### FLB System Anniversary

As a service to farmers, the Federal Land Bank Association of Plainview will join in a national program of public information keyed to the 50th Anniversary of the Federal Land Bank System. The Plainview Association, along with some 700 other associations and the twelve Federal Land Banks, will carry out the program to make all Americans aware of the importance of agriculture.

Harold E. Akins, the local Association manager stated that large segments of the country's population, such as city dwellers, factory workers and the like, are not aware of the vital part which agricultural people take in adding to the basic strength of the nation.

With agriculture moving into a "challenging new era of development for rural America and of production for the worldwide battle against hunger," it becomes increasingly necessary that the true, complete story of agricultural progress and potentials be told, he said.

Mr. Akins noted that numerous meetings, commemorative activities and special anniversary events will get under way in the coming months, leading up to the nationwide 50th Anniversary in 1967. The twelve Federal Land Banks were established in 1917 under the Farm Loan Act.

The 50th Anniversary comes as a timely opportunity, Mr. Akins commented, to translate the accomplishments of agriculture into terms of interest for all people everywhere. He said the Federal Land Bank Association of Plainview welcomes the chance to take part in this effort.
