The scheduled visit of the Texas Tech coaches and other faculty members of Tech was ended with a dinner at Graham's Restaurant Dining Room Thursday night, June 18.

The day had begun much earlier with the Annual Abernathy-Red Raider Club Golf Tour at the Abernathy Recreation Center Golf Course. Four teams played the course and the winning team was composed of Coach Gene Gibson of Tech, Dr. John Hale, Abernathy; Dr. Cobb, Tech faculty member and Bud Vickers, Abernathy. Second place team, Dr. Boaz of Tech, Rev. Hester, County Line Baptist Church, Rev. George, Assembly of God Church, Abernathy and Ronnie Hester of County Line.

Third place went to these two teams on a tie: Jim Wright of Tech, Bill Tatum of Lubbock, Ray Pinson and Steve Guerrant of Abernathy, and Pete Wilson and Pat Scarborough of Petersburg, Merrill Green, Tech and David Pinson of Abernathy.

Low score for the course was 66 with a tie between Merrill Green and Vic Struve. Each was presented with a trophy donated by the H. D. Sparks Life Insurance Agency of Lubbock. Other players received one or more gold balls. High score and booby prize went to Lewis Lutrick.

Following the awarding of the trophies and golf balls the meal was served and enjoyed by all.

Pete Thompson welcomed all and introduced Lete Jackson who made a short talk and introduced Polk Robinson who spoke briefly on various phases of Tech football and basketball. He in turn introduced J. T. King, football coach, who talked at length on the available material for the coming season and what they hope to accomplish. Coach King then called on basketball coach Gene Gibson. With Gibson's talk finished we had a pretty good idea of what these men thought of their chances in the coming football and basketball seasons.

Tech Freshman Coach B. U. Huffman was now called on, and said they always called on him when everyone else had spoken their piece and they needed time to get re-organized and as they hadn't told him what to talk about he would have to sort of talk at random. He did and kept the crowd doubled up in hearty laughter for the next fifteen minutes.

Next on the program was a movie of film clippings of various plays in rapid succession both of football and basketball games engaged in by Tech at various times the past season. Our attention was called to certain plays and players actions calling players by name and explaining the type of play to be made. The basketball films were in color and there was no lack of action. The films concluded the program.

She was the mother of Mrs. L. L. Duckett of Abernathy.





College Station—"Safer American Families Everywhere" is the theme for National Farm Safety Week. President Lyndon B. "Notwithstanding the fact," said the President, "that hundreds of thousands of volunteer leaders and members of rural organizations actively participate in Community, state, and national safety programs which have proved effective in reducing the number and rate of accidents among farm residents, accidents still cause thousands of deaths and nearly a million disabling injuries to farm people each year. This loss of human and economic resources causes a significant adverse impact upon the economy of the nation and must be viewed as a matter of national concern."

"I feel that the many public spirited persons responsible for past and present farm safety efforts should be given renewed public recognition and support. In addition, I urge that vigorous new efforts be made to eradicate insofar as feasible, all of the reasonably foreseeable causes of farm and rural accidents. Accomplishment of that objective should be the goal of National Farm Safety Week, 1964."

Rural Accident Report Given

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 20 accidents on rural highways in Hale County during the month of May, according to Sergeant D. S. Lawson, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for sixteen persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$26,300.00.

The rural accident summary for Hale County from January through May of 1964 shows a total of 96 crashes resulting in one person killed, 60 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$82,200.00.

The Sergeant expressed serious concern over the increase in fatal motor vehicle traffic accidents and deaths throughout the state.

"For the first five months of 1964, 1025 persons have died in traffic, compared to 871 for the same period of 1963," the Sergeant stated. "This 18% increase is very alarming and when you realize our heavy volume traffic months are still ahead, we must anticipate increasing problems in the accident picture. There is an increase in all types of accidents throughout the state and it is something that merits our greatest concern," he said.

"The driving public must assist in the reduction of this trend if we are to turn it downward. Otherwise our death count at the end of the year will far exceed the record number of 2,729 deaths in Texas traffic during 1963. If you are driving, your life literally is in your own hands, so won't you help yourself and others by resolving not to become one of our statistics?" the Sergeant asked.

Hale Cattle Bangs Free

Hale County has been certified as a brucellosis (bangs) free area after tests conducted over a period of several weeks. Dr. R. D. Eaton was in charge of the U. S. Department of Agriculture animal disease eradication laboratory during the tests.

Herman West, a farmer near Plainview, was field man.

Serious brucellosis infection was found in only two or three Hale herds, assistant county agent Bobby Lemons said. Those herds and other animals found to be infested were disposed of.

"Backtagging" - a system of certifying for brucellosis eradication by vaccinating cows as they reach livestock markets is gaining popularity in Texas, according to the Texas Animal Health Commission.

During the month of April, animal health authorities received reports on 2,104 head of backtagged cattle from more than 20 slaughter establishments. When the cow is backtagged, it is numbered so that the state, county and herd of its origin can be identified at a glance. Then when it goes to slaughter, a blood sample is taken and the results of the brucellosis test recorded.

Follow-ups on the backtagged cattle, plus samples taken from 2,905 other cattle slaughtered in April produced 205 reactors, U.S. Veterinarian John L. Wilbur, Jr., reported.

Meanwhile, area testing for brucellosis eradication was proceeding in Bell, Caldwell, Guadalupe, Hale, Karnes, Uvalde, Collingsworth, Hansford, Live Oak, Polk, Pecos, and Wilson and Parker Counties, so that the only gaps in the western and Panhandle portions of the state lie in Potter, Gray, Roberts, and Hemphill Counties.

Carson County qualified as a modified-certified area, and Mitchell and Scurry counties for recertification during the month.




