by the farmer in a radius of up to 100 miles
