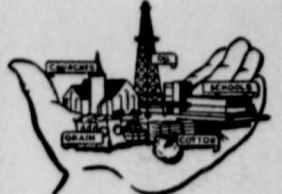

MRS. EDITH WILSON Retirement Announced

Mrs. Edith Wilson, cafeteria manager of the Abernathy Public Schools since 1953, announced her retirement effective June 30, 1964. Mrs. Wilson taught in Midland County Schools for eleven years prior to World War II. During WW II she became director of cafeteria services for nurses and doctors at Midland Army Flying Field, Midland, Texas.

From 1946 to 1956 Mrs. Wilson served as director of Food Services for the Midland Independent School District. In this capacity she planned, equipped, and directed seventeen cafeterias. In 1956 Mrs. Wilson became dietitian for San Angelo College and in 1957 she re-entered Abilene Christian College to complete her degree which she received in 1958.

In September of that year Mrs. Wilson came to Abernathy that she might be near her two sons who were students at Texas Tech. Cecil, now of the Internal Revenue Service, and James, a mathematics and science teacher at Stamford, have both graduated.

Retirement from public school work does not mean the end of a long and illustrious career of service for Mrs. Wilson. For several summers Mrs. Wilson with Mrs. Jewel Watson, recently retired as head of the English Department at Abilene Christian College, and Mr. Roy Watson, retired, have operated Camp Klebit near Granbury, Texas. This camp at one time was Thorpe Springs College, now Texas Christian University. In addition to a summer camp, full approval as a foster home for underprivileged was given this trio last fall. Because Mrs. Wilson needed one more year to complete her retirement, it was decided to wait until 1964 to start the foster home. Two children have already been placed in Mrs. Wilson's home, Betty in the third grade and J. C. in the seventh grade. These two, along with eight others, will form the nucleus of the first group.

At a time when most people are looking forward to retirement, Mrs. Wilson is looking to a new beginning in which she may be of service to children.

Mrs. Wilson states, "I have enjoyed my work here. I have enjoyed the people here and it was wonderful being close to my sons and seeing them through college. I feel that now I must dedicate the rest of my life to children."

Abernathy's loss will certainly be Granbury's gain. For services well rendered, the school would like to say "thank you" for the noble endeavors upon which you are entering--good luck.

The Cubanos go to Littlefield next Sunday, May 24.

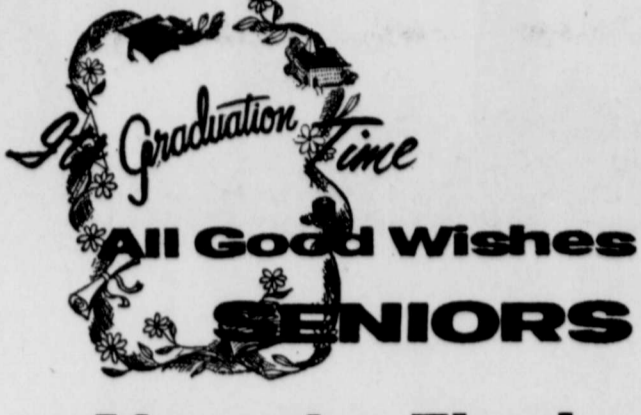

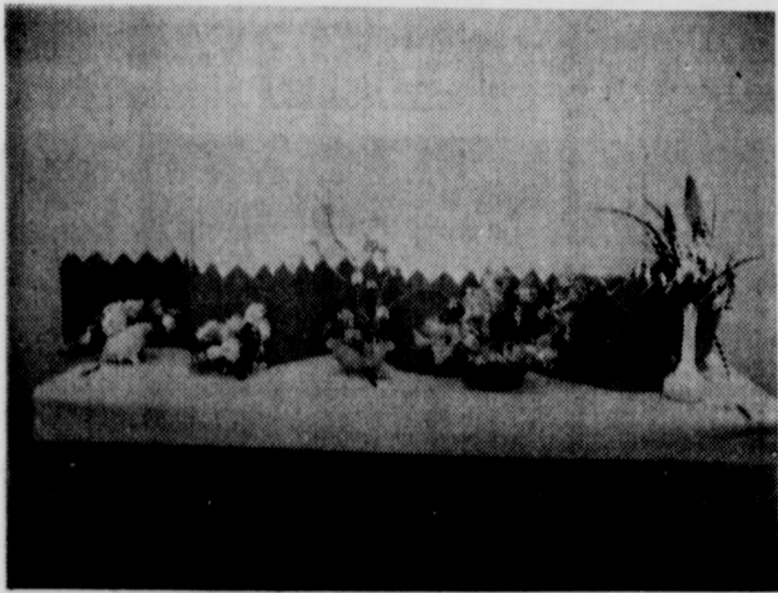

CARRIERS TO DISTRIBUTE SURVEY CARDS

Postmaster Herman Lambert reminds rural patrons of the Abernathy Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Lambert explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings.

