

Two Hale Center men battled o a draw in their home town in Saturday's second Democratic Primary election, with each man getting 301 votes for Commissioner of Precinct Three, Hale County. They are Herschel Williams and R. L. Ballard.

Votes at Abernathy, which favored Williams 95, to 71 for Ballard, and at Cotton Center, 77 for Williams and 38 for Ballard, gave the victory to Williams.

Williams received a total of 473 votes, to 410 for Ballard.

ATTEND REUNION



The deficiency asserts itself in many forms-it is a contributing factor pellagra, and there's a weakened resistance to disease in the absence of sufficient protein. Dr. Lyman adddessed the recent Hu-man Nutrition Workshop at Texas A&M University.

A new research project being supported by the Cotton Producers Institute has as its goal improved luster for cotton yarns and fabrics. Scientists are attempting to develop new mechanical and chemical methods for improving luster and to determine the application of those methods to cotton yarns and fabrics.




