Mrs. Edith Wilson, cafeteria Mrs. Wilson taught in Midland County Schools for eleven years prior to World War II. During WW II she became director of cafeteria services for nurses and doctors at Midland Army Flying Field, Midland, Texas.

From 1946 to 1956 Mrs. Wilson served as director of Food Serwices for the Midland Independent School District. In this capacity she planned, equipped, and directed seventeen cafeterias. In 1956 Mrs. Wilson became dietitian San Angelo College and in 1957 she re-entered Abilene Christian College to complete her degree which she received in 1958. In September of that year Mrs Wilson came to Abernathy that she might be near her two sons who were students at Texas Tech. Cecil, now of the Internal Revenue Service, and James, a mathematics and science teacher at Stam-

ford, have both graduated. Retirement from public school work does not mean the end of a long and illustrious career of service for Mrs. Wilson. For se-veral summers Mrs. Wilson with Mrs. Jewel Watson, recently retired as head of the English Department at Abilene Christian College, and Mr. Rov Watson retired, have operated Camp Klebit near Granbury, Texas. This camp at one time was Thorpe Springs Colege, now Texas Christian University. In addition to a summer camp, full approval as a foster home for underpriviledged was given this trio last fall. Because Mrs. Wilson needed one more year to complete her retirement, it was decided to wait until 1964 to start the foster home. Two children have already been placed in Mrs Wilson's home, Betty in the third grade and J. C. in the seventh grade. These two, along with eight others, will form the nucleus of the first group.
