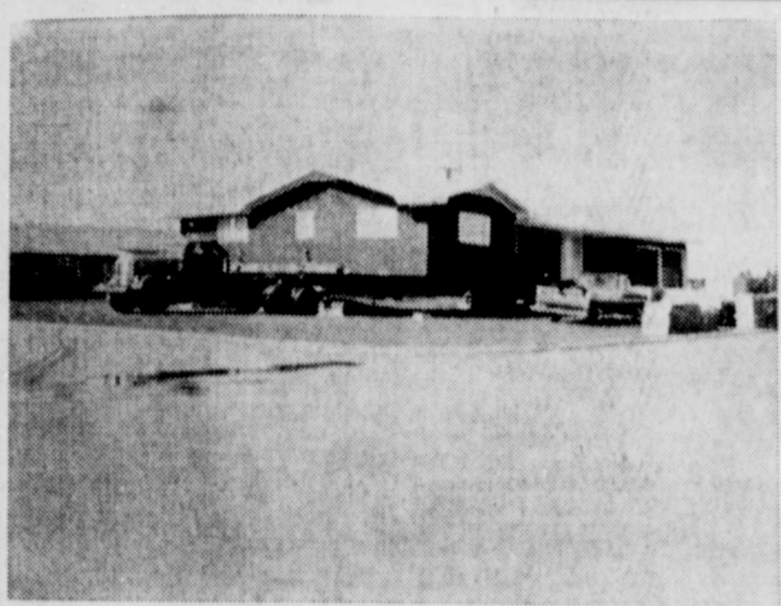

PO Service Is To Be Reduced On Saturdays

The limited adjustments in some postal services ordered in Washington March 10th by Postmaster General John L. Gronowski to save \$12.7 million will begin to take effect in Abernathy and other cities May 4th Postmaster Herman Lambert said recently.

Service changes planned locally include the following, Mr. Lambert said. There will be no money orders written on Saturday. The postmaster emphasized that no essential major services are affected under the orders. Regular business mail deliveries will continue as usual.

Letters and other first class mail will be handled with the same priority as ever. The only changes are the ones mentioned above, and they affect Saturday's business only.

The economy step, Mr. Lambert explained, is in line with President Johnson's program under which the recent Federal income tax cut was provided.

Primary Elections Slated In Texas Saturday, May 2

Texas voters will go to the polls Saturday, May 2, to vote in the Democratic and the Republican Primaries. A voter may participate in only one of the primaries, not both.

Democratic primary voting in Abernathy, Hale County, will be in city hall clubroom, with Aaron DuBose in charge. Lakeview, Hale County, voting will be at the Lakeview Methodist Church, with S. M. Harrison in charge. Polls at New Deal, Lubbock County, will be in the New Deal school and in the New Deal clubhouse.

Polls At A-1 Lanes

North Lubbock County voters who, in the past, have been marking ballots at Joe Thompson Implement Co. are reminded of a change in the polling place for the May 2 Democratic Primary. The North Lubbock County voters will mark their ballots at polls in A-1 Lanes, the bowling alley building in South Abernathy. Frank E. Lovelace will be in charge of the polls at A-1 Lanes. A building expansion program is underway at Joe Thompson Implement Co., making the change in voting sites necessary.

Vote Early

Voters are urged to go to the polls early in the day Saturday. This co-operation will allow the election workers to finish the returns shortly after the polls close. The polls here will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

For Governor

Topping the interest in statewide voting is the race for governor in the Democratic primary. Incumbent Governor John Connally is faced by a liberal candidate Don Yarbrough. Yarbrough

ough has strong backing from a coalition of Latin American, Negro and Labor groups. There are two other candidates in this race. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith of Lubbock also faces an opponent with the liberal coalition backing. Opposing Lt. Gov. Smith is Albert Fuentes, Jr., of San Antonio.

The daily press will carry a complete listing of state and national candidates before election time.

Republican Primary

James Anderson, Abernathy Republican precinct chairman, announced that the Republican Primary voting Saturday will be in his home, 612 12th St., for Hale County Republicans in this voting precinct.

There was no information available at press time concerning plans for Republican primary voting in Abernathy, Lubbock County, or at Lakeview or New Deal. Names of Goldwater, Rockefeller, Stassen and Smith will be on the Republican ballot in the presidential preferential voting. Republicans also will choose U. S. Senator candidates.

