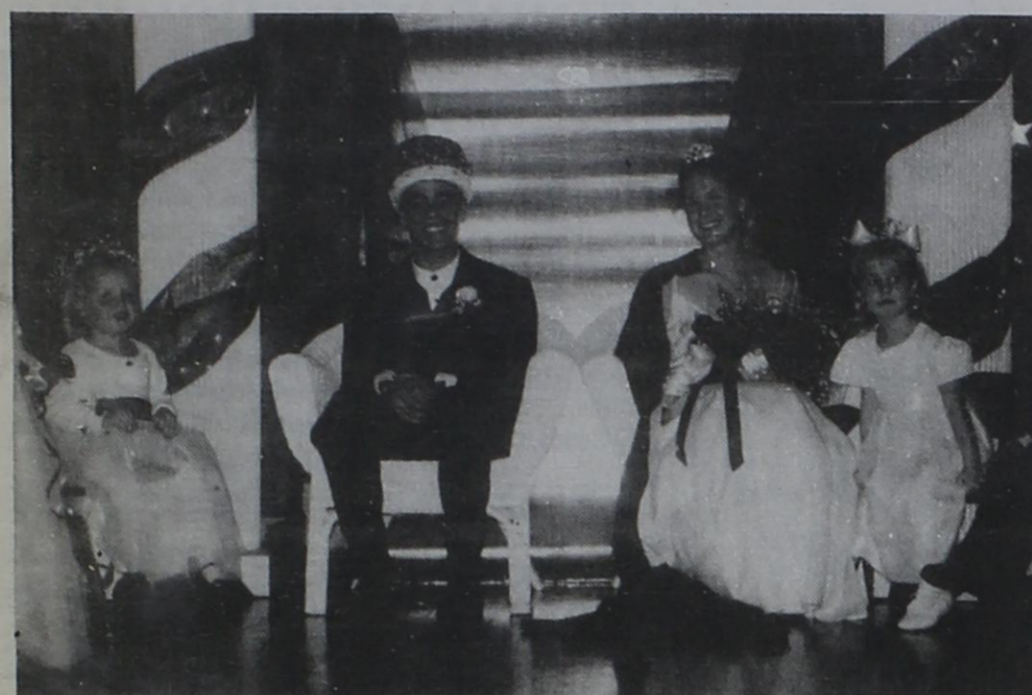

We look forward to seeing all of you there. Come and let us give thanks.