Carriers assisting with the survey are J. D. Webb, Route 1, and Jack Hackler, Route 2.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Lambert concludes.

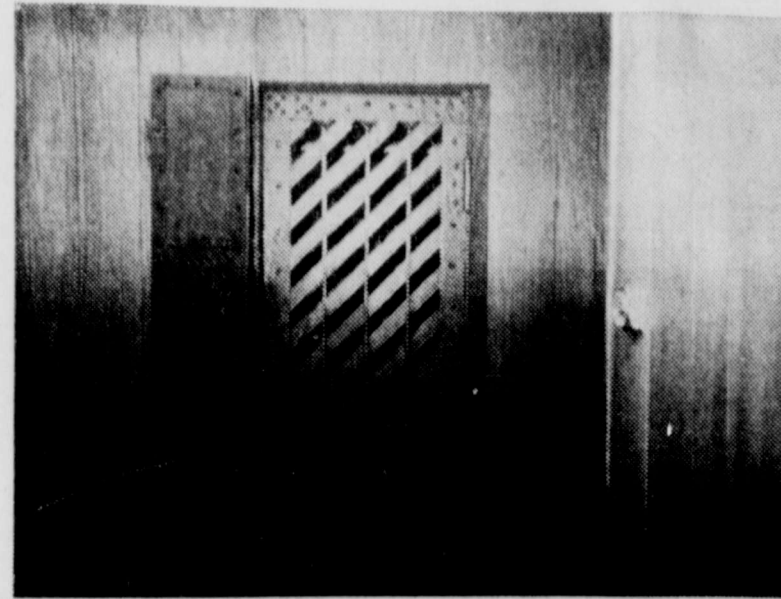

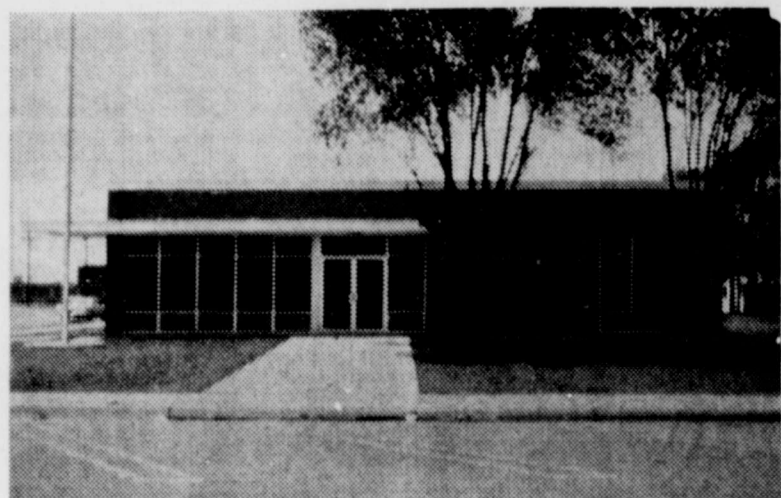

The auditors report was read and explained by Cleo Richards of the Merriam Co. of Lubbock. These also were accepted as read.

One hundred and twenty slides, in color, were shown, accompanied

by music arranged with relation to the section of the country in the slides being shown at the time. These slides were superb in the quality and clarity of detail and color. Mr. Hughes is an excellent camera man and these slides were greatly enjoyed by everyone present. The 24 or 25 minutes required to show them passed all too soon.

The benediction was given by Clayton Enger and the meeting adjourned.