Hot On Home-Front

Hottest Democratic races on the home-front include the 4-man battle for Commissioner, Precinct 3, Hale County, and the 3-man race for sheriff of Hale County.

Incumbent Commissioner Rayburn Karrh is not a candidate for re-election to the Hale County, Precinct 3 post. All four of the men seeking to succeed Karrh as commissioner are Hale Center area residents, John Robertson, Herschel Williams, R. L. Ballard and Jay Cannon.

Incumbent Hale County Sheriff Walter Sanders is seeking re-election. His two opponents are Troy Porterfield and Bill Holland, both of Plainview.

AUSTIN, TEXAS

GREETINGS:

The right to vote is a treasured instrument of a democracy, and a solemn responsibility on the part of every American citizen of voting age. Unfortunately, it is a responsibility that is often treated lightly, for many eligible voters consistently fail to exercise their right and duty to cast their ballot.

Texas will vote in the primary elections on May 2 to select their nominees for public office at the local, state and national level.

On the same day the party precinct conventions will be held to select delegates to the county conventions and to consider resolutions affecting state and national policy. These conventions are the genesis of our entire political and governmental structure.

It is vital to our state and nation that as many persons as possible participate in these essential functions of representative government.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate Saturday, May 2, 1964, as

TEXAS CITIZENSHIP DAY

and urge all eligible voters to participate in the primary election and precinct conventions of the party of their choosing.

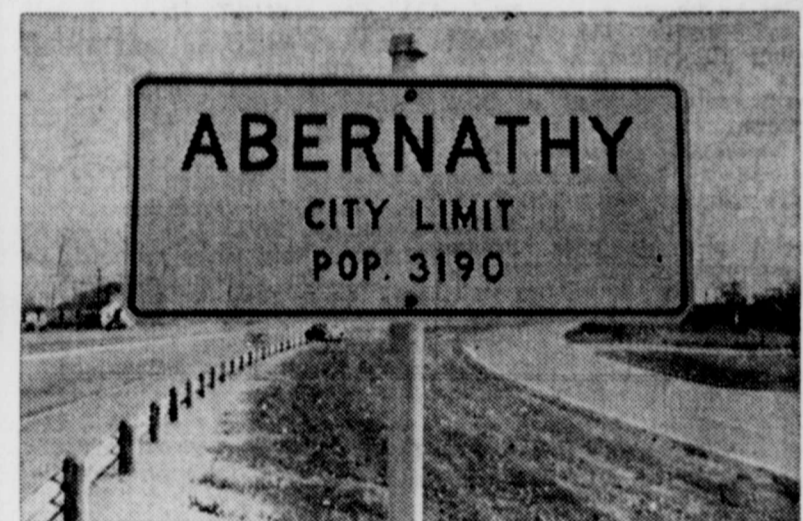

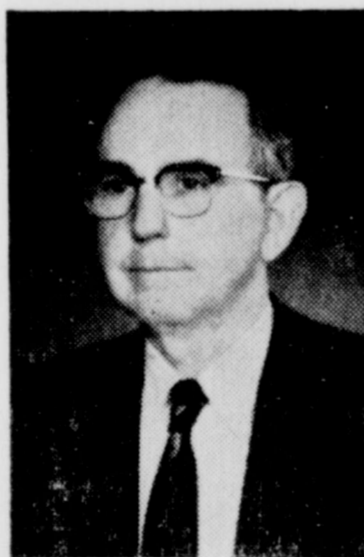

County Line Co-Op Gin Has Meeting

(By O. F. REA)

County Line Co-op Gins 11th annual meeting started promptly on time Thursday night with serving of the good, wholesome meal, cafeteria style, by the school cafeteria personnel. Approximately 264 plates were served.

With completion of the meal the meeting was called to order by gin president Marvin Floyd, who served as master of ceremonies. The invocation was given by Rev. Hester of the County Line Baptist Church. A number of door prizes were drawn for and handed out. We were asked to register as we entered and were

given numbered stubs of tickets and also a pair of cotton pillow cases, made at Post, of Plains cotton of course.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The reading being by gin manager Matthew Goodrich. Mr. Goodrich also gave his manager's report at this time, and it was followed by the audit report by Mr. Richards of the Merriman Co. of Lubbock. Copies of the report were passed out to the members.

