Memorial Day Tragedy Here



A TWELVE-YEAR-OLD boy, Phillip Harrison, was fatally injured and his father, William H. Harrison, 40, was critically injured at 3:32 p.m. Saturday, Memorial Day, when the 1957 Chevrolet, shown above, was in collision with a northbound Santa Fe passenger train. The accident happened at the southeast corner of Abernathy, where FM 597 crosses the railroad track near White Gold Gln. They were taken to West Texas Hospital, Lubbock, by ambulance, where Phillip died at 6:05 p.m. Saturday. At last report, the father's condition remained critical.

William H. Harrison is the new owner of White Auto Store in Abernathy. He had been here about two weeks. Mr. Harrison and Phillip were en route to Hamlin to move the rest of the family and their household belongings to Abernathy when the accident happened.

There were several witnesses to the accident who were some distance away when the car and train hit. They included Don Halley and his two sons and Larry Northcutt. Halley is a mechanic at Abernathy Motor Co. and Larry was on a grocery delivery for Smith's Thriftway Store where he is employed.

Highway Patrolman Earl Bartley said the 1957 Chevrolet left skid marks on the pavement for 86 feet before it came in contact with the train.

Dr. Ace Powers of Seagraves was a passenger on the train. He administered first aid to the victims as best he could without medical instruments until the ambulances arrived. Phillip was thrown under the train and one of his legs was cut off. Dr. Powers was en route to Washington, D. C., where his daughter is to participate in the National spelling bee.

Phillip's death makes at least three for that highway-railroad crossing. Also, there have been other train-vehicle collisions at that crossing that did not result in death.

Funeral Is Held
Services were held Tuesday in the Church of Christ at Hamlin for 12-year-old Phillip Harrison, who died Saturday afternoon of injuries sustained in a car-passenger train collision at Abernathy. The boy's father, William H. Harrison, 40, was in serious condition at West Texas Hospital in Lubbock at last report.

En Route To Hamlin
When the mishap occurred, the father and son were en route to Hamlin to pick up the remainder of the family and return them and their belongings to Abernathy.

Harrison had lived in Abernathy two weeks.
The collision occurred just 20 feet southeast of the Abernathy city limits on F-M Road 597 at 3:32 p.m.

The Harrison boy died at 6:05 p.m. in West Texas Hospital in Lubbock. His leg was severed when he was catapulted under the Santa Fe Railway Co. passenger train.

C. of C. Meeting

The Abernathy Chamber of Commerce held its regular monthly meeting on Monday, June 1. Attending the meeting were 21 men of the community.

The elected directors of the Chamber met with newly appointed manager, Robert Barnes, at 7:00 p.m. and discussed matters which were to be presented at the general meeting. During this meeting, the directors accepted a proposal to present to the Chamber the need for office furniture in Mr. Barnes' office. They also voted to have the Chamber to decide on whether to get a telephone for Mr. Barnes.

The general meeting began at 8:00 and the minutes were read by secretary John Hale and approved by the Chamber. After the minutes were read, a report was given by the chairman of the committees appointed in the last meeting. The Chamber accepted a proposal to send flowers to Mr. Harrison, a businessman, who was injured seriously in a car-train accident here. They took up a collection after this decision and appointed Don Paxton to take care of the flowers.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:15 p.m. The next regular meeting will be held Monday, July 6.

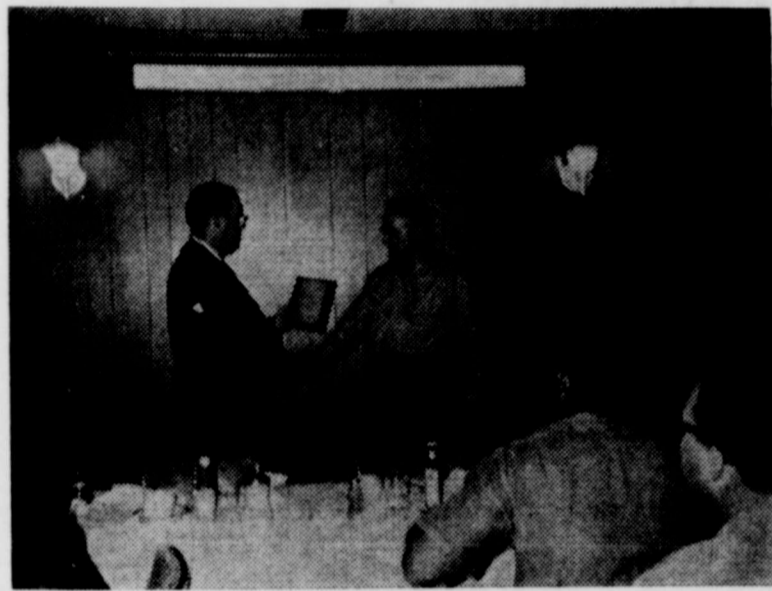
Appreciation Offered Volunteer Firemen

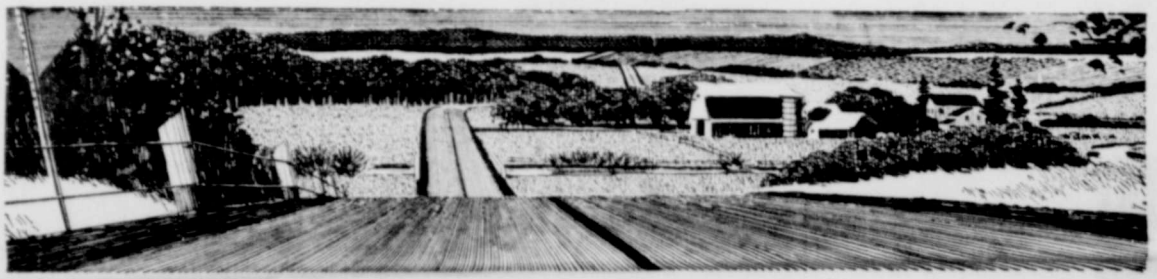