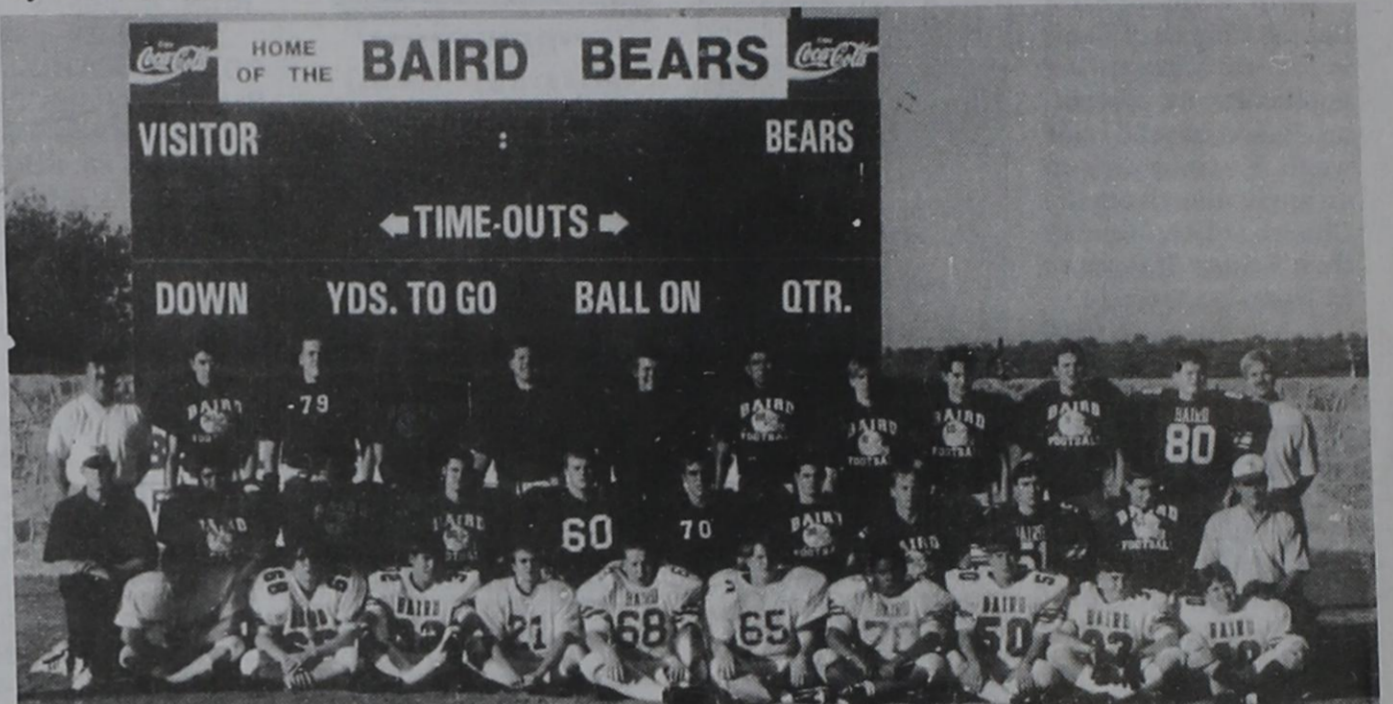

The Baird Bears traveled to Dublin to play the Tolar Rattlers for the bi-district championship, and what a scorcher it turned out to be.

The Bears won the toss and elected to receive. On that very first kick-off, Lee Harle fielded the ball at the Bears' 15 yd. line, and from the starburst return, Harle handed off the Logan Russell, who headed to the right side of the field and ran untouched 85 yds. for the T.D. The PAT was good. Score 7-0 Baird.

The Bears kicked off

and the Rattler receiver was tackled by Bucky Rivera at the Tobar 36 yd. line. Tolar went 3 plays and out and punted.

The Bears set up shop at their own 25 yd. line, but turned the ball over on a fumble at their own 44. Tolar couldn't get anything going and turned the ball over on downs.

The Bears, starting on their own 31 yd. line, went on a 69 yard drive. Because of great blocking from the offensive line of J.J. Carrillo, Ty Wilson, Dustin Watson, Coleman Vestal, Jonathan Parr, and Luke Horner, Jeremy Riney was able to score on a 2 yd. run. The PAT was no good. Score 13-0

Baird.

Baird again kicked off to the Rattlers and their receiver was gang-tackled by Robert Mendez, Jeremy Gonzales, and Bucky Rivera. Tolar went 3 plays and out, and punted. The Bears, leading 13-0, went to the air, but were intercepted at midfield. Tolar couldn't build up any steam on the turnover, thanks to the great de-

fense of Jason Gomez, Ryon Vestal, Clay Smith, Bucky Rivera on the line, linebackers Jeremy Riney, Justin Rivera, Robert Mendez, Coleman Vestal, and secondary Dusty Barron, Logan Russell, and Lee Harle. The Rattlers were forced to punt.

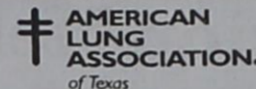

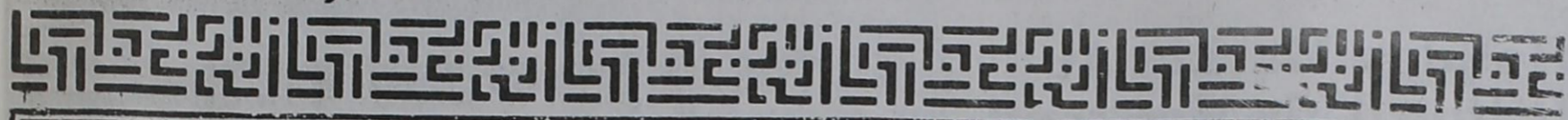

Our railroad prospects are brightening every day; every mail confirms us in the opinion that if the road does not touch our enterprising little town that it will not come near enough to it to do any damage at all. By

private communication from a party who had been in conversation with an advance prospecting engineer, now on the West side of the Brazos, we learn that it is quite certain that the road will be built on the North line after leaving the head of Palo Pinto Creek and that the locating party will within two weeks make the fact public by their locating the line there.

This line is the one recommended by Washburn who personally inspected it, and the one that leaves our little sister, Albany, about nine miles to the North. This would place the road at least twenty-five miles North of Belle Plain, her citizens ask nothing better unless it would be the confluence of two roads at this place.

At least 48 hours before digging, leveling land or drilling, be sure to place a toll-free call to 1-800-344-8377 to locate any pipeline that may be in the area. After your call is received, a representative will be sent to mark the location of the line at no cost to you.