The remainder of the door prizes were now drawn for and passed out. It was time for election of two directors. Nominations were received on Fred Exum, Otis Pope, Y. F. Snodgrass, Marvin Floyd and E. M. Crow. These last two names were incumbents and were re-elected, receiving 40 and 46 votes respectively of the 137 votes cast.

A number of visiting Co-op people and others were now recognized and Mr. Hamilton of the Co-op Oil Mill at Lubbock made a short talk in which he brought out that the oil mill had received 300,000 tons of cotton seed this season with 3,750 tons coming from County Line Co-op Gins. They also received 12,000 tons of Soy beans. The building of separate mill for pressing Soy beans is being considered.

Mr. Ronnie Brown of the Co-

op Congress stated that the company had received 645,000 bales of cotton with 9,945 bales coming from County Line Co-op Gins. Mr. White of the Plains Cotton Co-op Assn. stated that they had handled 961,878 bales of cotton, 9,400 coming from County Line Co-op Gins.

Now, with business and statistics over with came the entertainment, Mr. Bob Murphey, of Nacogdoches. He immediately put us into convulsions of laughter and kept us there for some 35 or 40 minutes. When he thought we had about all we could stand he came up with this bit of philosophy of life: "We are all either pillars or caterpillars. We either hold up or tear down. Don't be a caterpillar, be sure you are a pillar."

With a net margin for the year of \$120,274.00, \$12.79 per bale, approximately \$80,000.00 was handed out to patrons.

PROGRAM FOR PRE-SCHOOL

A program for pre-school children and their parents will be presented May 11 at 8 p.m. at the PTA meeting in the school cafeteria. The Kindergarten children will give the program.

The new officers for the PTA will be installed.

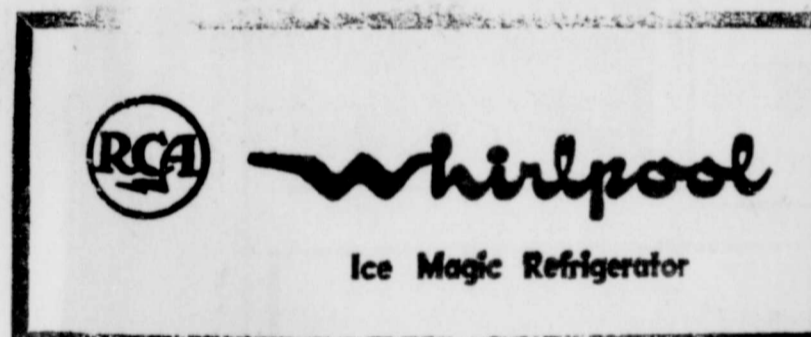

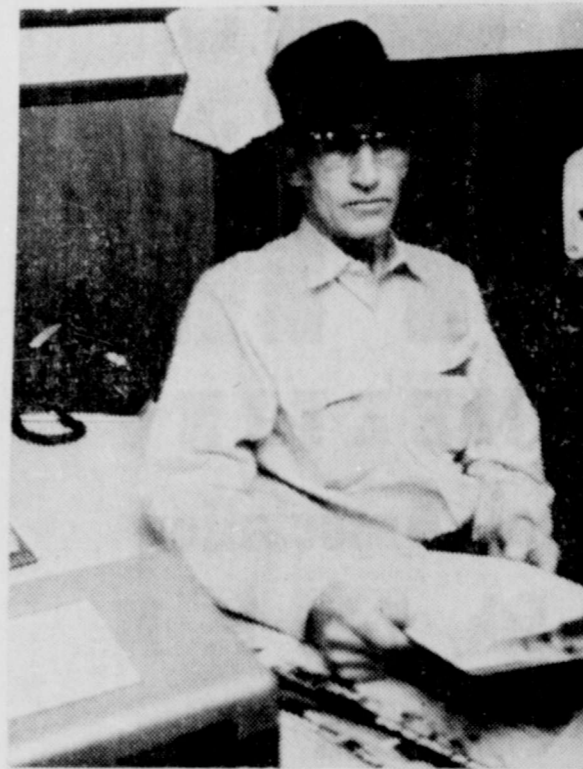