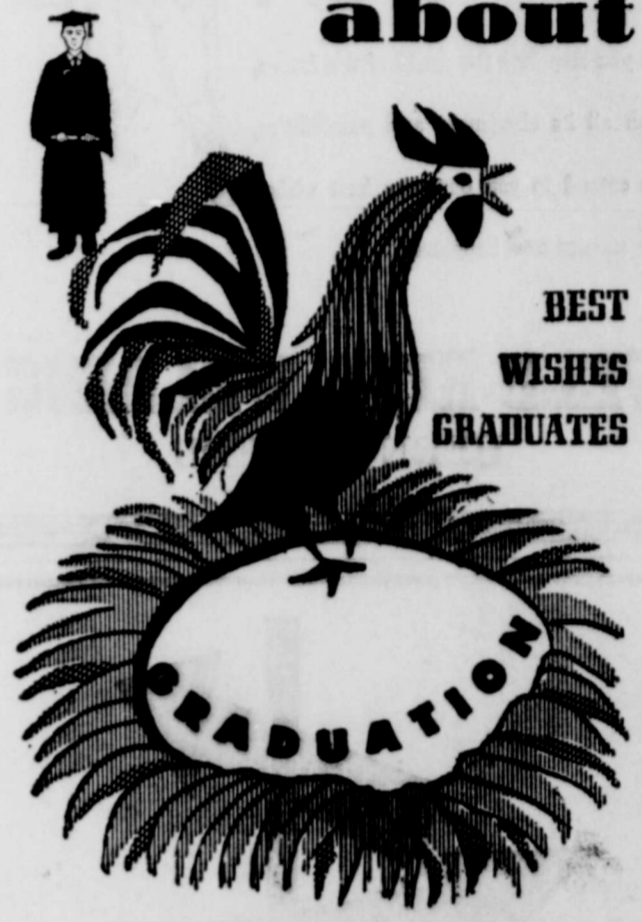

PLANTING DATES MAY INFLUENCE SIZE OF WEEVIL POPULATION

Weather conditions during the spring and early summer will to a large degree determine the size of the boll weevil population in the infested areas below the Caprock. However, farmers in infested areas should be aware of the

factors involved in both late and early planting as far as weevils are concerned. Early plantings—in some cases—gives time to set a crop before large weevil populations develop. points out Don Rummel, Extension Entomologist. food and breeding sites and allows for extra generations. If farmers in weevil infested areas would avoid planting until May 10-15, some early emerging weevils would die from lack of food. If planting takes place over a long period—early to late—emerging weevils are assured of a constant food supply, probably resulting in heavier over-all infestations, the entomologist warns.

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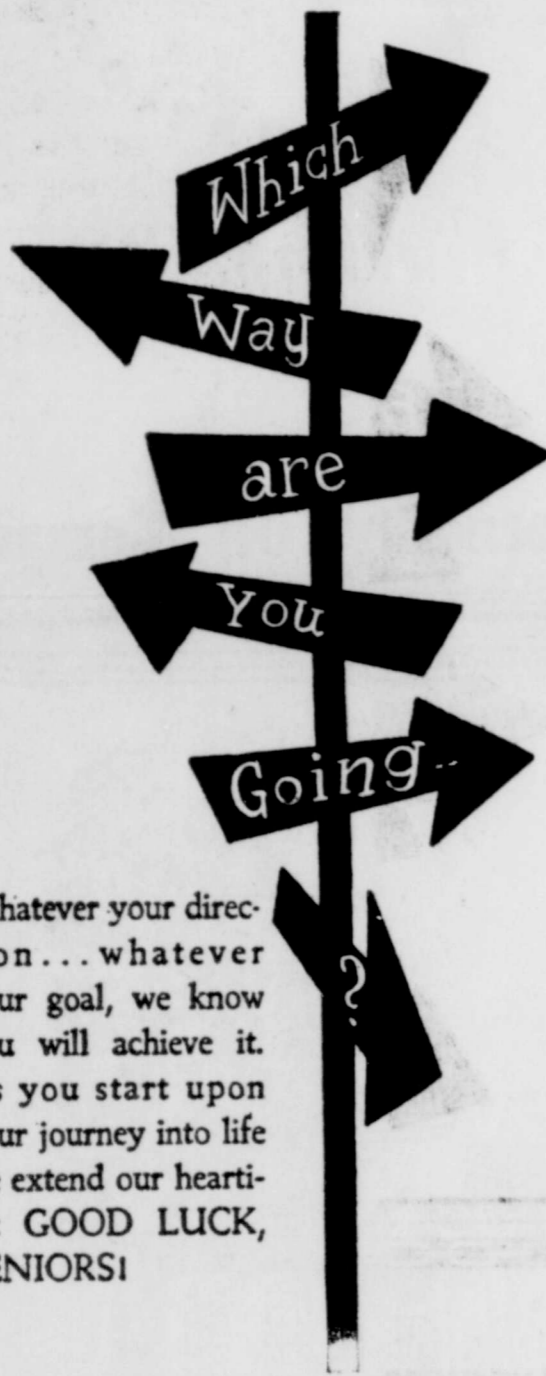