Making this call is important to the public, you and the pipeline. It can prevent dangerous situations, property damage, disruption of service and work delays.

How to recognize a natural gas leak.

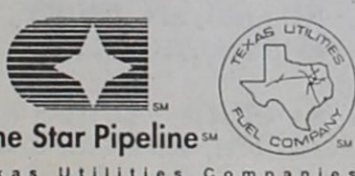
There are several signs that can indicate a pipeline leak. They include:

- ◆ Distinctive odor associated with natural gas.
- ◆ Dead vegetation in an otherwise green area.
- ◆ A hissing or roaring sound.

What to do if you find a leak.

If you find a pipeline leak, your first concern should be for your own safety and the safety of those around you. It is important to take the following steps:

- ◆ Leave the area immediately on foot.
- ◆ Avoid creating sparks that could ignite the gas.
- ◆ Do not light a match, start an engine or switch electrical equipment on or off.
- ◆ Immediately call the pipeline operator. If it is a Lone Star Pipeline Company line, call us collect at (214) 741-1671.
- ◆ If it is a Texas Utilities Fuel Company pipeline, call us collect at (214) 969-7221.
- ◆ Call 911 or the local fire and police departments.

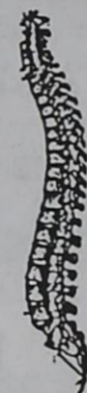

Visit To The New Dallas VA Center

On November 9th I had an appointment at the dermatology clinic in the new building at the Dallas Veterans Medical Center. As we approached that large complex I wondered at the old building, the not-so-old building and the new one and wondered at three distinctly different styles of architecture all joined together.

We entered through the big revolving doors and wondered how a disabled person could negotiate those doors in a wheel chair or one of those little motorized scooters.

Once inside it looked like we were in a great shopping mall but with very few signs or open sections. This new building had none of the more austere, utilitarian look we were accustomed to in any veterans facility I had ever been in.

One thing was the same as always. We

waited, and waited. While we waited a man told me of seeing coyotes in Arizona take his neighbors two poodles. Said he hates poodles anyhow.

About the time I was ready to throw a caffeine fit I sent my driver-guide for a cup of coffee. Wouldn't you know he came back with it just in time to see me passed in to see a practitioner. By the time three spots on my head were frozen to remove skin cancers, my coffee was now COLD.

Joe had a time locating the pharmacy where he dropped the prescriptions in the mail out box. Far too many were waiting. I was having a worse time trying to locate the travel office and worse waiting too.

I had though that with the new space they might have peopled it with enough staff to reduce the waiting.

Wrong thought. There were three places for cashiers but only one was manned and he would serve one or two then take off for a bit, serve one or two more and gone again. I don't know whether his problem was physical or mental. Anyhow I don't

get stuck for co-payment on drugs or supplies because my ID card had a purple triangle indicating service connected disability. Yes, purple like royalty but if the triangle were blue, things would cost me and if the beds were full and I needed to be hospitalized they would have to make room for me while a blue card would have to wait.

I have been told that service is so well coordinated at Big Springs any wait over fifteen minutes is quite unusual. But when we went with another veteran to Temple once, I vowed never to seek treatment there. Not only was the waiting the longest ever, but the doctors were mostly foreign. They seemed incapable of really understanding English and we certainly couldn't understand them. WHAT A MESS!

The clinic on Rosedale in Fort Worth gives as good service as any, nor is the waiting excessive.

News clippings from my blind friend in San Antonio says money for veterans is being cut and that is confusing too. How can they maintain those major centers properly on reduced appropriations yet consider opening clinics out here?

Did you know that

doctors at some military bases do not even qualify nor have licenses to practice medicine? So I have read through in some states they have to qualify just as civilian doctors but the requirements are not uniform nor am I certain every "doctor" the military might transfer in is closely checked by the states.

I once read a woman's complaint that interns practiced on our veterans. She thought it was awful but they have to learn somewhere and I have had interns do some very minor surgery on me. But on my eye and heart I was assured that interns assisted but an expert was right there. Being unconscious I can't say who did what, but I survived four by-pass and the Dallas VA hospital's record on heart surgery is one of the best in the US.

That new building is excessively spacious and was probable fantastically expensive but it is only the people at any medical establishment, not the beauty of the building, that counts.

There are signs in Dallas AVAMC saying that if you don't like the doctor assigned to your case you can ask to see the chief of service. I never have yet, but if ever faced with a crew

and had a good drive going, but it stalled out and they were forced to punt. With a good punt from Kyle Hogue, the Bears pinned the Rattlers just inside their own 20 yd. line.
